## FIFTH GENERATION.

ELEAZER<sup>5</sup> (4194), b. in Grafton, Mass., 1735; m., 1760, Lucy, dau. of Benjamin Leland, who was b. in Grafton, 1740; he was accidentally killed, according to family tradition; she m. 2d, Dec. 12, 1781, John Goodale, and d. in Worcester, Mass., 1814. The following story is given in the History of Sutton: "There once existed in this vicinity a sect known as the 'Live-for-evers.' They held, among other singular tenets, that if one seemed to be dead, faith, accompanied by certain manipulations by the faithful, would restore him to life. Mr. Fletcher came one rainy night, and found them holding a meeting at his house; and, not being in favor of their views, ordered them out. But on account of the rain they refused to go. So, being enraged, he said, 'If you fear rain more than fire you can stay;' at the same time seizing the peel [wooden oven-shovel] he drove it into the fire, and began scattering embers and coals among the crowd until they dispersed." SAMUEL<sup>5</sup> (4198), b. in Grafton, Mass., Sept. 30, 1744. The following is from Hall's "History of Eastern Vermont": —

"Among the earlier inhabitants of Townshend, no person occupied a higher position, or enjoyed a larger share of public confidence, than Samuel Fletcher. . . . At the age of seventeen he enlisted in the French war, and continued one year; on his return he learned the trade of a blacksmith, which he followed four years, when he married Mehitable, dau. of Col. John Hazeltine, and removed to Townshend, Vt. At the commencement of the Revolution he joined the American army as orderly sergeant, and was at the battle of Bunker Hill. He returned to Townshend, Jan., 1776, and was made captain of a militia company, and raised to a quartermaster in February of the same year. He commanded a company of minute men, and went to the relief of Ticonderoga, and was at the battle of Bennington, 1777. On the expedition he attacked a company of forty British, killed one and took seven prisoners, without loss to himself." He was colonel of a regiment at the close of the Revolution, and afterwards major-general of militia. He was twelve years a member of the executive council (now senate) of Vermont, and eighteen years high sheriff of Windham Co. He was five feet ten inches in height, straight and finely proportioned: his eyes, which were blue, corresponded well with a light complexion: kindness, generosity, and hospitality were prominent traits. JAMES<sup>5</sup> (4199), b. Jan., 1747: m. Margaret, dau. of Ezra Wood of Upton, Mass., in 1772; rem. to Northbridge, Mass., to what is now the village of Whitinsville, and engaged in the manufacture of iron and in agricultural pursuits; he was appointed lieutenant of a company of militia, 1775, and was in the Revolutionary army in several campaigns: he was at Cambridge, in the Rhode Island campaign, at the battle of Bennington, and the surrender of Burgoyne; after the war he was appointed colonel of the militia. He commenced in 1810 the manufacture of cotton goods, and continued until his death, Dec. 23, 1834. He was a man of unblemished reputation. His name appears with that of his brother Samuel and that of Squire H. (4207) among the original proprietors of the town of Fletcher, Vt., to which they gave the name.

At the time of their marriage he was nineteen and she eighteen years of age; and in Aug. of the following year they rem. to Buffalo, N.Y., accompanied by her sister Valinda. There he engaged in trade, became wealthy, and d. Aug. 20, 1822. She d. Mar. 19, 1862. "A most excellent Christian woman, who might well be designated as a model matron." Children:—

At the time of the burning and sacking of Buffalo, Dec. 30, 1813, he was about seven years old, and the family found refuge about ten miles distant. He became a member of the Presbyterian Church at the age of eighteen, and continued until his death a consistent professor. He had a liberal hand toward public interests, charitable and religious. Mr. C. E. Young (4331) gives some particulars of his business life: "He commenced in 1819 as a clerk in St. Thomas, Can.; after three years he returned to Buffalo, and engaged as a clerk until he was taken into the firm where he had been employed: in 1836 he purchased his partner's interest, his brother Pascal P. becoming his assistant, and in 1842 his partner." At his death memorial resolutions were passed by the Common Council of the city, the Board of Trade, and other organizations. Issue:—

To a good common school education was added higher branches at Hamilton Academy and at Amherst, Mass., Academy. In 1836 he entered the store of his bro. Samuel F., as assistant, and in 1842 became a partner: and this business relation continued until his brother's death. He m., Sept. 1, 1845, Phebe Lorenz of Pittsburgh, Penn. The business house of the Pratts became one of the most extensive in Western New York,

both in manufacturing and mercantile lines, and his clear and sagacious mind largely controlled its success. But the cares of private business never so absorbed him, but that he lent a ready hand and liberal purse to affairs of the church, to charitable and benevolent objects, and to enterprises for the public good. He is a member of the Presbyterian Church, and associated in various charitable and business organizations. He was for a time one of the Board of Aldermen. VALINDA (4213), b. in Townshend, Mass., May 9, 1790; rem. with her sister Sophia to Buffalo, 1807, where she m., Nov. 10, 1810, Foster Young of Peterboro', N.H., who d. in Buffalo, Jan. 8, 1851, æ. 68; res. Williamsville, N.Y.; rem. to Buffalo, where she still lives past 90 years of age; member of the Methodist Church.

The journey to Buffalo is thus described by Mr. Letchworth:—

“Samuel Pratt, jun., son-in-law of Gen. Fletcher, emigrated to Buffalo with his wife and infant son, Samuel F. Pratt, who was then about three months old, in Aug., 1807. Mr. Pratt had previously made the journey from Town-

shend to Buffalo on horseback, and returned in the same manner. He brought his family here in one of the old-fashioned, wide-tired, boot-shaped wagons, with parallel side-boards and cloth-covered top, which formed one of a train, containing mostly Indian stores, under charge of Asa Pratt, who had been to Boston to make purchases, and was then bringing them home. His younger brother, Paseal Paoli, then a lad of thirteen, had been permitted by his indulgent father to accompany his brother on this trip for the "fun of the thing." Mr. and Mrs. Pratt were accompanied by Mrs. Pratt's sister, Miss Valinda Fletcher, afterwards Mrs. Foster Young. Issue:—

The following was written by Judge Abner Hazeltine:—

"Mr. Adolphus Fletcher came to Jamestown when it was a small village, a mere hamlet, situated in an obscure corner, remote from any thoroughfare, and scarcely known abroad, except to a few on the waters below us, who were engaged in the lumber trade. Mr. Fletcher and his paper were among the instrumentalities for bringing this se-

cluded section into notice; and if the remarks called forth by the first number of ‘The Jamestown Journal,’ from the editors of other papers to whom it was sent with the usual request, ‘Please exchange,’ could now be collected, they would be a source of much amusement. The undertaking was evidently regarded as Quixotic by those who had heard of Jamestown, if not a Foax. But the work then commenced has completed more than fifty yearly volumes.

“The boyhood of Mr. Fletcher was passed on his father’s farm, with occasional attendance on the schools which were then well sustained in the Old Bay State. His apprenticeship was passed in the office of ‘The Massachusetts Spy,’ which was established at Worcester, by Mr. Thomas, prior to the American Revolution. Soon after becoming of age, he married, May 13, 1818, Miss Sarah Stow, a native of Worcester, and who had been his neighbor and associate from childhood.

“Prior to his marriage, an elder brother and sister had settled in Chautauqua County, N.Y., and had purchased from the first occupant, Renben Slayton, Esq., the site of the present village of Ashville. His father’s family having concluded about that time to follow their elder children to their new home, he was induced to accompany them. A friend who accompanied him informs the writer, that the two families started from Worcester with a span of horses and two pairs of oxen, and were three weeks on the way, arriving at what was then known as Goose Creek, or Slayton’s Mills, in June, 1818.

“During his residence at Ashville, he was to some extent engaged in farming. He also had a small store in connection with the late Dr. Deming of Westfield, and kept a tavern. He was thus employed, when, at the solicitation of friends at Jamestown who knew something of his early pursuits, he resolved to resume his original occupation. He removed to Jamestown in the summer of 1824, and with a small stock of type, purchased mostly on credit, and a press constructed on the spot, under his own supervision, he soon commenced ‘The Jamestown Journal,’ doing a large share of the work with his own hands. For several years no man in Jamestown worked harder or more hours than he.

“One great object in getting up the paper was to promote the interests of southern Chautauqua, which it was supposed had suffered for want of an organ: and this instead of party polities, was intended to be its leading

characteristic. Mr. Fletcher, although a man of decided opinions, adhered to this platform strictly, taking no part in the controversies between the Clintonians and Buck-tails, as the leading political parties in the State were then denominated. But this position did not long suit the times. The abduction of Morgan, and the presidential contest between Jackson and Adams, were elements of party strife too strong to admit of neutrality; and a paper for the avowed object of aiding the election of Gen. Jackson was started in opposition to 'The Journal.' This division of support not only lessened his income, but imposed new labors and responsibilities on Mr. Fletcher. His paper, as a matter of course, came out on the other side, and from that time became decidedly political. It soon acquired a patronage superior to that it had lost, and became a remunerative establishment. After remaining at its head about twenty years, he sold out to his son, from whom it soon passed into other hands.

"After the death of his first wife, Jan. 6. 1836, and just thirty years before his death, he married Miss Caroline E. Brooks of Westminster, Mass. Early in life he became a member of the Congregational Church, of which he was a consistent member until his death. He will long be remembered as a good citizen, and an upright and exemplary man." 

The following sketch, written by his son Richard, is taken from Benedict's "History of the Baptists:" —

"He was baptized, and united with the Baptist Church in Leicester, Mass., 15th of May, 1763, being then almost twenty-two years of age. From that day to the day of his death, he continued an active and devoted Christian, being a period of more than seventy years. At about the age of twenty-two, he established himself as a physician in his native town of Westford, and pursued this profession with signal usefulness and success till the infirmities of great age made it necessary for him to retire from active life.

"Beside many other public offices which he held while he remained in Massachusetts, he was a member of the convention which formed the constitution of that Commonwealth in 1780. In that convention he struggled hard to ingraft into the constitution the principle that no man should be compelled by law to pay taxes for the support

of preaching, but that all such contributions should be voluntary, and according to the dictates of conscience. He afterwards successfully advocated, through the press, and maintained this principle of religious liberty, in the State of Vermont. Though he failed to effect the object for which he contended in the convention, yet he lived to see the principle which he maintained carried out in the constitution and laws of Massachusetts. On the 3d day of October, 1776, he was married to Sally Green, daughter of Jonathan Green of Chelsea, Mass. In Feb., 1787, he removed to Cavendish, Vt., where he continued to reside till his death. At the time of his removal to Vermont, that State was not a member of the Union, and he was a member of the convention which applied to Congress for admission. He was shortly after a member of a convention to revise the constitution of that State. He was frequently a member of the legislature, for some years one of the judges of the county court, for several years a member of the council, and was one of the electors of president and vice-president when Mr. Monroe was first elected. He was for a time president of the medical society of his county, and delivered lectures before that body. He held many other offices, not important to mention, but which manifested the respect in which he was held, and the confidence reposed in him. He died peacefully, surrounded by a numerous company of affectionate and devoted children and grandchildren, on the 5th of January, 1839, aged ninety-two years. His wife, with whom he had lived most happily for sixty years, and who still lives in the grateful and affectionate remembrance of her children and grandchildren, had deceased a few years before his own death.

"He was at all times, in public and in private life, an humble and devoted Christian. His advantages for an education in early life were very small, and he was almost wholly a self-taught man. Still he made himself quite a respectable English scholar, and acquired, without the aid of any teacher, a considerable knowledge of the Latin and Greek languages. He was thoughtful and serious, and possessed habits of patient and persevering investigation. He had a sound and well-balanced mind, and uncommon calmness and equanimity of temper. He cherished an unwavering faith in an over-ruling Providence, which sustained him in the midst of trials, and in the darkest hour. He was retiring and unobtrusive, without vanity or love

of display. His great and constant purpose was to fill up life with duty. He lived long and lived well.

RICHARD<sup>6</sup> (4664), was b. in Cavendish, Vt., Jan. 8, 1788, and his boyhood was passed in his native town, to which he always evinced great attachment, although he never resided there again after entering Dartmouth Coll., at the age of fourteen. He was graduated in 1806, receiving the highest honors. He then went to Salisbury, N.H., and took charge of an academy school, commencing at the

*Richard Fletcher* same time the reading of law with Daniel Webster who then lived there, and who m., 1808,

Grace Fletcher (764). It is related that at the end of his professional studies, the young lawyer found himself in debt to Mr. Webster for tuition, and gave his promissory note to the amount of five hundred dollars, understanding that sufficient time should be allowed for earning it in his practice. Mr. Webster, however, under some unusual pressure, sold the note, and its payment was shortly demanded. Mr. Fletcher thereupon appealed to Worcester, and to Concord, Vt., for aid; his father and other friends raised the requisite sum, and when, with the hard cash in saddle-bags, he rode back to his office, Cartioning in Salisbury, he acquired a good practice, and in 1819 removed to Boston, with the reputation of an excellent professional reputation and a few thousand dollars in money. Here he shortly took rank with the very best of legal advocates. We quote from a notice that appeared soon after his death, which is, no doubt, just: "While in practice before the courts, his presence ever commanded the utmost respect, and great favor, of both sides, and his expressive features, and of most remarkable and pleasing address, combined with his great learning and untiring industry. It is not strange that he should have succeeded at the bar and on the bench." Another notice of him says: "He was a master of great power — fluent and elegant in dic course, bright and sparkling in thought, keen and exact in research." His care not to be engaged in unworthy causes was noted. A lady called one day at his office, where the writer was present, and made a long statement of a lawsuit in which she desired to engage his services, and for which she said she was prepared to pay well. After hearing her patiently, "Madam," said he, "you would lose that suit, and ought to lose it: I cannot undertake it."

In political life, he found little that suited his tastes. He was a member of the Massachusetts legislature, and, in 1837, was elected a representative in Congress. He again received the nomination of the Whig party, which was, at that time, in that district, equivalent to a re-election. This he declined, as he preferred to devote himself to his profession, and especially because life in Congress was so uncongenial to him. In 1848 he was appointed judge of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, and retired from the bench in 1853. The degree of LL.D. was conferred by both Harvard and Dartmouth.

He made a public profession of religion, and united with

the Federal-street Baptist Church, under the pastoral care of Rev. Howard Malcolm. He became superintendent of the Sunday school, and at one time was chosen deacon. Concerning this last it was related:—

“On being informed of the selection, Mr. Fletcher appeared before the society, and, in one of his happiest moods, addressed them. He thanked them for the kindness and confidence they had shown him, and then proceeded to give them a description of the character and qualifications which in his judgment were requisite for the office. Speaking thus at length upon the subject of religion and the importance of personal piety and sincere devotion to God and the cause of the Redeemer, and having wrought up the attention of his hearers to a great interest, he closed by assuring them that he did not possess, nor claim to possess, then and there, that degree of holiness which the candidate should bring to the office. The calls of business, the cares of his profession, and the worldliness of his life, that had too much engrossed his attention, rendered it improper for him, however much he appreciated the honor, to accept the offer. ‘And besides,’ said the speaker, lowering the tones of his voice, and throwing into his handsome face all the interest and emotion which memory and the occasion called up, ‘there is one insurmountable barrier standing between me and the position named. Among all the qualifications which I have alluded to, that this officer of the church should possess, there is one which I have not named: the injunction of Holy Writ, through the apostle, is that the deacon “should be the husband of one wife.” I have none. I cannot accept the office.’”

His religion was not so much of the aggressive kind, nor did he often urge his views upon others; but it pervaded his entire character, and shone out in all his actions. Its rich fruits were his kind and loving disposition, with almost the tenderness of a child; the firmness for the right, which no force could bend and no money could bribe; the ever-flowing fountain of benevolence that bestowed his wealth to the help of many. He was devotional; private and public worship he delighted in. When taken from his active duties, and confined to his bed by sickness, he had read to him, not the newspapers and books of the day, but Doddridge and Baxter. A scrap from his diary is illustrative:—

“JAN. 15, 1857.—Received through the post-office to-

day a very remarkable letter, in which the writer says that more than forty years ago he abstracted twenty-five cents from my pocket. He encloses me a dollar and twenty-four cents for the money so taken, the interest evidently having been computed at compound interest to make this sum. Speaking of the act, the writer says: ‘It has harrowed up my soul. Oh, had I thought that God looked on the heart! ’ He expresses great compunction, and begs me to forgive him and pray for him, that he may be forgiven of God. . . . I sincerely and heartily forgive the person, whoever he may be, and I humbly and earnestly pray God to forgive him for Christ’s sake, as he seems to be heartily contrite and penitent. How many sins I have committed in my life, for which I need the forgiveness of my fellow-men and of my heavenly Father! ‘Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.’ What a proof is here of the power of conscience! Without the pardoning mercy of God through Jesus Christ, what may be the tortures of a guilty conscience in the world to come!”

He never married. His attachment to his relatives was remarkable. Tens of thousands of dollars he bestowed upon them while he lived. His nephews and nieces he seemed to love as if they were his children. His benefactions were widely spread. The worthy young man who needed a lift to get through college found in him a friend, and charitable societies reckoned surely upon his aid. His will, after providing for his relatives, gives to Dartmouth College the residue. A passage in that will is of interest:—

“In view of the numerous and powerful influences, constantly active in drawing professed Christians into fatal conformity to the world, both in spirit and practice; in view, also, of the lamentable and amazing fact, that Christianity exerts so little practical influence even in countries nominally Christian, it has seemed to me that some good might be done by making permanent provision for obtaining and publishing, once in two years, a prize essay, setting forth truths and reasoning calculated to counteract such worldly influences, and impressing on the minds of all Christians a solemn sense of their duty to exhibit in their godly lives and conversation the beneficent effects of the religion they profess, and thus increase the efficiency of Christianity in Christian countries, and recommend its acceptance to the heathen nations of the

world." For this purpose, he provides ten thousand dollars.

At the age of eighty-one, he d., June 21, 1869. His remains repose at Mount Auburn; and over them we inquire, Where are the young men of this generation to fill the places of those gone before?

"A few days since, there came from New-York City, the remains of Mrs Adeline Fletcher, for burial here [Cavendish]. She was the widow of Dr. Alpheus Fletcher, who died here in 1849. The returning, dead, of those who have lived among us, brings vividly to mind the memory of those who have once been. Mrs. Fletcher was a dau. of the Hon. Uriel C. Hatch, at one time a prominent lawyer resident here, a representative in the Vermont legislature, from this town, at different periods, and familiarly known, even now, as Judge Hatch. Dr. Alpheus Fletcher, who died at the age of forty-six years, was a brother of the late Judge Richard Fletcher of Boston, and of Ex-Gov. Ryland Fletcher, the last living representative, we believe, of this remarkable family. We hardly appreciate, at this day, the memory of Dr. Fletcher, — who was the wittiest man of his day, one of the most skilful physicians and most learned men of his time, was edu-

cated at Burlington till the session of the college there was suspended, during the war of 1812, when he went to Hanover, N. H. Subsequently Dr. Fletcher was connected with the medical institution at Castleton in its palmiest days, and was engaged in the active practice of his profession at the time of his death. He labored in early life upon his father's farm, receiving such education as the district school afforded in those days. Commencing at the age of seventeen, he taught school during the winter months for five years. At his first appearance for parade in the militia, he was chosen a sergeant, and afterwards held nearly every post to that of brigadier-general. He attended for a short time the military school in Norwich, Vt.

He was one of the earliest and most efficient laborers in the temperance cause; he addressed meetings in various parts of the State, and was president of the State temperance society. At the time he was colonel of a militia regiment, he called the officers together, and procured a vote to abolish the custom of "treating" on parade-days. He had then to encounter bitter opposition and abuse; but he has lived to see a law prohibiting the sale of the destructive poison effectually enforced in his State, and never likely to be repealed.

In 1837 he took up the anti-slavery cause, and was its untiring champion until Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that slavery was no more.

He was elected, in 1854, lieutenant-governor, and in 1856 governor of the State of Vermont, and held the latter office two years. He was elector of president and vice-president of the United States in 1864, and was delegate to two national conventions for the nomination of president and vice-president of the United States.

A member of the Baptist church, he has taken great interest in the moral and religious improvement of the people, especially by the promotion of Sunday schools.

He has cultivated, almost during his life, the farm where his father settled, on Black River, a little below Proctorsville. Issue:—





On foot and alone, at the rate of fifty miles a day, I travelled until I arrived at Bridgeport, Conn., where for the first time I found myself on board a sailing-craft. Arriving at Hell Gate, the old sea-captains, on learning that there was a raw Yankee on board, were disposed to have some sport; but, there being on board a

number of families moving to New York on the first day of May, no action took place."

In 1803 he went to Lincolnville, Me., and taught school, and the same year m. Mary L. Brown of that place. Here he bought a farm, and lived more than sixty years, and d. In about three weeks he managed to escape from the British, and, after great hardships, reached home. Recovering from his wounds, he returned to the army, and served through his three years' enlistment. He was, in 1779, under Gen. Sullivan, in his campaign against the Indians in Genesee Co., N.Y.

He received a common-school education, and at the age of fourteen was put under Mr. Samuel Comings, whose dau. he afterwards m., and whose mills he purchased. He was engaged for some years in trunk-making. He was an exemplary member of the Baptist church, and was noted for his industry and his strict integrity. He d. May 8,

1831, and was buried in the cemetery, in the southerly part of New Ipswich, where a plain gravestone marks the spot.

He wrote a narrative of his adventures, of which two editions were published while he lived, and which has since been reprinted in elegant form, with notes and portraits, by Charles I. The town records of Chesterfield do not extend so far back as the time of his birth: but we find recorded his marriage to Elizabeth Whitney, May 2, 1772. He served in the war of the Revolution, but how long, or in what capacity, does not appear. After the close of the war he removed far up the Connecticut River, pitching upon the Vermont side, where the town of Waterford was afterward laid out and organized in 1793. At the first town-meeting he was chosen constable. Nine children were born to Samuel and Elizabeth, and after her death he married widow Mary [Ames] Billings. By the last marriage there were five children, making a good old-fashioned family of fourteen reared on the farm in Waterford, where the father lived until near the time of his death, which occurred in 1831, in East Montpelier, Vt., where he was buried. In 1793, being then twenty-nine years of age, he rem. from Chesterfield with his wife and two children, and following his older bros. Samuel and James to the State of Vermont, he purchased a tract of wild land in the town of Lyndon, a few miles distant from Samuel, who had settled at Waterford, on the Connecticut River. Here he constructed a log-cabin, and proceeded to clear off the forest. His choice of location was wisely made, and a fine farm with fruitful soil was developed in course of time. In person, tall and muscular, he possessed, to a striking degree, the bold, energetic powers demanded by the circumstances and the times. As the country became settled and populated, he was foremost in laying out for the public good. He founded the public school and built the schoolhouse; he gave the land for the cemetery, and for the site of the academy. The title of "captain" attached to him from having been selected as leader of a band of farmers, who, in the war of 1812, organized for

their common protection. He m. 2d, Mary H. [Haines], widow of Levi Brackett; at that time the mother of five children. She was b. July 14, 1773, and d. Jan. 14, 1853.

Capt. Joel Fletcher was a man of high standing and influence in the community; and "full of days and riches and honor," he d. Jan. 6, 1858, spared to the age of ninety-four to enjoy the fruits of his industry, and to witness the general comfort and prosperity of his numerous descendants. JOHN<sup>t</sup> (6454), b. in Chesterfield, N. H., Feb. 19, 1782; received a good common-school education; started out in the world, a mere lad; first pitched in the State of New York, and at the age of eighteen, it is said, drove the first team of horses that went from the Genesee River to Buffalo. In 1803 he rem. to what was known as the "Black River Country" in Canada, and engaged in lumbering. About this time he narrowly escaped impressment in the British naval service. Going to Quebec in 1805, with a raft of timber, he encountered in a public house the press-gang of the fleet then lying in the harbor, and they at once pounced upon him. Realizing the situation, he affected a rollicking, good-humored submission, ordered

drinks for the crowd, got them seated around a table, handed the bottles, caught up the water-pitcher which he stepped to the door to fill, and—did not return!

He m., Sept. 11, 1810, Ruth Hollingshead, who is still living, and in her 89th year has given from her remarkable memory the dates of the births and deaths of one hundred members of the family.

He had escaped, as before mentioned, the navy; but in 1812 was drafted into the British army. Shortly released, however, he furnished the garrison at Toronto six thousand cords of wood by contract. Then he was made Indian agent at Lake Simcoe five years. An incident illustrates his kindness of heart, though perhaps trenching upon strict loyalty. Two sailors, condemned to a cruel punishment for a petty theft of food which they needed, deserted. Mr. Fletcher discovered them perishing with cold and hunger, and, instead of delivering them to certain punishment of death, gave them food and money to escape. Indorsing pecuniary obligations for the benefit of a friend brought the loss of his wealth; and soon after, in 1840, he rem. to the State of Illinois, and spent the rest of his days at Oswego, and lastly at Plato, where he d. Oct. 19, 1860, a. 79. He is described as being physically a splendid specimen of a man,—a fine form, giant strength, and handsome face. He had indomitable energy, unflinching courage, unwavering integrity, with a kind disposition, and a woman's tenderness of heart. Issue:—

He was one of the original directors of the Rutland and Burlington Railroad, and held the position of director and president of the bank at Middlebury, Vt., for nearly fifty years, and only resigned when the feebleness of old age compelled him to exchange the active business life with which he had so long been identified, for the quietude of an elegant country home. He entered zealously into every project to benefit his town, and made many liberal gifts. Instances are few of an equally remarkable career blessed by nature with a grand head and a strong physique, neither of which were ever abused by any rashness." Issue:—



 last of his father's nine children, and the only issue of the  
 2d marriage. His mother, the widow of Levi Brackett,  
 had five children by her former marriage; and hence Joel  
 had a numerous circle of half-brothers' and half-sisters,  
 older than himself. Naturally enough he would be a pet  
 in such a household; but like them he was inured in early  
 life to hard work, and trained to industrious habits, and  
 his youth was passed in incessant employment. His  
 schooling was by no means neglected: yet, corresponding  
 with the exigencies of the times, his opportunities were  
 small, and the district-school and an academy in Haver-  
 hill furnished his educational training. His special pro-  
 ficiency was in mathematics, and his skill and accuracy in  
 mental computations were greatly useful in the wide ex-  
 tended business of his later life. Illustrative of his energy,  
 hardihood, and capability, it is related that when only thir-  
 teen years of age, he took a four-horse team, in midwinter,  
 laden with surplus products of his father's farm and his  
 mother's loom, to the city of Portland, two hundred and  
 ten miles distant, sold his produce, and brought back  
 goods needed from the city market; this, across a thinly  
 settled country, through the Willey Notch, and over bleak  
 hills, in the rigor of a northern winter.

To the rigid training of the boy was due the stern habit  
 of the man: in labor always tireless, rapid, efficient. At  
 an early age he stepped to the front in charge of the farm  
 on which his father settled; and he continued until about  
 thirty years of age engrossed in its care and management.

He m., Jan. 15, 1840, Zerviah Townsend Meigs, who was b. 1818, and survives him; a fit helpmeet in his life-work, sharing his labor, and effectually contributing to his success.

His labor was not confined to the pursuits of his private interests. He was a member of the local agricultural society, and encouraged every improvement in the farming interest.

In 1856 he turned his attention to mercantile pursuits, purchasing an interest in a business in St. Johnsbury, Vt., which he shortly assumed, and, applying his indefatigable energy, built up in a few years a very extensive and successful trade. But such application overtaxed his physical system; and, relinquishing to his son Henry E. his business in Vermont, he sought rest, removing, 1870, to Lake City, Minn., where he was president of the bank and mayor of the city. He was also largely concerned in business in St. Paul and Minneapolis.

After his removal to the West, it was his custom to return frequently to his boyhood's home and the field of his manhood's earlier achievements, to renew the memories of his youth, and to refresh himself in the society of his friends. On one of these visits he d. suddenly at St. Johnsbury, Feb. 16, 1875.

An estimate of his character, which is, no doubt, just, says: "Busy, restless, active in mind and body; aggressive, ambitious, positive in nature; enterprising, energetic, and courageous in his actions; large-hearted, straightforward, and honest in his dealings,—he was admired and respected by all. In a long life of active business he never became to the slightest extent financially embarrassed. Frank, open, and candid himself, he despised hypocrisy in others. In habits he was strictly temperate, eschewed the use of liquors and tobacco, and personally abhorred them. If there be any single characteristic of his entire life, it is the resolute, unceasing progress from small beginnings to distinguished results, accomplished by his own unaided efforts, by the most unflagging pertinacity, courage, and ability. The only genius he possessed was that for hard work, but his talents were of no inferior order. The massive granite pedestal marking his resting place and surmounted by a granite statue of heroic size, seems a fair representation of his life,—plain, enduring, and eminent for solidity." Issué:—

He was but fourteen years of age when his father d., leaving only for his children to inherit, the memory of his virtues and good instructions. It was thought best that he should follow the occupation of his father, and become a blacksmith: and he was apprenticed accordingly. But his love of books was stronger than his attachment to the forge and anvil; and at the age of seventeen his mother consented that his apprenticeship should be ended. Two years after, he was in the schoolroom as a teacher. He was graduated at Norwich University. In 1842 he was settled as pastor of the Universalist church, in Surrey, N. H. In 1845 he rem. to Brattleboro', Vt., thence to Cambridge, Mass., and soon after to Lowell, Mass., where he labored four years. Here he was induced to turn his attention to the law, was appointed commissioner of insolvency, and soon after judge. It appears from Bradbury's "History of Kennebunk, Me.," that the Seth Fletcher who m. Major Pendleton's dau. was at Kennebunk in 1661 and witnessed a will, in 1663 attended a town meeting there, and in 1671 witnessed another will. The Rev. Seth was appointed in 1667, with another, to divide land between Saco and Cape Porpoise (Arundel); recorded in the records of both towns. He is called both "Rev." and "Mr." in the same record, and there is but little ground for supposing two Seth Fletchers. The only child of Seth:—

Moreover I doe solemnly bynde myselfe in the sight of God, that when I shall be called to give my voice touching any such matter of this state, wherein freemen are to deal, I will give my vote & suffrage, as I shall judge in myne owne conscience may best conduce and tend to the publique weale of the body without respect of persons, or favour of any man. Soe help me God, in the Lord Jesus Christ.

## AN ADVENTURE OF THE WAR.

BY HON. OLIVER P. MORTON, UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM INDIANA.

THERE were a number of Indiana regiments in the Union army that fought the battle of Shiloh, and many of them suffered severely. Immediately upon getting the news of the battle, as the Governor of the State, I caused to be prepared such sanitary supplies as would contribute to the comfort and recovery of the wounded and sick, and chartered several steam-boats to carry them to the field, and to bring home such of the wounded as were capable of being removed. I also determined to go upon one of these boats to visit the Indiana troops, inspect their condition, and see what could be done for their comfort and health. By way of explanation, I will state what may not be familiar to all your readers, that the battle of Shiloh was fought upon the west bank of the Tennessee River, about one hundred and fifty miles above the point where it empties into the Ohio. It was arranged that the boat should start from Evansville, on the Ohio River, which is on the south-western border of Indiana, on Sunday morning, and the supplies were forwarded so as to be on board at that time. To get there myself, I was to leave Indianapolis at eight o'clock on Saturday evening, on the Terre Haute train, and, on my arrival at Terre Haute, take a special train for Evansville, which is one hundred miles south of that point.

Calvin Fletcher was an old and highly esteemed citizen of Indianapolis, one of its pioneers, a lawyer by profession, but for many years had applied himself to banking and agriculture, and was one of the wealthiest men of the State. He was a devout Christian, distinguished for his benevolence, and wielded an influence second to that of no other citizen. He was also a man of intense patriotism, and when the war broke out gave his mind and heart to the support of the government and the preservation of the Union. He was among the foremost in all efforts for the relief of our army, and took part in the first organization of the Indiana Sanitary Commission, and worked with it faithfully until the end of the war.

When I announced my purpose to visit the army, he at once volunteered to go with me, and said he would be in readiness to start at the time fixed.

About three hours before the time for departure he came to my office in the State House, and said that circumstances had transpired which would prevent him from going, but that he was determined to be represented, and would send his son "Mily;" and said he, "If 'Mily' never gets back I will take care of his wife and children." This was the familiar name by which he called Miles J. Fletcher, a young man of twenty-eight years, and then State Superintendent of Public Instruction, an office to which he had been elected by the people the year before. He was a ripe scholar, possessing classical and scientific attainments of a very high order, and was, at the time of his election, a professor in the Asbury University, at Greencastle. He had an ardent temperament, pure character, lofty ambition, and was, perhaps, all things considered, the most promising young man in the State. I arrived at the depot about twenty minutes before the train was to start, and found the old gentleman there. Said he, "I have put into the baggage-car a box containing two dozen bottles of Catawaba wine for the use of yourself and 'Mily,' for the food and water may be bad where you are going. 'Mily' is not here yet, and I am in a hurry; and if I do not see him, tell him that if he never gets back I will take care of his wife and children." It was the second time he had made the remark, and it struck me with peculiar force. Had he a presentiment that his son would never return? The journey was not entirely free from danger, for the banks of the Tennessee River were in many places infested with guerrillas, who sometimes fired upon passing boats; and there were other perils beyond those attending ordinary life at home. He then bade me good-by, and with a "God bless you," left the depot. In a few minutes the professor arrived in high spirits, and I gave to him his father's message. We went into the sleeping-car, and, being very tired from the labors of the day, I at once entered a berth, the professor assisting me in undressing, and saying he would call me before we arrived at Terre Haute. He said he should sit up to see his wife at Greencastle, which was on the line of the road, and where his family resided; that he had telegraphed her to be at the depot when the train passed, and to bring his overcoat. Just before midnight he aroused me, and said, "We will be in Terre Haute in a few minutes." He was very lively, and said, among other things, "I have the advantage of you. I have kissed my wife since you kissed yours; she received my despatch, and was at the depot waiting for me." At Terre Haute we left the car, and entered the special train which was in waiting to take us to Evansville, and which consisted of a

locomotive and a single passenger-car. The conductor said we should make a very quick run, for they had telegraphed down the road to have the track clear, and we should only stop for wood and water. We soon started at a rapid gait; and the whole party, some nine persons in all, were wide awake and full of fun. The professor produced a small carpet-bag, from which he took some lunch, which was served around; and, while we were discussing it, he told several stories—and he was an excellent story-teller—of his speech-making tour the year before in the county of Sullivan, through which we were about to pass; and after some twenty or thirty minutes spent in this way, the company made their several dispositions for the ride. The stove had been taken out of the car, and in the middle, where it had stood, the seats ran lengthwise, instead of cross-wise, in the usual way. I lay down with my head to the rear, and my feet forward, on the long side seat, and the professor lay down on the same seat, with his head to the front, which brought our feet together. We were soon asleep, and about that time entered the county of Sullivan, in which there lived a class of people who were disaffected toward the government, and sympathized strongly with the rebellion, and some of them carried their opinions to the extent of overt treason, and had already obtained for the county a disagreeable notoriety.

We had not been long asleep when we were awakened by a terrible shock and crash. I immediately sprang to my feet, which brought me at the side of the professor, and felt that the car was still on the track, and moving. The professor threw his feet off the seat upon the floor, raised his head from the carpet-bag upon which it was lying, and with his left hand threw up the window at his side, and put his head out to see what was the matter.

It flashed through my mind that this was dangerous, but there was no time to speak, it was all the work of a moment. At the instant of putting his head out of the window, it was darkened as by some passing object, and his face dropped upon the window-sill. I took him by the shoulders, and laid him back with his head upon the carpet-bag, and he was already dead. The blood spurted from the side of his head in torrents, and ran across the floor of the car in a stream. A portion of the left side of the skull, as large as the palm of my hand, had been knocked out, and the brain was protruding from the mortal wound. By this time the car was stopped, and all was still. Never before had I so powerfully realized the awful presence of death.

Our company stood around and gazed with horror upon the face of the dead, and for several minutes not a word was spoken. A horrible suspicion entered my mind that it was not accidental; that it was murder; that it was intended for me.

but, by an inscrutable dispensation of Providence, had fallen upon him, and this was strongly confirmed by subsequent disclosures.

It was a bright moonlight night; and when we went out of the car, the cause of the disaster was apparent. Our locomotive and car were still upon the track, but the locomotive much broken. Some distance in the rear, and close alongside of the track, and nearly at a right angle with it, were the shattered remains of a large cattle-car, with which it was obvious the locomotive had collided. Subsequent investigation showed that this car had for two weeks been standing upon a switch, some two hundred yards from the point of collision, and had been seen in its accustomed place as late as eleven o'clock that night, and must have been shoved, shortly before our arrival, down the switch with such force as to carry the forward truck over upon the main track, the rear truck still remaining upon the switch; that when struck by the locomotive it was shoved down the switch and down the main track, until it stood at a right angle with our train, when it was cleared by the locomotive, the end of it grazing the side of the passenger-car at the fatal instant when Professor Fletcher put his head out of the window. The scene of disaster was near the depot, in the town of Sullivan; and report had it that a man, notorious for his disloyal sentiments, at a late hour of the night, at a low drinking-house in the town, had said to several boon companions:—

"Now, boys, let's take a drink, and then go to the depot and knock h—l out of this d—d abolition governor that's coming down the road to-night!"

Another man was arrested and tried for the offence, but the trial amounted to nothing, and he was acquitted.

I sent for the telegraphic operator, but he could not get a despatch through to Indianapolis until eight o'clock in the morning. I studied in what words I should break the dreadful news to his father. The first despatch I tore up, then the second, then the third; and finally communicated with my private secretary, with the instruction to convey the awful intelligence to the father and family as best he could.

In the afternoon I sent the corpse by special train to Green-castle, and, procuring another locomotive, started on my way to the army. For many days the horrible scene was ever present in my mind, and I was filled with apprehensions of disaster which I had never before experienced; and it was not until my return home, some five weeks afterward, that the spell was broken, and I was able to put away for a time the terrible impressions of that night.

## APPENDIX C.

PAGE 189.

The first meeting-house at Wilton, N. H., was built in 1752. It was an inconsiderable building, used about twenty-one years, and then demolished. The second meeting-house which is now standing is a very decent, commodious building. At the raising of this meeting-house, Sept. 7, 1773, a distressing accident happened. When the frame was nearly completed, in consequence of the failure of a supporting timber, one of the beams broke and fell, and several men being on it at the same time fell with it, three of whom, George Lancey, Simeon Fletcher, and Reuben Stiles, were instantly killed. [Farmer & Moore's *Hist. Coll. of N. H.*, vol. i, p. 67.]

"Feb. 17, 1777. I set out and travelled to Pitskill, and crossed the river to North Casel, and there I got information that the regiment to which my brother John belonged was gone into the Jarsies. Then I made the best of my way to overtake them. I crossed the North River, and staid at a place called Caeet, at a Frenchman's house. 18th.—I started at three o'clock in the morning, and overtook them at noon. The company told me that John was left at White Plains with Jo Wright that was sick. 19th.—I came about twenty-five miles that day, and lodged at a Dutchman's house, where I got my horse shod. 20th.—Set out, and fell in with four men that had been to Congress for money, and got with them eleven hundred thousand dollars, a part of which was to pay the Northern army, and the rest to Boston."

## FLETCHER FAMILY REUNION.

People Bearing That Name and Others Related to Them Met in Large Numbers at Tremont Temple

Fletchers from many places and related to them gathered to the number of considerably more than two hundred at Tremont Temple today for the meeting of the Fletcher Family Union organization which has existed but twenty-eight years. A register was opened today of those attending which showed that several States were represented by the attendees and that not a few had come long distance to be present at this reunion.

Lorimer Hall was used for the morning meeting, over which the president of the association, Austin B. Fletcher, LL D., of New York presided. He gave an address of welcome and referred naturally to the family's ancestors and the organization which serves to perpetuate and keep green the names of the earliest known bearing the name of Fletcher. The secretary, Mr. Thomas A. Fletcher, also of New York, gave a review of previous family gatherings and included much matter of interest regarding the association.

There were several informal addresses. Josiah M. Fletcher of Nashua, N. H., being one of the speakers who was heard with interest. He has attended every reunion ever held by the association, and today gave a pleasant story regarding his interest in all that relates to the name of Fletcher. He closed with a brief speech which he brought for this special occasion. A pleasant feature of the meeting was the address of Professor William L. Fletcher of Amherst College, whose brief speech was exceedingly bright. He spoke of the day's reunion as a family gathering much like the old-time New England Thanksgiving Day gathering, which meant many people of kindred ties coming together for a general good time, with plenty to eat, including numerous varieties of pie, for one thing. Professor Fletcher then said that most people deplored the use of pie in any form, but he believed it to be one of the greatest handed down by ancestors, except that in the days when the ancestors of the Fletchers of today lived batter pies were made. This he used to illustrate a point of the general sterling qualifications of the handed down by the sturdy people at the New England farmers from many of his hearers today were lost.

Professor Fletcher related several anecdotes, and among them this: *I* that Vermonters are proud of the *microsoft®* they are so fond of pie, partly because in that State they know how to make good ones in great variety. *big*

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
