PREFACE.

THIS Book of Prayers is a token of the interest which the Church of Scotland takes in the seafaring community.

Remembering that some of the dearest friends of our Lord Jesus Christ when He was upon the earth were fishermen, and knowing the Christian worth of many of our toilers on the sea, and the hardships and perils of their lot in life; and believing that the spirit of devotion to God which is manifested in worship and in prayer is of great importance to all men, and specially to those whose calling is arduous, perilous, and full of temptation, the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland has directed its Committee on Aids to Devotion to issue this Prayer-book for Sailors and Fisher-folk.

It is well known that many of our sailors and fisher-folk do not need a book to help them either in their public or private prayers; but it is also well known that many of them do

need such help, and that for want of it their prayers are hindered. This book is intended to give such help.

There are many occasions when the Christian men in a ship's company or a boat's crew might worship God together, and do not, simply because none of their number dare trust himself to lead the rest, and there are many occasions on which prayers would be most becoming; say at a burial at sea, when there is a storm, when an accident has occurred to one of the crew, or when there is serious sickness on board; but from natural diffidence, or simply from not knowing what to do or say, the duty and comfort and sustaining power of prayer is wanting.

This book is intended for use on such occasions, and any one who will take the trouble carefully to look through it will find in it prayers suited to all the varying circumstances of seafaring life.

There are two services for the Lord's Day which can be used on board a ship of war, a liner, a merchant ship, or a fishing-boat, with special prayers which can be introduced into the services as occasion demands.

There is a service for the sick in hospital, and a short service which can be read to a sick shipmate, with special prayers to suit the conditions of the sick.

There is a Burial Service which can be used when no clergyman is available.

There are prayers for the use of fishermen afloat and in the fisherman's home.

For the convenience of those who may not be able to carry a Bible about with them, and in order that the proper Scripture material for a service may always be at hand in one volume, several appropriate passages of Holy Scripture are printed at the end of the book.

We invite those into whose hands this book may come to look carefully through it, when we are sure that they will find some prayers suitable to themselves and their circumstances.

We commend the book to all who are interested in sailors and fisher-folk, and specially to societies which exist for the purpose of conducting missions to seamen, in the hope that they will use it and recommend it to those whom they seek to influence for good.

We wish our sailors and fisher-folk God-speed; and our prayer is, that they may continue stedfast in the faith of Christ, and may come at last into the haven of eternal rest.

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Morning Service.

“Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power, for Thou hast created all things, and for Thy pleasure they are and were created.”

LET US PRAY.

O LORD our God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desirest not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn unto Thee and live; and hast sent Thine

only and well-beloved Son to suffer the cruel death of the cross, that by Him we may have access to Thy throne of grace; we approach Thee in His holy name, acknowledging Thee to be our God and heavenly Father, and desiring to render unto Thee the praise and worship of faithful servants, and loving children.

O most merciful Father, we acknowledge before Thee that we are sinners, and that, without Thy grace, there can be in us no goodness.

We confess, O God our Father, all our sins against Thee. It is against Thy pure and holy law that we have rebelled. It is against Thy great love that we have sinned when we have disobeyed Thee. It is Thy mercy that we have misused when we have been careless and foolish. We acknowledge our transgression; and our sin is ever before us. Against Thee, Thee only, have we sinned, and done this evil in Thy sight.

We thank Thee, O God, with all our heart, that Thou hast promised to pardon our sins. Have mercy upon us, O God, and cleanse us from our sins. We put our trust in the merits of Thy beloved Son, who gave Himself a sacrifice for our sins; and for His sake we beseech Thee to take away all our iniquity, to receive us graciously, and to supply all our need.

O Lord, of Thy good pleasure, shed abroad

Thy love in our hearts by the Holy Spirit; granting us, if it be Thy holy will, to know that we are Thy reconciled children in Jesus Christ.

Almighty God, who art the confidence of all the ends of the earth, and of them that are afar off upon the sea—our sun and shield, our refuge and defence, the strength of our heart and the rock of our salvation—enable us to put our trust in Thee. Teach us with full assurance to look up to Thee as our reconciled God and Father in Christ Jesus, and graciously remember Thy word unto Thy servants, on which Thou hast caused us to hope, that Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee.

Pardon, O God, whatever want of confidence we have shown towards Thee, and lead us henceforth by the teaching of Thy Holy Spirit to trust in Thee with all our heart. Help us to rely on the goodness of Thy providence. Increase our faith in the promises of Thy Word. Dispose us to cast upon Thee all our cares, humbly to commit to Thy keeping all our interests, and earnestly to seek the guidance of Thy wisdom and the aid of Thy strength in all our undertakings.

Teach us, O God of all grace, to depend on the merciful provisions of Thy Gospel. Counting all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus our Lord, may we seek to win Christ, and to

be found in Him, having the righteousness which is by faith. Convince us that without Him we can do nothing, but that through His strength we can do all things. May we be persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Honour and praise be to Thee, O Lord God Almighty, for all Thy mercy and loving-kindness shown unto Thy people. We thank Thee for creating us after Thine own image; for redeeming us when we were lost, with the precious blood of Thy beloved Son; for sanctifying us with Thy Holy Spirit through the revelation and knowledge of Thy Word; for helping us in all our necessities; for saving us from dangers of body and soul; for comforting us with Thy fatherly pity in all our tribulations; for giving us so long a time of repentance; and for enabling us, the living in the land of the living, to praise Thee as we do this day.

Fill our hearts with such zeal for Thy glory, that our constant endeavour may be to serve and worship Thee in spirit and in truth. Deliver us from the wiles of the devil, the snares of the world, the evil desires and affections of the flesh, and from all that may in any wise hinder us in Thy service. May Thy

Holy Spirit take such full possession of our hearts that the whole course of our lives may be ruled and guided by His power. And grant that the rest of our time in this world may be so spent in Thy fear and love, that we may end our lives in Thy favour, and finally come to Thy heavenly kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Gracious God, in whom alone dwelleth all fulness of light and wisdom, be pleased to enable us by Thy Holy Spirit to understand Thy Holy Word. Give us grace to receive it with reverence, and humility, and faith; and enable us so faithfully to obey it, that by our godly lives we may set a good example to our brethren, and glorify Thy holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen.

Here may be read a portion of the Old Testament and of the New Testament, and thereafter a Psalm, Paraphrase, or Hymn may be sung.¹ A short Address may be given, or a Sermon read, and another Psalm, Paraphrase, or Hymn may be sung.

LET US PRAY.

O GOD, who hast caused the light of Thy Word clearly to shine among us, and hast plainly instructed us in the way of salvation, let it please Thee to cause the light from heaven so to shine into our hearts and minds, that we may possess the knowledge of Thy will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding. Cause the Gospel of Christ to come to us, not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance; and enable us to receive it, not as the word of men, but as Thy Word, O living God, which worketh effectually in them that believe.

Enable us all, O Lord, daily to increase in the knowledge and love of Thee our God, and of Thy Son Jesus Christ. Every day may we be more and more zealous in the duties of religion; more frequent and more fervent in our prayers and thanksgivings; more serious in our repentance and humiliations; more desirous and better fitted to take part in all holy ordinances, and more regular and exemplary in our lives and conduct.

O God our Father, who hast made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth, and who hast commanded us to love the brotherhood and to fear Thee, enable us in the bonds of true

charity to pray for all our brethren of mankind.

Bless them, O God, that bless Thee. Sanctify them that put their trust in Thee. Save Thy people and bless Thine heritage. Give Thy peace to Thy world, to Thy Churches, and to Thy ministers, because every good gift cometh down from Thee, the Father of lights.

Grant, O Lord, that the whole world may be enlightened with the knowledge of Thy saving truth, and that Thy kingdom of grace may so universally prevail over all the earth, that Thy kingdom of glory may be hastened, and that Thy will may be done in earth as it is in heaven.

O God, who rulest over all nations, setting up one and bringing down another according to Thy will, look down with favour, we beseech Thee, on the British Empire, with all its colonies and dependencies. Promote its interests, both civil and religious, and grant that the manifold privileges we enjoy may continue unimpaired to the latest generations.

We pray for all who are in authority, especially for his most sacred Majesty King Edward, that Thou wouldst enrich him with all heavenly blessings. Protect his person; prosper his government; and make him an honoured instrument in Thy hand for the preservation and diffusion of Thy truth. We pray for her gracious Majesty Queen Alex-

andra, for the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family, that they may be enabled to adorn their exalted station with the virtues of a godly and religious life. Bless and guide all in authority in the empire, and grant that the whole community under them may lead quiet and peaceable lives in godliness and honesty.

We commend our army and navy to Thy protection, beseeching Thee to support them in all hardships, and to grant them defence and deliverance in all perils, and victory over all their enemies.

Father of mercies, we implore Thy tender compassion for all whom Thou hast visited with any affliction. Relieve the destitute; heal the sick; protect the friendless; comfort the bereaved; support the dying, and prepare them for their change. Give to all Thine afflicted ones abundant consolation, and a good hope through grace; and cause Thy fatherly chastening, though for the present grievous, to yield unto them afterward the peaceable fruit of righteousness.

We pray for our kindred, our friends, and our benefactors, that they may prosper in all things, and be in health, and above all, that their souls may prosper. We pray also, that Thou wouldst grant Thy forgiveness to such as have in any way injured us, and that Thou wouldst enable us from the heart to forgive them.

Bless us in all the works of our hands. Guide and sustain us amid the perils of our calling, and make us heartily content with whatsoever in Thy providence Thou art pleased to send.

Almighty God, who hast given the sea Thy decree, and whose dominion is over the fish of the sea and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the sea, grant Thy blessing, we beseech Thee, to all who go down to the sea in ships and do business in the great waters.

Be pleased, for Christ's sake, to bless Thy servants who now pray to Thee. Preserve us in times of storm; guide us in all our courses and in all our ventures, and prosper us in all things. Bless our loved ones in their homes; keep them from fear for us, and grant unto them the gift of perfect trust in Thee, their God and Father in Jesus Christ.

May the love of Christ be with us all to save us and make us glad. May the Holy Spirit be with us to sanctify us and keep us in the way of life. May the sense of Thy presence be ever with us, to be the strength of our life and our eternal portion.¹

Hear these our humble prayers, O God most high, pardon their imperfections, and grant us an answer in peace. Take us all into Thy gracious keeping. Lead us all forward and upward by the power of Christ dwelling in us. Teach us that we are Thine,

and heirs of the heavenly kingdom; enable us all to press toward the mark for the prize of Thy high calling; and finally, through the abounding merit and mediation of Jesus Christ our Lord, give us a place in the eternal glory; and to Thee the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, we ascribe all honour and glory, world without end. Amen.

Then may be sung a Psalm or Hymn.

“Wait on the Lord; be of good courage, and He shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the Lord.”

LET US PRAY.

○ THOU that hearest prayer, unto Thee shall all flesh come. Bow down Thine ear, O Lord; hear us, for we are poor and needy. Rejoice the souls of Thy servants;

for unto Thee do we lift up our souls. For Thou, Lord, art good, and ready to forgive, and plenteous in mercy unto all them that call upon Thee.

Almighty and most merciful Father, we present ourselves before Thee trusting not in our own worthiness, but in Thy manifold mercies. We thank Thee that Thou hast promised to hear our prayers, for the sake of Thy beloved Son; and hast also commanded us in His name to meet together, and that He has given the assurance that He will be in the midst of us.

Wherefore we beseech Thee, most gracious God, to look down upon us in pity. Cast us not out of Thy sight on account of our sins, which deserve Thy wrath; but graciously receive us for the merits of Jesus Christ, in whom thou art ever well pleased. For His sake, let it please Thee to remember us with the favour which Thou bearest unto Thine own, and to visit us with Thy salvation.

Enable us to love Thee, the Lord our God, with all our heart, and soul, and strength, and mind; and graciously cause Thy Holy Spirit so to dwell in us, that all our thoughts, and words, and deeds may be to the praise and honour of Thy name. May our light so shine before men, that they may see our good works, and glorify Thee, our Father in heaven.

O God, who hast called us of Thy free grace to be heirs of Thy heavenly kingdom with

Jesus Christ Thy Son, let it please Thee to increase our faith and knowledge, and so to enlighten our minds and sanctify our hearts, that we may stedfastly walk before Thee in all holiness, and finally obtain an entrance into Thy kingdom of glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Grant also, O Lord, that we may be nourished by Thy goodness with all things which Thou knowest to be needful for us, and may be enabled to use Thy gifts with contentment and thankfulness. And because we are so frail and prone to evil, and so constantly beset by our spiritual foes that we cannot stand in our own strength, we earnestly beseech Thee so to arm us with Thy grace, and to strengthen us with the might of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may withstand all temptation, and finally obtain the victory over all our enemies.

We adore Thee, O God, as the Father of lights, from whom cometh down every good and perfect gift. We thank Thee for the revelation which Thou hast made of Thyself, and of Thy holy will in the written Word, and in Christ Himself, the living Word, the life and light of men. And now we pray Thee of Thine infinite mercy so to cause the pure light of divine knowledge to shine into our hearts and minds, that we may comprehend the precepts of the Gospel of Christ. Plant in us also, we beseech Thee, the holy

fear of Thy blessed commandments, that, trampling upon all carnal lusts, we may seek a heavenly citizenship, both saying and doing always such things as shall please Thee.

O Lord our God, who knowest that we have daily need of Thy divine aid and guidance in our pilgrimage, dispose us, with true humility, to rely on the teaching of Thy Word and the grace of Thy Holy Spirit. Convince us of our ignorance and blindness; cause us ever to have recourse to Thee, lest in any way we be seduced by the wiles of the tempter or the wickedness of ungodly men; and so direct us, that we may at last come to that heavenly glory which has been purchased for us by the blood of Thy dear Son.

Graciously hear us, for the sake of Jesus Christ, who hath taught us thus to pray:—

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. Let the people praise Thee, O God, let all the people praise Thee. O let the nations be glad, and sing for joy; for Thou shalt judge the people righteously, and govern the nations upon earth. Let the people praise Thee, O God, let all the people praise Thee. Then shall the earth yield her increase; and God, even our own God, shall bless us. God shall bless us; and all the ends of the earth shall fear Him.

Enlighten our minds, we beseech Thee, by Thy Holy Spirit, that we may be guided in ways of righteousness. Defend us in soul and

body from all evil. Take us into Thy good keeping all the days of our lives, and ever increase in us the gifts of Thy grace, until we be perfected in the glory of Thy Son Jesus Christ, who shall replenish our souls with His everlasting light and gladness.

We pray, O heavenly Father, in the spirit of Christ, for all our brethren of mankind. Be pleased to make known the way of salvation to all who now sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, that they may come forth into light, and may by faith receive the life eternal. Bring thine ancient people Israel, with the fulness of the Gentiles, into the Church of Christ.

Father of lights, from whom cometh down every good and perfect gift, be pleased, we pray Thee, to bless Thy Church on earth; and grant unto all preachers and ministers of Thy Word the gifts of Thy Holy Spirit, and to all Thy children grace, that they may believe unto salvation, and persevere in holiness unto the end. Bless the faithful and the strong. Confirm the fearful and the wavering. Grant to the seekers after truth that they may find in Christ the way, the truth, the life. Remove the doubts of the doubting; and cause, by Thine almighty power, the glory of the kingdom of Christ to prevail everywhere among the children of men.

Bless, we pray Thee, his most sacred Majesty King Edward, her gracious Majesty

Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family. Grant, O King of kings and Lord of lords, that they may all be members of the household of faith, and heirs of the heavenly kingdom.

O God, who rulest over all nations, setting up one and bringing down another according to Thy will, look down with favour, we beseech Thee, on the British Empire, with all its colonies and dependencies. Promote and strengthen good and wise government therein; and bless all the people with peace, to the praise of Thy holy name and the increase of the happiness of the whole world.

Enlighten and direct, by Thy heavenly wisdom, O God, we beseech Thee, all persons set in authority in the realm; and enable them, in their various stations and offices, to advance Thy glory and the public good.

Bless, we pray Thee, the British navy and army. May it please Thee to strengthen and protect all who serve therein, and to make them, under Thy will, the means of preserving peace and defending liberty.

Guide and protect all who travel by land or sea,—all exiles, all emigrants, and all who are solitary and desolate. Cheer them with a comfortable sense of Thy presence.

O God, who holdest the waters in the hollow of Thy hand, who stayest the rough wind in the day of the east wind, and who makest the stormy wind to fulfil Thy pleasure, bless and

keep, we beseech Thee for Christ's sake, all mariners and fishermen. Preserve them by Thine almighty power in every time of peril, give them faith in Jesus Christ of Nazareth, who stilled the tempest on the sea of Galilee, and grant that by the power of His love they may be saved.

God of all comfort, we commend unto Thee all those whom Thou hast in any wise afflicted; all nations visited with pestilence, famine, or war; all persons suffering from poverty, sickness, bondage, or other distress, whether of body or of mind; and we beseech Thee to show them Thy fatherly kindness, and to overrule all these evil things for their good, to the end that, turning with their whole hearts unto Thee, they may receive perfect consolation now, and in Thy good time full deliverance from all their troubles.

Prepare us, O God, for every event that may befall us. So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. O satisfy us early with Thy mercy, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days. Guide us by Thy counsel while we live, and afterwards receive us into glory.¹

And now, Lord, what wait we for? Our hope is in Thee. Be pleased to accept our worship; to forgive our sins; and to grant us, for the sake of Thy beloved Son, what-

soever good things we have asked of Thee in His name.

I.

TO BE USED WHEN THERE ARE EMIGRANTS
ON BOARD.

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father, we, Thy children, who are now called in Thy providence to leave our native shores, and to pass through the great ocean, desire to commend ourselves to Thy care. We beseech Thee, who stillest the noise of the waves, and holdest the winds in the hollow of Thy hand, to deliver us, and those who sail with us, from all the perils to which we are exposed, and to grant us a swift and prosperous voyage to our desired haven. Preserve, O Lord, to the end, all our sojourning in this life, without harm and without storm.

We pray for those of us who are emigrating to a distant country, that it may please Thee, by whom all things are ordered, to provide for us new homes in the land of our adoption. Aid us in all our lawful undertakings. Bless us in our basket and our store. And above all, supply to us and to our families the means of grace, that our souls may be nourished and strengthened unto eternal life.

O Lord our God, from whom alone come strength and light, enable us to hold fast those precious truths of Thy blessed Word in which we have been instructed. Though far removed from the sanctuaries of our fathers, suffer us not, we beseech Thee, to be moved away from the faith and hope of the Gospel which we have heard.

O God of our fathers, we commend to Thy care our dear friends whom we have left in the land of our nativity. Encompass them with Thy favour as with a shield. Enrich them with the treasures of Thy grace. Cheer us from time to time with tidings of their welfare. And though we should never again see them in this world, may we meet them at last in our Father's house, and there be made perfectly blessed with them in the full enjoying of Thee to all eternity, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

II.

ON THE OCCASION OF A STORM OR OTHER
DANGER AT SEA.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who art our refuge and our strength, a very present help in trouble, have mercy upon us, and hear our prayer. Out of the depths do we cry unto Thee. Rebuke the wind and the sea, O God, and let there be a calm. Deliver us in this time of our extremity, that we may yet live to serve Thee, and to glorify Thy holy name.

We acknowledge that we have justly provoked Thy judgments. Our iniquities have taken hold upon us, so that we are not able to look up: they are without number, therefore our hearts fail us. O God, whose mercy is infinite, be Thou pleased to deliver us. O Lord, make haste to help us. Enter not into judgment with Thy servants, we beseech Thee; for in Thy sight shall no man living be justified.

For the sake of Jesus Christ, who is able to save to the uttermost the chief of sinners, receive us graciously, forgive us freely; restore unto us the joys of Thy salvation, and uphold us with Thy free Spirit.

Give Thy blessing to the captain, the officers, and sailors of this ship. Give them wisdom, courage, and endurance, that by Thy grace

they may bring us safely through this time of peril.

Help us all, O God, to commit ourselves to Thee, as to a faithful Creator and Redeemer, who hast said that Thou wilt never leave us nor forsake us. And if it be Thy will that these waters should overwhelm us, let our souls be safe in Thy hands, kept by Thy power unto life everlasting. Be merciful to our relatives and friends. Comfort them. MERCIFUL FATHER, who hast taught us in Thy Holy Word that Thou dost not willingly afflict the children of men, look with compassion, we beseech Thee, on this Thy servant.

Sanctify to him Thy fatherly correction, that it may yield in him the peaceable fruits of righteousness. Teach him to submit with meekness to Thy will. Comfort him with a persuasion of Thy favour. Support him with the hope of eternal life.

We earnestly pray that, if it seem good to Thee, Thou wouldst bless the means employed for his recovery, that his sufferings may be relieved, his health restored, and his days prolonged to serve Thee on the earth. But if Thou hast appointed that this sickness shall be unto death, prepare him, O God, to depart in peace, and mercifully receive him into those blessed mansions which are prepared in heaven for the redeemed.

Give to him, O Father in heaven, assurance of Thy favour. Give to him, O Christ, the peace which the world cannot give. Give to him, O Holy Spirit, the light and comfort which can guide through life and through death.

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. *Amen.*

O God, who hast prepared for us in heaven a better and more enduring inheritance than can be found on earth, dispose us to seek those things which are above; and enable us so to look at the things which are unseen and eternal, that we may bear patiently all present hardships, and may reckon them unworthy to be compared with the glory which shall hereafter be revealed in us.

Merciful Father, who hast given Thine own Son to be the propitiation for our sins, grant us, for His sake, Thy mercy to forgive us and Thy grace to help us. Pardon all the defects of our love to Thee, and all the excess of our love for earthly things. Turn our inclinations and affections from those vain objects which would draw away our hearts

from Thee. Give to us clear views of Thine excellency, and impress us with a lively sense of Thy goodness. Above all, teach us to comprehend, with all saints, the breadth, and length, and depth, and height of Thy love towards us in Jesus Christ.

Graciously hear and answer us, O Lord, according to the fulness of Thy mercy in Christ Jesus, our Lord and Saviour.

Select Portions from the Old Testament

WHICH MAY BE USED IN THE SERVICES
CONTAINED IN THIS BOOK.

I.

EXODUS XIV.

AND the Lord spake unto Moses, saying,
Speak unto the children of Israel, that
they turn and encamp before Pi-hahiroth,
between Migdol and the sea, over against
Baal-zephon: before it shall ye encamp by
the sea.

For Pharaoh will say of the children of
Israel, They are entangled in the land, the
wilderness hath shut them in.

And I will harden Pharaoh's heart, that he
shall follow after them; and I will be honoured
upon Pharaoh, and upon all his host; that the
Egyptians may know that I am the Lord.
And they did so.

And it was told the king of Egypt that the people fled: and the heart of Pharaoh and of his servants was turned against the people, and they said, Why have we done this, that we have let Israel go from serving us?

And he made ready his chariot, and took his people with him:

And he took six hundred chosen chariots, and all the chariots of Egypt, and captains over every one of them.

And the Lord hardened the heart of Pharaoh king of Egypt, and he pursued after the children of Israel: and the children of Israel went out with an high hand.

But the Egyptians pursued after them, all the horses and chariots of Pharaoh, and his horsemen, and his army, and overtook them encamping by the sea, beside Pi-hahiroth, before Baal-zephon.

And when Pharaoh drew nigh, the children of Israel lifted up their eyes, and, behold, the Egyptians marched after them; and they were sore afraid: and the children of Israel cried out unto the Lord.

And they said unto Moses, Because there were no graves in Egypt, hast thou taken us away to die in the wilderness? wherefore hast thou dealt thus with us, to carry us forth out of Egypt?

Is not this the word that we did tell thee in Egypt, saying, Let us alone, that we may serve the Egyptians? For it had been better

for us to serve the Egyptians, than that we should die in the wilderness.

And Moses said unto the people, Fear ye not, stand still, and see the salvation of the Lord, which He will show to you to-day: for the Egyptians whom ye have seen to-day, ye shall see them again no more for ever.

The Lord shall fight for you, and ye shall hold your peace.

And the Lord said unto Moses, Wherefore criest thou unto me? speak unto the children of Israel, that they go forward.

But lift thou up thy rod, and stretch out thine hand over the sea, and divide it; and the children of Israel shall go on dry ground through the midst of the sea.

And I, behold, I will harden the hearts of the Egyptians, and they shall follow them: and I will get me honour upon Pharaoh, and upon all his host, upon his chariots, and upon his horsemen.

And the Egyptians shall know that I am the Lord, when I have gotten me honour upon Pharaoh, upon his chariots, and upon his horsemen.

And the angel of God, which went before the camp of Israel, removed and went behind them; and the pillar of the cloud went from before their face, and stood behind them:

And it came between the camp of the Egyptians and the camp of Israel; and it was a cloud and darkness to them, but it gave

light by night to these: so that the one came not near the other all the night.

And Moses stretched out his hand over the sea; and the Lord caused the sea to go back by a strong east wind all that night, and made the sea dry land, and the waters were divided.

And the children of Israel went into the midst of the sea upon the dry ground: and the waters were a wall unto them on their right hand, and on their left.

And the Egyptians pursued, and went in after them to the midst of the sea, even all Pharaoh's horses, his chariots, and his horsemen.

And it came to pass, that in the morning watch the Lord looked unto the host of the Egyptians through the pillar of fire and of the cloud, and troubled the host of the Egyptians.

And took off their chariot wheels, that they drave them heavily: so that the Egyptians said, Let us flee from the face of Israel; for the Lord fighteth for them against the Egyptians.

And the Lord said unto Moses, Stretch out thine hand over the sea, that the waters may come again upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots, and upon their horsemen.

And Moses stretched forth his hand over the sea, and the sea returned to his strength when the morning appeared; and the Egyptians fled against it; and the Lord overthrew the Egyptians in the midst of the sea.

And the waters returned, and covered the chariots, and the horsemen, and all the host of Pharaoh that came into the sea after them; there remained not so much as one of them.

But the children of Israel walked upon dry land in the midst of the sea; and the waters were a wall unto them on their right hand, and on their left.

Thus the Lord saved Israel that day out of the hand of the Egyptians: and Israel saw the Egyptians dead upon the sea-shore.

And Israel saw that great work which the Lord did upon the Egyptians: and the people feared the Lord, and believed the Lord, and his servant Moses.

II.

I CHRONICLES XVI. 7-36.

THEN on that day David delivered first this psalm, to thank the Lord, into the hand of Asaph and his brethren.

Give thanks unto the Lord, call upon His name, make known His deeds among the people.

Sing unto Him, sing psalms unto Him, talk ye of all His wondrous works.

Glory ye in His holy name: let the heart of them rejoice that seek the Lord.

Seek the Lord and His strength, seek His face continually.

Remember His marvellous works that He hath done, His wonders, and the judgments of His mouth;

O ye seed of Israel His servant, ye children of Jacob, His chosen ones.

He is the Lord our God; His judgments are in all the earth.

Be ye mindful always of His covenant, the word which He commanded to a thousand generations;

Even of the covenant which He made with Abraham, and of His oath unto Isaac;

And hath confirmed the same to Jacob for a law, and to Israel for an everlasting covenant,

Saying, Unto thee will I give the land of Canaan, the lot of your inheritance;

When ye were but few, even a few, and strangers in it.

And when they went from nation to nation, and from one kingdom to another people,

He suffered no man to do them wrong; yea, He reproved kings for their sakes,

Saying, Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm.

Sing unto the Lord, all the earth; show forth from day to day His salvation.

Declare His glory among the heathen; His marvellous works among all nations.

For great is the Lord, and greatly to be

praised: He also is to be feared above all gods.

For all the gods of the people are idols: but the Lord made the heavens.

Glory and honour are in His presence; strength and gladness are in His place.

Give unto the Lord, ye kindreds of the people, give unto the Lord glory and strength.

Give unto the Lord the glory due unto His name: bring an offering, and come before Him; worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness.

Fear before Him, all the earth: the world also shall be stable, that it be not moved.

Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; and let men say among the nations, The Lord reigneth.

Let the sea roar, and the fulness thereof: let the fields rejoice, and all that is therein.

Then shall the trees of the wood sing out at the presence of the Lord, because He cometh to judge the earth.

O give thanks unto the Lord; for He is good: for His mercy endureth for ever.

And say ye, Save us, O God of our salvation, and gather us together, and deliver us from the heathen, that we may give thanks to Thy holy name, and glory in Thy praise.

Blessed be the Lord God of Israel for ever and ever. And all the people said, Amen, and praised the Lord.

III.

PSALM XCVI.

O SING unto the Lord a new song; sing unto the Lord, all the earth.

Sing unto the Lord, bless His name; show forth His salvation from day to day.

Declare His glory among the heathen, His wonders among all people.

For the Lord is great, and greatly to be praised: He is to be feared above all gods.

For all the gods of the nations are idols: but the Lord made the heavens.

Honour and majesty are before Him: strength and beauty are in His sanctuary.

Give unto the Lord, O ye kindreds of the people, give unto the Lord glory and strength.

Give unto the Lord the glory due unto His name: bring an offering, and come into His courts.

O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness: fear before Him, all the earth.

Say among the heathen that the Lord reigneth: the world also shall be established that it shall not be moved: He shall judge the people righteously.

Let the heavens rejoice, and let the earth be glad; let the sea roar, and the fulness thereof.

Let the field be joyful, and all that is

therein; then shall all the trees of the wood rejoice.

Before the Lord; for He cometh, for He cometh to judge the earth: He shall judge the world with righteousness, and the people with His truth.

IV.

PSALM CXXXV.

PRAISE ye the Lord. Praise ye the name of the Lord; praise Him, O ye servants of the Lord.

Ye that stand in the house of the Lord, in the courts of the house of our God,

Praise the Lord; for the Lord is good: sing praises unto His name; for it is pleasant.

For the Lord hath chosen Jacob unto Himself, and Israel for His peculiar treasure.

For I know that the Lord is great, and that our Lord is above all gods.

Whatsoever the Lord pleased, that did He in heaven, and in earth, in the seas, and all deep places.

He causeth the vapours to ascend from the ends of the earth: He maketh lightnings for the rain: He bringeth the wind out of His treasures.

Who smote the first-born of Egypt, both of man and beast.

Who sent tokens and wonders into the midst of thee, O Egypt, upon Pharaoh, and upon all his servants.

Who smote great nations, and slew mighty kings;

Sihon king of the Amorites, and Og king of Bashan, and all the kingdoms of Canaan :

And gave their land for an heritage, an heritage unto Israel His people.

Thy name, O Lord, endureth for ever ; and Thy memorial, O Lord, throughout all generations.

For the Lord will judge His people, and He will repent Himself concerning His servants.

The idols of the heathen are silver and gold, the work of men's hands.

They have mouths, but they speak not ; eyes have they, but they see not ;

They have ears, but they hear not ; neither is there any breath in their mouths.

They that make them are like unto them : so is every one that trusteth in them.

Bless the Lord, O house of Israel : bless the Lord, O house of Aaron :

Bless the Lord, O house of Levi : ye that fear the Lord, bless the Lord.

Blessed be the Lord out of Zion, which dwelleth at Jerusalem. Praise ye the Lord.

V.

PSALM CVII.

○ GIVE thanks unto the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth for ever.

Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, whom He hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy;

And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west, from the north, and from the south.

They wandered in the wilderness in a solitary way; they found no city to dwell in.

Hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted in them.

Then they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, and He delivered them out of their distresses.

And He led them forth by the right way, that they might go to a city of habitation.

Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men!

For He satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness.

Such as sit in darkness, and in the shadow of death, being bound in affliction and iron;

Because they rebelled against the words of God, and contemned the counsel of the Most High:

Therefore He brought down their heart with labour : they fell down, and there was none to help.

Then they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, and He saved them out of their distresses.

He brought them out of darkness and the shadow of death, and brake their bands in sunder.

Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men !

For He hath broken the gates of brass, and cut the bars of iron in sunder.

Fools, because of their transgression and because of their iniquities, are afflicted :

Their soul abhorreth all manner of meat ; and they draw near unto the gates of death.

Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble, and He saveth them out of their distresses.

He sent His word, and healed them, and delivered them from their destructions.

Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men !

And let them sacrifice the sacrifices of thanksgiving, and declare His works with rejoicing.

They that go down to the sea in ships, that do business in great waters ;

These see the works of the Lord, and His wonders in the deep.

For He commandeth, and raiseth the stormy wind, which lifteth up the waves thereof.

They mount up to the heaven, they go down again to the depths: their soul is melted because of trouble.

They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, and are at their wit's end.

Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble, and He bringeth them out of their distresses.

He maketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still.

Then are they glad because they be quiet; so He bringeth them unto their desired haven.

Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men!

Let them exalt Him also in the congregation of the people, and praise Him in the assembly of the elders.

He turneth rivers into a wilderness, and the water-springs into dry ground;

A fruitful land into barrenness, for the wickedness of them that dwell therein.

He turneth the wilderness into a standing water, and dry ground into water-springs.

And there He maketh the hungry to dwell, that they may prepare a city for habitation;

And sow the fields, and plant vineyards, which may yield fruits of increase.

He blesseth them also, so that they are multiplied greatly, and suffereth not their cattle to decrease.

Again, they are minished and brought low through oppression, affliction, and sorrow.

He poureth contempt upon princes, and causeth them to wander in the wilderness, where there is no way.

Yet setteth He the poor on high from affliction, and maketh Him families like a flock.

The righteous shall see it, and rejoice; and all iniquity shall stop her mouth.

Whoso is wise, and will observe these things, even they shall understand the loving-kindness of the Lord.

VI.

ISAIAH XLII. 1-12.

BEHOLD my servant, whom I uphold; mine elect, in whom my soul delighteth: I have put my Spirit upon Him; He shall bring forth judgment to the Gentiles.

He shall not cry, nor lift up, nor cause His voice to be heard in the street.

A bruised reed shall He not break, and the smoking flax shall He not quench: He shall bring forth judgment unto truth.

He shall not fail nor be discouraged, till He have set judgment in the earth: and the isles shall wait for His law.

Thus saith God the Lord, He that created

the heavens, and stretched them out; He that spread forth the earth, and that which cometh out of it; He that giveth breath unto the people upon it, and spirit to them that walk therein:

I the Lord have called Thee in righteousness, and will hold Thine hand, and will keep Thee, and give Thee for a covenant of the people, for a light of the Gentiles.

To open the blind eyes, to bring out the prisoners from the prison, and them that sit in darkness out of the prison house.

I am the Lord; that is my name: and my glory will I not give to another, neither my praise to graven images.

Behold, the former things are come to pass, and new things do I declare: before they spring forth I tell you of them.

Sing unto the Lord a new song, and His praise from the end of the earth, ye that go down to the sea, and all that is therein; the isles, and inhabitants thereof.

Let the wilderness and the cities thereof lift up their voice, the villages that Kedar doth inhabit: let the inhabitants of the rock sing, let them shout from the top of the mountains.

Let them give glory unto the Lord, and declare His praise in the islands.

Select Portions from the New Testament

WHICH MAY BE USED IN THE SERVICES
CONTAINED IN THIS BOOK.

I.

MATTHEW VI. 19-34.

LAY not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal :

But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal :

For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

The light of the body is the eye : if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light.

But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the

light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness!

No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon.

Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment?

Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better than they?

Which of you, by taking thought, can add one cubit unto his stature?

And why take ye thought for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they toil not, neither do they spin:

And yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.

Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to-day is, and to-morrow is cast into the oven, shall He not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith?

Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed?

(For after all these things do the Gentiles seek;) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things.

But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.

Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof.

II.

LUKE VIII. 4-25.

AND when much people were gathered together, and were come to Him out of every city, He spake by a parable:

A sower went out to sow his seed: and as he sowed, some fell by the way-side; and it was trodden down, and the fowls of the air devoured it.

And some fell upon a rock; and as soon as it was sprung up, it withered away, because it lacked moisture.

And some fell among thorns; and the thorns sprang up with it, and choked it.

And other fell on good ground, and sprang up, and bare fruit an hundred-fold. And when He had said these things, He cried, He that hath ears to hear, let him hear.

And His disciples asked Him, saying, What might this parable be?

And He said, Unto you it is given to know

the mysteries of the kingdom of God : but to others in parables ; that seeing they might not see, and hearing they might not understand.

Now the parable is this : The seed is the word of God.

Those by the way-side are they that hear ; then cometh the devil, and taketh away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved.

They on the rock are they, which, when they hear, receive the word with joy ; and these have no root, which for a while believe, and in time of temptation fall away.

And that which fell among thorns are they, which, when they have heard, go forth, and are choked with cares and riches and pleasures of this life, and bring no fruit to perfection.

But that on the good ground are they, which in an honest and good heart, having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience.

No man, when he hath lighted a candle, covereth it with a vessel, or putteth it under a bed ; but setteth it on a candlestick, that they which enter in may see the light.

For nothing is secret that shall not be made manifest ; neither any thing hid that shall not be known and come abroad.

Take heed therefore how ye hear : for whosoever hath, to him shall be given ; and whosoever hath not, from him shall be taken even that which he seemeth to have.

Then came to Him His mother and His brethren, and could not come at Him for the press.

And it was told Him by certain, which said, Thy mother and thy brethren stand without, desiring to see Thee.

And He answered and said unto them, My mother and my brethren are these which hear the word of God and do it.

Now it came to pass on a certain day, that He went into a ship with His disciples: and He said unto them, Let us go over unto the other side of the lake. And they launched forth.

But as they sailed He fell asleep: and there came down a storm of wind on the lake; and they were filled with water, and were in jeopardy.

And they came to Him, and awoke Him, saying, Master, master, we perish! Then He arose, and rebuked the wind and the raging of the water: and they ceased, and there was a calm.

And He said unto them, Where is your faith? And they being afraid wondered, saying one to another, What manner of man is this! for He commandeth even the winds and the water, and they obey Him.

III.

ACTS XXVII.

AND when it was determined that we should sail into Italy, they delivered Paul and certain other prisoners unto one named Julius, a centurion of Augustus' band.

And entering into a ship of Adramyttium, we launched, meaning to sail by the coasts of Asia; one Aristarchus, a Macedonian of Thessalonica, being with us.

And the next day we touched at Sidon. And Julius courteously entreated Paul, and gave him liberty to go unto his friends to refresh himself.

And when we had launched from thence, we sailed under Cyprus, because the winds were contrary.

And when we had sailed over the sea of Cilicia and Pamphylia, we came to Myra, a city of Lycia.

And there the centurion found a ship of Alexandria sailing into Italy; and he put us therein.

And when we had sailed slowly many days, and scarce were come over against Cnidus, the wind not suffering us, we sailed under Crete, over against Salmone;

And, hardly passing it, came unto a place

which is called the Fair Havens; nigh whereunto was the city of Lasea.

Now when much time was spent, and when sailing was now dangerous, because the fast was now already past, Paul admonished them.

And said unto them, Sirs, I perceive that this voyage will be with hurt and much damage, not only of the lading and ship, but also of our lives.

Nevertheless the centurion believed the master and the owner of the ship, more than those things which were spoken by Paul.

And because the haven was not commodious to winter in, the more part advised to depart thence also, if by any means they might attain to Phenice, and there to winter; which is an haven of Crete, and lieth toward the south-west and north-west.

And when the south wind blew softly, supposing that they had obtained their purpose, loosing thence, they sailed close by Crete.

But not long after there arose against it a tempestuous wind, called Euroclydon.

And when the ship was caught, and could not bear up into the wind, we let her drive.

And running under a certain island which is called Claudia, we had much work to come by the boat:

Which when they had taken up, they used helps, undergirding the ship; and, fearing lest they should fall into the quicksands, strake sail, and so were driven.

And we being exceedingly tossed with a tempest, the next day they lightened the ship;

And the third day we cast out with our own hands the tackling of the ship.

And when neither sun nor stars in many days appeared, and no small tempest lay on us, all hope that we should be saved was then taken away.

But after long abstinence Paul stood forth in the midst of them, and said, Sirs, ye should have hearkened unto me, and not have loosed from Crete, and to have gained this harm and loss.

And now I exhort you to be of good cheer: for there shall be no loss of any man's life among you, but of the ship.

For there stood by me this night the angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve,

Saying, Fear not, Paul; thou must be brought before Cesar: and, lo, God hath given thee all them that sail with thee.

Wherefore, sirs, be of good cheer: for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me.

Howbeit we must be cast upon a certain island.

But when the fourteenth night was come, as we were driven up and down in Adria, about midnight the shipmen deemed that they drew near to some country;

And sounded, and found it twenty fathoms:

and when they had gone a little farther, they sounded again, and found it fifteen fathoms.

Then fearing lest we should have fallen upon rocks, they cast four anchors out of the stern, and wished for the day.

And as the shipmen were about to flee out of the ship, when they had let down the boat into the sea, under colour as though they would have cast anchors out of the foreship,

Paul said to the centurion and to the soldiers, Except these abide in the ship, ye cannot be saved.

Then the soldiers cut off the ropes of the boat, and let her fall off.

And while the day was coming on, Paul besought them all to take meat, saying, This day is the fourteenth day that ye have tarried and continued fasting, having taken nothing.

Wherefore I pray you to take some meat; for this is for your health: for there shall not an hair fall from the head of any of you.

And when he had thus spoken, he took bread, and gave thanks to God in presence of them all: and when he had broken it, he began to eat.

Then were they all of good cheer, and they also took some meat.

And we were in all in the ship two hundred threescore and sixteen souls.

And when they had eaten enough, they lightened the ship, and cast out the wheat into the sea.

And when it was day, they knew not the land: but they discovered a certain creek with a shore, into the which they were minded, if it were possible, to thrust in the ship.

And when they had taken up the anchors, they committed themselves unto the sea, and loosed the rudder-bands, and hoised up the mainsail to the wind, and made toward shore.

And falling into a place where two seas met, they ran the ship aground: and the fore part stuck fast and remained unmoveable, but the hinder part was broken with the violence of the waves.

And the soldiers' counsel was to kill the prisoners, lest any of them should swim out, and escape.

But the centurion, willing to save Paul, kept them from their purpose; and commanded that they which could swim should cast themselves first into the sea, and get to land:

And the rest, some on boards, and some on broken pieces of the ship. And so it came to pass, that they escaped all safe to land.

IV.

COLOSSIANS III. 1-17.

IF ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God.

Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth.

For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God.

When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with Him in glory.

Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry:

For which things' sake the wrath of God cometh on the children of disobedience.

In the which ye also walked sometime, when ye lived in them.

But now ye also put off all these; anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth.

Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds;

And have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of Him that created him:

Where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free: but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, long-suffering;

Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye.

And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness.

And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.

And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him.

V.

I JOHN III.

BEHOLD what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God! therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew Him not.

Beloved, now are we the sons of God; and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when He shall appear, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him as He is.

And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as He is pure.

Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law.

And ye know that He was manifested to take away our sins; and in Him is no sin.

Whosoever abideth in Him sinneth not: whosoever sinneth hath not seen Him, neither known Him.

Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous, even as He is righteous.

He that committeth sin is of the devil; for the devil sinneth from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that He might destroy the works of the devil.

Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for His seed remaineth in him; and he cannot sin, because he is born of God.

In this the children of God are manifest, and the children of the devil: whosoever doeth not righteousness is not of God, neither he that loveth not his brother.

For this is the message that ye heard from the beginning, that we should love one another.

Not as Cain, who was of that wicked one, and slew his brother. And wherefore slew he him? because his own works were evil, and his brother's righteous.

Marvel not, my brethren, if the world hate you.

We know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death.

Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer:

and ye know that no murderer hath eternal life abiding in him.

Hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren.

But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?

My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed, and in truth.

And hereby we know that we are of the truth, and shall assure our hearts before Him.

For if our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things.

Beloved, if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence toward God.

And whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight.

And this is His commandment, That we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ, and love one another, as He gave us commandment.

And he that keepeth His commandments dwelleth in Him, and He in him. And hereby we know that He abideth in us, by the Spirit which He hath given us.

VI.

REVELATION XXI.

AND I saw a new heaven and a new earth :
for the first heaven and the first earth
were passed away ; and there was no more sea.

And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusa-
lem, coming down from God out of heaven,
prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.

And I heard a great voice out of heaven,
saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with
men, and He will dwell with them, and they
shall be His people, and God Himself shall
be with them, and be their God.

And God shall wipe away all tears from
their eyes ; and there shall be no more death,
neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there
be any more pain : for the former things are
passed away.

And He that sat upon the throne said,
Behold, I make all things new. And He
said unto me, Write : for these words are true
and faithful.

And He said unto me, It is done. I am
Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end.
I will give unto him that is athirst of the
fountain of the water of life freely.

He that overcometh shall inherit all things ;
and I will be his God, and he shall be my son.

But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the

abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death.

And there came unto me one of the seven angels, which had the seven vials full of the seven last plagues, and talked with me, saying, Come hither, I will show thee the bride, the Lamb's wife.

And he carried me away in the spirit to a great and high mountain, and showed me that great city, the holy Jerusalem, descending out of heaven from God,

Having the glory of God: and her light was like unto a stone most precious, even like a jasper stone, clear as crystal;

And had a wall great and high, and had twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and names written thereon, which are the names of the twelve tribes of the children of Israel:

On the east, three gates; on the north, three gates; on the south, three gates; and on the west, three gates.

And the wall of the city had twelve foundations, and in them the names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb.

And he that talked with me had a golden reed to measure the city, and the gates thereof, and the wall thereof.

And the city lieth four-square, and the

length is as large as the breadth. And he measured the city with the reed, twelve thousand furlongs. The length, and the breadth, and the height of it are equal.

And he measured the wall thereof, an hundred and forty and four cubits, according to the measure of a man, that is, of the angel.

And the building of the wall of it was of jasper: and the city was pure gold, like unto clear glass.

And the foundations of the wall of the city were garnished with all manner of precious stones. The first foundation was jasper; the second, sapphire; the third, a chalcedony; the fourth, an emerald:

The fifth, sardonyx; the sixth, sardius; the seventh, chrysolite; the eighth, beryl; the ninth, a topaz; the tenth, a chrysoprasus; the eleventh, a jacinth; the twelfth, an amethyst.

And the twelve gates were twelve pearls; every several gate was of one pearl: and the street of the city was pure gold, as it were transparent glass.

And I saw no temple therein: for the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are the temple of it.

And the city had no need of the sun, neither of the moon, to shine in it: for the glory of God did lighten it, and the Lamb is the light thereof.

And the nations of them which are saved

shall walk in the light of it: and the kings of the earth do bring their glory and honour into it.

And the gates of it shall not be shut at all by day: for there shall be no night there.

And they shall bring the glory and honour of the nations into it.

And there shall in no wise enter into it anything that defileth, neither whatsoever worketh abomination or maketh a lie; but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life.
