

ORIGIN OF THE NAME MCKILLOP OR MCCALEB

FROM: THE CATHOLIC HIGHLANDS OF SCOTLAND by DON BLUNDELL, page 139

"Another family of influence were MacDonalds of Sherrageg. They were originally M'Killops but took the name McDonald on their marrying into the Keppoch Family".

FROM: <u>SURNAMES OF SCOTLAND</u> by Dr. GEORGE F. BLACK (New York, 1946)

The name McCaleb was a corruption of McKillop which in turn was a corruption of the Gaelic MacFhilib, son of Philip.

MacKILLOPS, A SEPT OF THE CLAN MacDONELL (Macdeonnell)

WILLIAM McCALEB (McKillop or McKellop), 1715-1775, is said to have been a member of the McKillop family who were a Sept of the Macdonell of Keppoch Clan of Scotland. The spelling of the names Macdonald and Macdonnell are synonymous as the various branches of the Clan Donald are so interwoven.¹ The Macdonalds were the most powerful of the Highland Clans. The Clan, like other clans of Scotland, was made up of two classes: (1) Clansmen who were related by blood and (2) "Broken men", individuals or groups from other clans who obtained the protection of the Clan. Don Odell Blundell's explanation of the union of the Macdonnells of Keppoch and the Mac Killops of Sherrebeg (Above cit.) may refer to the marriage of William McCaleb (McKillop), father of William McCaleb (MacKillop) 1715-1775, to Mary Macdonnell, who was said to be the daughter of Chief Macdonnell. (This would have been about 1714).

Sherrabeg was a tenant farm in the District of Badenoch and is no longer in existence.²

EXTRACTS FROM THE SURNAMES OF SCOTLAND by Dr. George Black (New York, 1946-page 629)

McKillop, MacFhilib, "Son of Philip".

But who this Philip was who gave the name is not known. The asperation of the "f" in the genitive case causes it to disappear. Philip is originally a Greek personal name (Phillippos), meaning "Horse Lover". Some of the names are said to have been standard bearers to the <u>Campbells</u> of <u>Dunstaffnage</u>. Others are included in the Septs of MacDonald of Glencoe and of Macdonnells of Keppoch, and



MacKillop also occurs as a surname in Arran. FINLAIUS MacPILIBH, priest of the <u>Diocese of Argyll</u>, is in record in 1433 (Pap. Lett. VIII, page 470), and in 1437 <u>JOHN</u>, son of FYNLAIUS PRIORIS MacPHILIB, appears as perpetual vicar of <u>Kilcalmonell</u>. (Saniti Colmaneli in Cnapdul), (Ibid of page 626). WILLIAM MacKILLOP, a follower of the Earl of Cassilis, was repited for murder in 1526 (RSS., I. 3386) DONALD M'GILLIP is mentioned in 1532 (MacGregor I, p. 87). ROBERT MAKILLIP was a witness at Penkill, Ayrshire, in 1545 (RMS., III 3160). MALCUM M'KILLIB witnessed a Glenurquhay Bond of Manrent in 1547. CHARLOCHT M'KILLIB was a witness at "Ill of Lochtay" in 1649 (BBT. pps. 185 and 189), and Duncan McGillop in the Kirktone of Weeme is in record in 1692. Makellop 1509. (Extracts of Black's book copied by William McCaleb about 1959).

The name is also current in the abbreviated form MacGilp. A family of this name took the name MacDonald on their inter-marrying with the Keppoch family. (Bluncell, <u>The Catholic Highlands</u>, 1909, p. 139). The Gaelic "motto" of the Family, "Cadal Chain Aom Air Faire" is of the twentieth centruy. McKillip and McKyllap 1692--See also MacKyllap.


JOHN MCKILLOP

The only McKillop who is mentioned as being a prisoner in the 45 Rebellion was John whose home was in Sterling and who was a malster. He was in prsons of Linthgow and Leith for about three weeks in 1746 and was liberated on July 2, 1746. (Scots Ancestry Research Society.)

PARISH RECORDS OF SCOTLAND (SCOTS ANCESTRY RESEARCH SOCIETY)

Prior to 1855 registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in Scotland were voluntarily recorded in the old parochial registers (unindexed) of each parish. The old parochial registers of the parishes in the county of Inverness which have extant records for the period in which you are interested, namely:

The Scots Ancestry Research Society found no McCalebs (McKillops) in a search of the above available records.

The director of the Scots Ancestry Research Society stated in a letter to K. H. in 1949: "I would have liked to assist you, but the parish records of Invernesshire are of such poor quality that I can do nothing. There are few, if any, possible sources of information as early as 1715. This incessant subdivision of property in Scotland amongst all the sons ultimately led to the dispersal of a family, being unable to gain a subsistence in Scotland".

In Vol. II I have included all McCalebs, McKalebs, McKillips, McKillops, Mc Gillups and like spellings. Most of these early families settled on tho same spelling of the name, "McCaleb". I have always been taught and my research seems to bear out the claim that McKillips (McCalip) and McKillops are not the same family in late Scot and early America. K. H.

INFORMATION FROM THE SCOT ANCESTRY RESEARCH SOCIETY

McKillops were Septs of Mcdonalds of Glengarry, Macdonnells of Keppoch, Magregors (Magruders), Campbells. They were groups who sought the protection of major Clans.

THE CLAN DONALD by I. F. Black

This is a very fine history of the MacDonald Clan and all of its division. It states that the MacDonalds were the largest and most powerful Clan in Scotland. It names the McKillops as a Sept of the McDonalds.

THE CLANS AND TARTANS OF SCOTLAND, by Robert Bain (Collins in London, Glascow, New York)

The Mcdonnells were wise enough to settle where there was firwood (Kingussie), salmon fish in the Spey and Tummel, and peatmoss, and tillable soil.

WILLIAM MCCALEB married MARY MacDONNELL

WILLIAM McCALEB (MacKillop), Highland Chieftan, was a native of Scotland. Family tradition says that he was the son of William McCaleb. The dates of his birth and death are not know. Neither is it certain where in Scotland the family lived. Family tradition says that they lived in Invernesshire. It seems likely that they lived at Sherrabeg, a farm that is now extinct, in Badenoch, 4 or somewhere east of Loch Lochy between the present towns of Kingussie and Pithlochry.⁹ When the family changed the spelling of the name is not known. The name McCaleb was a corruption of Mac Killop which in turn was a corruption of the Gaelic MacFhilib, son of Philip.⁰ It seems reasonable to believe that the family was using the present spelling before leaving Scotland since there are McCalebs in Scotland today, and since nearly all the families in America were using the more recent spelling by the time of the American Revolutionary

William McCaleb married MARY MACDONNELL (also written "McDonald" and "Macdonell") of the Keppoch family. Some say that she was the daughter of Chieftan Macdonnell of Keppoch, but there is nothing to bear out this claim. William and Mary (Macdonnell) McCaleb had at least one child, William McCaleb, who was born in Scotland in 1715 and died in South Carolina in 1775.

William McCaleb is thought to have fought with the major Clan Macdonnell at Preston-Moor.9

WILLIAM NEIL MCCALEB married SARAH MacALPIN

WILLIAM NEIL McCALEB (McKELLOPE), son of William and Mary (Macdonnell) McCaleb, was born in Scotland in 1715, and he died in North or South Carolina 1775.¹⁰ Tradition and evidence seems to indicate that he was known as "Neil". Tradition says that he was born in Invernesshire, Scotland and that he died in South Carolina.


William Neil McCaleb married SARAH McALPIN¹¹, daughter of Highland Chieftan McAlpin, in Scotland about 1746. Tradition says that they eloped.



William Neil McCaleb (McKellope) fought at Culloden in 1746 for the cause of Bonnie Prince Charles. The McCalebs (McKellopes) were a Sept of the Macdonells of Keppoch, and William fought with, or under, the leadership of the major Clan at the battle. Coll, 15th of Keppoch, known as "Coll of the Cows", withstood all attempts of the MacKintoches, assisted by government troops, to capture him, and for forty years he held his lands in Lochaber by right of the sword. His son, Alexander, succeeded him, and with his followers joined Prince Charles Edward in 1746, and by intercepting government roops who were attempting to surprise the gathering at Glenfinnon, they were the first to strike a blow at the "45". Tradition says that Alexander was a tall and very large man and that he was very angry because he was not allowed to lead all the Scots forces at Culloden, where he was killed in battle. Because the army of William Duke of Cumberland was hunting down the followers of Bonnie Prince Charlie, William McCaleb, with his consort, Sarah (MacAlpin) McCaleb, fled in 1746 to Ireland, and they immigrated from Dublin, landing in Charleston, Province of South Carolina, in the year.12 Tradition says that there was much suffering aboard ship because the ship was lost at sea for many weeks, and that a child was born aboard ship, presumably to a McCaleb. Tradition says that the MacKeys came over on the same ship with the McCalebs from Ireland that two or three of William Neil's brothers were aboard the same ship.


William Neil McCaleb and his wife moved inland and, according to tradition, settled in either South or North Carolina with "other exiled followers of Bonnie Prince Charles". It has not been proven exactly where in this area they settled. Evidence seems fairly conclusive that the McCalebs settled in the area of Lancaster and Chesterfield Counties, South Carolina, or Anson and Mecklinburg, N. C. In this same area were the McKeys, McAlpins (See Addenda for research on MacKey and MacAlpin families in this area), Flora McDonald, Shelbys, Wileys, Alexanders.

In 1766 Neil McKellope was in the Indian Wars as a member of Adam Alexander's Militia from Mecklinburg County, North Carolina. William Neil and Sarah (McAlpin) McCaleb, who was born in 1747. They probably had other children. It seems likely that James McCaleb of Cabarrus and John McCaleb of Orange were sons. (See Book II of McCaleb History).





- Dr. James F. McCaleb, medical doctor and journalist, 3. a resident of Carlisle, Mississippi, did a great deal of research on the McCaleb family. He secured the help of professional genealogists to help him. He had in his possession the earliest known McCaleb family Bible and valuable old papers which had been handed down to him from his ancestor, David McCaleb. These old papers, Bible, and research were burned when Dr. McCaleb's home was destroyed by fire. The fact that he had these records is substantiated in the Dictionary of American Biography, Vol. II, pages 560-561. Dr. McCaleb told what he could remember to Mrs. Katy McCaleb Headley. He said that he had proof that William McCaleb lived at Invernesshire, Scotland; that William McCaleb was chieftain of a small McKillop Clan which was a Sept of the Mac donnells of Keppoch; that William McCaleb fought at the battle of Preston Moor; that William and Mary (Macdonnell) McCaleb were the parents of William McCaleb, who was born 1715 in Invernesshire, Scotland and died in 1775 in South Carolina: that this son married Sarah MacAlpin, the daughter of Highland Chieftain MacAlpin. He said Mac-Killops and McKillips were different families.
- 4. Don Odo Blundell in the <u>Catholic Highlands of Scotland</u> has this to say: "Another family of influence were the Macdonalds of Sherrabeg. They were originally M'Killops, but took the name Macdonald on their marrying into the Keppoch family". Sherrabeg was in the district of Badenoch and was a tenant farm. Scotland did not have primogeniture and therefore the farms became very small or extinct. Today Sherrabeg is nonexistent.

- 7. Old Bible which was owned by Dr. Jas. F. McCaleb, of Carlisle, Mississippi, is said by Dr. McCaleb to have given the fact of marriage, but the tradition of Mary Macdonnell's father being a chieftain is probably wishful thinking.
- 8. Dr. Jas. F. McCaleb's old McCaleb that burned with his home.
- 9. Research which Dr. Jas. F. McCaleb said that he had done.
- 10. Dates of birth and death came from the old McCaleb Bible which was owned by Dr. Jas. F. McCaleb and which burned when his home was destroyed by fire. Dr. McCaleb said that the old Bible stated that William and Sarah eloped and married after Culloden, went to Dublin, Ireland and from there immigrated to Charleston, South Carolina--all the same year, 1746. The old Bible said that they moved inland and settled with other exiled followers of Bonnie Prince Charlie. This information or tradition has been handed down to all descendants of William Neil McCaleb.
- Goodspeed (Biography of Dr. William C. McCaleb) says 11. that William McCaleb (1715-1775) married Caroline Calvert. This is most certainly not true and is no doubt the source of the error which has caused so much confusion. Each generation of McCalebs of descendants of Captain William McCaleb have been taught that Sarah McAlpin was Captain McCaleb's mother. Dr. Jas. F. McCaleb, in a letter to Mrs. Katy McCaleb Headley, had this to "The Mississippi Memoirs" from which you quote say: is a totally unreliable authority and Genealogically worthless. William McCaleb never married Caroline Calvert, who was the wife of Captain Pulliam of Maryland and Georgia. I challenge anyone to prove that this Caroline Calvert, a descendant of Lord Baltimore, ever married a McCaleb," Mrs. Headley had two professional genealogists search the records of Maryland for any trace of William McCaleb or his family. No William or William Neil was found. No McCaleb, or like spelling was found in Maryland before the American Revolution. The only McCalebs found came during the Revolutionary War from York and Adams County, Pennsylvania. On the other hand, Mrs. Headley found Neil (Neal) M'Kellope listed as one who was formerly a member of Captain Adam Alexander's Company of Militia, 1776 (Indian Wars) from Mecklinburg County, North Carolina (Colonial Records of North Carolina, Vol. 22, \$

p. 396. Adam Alexander was from Mecklinburg County, North Carolina.

Mrs. Thomas Paul Roberts of Baton Rouge, La. has this to say about the marriage of William Neil McCaleb's marriage: "Captain William's parents were William McCaleb (McKillip) and his wife Caroline Calvert, born 1730 in Maryland and died in South Carolina. This has been verified by professional genealogists and accepted by <u>Magna Charta</u>, of which I am a member, by the <u>Colonial</u> <u>Dames</u>, of the XVII, by the American Colonists, and by the James Society, and others". She said: "William McKillip was born about 1726 in Scotland and died after 1747 in South Carolina, and Caroline Calvert was born 1730 in Maryland". Mrs. Headley's research in New York, Vermont, Pennsylvania, Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina did not bear out the above claim. Neal McKellope, who lived near Mecklinburg, North Carolina in 1766 is the only trace found of our ancestors.

- 12. Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Louisiana, Vol. II, (1892) and the Dictionary of American Biography, Vol. II, p. 560 confirms the arrival of the McCalebs or McKillops in America.
- 13. Some say that several brothers came from Scotland together. They say that one settled in South Carolina; one settled in North Carolina; one settled in Penn-sylvania. Some say that one brother moved west and married an Indian. James McCaleb of Cabbarus County, North Carolina had a son named William Neil who died August 21, 1813, aged 73 yr., 6 mo., and 6 days. He was buried in the Popular Tent Graveyard in Cabarrus County. Descendants of John McCaleb of Orange County, North Carolina claim that he was a brother of Captain William McCaleb. Both John and James were Revolutionary soldiers. Other Revolutionary soldiers from North Carolina who probably were related to Captain William McCaleb were: Hugh, Aneas (Enos), and Archibald (who may have been from South Carolina).




CAPTAIN WILLIAM MCCALEB married ANN MACKEY

WILLIAM McCALEB, pioneer, soldier, and legislator was born in South Carolina or just over the boundary in North Carolina. He was born in 1747, and he died at his Hermitage Plantation, which was located on the North Fork of Bayou Pierre in Claiborne County, Mississippi, Mar. 7, 1813. He was the son of William and Sarah (MacAlpin) McCaleb who had immigrated from Scotland by way of Dublin, Ireland to Charleston, South Carolina in 1746. It is not known where in South Carolina or North Carolina Captain William McCaleb was born and spent his childhood. It probably was in Lancaster or Chesterfield County, South Carolina or Anson or Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. He may or may not have had sisters and brothers.² It is known that he married ANN MACKEY, who was born 1746, in South Carolina October 23, 1769, at which time he was a young man of twenty-three years of age and was probably living with his parents. That they married in South Carolina is confirmed by the inscription on their joint tombstone which is in the Hermitage Plantation Cemetery. He probably married in Chesterfield or Lancaster County, South Carolina. He may have married his wife in the Pendleton District (96th District), South Carolina as William MacKey. His wife, a son under sixteen, six daughters, and four slaves appear as a household on the census of 1790 and were living in Ninety-Six District, Pendleton County. This William MacKey may have been a brother to Ann (MacKey) McCaleb. Tradition says that the MacKeys came to America on the same ship with the McCalebs in 1746, and it is logical that the two families settled near one another. Captain William McCaleb and his wife were probably living in the Pendleton area as early as 1774, since their son, David McCaleb, said that he was born in the Pendleton District.

Captain William McCaleb served in the Revolutionary War under Generals Marian and Pickens. He held the rank of Captain and commanded a company of Hussars or horse of the 91st Militia, South Carolina Line. He participated in the battles of Camden, the Cowpens, Guilford Court House, Eutaw Springs, the Seige of Charleston, and Ninety Six.⁴

William McCaleb and his colleague, General Wade Hampton, represented the South of the Saluda District in the South Carolina Convention which ratified the Federal Constitution.⁵ (Elliott's Debates on the Federal Constitution, Vol. IV, Page 239).



The table top tombstone which covers the graves of Captain William and Ann (McKey) McCaleb, confirms his service in the Revolutionary army. The tombstone inscription reads: "William McCaleb died March 7, 1813, aged 66 years. Ann, his wife, died October 10, 1821, aged 75 years and 7 months. They were married in South Carolina where he held the rank of Captain in the army of the Revolution and sacrificed his youthful vigor in the cause of American Independence. She, amid the perils to which her husband was exposed, displayed her devotion as a wife and the courage of the heroine".

The first land grant to a McCaleb, which has been located in South Carolina, is 275 acres on 12 Mile Creek, 96th District, granted on July 12th, 1784. 12 Mile Creek is in Anderson and Pickens Counties, and it was in Old Pendleton District until it was discontinued in 1821 to form Anderson and Pickens Counties. Pendleton was opened to settlement about 1784 by an Indian Treaty. Some settlers had pushed into lower Pendleton before the Revolution,⁶ but he main influx began about 1785. In 1787 Capt. William McCaleb obtained a grant of 466 acres on Coffee Creek in 96 District and 369 acres on 12 Mile Creek. In 1788 he obtained 300 acres on Carre Creek in the 96th District. In 1796 he received a grant of 359 acres on Keowee River in the Pendleton District.⁷

The South Carolina census of 1790 for Pendleton County, 96 District, shows that Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb had three sons over sixteen years of age, two sons under sixteen years of age, and three daughters, and eight slaves. This same census shows that General Andrew Pickens, Esquire (General Pickens, hero of the Revolution) and General Robert Anderson Esquire, for whom Pickens and Anderson Counties were respectively named, were the nearest neighbors of the McCalebs.

On June 27, 1799 Captain McCaleb purcheased land in West Florida, near Natchez, from William Marshall of the city of Charleston, South Carolina. This transaction is on record in the Chancery Court Records of Adams County, Mississippi. This land consisted of 950 acres on the south branch of Fairchild's Creek about twelve miles east of the old Fort. In this land transaction, Captain McCaleb is described as being from Pendleton County, South Carolina.⁶ Gale and Seaton's edition, <u>American State Papers</u> shows that William McCaleb (non-resident) obtained a British grant to 600 acres on Fairchild Creek, dated 1777. This seems to be the Marshall land that Marshall obtained in 1777 and William McCaleb purchased in 1799.

In 1799 Captain William and Ann (MacKey) moved their family and eight slaves to the Province of West Florida, Natchez District. Matilda, the youngest daughter had died. William Neil, the oldest son, had probably died. David remained in South Carolina for a few more years before following the family. Captain William, Ann, and the rest of the family and slaves moved to Natchez. They arrived in Natchez in 1799. Tradition says that they came overland across the mountains, down the Tennessee, Ohio, and Mississippi Rivers to Natchez. Tradition says also that they stopped for a visit with Archibald McCaleb, brother to Captain William McCaleb, and his family at Campbell's Station near Knoxville.9 Shortly after the family arrived in Natchez, Captain McCaleb obtained a land grant on the North Fork of the Bayou Pierre¹⁰in what is now Claiborne County, where he established his Hermitage Plantation. It is not known why he did not make his home on the fertile land which he had purchased from John Marshall near Natchez, but it is almost certain that he sold or gave this property to his son, John McCaleb.

To take care of his family, Captain William McCaleb built a large rambling one story home on his Hermitage Plantation. It had a long, wide front porch, an enclosed hall, and several wings which were added as need.¹¹ Large, live oaks grew on the spacious, sloping lawn which overlooked hundreds of acres of Bayou Pierre bottom lands. The cemetery was on a hill and within sight of the house.

Like most of the early planters who came early to this section and who obtained choice lands, Captain McCaleb and his sons became wealty in cotton and slaves. (Note the wills and probate court records of Adams and Claiborne Counties, Mississippi and of West Feliciana Parish, Louisiana). Because his sons obtained large tracts of land for themselves at \$1.25 per acre, Captain McCaleb requested in his will that his property be held together by his son Jonathan McCaleb, a bachelor, for the duration of Jonathan's life or until such time as Jonathan McCaleb thought it wise to divide it.

The "Mississippi Messenger" for November 12, 1805, page 3, Column 1, states: "William McCaleb, Esq. is elected a member of the Legislature of this territory to fill the place of John Shaw, resigned".

At the time of the Indian scare, Captain McCaleb and Colonel Farrar built and commanded a fort for the protection of the whites in the neighborhoold.¹² They had been fellow officers under General Pickens in the Revolution.

Both William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb died at the Hermitage plantation and are buried there in the family cemetery.13

It is recorded of Ann (MacKey) McCaleb that "she was an elegant woman, and was never thrown off her dignity so much as to frown--not even in household affairs".¹⁴

Captain William and Ann McCaleb probably were or became members of the Presbyterian faith, as he was one of several who helped finance building the old stone church in the Pendleton District.





All dates of birth and marriages were taken from the Captain William McCaleb family Bible, which is now in the possession of Col. Alfred Francis McCaleb of Bay Saint Louis, Mississippi. Some of the dates of birth can also be verified by tombstone inscriptions. Some dates of death are recorded in the Captain McCaleb Bible, and some are not. The ones which were not recorded in the Bible can, with the exception of William Neil and Matilda McCaleb, be found on the respective tombstones. For these records, see the Appendix. While dates of William Neil and Matilda McCaleb are burned off the Bible record, the chronological order shows about when the deaths occurred. It is probable that William Neil and Matilda were buried in the Old Stone Church Cemetery in South Carolina.

Ann MacKey's (McKey) relatives came to Claiborne County, Mississippi. William Mackey and family were living in the Pendleton District of South Carolina as early as 1790. Thomas MacKey estate was settled in Claiborne County, Mississippi in 1815. William McKey got an early land grant in Mississippi--66.52 acres in T. 11N; Jonathan MacKey got 306 acres Sec. 12 T. 11N, R 1 (Original Land Entry Book). Samuel MacKey died in Claiborne 1878. (Will-no children).



FOOTNOTES

- 1. Dates of births, marriage, and deaths of William and Ann MacKey McCaleb are confirmed by the inscription on their joint tombstone which is in the Hermitage Plantation Cemetery. These dates are also confirmed by the remains of the Captain William McCaleb Bible which is now in the possession of Col. Alfred Francis McCaleb, of Bay Saint Louis, Mississippi.
- 2. It seems likely that John McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier from Orange County, North Carolina, was a brother to Captain William McCaleb. Tradition says that two or three brothers came to America together. James McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier from Cabarrus County, North Carolina, may have been another brother. William Neil McCaleb, who is buried in the Popular Tent Cemetery in Cabarrus County, North Carolina probably was a son of James McCaleb.

- 5. After the Mississippi Delta was opened for settlement, General Wade Hampton's son and Captain McCaleb's son Jonathan both obtained large plantations in Washington County on Lake Washington.

- 6. There is a Highland, North Carolina just across the border from Oconee county, South Carolina. Some D. A. R. papers say that Captain McCaleb was born in Highland (Highlands), which may mean the highlands of Scotland. Highlands, North Carolina is a resort city.
- 7. Records of land purchases and sales made by Captain McCaleb and his older sons can be found in South Carolina in the Office of Records in Anderson, Pickens, and Oconee Counties, from the year 1784 to 1796. In 1790 Captain William McCaleb seems to be living near present Pendleton, South Carolina, where Anderson, Oconee, and Pickens Counties join.
- 8. In the old South Carolina records, Captain William McCaleb spelled his name "McCalleb" when he gave his signature, and it was spelled "McCaleb" when written by a notary. After coming to Mississippi, he spelled his name "McCaleb". (Will and other records, Claiborne County.)
- 9. Archibald McCaleb and William Campbell, with their families, and with one other man, established Campbell's Station near the present site of Knoxville, Tennessee, in 1787. Goodspeed says that Archibald McCaleb was from South Carolina. There is no proof of the legend of Captain McCaleb's family visit. (See Vol. II for descendants of Archibald McCaleb).
- 10. Bayou Pierre is a small river or Bayou which runs through Claiborne County. The Bayou forks into north and south forks which meet west of Port Gibson and flows into the Mississippi River.
- 11. This description was given to Mrs. Katy McCaleb Headley by her father, James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. and by Mrs. Cornelia (Regan) Clark. The Hermitage burned July 2, 1891. ("Port Gibson Reveille")
- 12. Tecumseh had aroused the Southern Indians.
- 13. The will of Captain McCaleb is on record in the Chancery Court office, Claiborne County, Mississippi. His son John's estate was settled in Adams County, Mississippi. Samuel's will was probated in West Felicianna Parish, Louisiana. Wills and probate records of Captain McCaleb's other children can be found in Claiborne County, Mississippi.







WILLIAM NEIL MCCALEB, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born August 8, 1770 in South Carolina and died before 1813. In 1786 William Neil McCaleb received a frant of 622 acres on Twelve Mile Creek, the 96th District, in South Carolina. It would seem that he died 1786-1790, as he does not appear on the census of 1790 as a head of a family or in the home of his parents. It seems most certain that he and his sister Matilda died in South Carolina before the family moved to Mississippi in 1799, since neither are buried in the Hermitage family burial ground. It is probable that both are buried in the Old Stone Church yard in South Carolina, as the earliest stones there are field stones and bear no inscriptions.



FOOTNOTE

 The Captain's Bible verifies the birth of William Neil McCaleb, lists his death among three who died prior to 1813, and does not list his marriage. (See Bible Records).

Jonathan McCaleb, who willed something to every nephew and niece or their heirs, did not mention William Neil McCaleb or heirs in his will.


William McCaleb (not William Neil McCaleb) came early to Madison County, Alabama from Virginia. Mrs. Balch, of Huntsville, Alabama, has his family Bible. She copied the genealogical pages for Mrs. K. H. in 1959. In a letter which accompanied the information she stated that she used a magnifying glass in order to be absolutely correct. The Bible Record showed her ancestor to have been born November 27, 1780 and died, aged 38. Census records bear out this information.

Mrs. Wilkerson of Shelby County, Mississippi, a descendant of William McCaleb of Virginia and Alabama claims that William McCaleb of Madison County and William Neil McCaleb, son of Captain William McCaleb, to be one and the same in her D. A. R. membership papers and in a book Wilkersons and Allied Families. She also has confused the records by using Goodspeed's error concerning the marriage of William McCaleb, (1715-1775), to Caroline Calvert, instead of Sarah McAlpin. Mrs. Wilkerson is probably descended from Enos or Aneas McCaleb, who appears on the North Carolina Revolutionary roles, and who appears in Rockbridge County, Virginia in 1803 with sons, William, Samuel, Eli, and Joseph. Samuel went to Illinois. Joseph stayed in Virginia, and William and Eli appear in Madison County, Alabama records. The name Harriet Sydney appears in the Joseph and William families, as do Joseph, Thomas, William, etc. (See Vol. II).

David, son of Captain McCaleb, had a son, William Neil, who died before 1813 and before David came to Miss.

William Neil McCaleb, who died Aug. 21, 1813, aged ?3 yrs., 6 mo., and 6 days, is buried in the Popular Tent Cemetery, Carrabus Co nty, N. C. He was no doubt the son of James McCaleb, Rev. Soldier, Carrabus County, who had a daughter, Matilda Jameson, buried in the same cemetery.






LOUIS JAMES McCALEB married (1) PAMELIA TRIGG (2) MRS. CAROLINE BUCK

LOUIS JAMES McCALEB, second of the children of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born in South Carolina February 17, 1772 and died in Claiborne County, Mississippi February of 1822.¹ He was buried in the Hopewell Plantation Cemetery,² Claiborne County, Mississippi. Louis James McCaleb, known to his family as "James", was twice married. He first married PAMELIA TRIGG. This marriage is recorded in the Captain William McCaleb Bible, but no date or place is given for the marriage. The placement in the Bible indicates that they were married 1794-1803. To this marriage was born a daughter.³ James McCaleb's second marriage was to a widow, MRS. CAROLINE BUCK, a native of South Carolina.⁴ It is certain that they married before 1816, because in that year she signed a land deed when James sold land to his brother, Jonathan. James and Caroline were the parents of two sons and a daughter.⁵


James McCaleb owned land in Anderson County, South Carolina in 1790. In 1800 he sold land in Oconee County, South Carolina to his brother, David McCaleb. He probably did not come to Mississippi to live until about 1806. On December 29, 1806 he was given a grant of 390 acres on the North Fork of Bayou Pierre. In 1803 James McCaleb owned 400 acres of land in Baton Rouge District, Louisiana. <u>The Original Entry Book</u>, Claiborne County, lists land owned by James McCaleb as 31T 12N-R4E 494.5 acres, Receipt D96. He evidently owned more than this, because in 1816 he sold 318 acres located on Booth Creek, in Claiborne County, to Samuel Lum.

James McCaleb's Bayou Pierre Plantation was known as Hopewell. Here he built a home west of the site where his son-in-law, Mr. Martin, later built his home, Talbot. James McCaleb left no will. His property was divided between his second wife and their three children. James Stuart McCaleb's share remained known as Hopewell Plantation, and Mary M. McCaleb took the part which became Talbot. By 1840 Mary M. McCaleb Martin and her husband had built a beautiful two story home on Talbot, so named because her husband was from Maryland. The rooms were large; the woodwork was exceptionally fine; it had a remarkably beautiful stair; and it had a long, wide one story front porch supported by lovely columns. It was located on a sloping, large lawn overlooking Bayou Pierre bottom land. At the foot of the hill was a pretty little spring house.



Hopewell was located on the North Fork of Bayou Pierre, near the once famous Grindstone Ford, Bayou Pierre Landing. The land was fertile, and the Natchez Trace crossed the Bayou Pierre here. Planters in this neighborhood became very prosperous and built beautiful homes for themselves. Near Hopewell was the beautiful Pleasant Hill Plantation home which was built by John Booth and later owned by John and Indiana (Booth) McCaleb. (John McCaleb, Jr. was a nephew of James McCaleb). John Taylor Moore built a mansion on Fairview Plantation. Bowling Green, which was just west of the McCaleb property, was magnificent with its large columned porches. The Watsons built a large two story home nearby.

James McCaleb was considered a bad manager by his brothers. He never became quite as wealthy as they, but he was very well off in his day. Hopewell⁶ was just across the Bayou Pierre from the Hermitage, home of Captain William McCaleb and his son, Jonathan McCaleb, and it was said that when the stream was up and unfordable, James and Jonathan would meet at the Bayou and exchange greetings across the creek. It has been said in the family that James often borrowed money, which he forgot to repay, from his brother Jonathan and that Jonathan derived a lot of fun from telling the other members of the family about these transactions. James McCaleb left no will. When his estate was settled in 1823 he owned 45 slaves valued at \$17305.00. The best one was valued at \$1200.00. The household goods were listed and valued at \$18772.64; the farm equipment was valued at \$20892.39. Malinda Ann, his daughter by his first marriage, died very shortly before he did. At his death, he left a widow and three living children. The widow later married FLETCHER CREIGHTON, a teacher, in December 18, 1828 in Claiborne County. (Book 3, p. 512). Mrs. Caroline Creighton made a will in 1846. In this will she left her property to her two living McCaleb children and to her grandson by a previous marriage, Richard Buck, of Pennsylvania. Caroline and Fletcher Creighton are buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.




- I. <u>MALINDA ANN McCALEB</u> was the daughter of Louis James and Pamelia (Trigg) McCaleb. In March of 1818 James McCaleb made a deed of gift (Deed Book G Chancery Court Records, Claiborne County, Mississippi) to his daughter. This deed probably was to give her property left to her by her mother and also her childs share of property after her marriage. In May of 1822 she is mentioned by her guardian, David McCaleb, as "the enfant daughter of James McCaleb". She married GEORGE LAKE in Claiborne County, Mississippi December 8, 1821. George Lake was a descendant of the very prominent Lake family of Dorchester County, Maryland. (Side Lights on Maryland History by Hester Dorsey Richardson, pp. 157-160.) They had no children. She died, a minor, in 1822. George Lake married (2) JANE BRIGGS, who was first cousin to his first wife.
- II. JAMES STUART McCALEB⁸ was the son of Louis James and Caroline (Buck) McCaleb. The McCaleb family claimed kinship with the royal Stuart family of Scotland, and it was for this family that James Stuart was named. When his father died in 1822 James S. was a minor under fourteen years of age, and he asked the Court to



appoint his uncle, Jonathan McCaleb, his guardian. He died in his native Claiborne County just before the November term of Chancery Court in 1842. He married ELEANOR HALL June 26th, 1839 in Anne-Arundell County, Maryland.

The following quotation is from a letter written by Robert L. Burwell, son of Dr. Elliott and Caroline Burwell: "A son of Henry A. Hall and Annie Lyle Estep Hall brought home from the University of Virginia, during the Christmas vacation a school mate from Port Gibson, Mississippi by the name of James S. McCaleb. James S. fell in love with Eleanor Hall, a sister of his school mate. They were married June 26th, 1839 in Anne-Arundell County, Maryland, (Records in St. Anne's Church) and James took his bride to Claiborne County, Mississippi to live on his plantation on Bayou Pierre. Eleanor bore James S. McCaleb two children-James and Annie Caroline. (I believe that the name of the plantation was Hopewell and consisted of 1500 acres). She, after the death of James S. McCaleb, married, June 15, 1847, ELLIOTT BURWELL, a teacher, but later a physician, from Buffalo, New York. He, after the death of his first wife, removed to Port Gibson to practice his profession. Dr. Burwell's original ancestor in America was John Burwell, who was one of the first settlers in Milford, Connecticut where he died in 1649. Dr. Elliotte Burwell was probably the McCaleb's physician because after the death of James S. McCaleb he and James McCaleb's widow wergomarried June 15, 1847 at Epiphany Episcopal Church near Carlisle, Mississippi. The family lived in Claiborne County until 1854 when they sold their plantation and returned to Anne-Arundell County, Maryland to a farm called "Oakley" near Mt. Zion in the region where the Halls had lived for many years and still do. Eleanor Hall McCaleb was born at 'Tudor Hall', her father's home, March 20, 1818 and died March 1, 1894. Dr. Elliott Burwell was born March 10, 1807 and died April 14, 1884. Eleanor Burwell was a direct descendant of Henry Hall, who was sent to America by the Bishop of London in 1798 as the first Rector of Saint James, located a few miles south of Tudor Hall."


A. JAMES McCALEB, son of James Stuart and Eleanor (Hall) McCaleb, was born July 27, 1840 in Claiborne County, and he was baptized into the Episcopal Church, Arundell County, Maryland. His birth date is recorded in Anne-Arundell County on the records



of St. Ann's Parish. Orphan Court records, Claiborne County, 1855, page 336 shows that Elliott Burwell, step-father and guardian of James and Ann McCaleb, received permission of of the court to move the property of James and Ann to Maryland. James and Ann had inherited property from their father and inherited \$5000.00 each from their great uncle, Jonathan McCaleb. (Jonathan McCaleb remembered both Eleanor and Doctor Burwell in his will). At the outbreak of the War between the States, James McCaleb sided with the Confederacy and became a member of Company "B" Maryland Guard, 21st Va. Inf. He died of typhoid fever in Richmond, Virginia, August 22, 1861. He is buried at Christ Episcopal Church at Owensville, Anne Arundell County. Eleanor Burwell, his mother, built Christ Church in memory of her two McCaleb children, as a stain glass window attests.¹¹ (Christ Church was consecrated December 2, 1869, and is still standing. Those who have seen it say that it is very lovely.) James McCaleb never married.


- B. <u>ANN CAROLINE McCALEB</u> was born in 1839. She was the daughter of James S. and Eleanor (Hall) McCaleb. While still a young lady, she was killed in a horse and buggy accident which resulted from her hitting a tree. She is buried in Christ Episcopal Church, which was built in her and her brother's memory by her mother.
- III. MARY M. McCALEB, daughter of Louis James and Caroline (Buck) McCaleb, was born 1814 in Claiborne County, Mississippi and died in her native county in 1865. Mary M. McCaleb married WILLIAM HEYWARD MARTIN12 May 23, 1833 in Claiborne County. The marriage was performed by Reverend Zebulon Butler, the first resident Presbyterian minister in Port Gibson. William H. Martin was born in Maryland in 1800 and died in Claiborne County in 1878 of yellow fever. He was a lawyer, a graduate of Princeton, son of Doctor Ennels Martin who served as a surgeon's mate on Doctor Shippen's Staff in the War of 1812, William Heyward Martin often told of witnessing the passage of the British ships up the Chesapeake Bay and of seeing the bombardment of Fort William Henry.

For some years William H. Martin practiced law in Port Gibson where he and his wife resided. He won the reputation of being one of the most talented




Lawyers of Claiborne County, if not of the state. After a time, at the solicitation of his wife, he gave up his chosen profession and engaged in looking after his large landed interests, which were wrecked by the war. They moved to Talbot Plantation where they spent the remainder of their lives. Near Talbot, at Pleasant Hill Plantation, resided John McCaleb, son of John and Marie (Collins) McCaleb, and the Martin and McCaleb children grew up as cousins and fast friends as well as neighbors.

- A. <u>CAROLINE M. MARTIN</u>, daughter of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was named for her maternal grandmother. She never married and for some years she kept house for her brothers Jonathan McCaleb and Fletcher in a house which stood on the lower end of College Street in Port Gibson. (The house, which burned, was located where Waddy Abraham's home now (1964) stands.) She was a fine piano player and aspired to be a singer. She was an interesting conversationalist and had a very alert mind. Shortly before her brother Jonathan McCaleb Martin married she moved to New York City. She was living as late as 1891.¹³
- B. <u>GEORGE HEYWARD MARTIN</u> was the son of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin. He served in the Confederate Army. After the war he settled in Wichita Falls, Texas, where he resided until his death. It is believed he never married.
- C. FLETCHER CREIGHTON MARTIN, son of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was named for his mother's step-father. He served in the army of the Confederacy. He was a graduate of the University of Texas, and he practiced law for some years in Seymour, Texas.
- D. JAMES E. MARTIN, son of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was a student of high rank at William College. After leaving college he began devoting his attention to agriculture. He entered the Confederate army as Captain of a company of infantry(Co. I, Mississippi Battalion Army of Northern Virginia), and during his career as a soldier showed remarkable courage and bravery. He was killed September 17, 1862 at the terrible battle of Sharpsburg, having, just prior to his death, been promoted to the rank of



Lieutenant Colonel of the Forty-eighth Mississippi Infantry Volunteers.


- E. <u>WILLIAM McCALEB MARTIN</u>, son of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, entered the Confederate service in the Claiborne Guards, in which he soon was promoted to lst. Lieutenant but resigned this position to return home and raise a cavalry company(Magruder's Partisan Rangers) in connection with Captain Magruder, in which he assumed the role of lst. Lieutenant. In an engagement which took place soon after, Captain Magruder was killed, and Lieutenant Martin was promoted to Captaincy of his company. Captain Martin was shot three times and was killed at Harrisburg, Mississippi July 14, 1864. (His brother, Jonathan McCaleb Martin, saw him killed). He was a young man of brilliant prospects, was a graduate of Yale College, and was expecting to make law his profession.
- F. <u>CHARLES HENRY MARTIN</u>, son of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin was possessed of a fine analytical mind and gave every promise of making a name and fame for himself. He served in Magruder's Partisan Rangers, CSA in War between the States. In early manhood he was assassinated by a negro.
- JONATHAN McCALEB MARTIN¹⁴, the sixth child of G. William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was known sometimes as "Jon. McC." Martin. He was born in Claiborne County June 2, 1846. He received his early education under a governess and a private tutor. He attended the Seidlitz School at Port Gibson until his education was interfered with by the bursting of the war cloud which was hanging over the country, and he left the halls of euridiction at the early age of fifteen years to shoulder his musket, don his suit of gray, and defend his country. Prior to his enlistment he had taken part in the Battle of Port Gibson, and three days after entering service he had his horse shot out from under him, this being the Battle of Harris' Landing. He became a member of the Fourth Mississippi Cavalry in 1863 and was later transferred to General Bedford Forrest's command. He served at Harrisburg, Mississippi, where he saw his brother killed, at Johnsonville, Tennessee, at the campus fight at Oxford, Mississippi, and at Selma Alabama. He surrendered



at Gainsville, Alabama. After the war, he attended the University of Virginia. He held the chair of English and Mathematics at Prytonnia High School in New Orleans, and in 1874 he engaged with the White League in the famous Battle of the Levee. He was admitted to the Louisiana bar in 1875, but he returned to Port Gibson and set up a law practice the same year. He became a member of the Mississippi Legislature and introduced the bill which created the Industrial Institute and College for Women, which later became Mississippi State College for Women.¹⁵ He was a member of the Methodist Church, the I. O. O. F., the Knights and Ladies of Honor, and the American Legion of Honor.

Mr. Martin married Miss AMANDA (Wood, nee McCall) MILES, a native of Mississippi, in Port Gibson, Mississippi December 15, 1885. She was a graduate of Columbia Female Institute at Columbia, Tennessee, a member of the Episcopal Church, an intelligent and talented lady. They resided in a beautiful old home on College Street in Port Gibson. Both Jonathan McCaleb and Amanda Miles Martin are buried in the Wintergreen Cemetery at Port Gibson, Mississippi. He died July 19, 1924. Amanda Malvia (Myles), who was born February 13, 1858, died December 23, 1945. They had no children. (The Martin home stood where Dr. D. Segrest's home now stands--1963).

- H. <u>SARAH HEYWARD MARTIN</u>, daughter of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was a graduate of the famous Female College at New Haven, Connecticut, of which Mrs. Edwards was president. She died in 1666.
- I. MARY E. MARTIN, daughter of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was a graduate of the Female College of New Haven, Connecticut. She died of yellow fever in 1878.
- J. <u>MALINDA ANN MARTIN</u>, daughter of William H. and Mary M. (McCaleb) Martin, was named for her mother's sister, Malinda Ann McCaleb. She died at the age of nine years.



FOOTNOTES

- 1. Birth and death are recorded in the Captain McCaleb Bible.
- 2. The Hopewell burial ground was destroyed early in the 20th century by a family who owned the property. The tabletop tombstones were used to make a walk and to level a field. Mr. Jonathan McCaleb Martin, a descendant of James and Caroline McCaleb, threatened to prosecute the vandals, but nothing came of it.
- 3. Deed Book G, Claiborne Chancery Records, show a Deed of Gift or childs share of property to Malinda Ann McCaleb by her father, James McCaleb.
- 4. "John McCaleb Martin", <u>Biographical and Historical</u> <u>Memoirs of Mississippi</u>, Vol. II, p. 405, Goodspeed Publishing Company, 1891. Some say that Mrs. Caroline (Buck) McCaleb's maiden name was Caroline Calvert and that she was a descendant of Lord Baltimore. This may be the source of the mistake made by Goodspeed.

Epiphany still stands as a mission church, and the old hand-pump pipe organ is considered a museum piece, 1964.



DAVID McCALEB married MATILDA FARRAR

DAVID McCALEB, pioneer and legislator was born in South Carolina April 2, 1774! He was the son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb. As a small boy, David McCaleb proved himself a hero. During the American Revolutionary War was, while on a short visit to his home, surprised by Tory soldiers, and he hid in the woods after admonishing his children not to tell that he had been home. The Tories suspected that he was near by, as there was a fresly dressed deer in the house. They attempted to force the young David to divulge his father's hiding place and went so far at to hang him by the neck with a horse bridle. David was saved by the timely arrival of General Marion's men. Before the Tories joined battle with the fast approaching patriots, a young Tory officer, drawing his sword, cut the bridle by which David hung.


In 1800 David McCaleb was grantee of six land deeds in Anderson County, South Carolina north of what is now Pendleton end near the Seneca River. Between 1800-1803 he sold land, and in 1800 he bought land in Oconee County from his brother, James (Louis James) McCaleb.

In early manhood David McCaleb was for some years high sheriff of the Pickens District, South Carolina (Oconee South Carolina Records). Also he served as Judge.

David McCaleb married MATILDA FARRAR? daughter of Thomas and Margaret Prince Farrar? November 20, 1794. About 1812 David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb and their children followed his parents to Mississippi. (About this time Thomas Farrar and his wife also came to Caliborne County, Mississippi). They first settled near Red Lick, Jefferson County subswquent to settling in Claiborne County. David McCaleb obtained land on the North Fork of Bayou Pierre near that of his father and brothers. Because of the abundance of springs on his property he named his plantation Cold Springs? On Cold Springs he built a fine home. It burned, and he built another on the same site. (The latter home burned at some time after his death).

David McCaleb soon became very wealthy from cotton and slaves. When the Choctaw lands were opened he operated plantations in the Mississippi Delta.

Jonathan McCaleb also operated plantations in the Mississippi Delta. To supervise this delta farming was something of a task. They hired overseers, but they visited the plantations regularly. They rode horses to Grand Gulf,



a Mississippi River port in Claiborne County, and took a river boat to the delta where they were met with horses to ride to their plantations.

David McCaleb was appointed by the President of the United States to represent Jefferson and Claiborne Counties in the territorial Legislature of Mississippi (Territorial Papers of the United States, Vol. VI, p. 21) and was a prominent member of the territorial Council.


During the threatened outbreak of the Creek and Choctaw Indians in 1813 he was a member of the Frontier Committee with Harmon Blennerhassett, a historical character? This committee met in Port Gibson September 18, 1813, after the fall of Fort Mins. Other members of the Frontier Committee were John Booth, Moses Shelby, and Captain Briscoe. On the Central Committee were Samuel Gibson, Col. Ralph Regan, Col. Thomas Farrar, Daniel Burnett, and Thomas Barnes. David and Matilda Farrar were both devout members of Epiphany Episcopal Church. They contributed to a building fund to build this church, and David McCaleb gave the beautiful old hand-pump pipe organ to Epiphany?

The McCalebs often were guests and also entertained the Davis family of which Jefferson Davis was a member. David William McCaleb, son of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, married the daughter of General Joseph Davis, brother of Jefferson Davis who was the only president of the Confederate States of America.

David and Matilda McCaleb are both buried in the Cold Springs family cenetery. She died October 12, 1844, and he died March 4, 1850.



DESCENDANTS OF DAVID AND MATILDA (FARRAR) MCCALEB

I. <u>THOMAS FARRAR McCALEB</u>, son of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born in South Carolina November 29, 1795. He served as lieutenant in the Confederate army in the War of 1812 in Captain Green's Company of Mississippi. He graduated with honors from Princeton College, New Jersey, studied law and established himself in 1618 in New Orleans, where he obtained eminence in his profession. In those halycon days of the profession in New Orleans he was of counsel in nearly every important case before the Supreme Court of the State, also representing in that capacity Donaldson, the founder of the town of Donaldsonville, kouisiana, and John McDonogn, the eccentric philanthropist.




Elected Secretary of State in 1831, he did not live to complete his term of office, as he expired of cholera November 5th, 1832 in New Orleans. He was brought home to Cold Springs Plantation for burial. The obituary from the "Louisiana Courier of November 7, 1832, page 1, Column 3 says: "Thomas Farrar McCaleb, esq., late Secretary of State of Louisiana and a distinguished member of the bar, will be mourned as his friends and society will be deprived of an object of their dearest affection, and his country mourns at his tomb the premature loss of his talents". Thomas McCaleb married MARY ANN CURTIS? about 1820. Only one child, a son, was born to this couple. Thomas Farrar McCaleb was a slave owner in 1830 and owned 12 slaves (Census 1830). He became extremely wealthy, and he invested in a great acreage around Biloxi Bay, Biloxi, Mississippi. He had in his possession a pair of beautiful china vases, which William and Sarah (MacAlpin) McCaleb are said to have brought with them from Scotland when they immigrated to America.¹⁰ A very fine portrait of Thomas McCaleb hangs in the Edgar Morris home in Port Gibson, Mississippi. It was willed to Theodore Howard McCaleb by his father, David McCaleb.

A. <u>CHARLES EUGENIUS McCALEB</u>, son of Thomas and Mary (Curtis) McCaleb, was born in New Orleans, Louisiana in 1821. (Census Record of ^Harrison County, Mississippi). He inherited money and quite a lot of real estate, much of which is now the Gulf Coast at Biloxi, Mississippi, from his father. His grandfather, David McCaleb, was his guardian. (Census 1850 Harrison County, Mississippi.) He married MARY ?, a native of Virginia. Their first child was born in Louisiana in 1843. By 1850 the family was living at Biloxi. Charles Eugenius and Mary (?) McCaleb were the parents of three sons. After his death, his widow married Peter W. Ott of Biloxi December 28, 1854. (Harrison County, Mississippi Marriage Records). There were several children born to this marriage.

1. <u>THOMAS McCALEB</u>, son of Charles Eugenius and Mary McCaleb, was born in 1843 in Louisiana (Census 1850, Harrison County). He lived his childhood at Biloxi, Mississippi.

2. <u>EREDERICK HENRY McCALEB</u>, son of Charles Eugenius and Mary McCaleb, was born in 1846 in Biloxi, Mississippi, and he died there June 29, 1909. He married (1) CECELIA JOICE, May 7, 1867 in Harrison County, Mississippi. She is buried in the Old French Cemetery near the beach at Biloxi, Mississippi. Her tombstone inscription states that she was a native of NewOrleans, the wife of Frederick H. 'McCaleb, and that she died in Biloxi January 16, 1897,




aged 45 years, 11 months and 7 days. Before her marriage she was an orphan and was reared by a wealthy family. Eight children were born to Frederick H. and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb. After her death, Frederick H. married (2) MRS. ANNIE LILLY (JORDAN) TILLMAN and by this marriage had one son. Frederick Henry McCaleb served in the Confederate army as a private in Company E., 3rd Regiment of Mississippi Infantry. He enlisted May 21, 1862 at Jackson, Mississippi (Letter from Adjutant General's Office, Washington, D. C., 1948). He was remembered by his children as a man of culture and refinement, and as an exceptionally kind and indulgent father. He is buried in Biloxi in the churchyard of a Roman Catholic Church on 1st St. on property which he then owned.

a. <u>CHARLES PETER McCALEB</u>, son of Frederick H. and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb was born March 7, 1868 in Biloxi, Mississippi. He spent his childhood in Biloxi and was educated as a Marine engineer. He married NORA AKEN, daughter of Joseph and Harriett (Waters) Aken¹¹, at Biloxi, Mississippi Sept. 24, 1890. The Aken family were French, and Nora Aken was a direct descendant of an Aken and his wife, Lady Mundy of Shepley Hall, of England. Albertus King Aken, Nora (Aken) McCaleb's grandfather, came to New Orleans from France.¹² After their marriage Charles Peter and Nora (Aken) McCaleb lived for some years in New Orleans, and then in Biloxi before moving to Galveston, Texas. He followed the sea as a marine engineer until he was drowned when his ship went down in the Gulf in the hurricane of July 27, 1943. His wife died in Galveston Feb. 7, 1946. She is buried in Oleander Cemetery, Galveston, Texas.

1). <u>CHARLES ALBERTUS McCALEB</u>, son of Charles Peter and Nora (Aken) McCaleb, was born in Biloxi, Mississippi June 11, 1899. He spent most of his early years in Biloxi. He moved to Galveston October 1915 with his parents. He was educated as an engineer, which profession he still follows. Charles Albertus McCaleb is known to his family and friends as "Bert". He married THELMA LASSERRE BARRY Feb. 21, 1925. She was born in Fernandine, Florida February 5, 1904. Her maternal family is rooted in the Basque country of France, and her paternal ancestors were Irish. She has a very responsible executive position with the United States Engineers in Galveston. They have no children.

2). <u>EESSIE JOICE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Charles Peter and Nora (Aken) McCaleb, was born in Biloxi, Mississippi May 6, 1907. She lived with her parents until their deaths. December 23, 1949 she married FREEMAN MORGAN CHRONKHITE.



They were married at Ten Acres, home of Mr. and Mrs. Hal Headley, Port Gibson, Mississippi. They resided in Galveston, Texas, where he worked for the United States Engineers. He died Nov. 15, 1962 and is buried in Galveston, Texas. They had no children.

b. THOMAS McCALEB, son of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb, is deceased. He married IDA RALEY at Biloxi, Mississippi. He was known as "Tom".

1). <u>THOMAS McCALEB</u>, JR., ¹³ was the son of Thomas and Ida (Raley) McCaleb. He married and had a family. He died at Bay Saint Louis, Mississippi.

2). MARY McCALEB was the daughter of Thomas and Ida (Raley) McCaleb.

3).<u>MIRCELITTE</u> was the daughter of Thomas and Ida (Raley) McCaleb.

4). FAY was the daughter of Thomas and Ida (Raley) McCaleb.

c. FREDERICK HENRY McCALEB, JR., son of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb, is deceased. He was known as "Fred". He was married.

1). <u>ARTHUR McCALEB</u>, son of Frederick Henry McCaleb, Jr. and his wife, was reared in Biloxi, Mississippi and is living there in 1964.

2). <u>ANNA McCALEB</u> was the child of Frederick Henry McCaleb, Jr. and his wife.

d. <u>EUGENE McCALEB</u>, son of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb, was known as "Gene". He married and had one son. They live in Biloxi, Mississippi on 1964.


e. JOSEPH McCALEB was the son of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb. He died in Corpus Christi, Texas.

1). FREDERICK McCALEB, son of Joseph McCaleb and his wife, is married and has one son. He lives at Corpus Christi, Texas.

b). FREDERICK McCALEB, JR. is the son of Frederick McCaleb.

f. <u>ANNIE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb, married RICHARD LUSK. They reside in Biloxi, Mississippi.

g. <u>CECELIA McCALEB</u>, daughter of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb, married ALEX EWING. She is deceased.

h. <u>BLANCHE JUSTIN McCALEB</u> lives in Biloxi, Mississippi. She is the daughter of Frederick Henry and Cecelia (Joice) McCaleb.

a. LORENZO CLARENCE McCALEB, son of Frederick Henry and Annie Lilly (Jordan) McCaleb, was born December 31, 1901 at Biloxi, Mississippi. He attended the schools of Biloxi and graduated from college. He married MARGARET MYRTLE FAIRLEY March 12, 1926. He is now with the State Board of Health of Coahoma County, Mississippi and resides in Clarksdale, Mississippi. He served in World War II as an Air Corps Major.

1). DORIS JANE McCALEB, daughter of Lorenzo C. and Margaret Myrtle (Fairley) McCaleb, was born June 12, 1926.

2). LAURA LORENE McCALEB, daughter of Lorenzo C. and Margaret Myrtle (Fairley) McCaleb, was born June 24, 1930.

3). MOLLY ANN McCALEB, daughter of Lorenzo and Margaret Myrtle (Fairley) McCaleb, was born June 18, 1928.

3. CHARLES McCALEB, son of Charles E. and Mary McCaleb was born in 1898 in Harrison County, Mississippi (Census 1850).

II. <u>WILLIAM NEIL McCALEB</u>, son of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born December 31, 1796 in South Carolina. The Captain McCaleb Bible gives the fact of his death, but it does not give a date. He died after his uncle, William Neil McCaleb, and before 1813, when Captain William McCaleb died. There is no tombstone for him in the Cold Springs or Hermitage cemeteries so he no doubt died in South Carolina before his parents moved to Mississippi.

III. LAURA PRINCE McCALEB, daughter of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born January 26, 1798 in South Carolina. She married (1) WILLIAM MARSTON GREEN (Book A, p. 152, Claiborne County Marriage Records) August 11, 1818. (Gen. Joseph E. Davis, brother to Jefferson Davis, was bondsman on marriage bond). He was the grandson of Col. Thomas Green and Martha (Wills) Green, who migrated from James City, Virginia to Jefferson County, Mississippi in 1785. (Col. Thomas Green served in the Revolutionary War as an officer



under George Rogers Clark). He was the son of Thomas Marston and Martha (Kirkland) Green. It was in the beautiful Green home, Springfield, that General Andrew Jackson married Rachel Robarb. William Marston and Laura Prince (McCaleb) Green had no children. He died July 27, 1829, aged 33 years and 6 months. A tombstone marks his burial place in the Cold Springs Planatation Cemetery. The widow married (2) EPHRAIM SIMONDS, a native of Massachusetts and a professor at Transylvania University at Lexington. Kentucky. He died November 3, 1837, age 38 years, and was buried in the Cold Springs cemetery. Laura Prince Simonds died September 12, 1838 and is buried at Cold Springs. There was no issue by her second marriage. Both she and her second husband left wills. (Claiborne County Chancery Records). David McCaleb willed the portraits of his daughter, Laura

Prince McCaleb and her second husband, Ephraim Simonds, to his son Edwin Howard McCaleb.

IV. EMILY HILLMAN McCALEB, daughter of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born in South Carolina October 11, 1799. She married FILMER WILLS GREEN, grandson of Col. Thomas Green and Martha (Wills) Green and brother to William Marston Green, at Cold Springs Plantation October 14, 1822. To this marriage was born a son and a daughter. She died November 27, 1829 and was buried at Cold Springs.

A. LAURA GREEN, daughter of Filmer Wills and Emily H. McCaleb Green, married ROBERT COX, and they resided at Richland Plantation near Church-Hill, Jefferson County, Mississippi. Among other things, her grandfather willed her his gold watch and a portrait of her deceased uncle, William Marston Green. One son was born to this marriage.

1. WILLIAM COX was the son of Robert and Laura (Green) Cox.

B. WILLIAM HINDS GREEN, son of Filmer Wills and Emily (McCaleb) Green, died August 29, 1337, age 12 years and 6 months. He was buried at Cold Springs.

V. <u>EVELINA MATILDA McCALEB</u>, daughter of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born February 15, 1802 in South Carolina. She married (1) ALBERT GALLATIN METCALF of Kentucky March 20, 1827 at Christ Church, Jefferson County, Mississippi. He was born December 26, 1798. They resided at his Lansanoor Plantation home, Washington County, Mississippi. He died January 28, 1833 and was buried at Cold Springs. The widow married (2) Doctor HAMMETT, who 'for some years was United States Congressman from Mississippi.



From this second marriage there was no issue. She died at her plantation home on Lake Washington, Washington County, Mississippi.

A. <u>FREDERICK AUGUSTUS METCALF</u>, son of Albert Gallatin and Evelina (McCaleb) Metcalf, was born 1830 and died 1883. He married MARTHA P. MILLER in 1854.



He married FLORIDA DAVIS, daughter of Joseph Davis and niece of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States of America. They resided on General Davis' Diamond Plantation, south of Vicksburg on the Mississippi River. She acted as hostess for her father; therefore, the McCalebs spent much of their time at General Joseph Davis' Hurricane Plantation.14 After General Davis' death they lived permanently at the Diamond Plantation, which General Davis willed to his daughter for her life time use. David McCaleb also owned a plantation in Warren County, Mississippi on the Mississippi River, about a nile from Diamond Landing and down river



about eight miles from Vicksburg. Old maps of the River show "McCaleb Landing". David William McCaleb served in the Confederate Army in Company K, 12th Mississippi Regimental Band of the Claiborne Guards. He died Sept. 28, 1882 and was buried in the Diamond Plantation Cemetery. His tombstone was moved to Cold Springs Cemetery when the Diamond Plantation Cemetery began caving into the Mississippi River.¹⁵ Florida (Davis) McCaleb married (2) REVEREND LAUGHLIN, an Episcopal minister. There was no issue from either of her marriages.



(He and Mr. Lowry were co-authors of a <u>Mississippi History</u> which was taught for some years in the public schools of Mississippi). From 1839-1842 William H. McCardle owned "The Whig", a newspaper published in Vicksburg. Emily Carolina (Eyrnes) and William H. McCardle were the parents of three children. She died March 6, 1852 and was buried at Cold Springs. He married (2) MARY E. BROWN, a daughter of Thomas White and Ann (Regan) Brown May 25, 1864 in Claiborne Jounty. There was a daughter born to this second marriage.

1. WILLIAM H. McCARDLE, JR., son of William H. and Emily Carolina (Byrnes) McCardle, was born April 14, 1843 in Claiborne County.

2. CHARLES RALSTON BYRNES McCARDLE, son of William H. and Emily Carolina (Byrnes) McCardle, was born September 3, 1845. He served as a private in the 12th Mississippi Infantry C. S. A. He married CORNELIA GARLAND, daughter of Robert and Ellen (Regan) Garland. He died November 15, 1887 and is buried at Cold Springs.

3. FREDERICK FAPRAR McCARDLE, son of William H. and Emily Carolina (Byrnes McCardle, was born April 23, 1850. He *This date may be in error

4. IREME McCARDLE, daughter of William H. and Mary E. (Brown) McCardle married DR. A. G. TILLMAN of Vicksburg, Mississippi. Their descendants reside in Vicksburg, Miss.

B. <u>CHARLES RALSTON BYRNES¹⁶</u>, son of Martha Ariementa (McCaleb) and Robert Ralston Byrnes, was born October 31, 1827 at Belvedere Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He married CATHERINE PRISCILLA SMITH of Natchez September 18, 1850. They settled at Belvidere, Claiborne County, Mississippi, where he operated the large plantation. To this union fourteen children were born. Seven lived to be grown. He served as a private in the 4th Mississippi Cavalry, C. S. A. He died February 17, 1898 and was buried at Cold Springs. She probably is buried there, also, but there is no marker for her grave.

1. <u>CHARLES RALSTON BYRNES, JR.</u>, was the son of Charles Ralston and Catherine P. (Smith) Byrnes. He married HELEN METCALF of Natchez, Mississippi, who was the daughter of Doctor Orrick and Helen (Gillespie) Metcalf, February 1881. For some years they resided at Shanrock Plantation in Claiborne County where their first three children were born. They moved to Adams County, near Natchez. He died in 1919.

IX. <u>THEODORE HOWARD McCALEB</u>, son of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born February 10, 1810 in South Carolina.(Census 1850 states: Born S. C.). He graduated from Exeter Academy and completed his liberal education at Yale College. He settled in New Orleans, studied law, and succeeded to Judge of the United States District of Appeals from 1846 to 1861. Judge McCaleb was the first dean and professor of Admiralty and International law of the University of Louisiana. He became the second president of the University of Louisiana (now Tulane University), and he resigned to join the Confederate Army. Theodore Howard McCaleb, L. L. D. was distinguished as a linguist and orator. His oration at the dedication of the Lyceum Hall, his welcome speech to the Choctaw Chief, Billy Bowbys, in his native Choctaw tongue, his eulogy of Sargent Smith Prentiss, his speech at the unveiling of the statue of his friend, Henry Clay, are still remembered. His decision in the case of Myra Clark Gaines vs the City of New Orleans, was referred to by Judge Bradley, of the United States



Supreme Court, in the most complimentary terms.

Theodore Howard McCaleb married AGNES FRANCES BULLITT, daughter of William and Octavia (Punnell) Bullitt of Kentucky and Louisiana, December 16, 1833. She was born September 8, 1814 in New Orleans. The McCalebs entertained lavishly, and some of their foreign guests were: Thackeray, the novelist; Macready, the actor; Chateaubriand, De Toqueville. When Louisiana seceded from the Union, Theodore Howard McCaleb resigned his judgeship, and he and his wife retired to his home, the Hermitage, which he had inherited from his Uncle Jonathan McCaleb. Mrs. Agnes (Bullitt) McCaleb is said to have lamented leaving New Orleans and thought it unfair to be so far from her friends and the gay social life of New Orleans while her friend, Mrs. Slidell, was having such a wonderful time in Europe. Theodore Howard McCaleb²⁴ died at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County April 20, 1864. Agnes Frances (Bullitt) McCaleb died at the Hermitage October 11, 1874.

A. <u>OLIVIA MATILDA AGNES McCALEB</u>, daughter of Theodore Howard and Agnes Frances (Bullitt) McCaleb, was born in New Orleans, Louisiana, November 17, 1334. She married WILLIAM THOMPSON MORRIS. He was born in Lawrence County, Alabama January 2, 1831. They resided in Port Gibson, Mississippi. He died May 27, 1906. She died in Dallas, Texas at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mollie Kyle, January 14, 1913. Both are buried in the Wintergreen Cemetery, Port Gibson, Mississippi.




b). MIRIAM JOY STELLY, daughter of Gordon A. and Dorothea Olive (Martin) Stelly, was born October 3, 1944.

D. <u>AGNES FRANCES McCALEB</u>, daughter of Theodore Howard and Agnes Frances (Bullitt) McCaleb, was born January 7, 1847. She was drowned when the "Steamer White", a Mississippi River boat on which she was a passenger exploded and sank in 1886. She never married. (A picture of the Steamer White hangs in the Court House Museum in Vicksburg, Mississippi).

E. <u>CORINNA JANE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Theodore Howard and Agnes Frances (Bullitt) McCaleb, was born November 17, 1835. She died at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi, July 13, 1875.

F. JONATHAN HOWARD McCALEB, son of Theodore Howard and Agnes Frances (Bullitt) McCaleb, was born September 2, 1885 at the Hermitage Plantation and spent his youth in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He attended Port Gibson, Mississippi and New Orleans schools and graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, University of Maryland in 1881. He practiced medicine at Pointe Coupee Parish, Louisiana for 26 years. There he married EMMA MAUDE COLLINS at at China Grove Plantation November 16, 1385. She was born December 16, 1868. They resided at China Grove Plantation, the old Collins family home. To this home Dr. Jonathan McCaleb brought a great part of the Hermitage library which he had inherited from his father. Among these books was the Captain William McCaleb Bible and the more recent Theodore Howard McCaleb Bible. When China Grove burned, the more recent Bible was saved, but only the pages concerning the births, marriages, and deaths were saved from the Captain William McCaleb Bible. 27 In 1907 Dr. Jonathan McCaleb and his family moved to Monroe, Louisiana, where he practiced his profession for ten years before retirement. Maude (Collins) McCaleb died June 5, 1928, aged 60 years, in Monroe, Louisiana. Jonathan McCaleb spent the last years of his life in the home of Colonel Alfred Francis McCaleb, in New Orleans, Louisiana. There he died January 7, 1940, age 34 years. both are buried in Monroe, Louisiana.

1. JONATHAN HOWARD McCALEB, JR., son of Dr. Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, was born September 27, 1886. He married FRANCES FAY WASHBURN of Monroe, Louisiana September 22, 1910. He was engineer for the Texas Company, and he and his wife lived in Shreveport, Louisiana. He traveled in Louisiana for his company. He died of typhoid fever October 27, 1914, age 28 years.

a. JONATHAN HOWARD McCALEB III, son of Jonathan Howard and Frances Fay (Washburn) McCaleb, was born July 4, 1911. He



married and had children. The family resides at Ringold, Louisiana.

1). FRANCES ANN McCALEB is the daughter of Jonathan Howard McCaleb, Jr. and his wife.

2). JONATHAN HOWARD McCALEB III is the son of Jonathan Howard McCaleb, Jr. and his wife.

3). <u>RESSE FARRELL McCALEB</u> is the daughter of Jonathan Howard McCaleb, Jr. and his wife.

b. <u>ERNESTINE AUXTER McCALEB</u>, daughter of Jonathan Howard and Frances Fay (Washburn) McCaleb, was born November 28, 1913. She married (1) DONALD WATTS, and to this union two children were born. She married (2) WILLIAM C. KEES. The family resides at Covington, Louisiana.

1). DONALD WATTS, JR. is the son of Donald and Ernestine Auxter (McCaleb) Watts.

2). <u>ROBERT GLENN WATTS</u> is the son of Donald and Ernestine Auxter (McCaleb) Watts.

2. FOSTER COLLINS McCALEB, son of Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, was born December 16, 1887. He married OTTIE PALMER POWELL of Pelican, Louisiana April 22, 1915. He has worked for the Pelican Well Tool Supply Company for some years. The family reside at New Iberia, Louisiana.

a. FOSTER COLLINS McCALEB, JR., son of Foster Collins and Ottie (Powell) McCaleb, was born May 16, 1922. He served in the armed forces in World War II. He studied medicine at Tulane University and became a medical doctor.

3. JOSEPH WADE McCALEB, son of Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, died of diphtheria October 24, 1893 age 2 years, at China Grove Plantation,

4. A child of Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb died at birth.

5. FREDERICK FARRAR McCALEB, son of Dr. Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, was born December 9, 1893. He became an artist of some repute. He was employed by Fitzgerard Advertising Agency of New Orlcans, Louisiana. His real talent was painting dogs and wild life. He painted numbers of covers for "Field and Stream", and this magazine spoke of him as "Our Fred McCaleb". His paintings



of dogs and fighting cocks are considered among the finest. He illustrated a number of books. Fred McCaleb never married. He died of a heart attack. His untimely death brought grief, not only to his close relatives, but to all the many people who loved this gentle, kind, intelligent, and gifted man.

6. ISABEL CHALFANT McCALEB, daughter of Dr. Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, was born February 11, 1896. She married ARTHUR J. PORCHE May 6, 1922. She resides in New Orleans, Louisiana.


7. <u>ALFRED FRANCIS McCALEB</u>, son of Dr. Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, was born December 4, 1898. He is known to his family as "Boo". December 11, 1919 he married ANNE ELIZA BLANKS of Monroe, Louisiana. Her family were prominent in Monroe and Columbia, Louisiana, especially in the old steam boat days. She was born February 17, 1898 at Nichols Plantation, Caldwell, Louisiana. Alfred Francis McCaleb is employed by the Federal Land Bank of New Orleans. He served in England and was promoted to Colonel. (While he was in England he was several times a guest in the home of Sir Winston Churchill's brother). After World War II, he and his wife lived at Fort Jackson, New Orleans, Louisiana, where he was commanding officer of the National Guard at Fort Jackson. He has continued to work for the Federal Reserve Bank. Several years ago he purchased a home at Bay St. Louis, and he and his wife reside there. Francis Alfred McCaleb, like nost of the descendants of Theodore Howard McCaleb, is a member of the Episcopal Church.

a. <u>ALFRED FRANCIS McCALEB</u>, JR., son of Alfred Francis and Anne Eliza (Blanks) McCaleb, was born December 12, 1922 in New Orleans. He was a lieutenant in the Marines in World War II. He was in the Pacific area during the war and piloted a fighter plane. He married ANNETTE BABER of Green Cove Springs, Florida November 28, 1943. He served as Captain of Marines in the Korean War and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with oak leaf cluster in lieu of another Air Medal. He has made a career of the Air Force.

1). ALFRED FRANCIS McCALEB III, son of Alfred Francis, Jr. and Annette (Baber) McCaleb, was born August 12, 1944.

2). <u>NANCY LORRAINE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Alfred Francis, Jr. and Annette (Baber) McCaleb, was born July 21, 1926.

3). <u>KENNETH BABER McCALEB</u>, son of Alfred Francis, Jr. and Annette (Baber) McCaleb, was born March 22, 1948.



b. EMILY LEAH McCALEB, daughter of Alfred Francis and Anne Eliza (Blanks) McCaleb, was born April 28, 1927 at Monroe, Louisiana. She married KARL MORRIS SAMUELS, JR., son of Karl Morris, March 3, 1948 at St. Anne's Episcopal Church in New Orleans, by Rev. Arthur Price.

1). <u>KARL MORRIS SAMUELS, JR</u>, son of Karl Morris and Emily Leah (McCaleb) Samuels, was born in New Orleans, Louisiana.

2). <u>DEBORAH ANN SAMUELS</u>, daughter of Karl Morris and Emily Leah (McCaleb) Samuels, was born August 15, 1949, in New Orleans.

8. <u>COLLIER MINGE McCALEB</u>, son of Jonathan Howard and Emma Maude (Collins) McCaleb, died of pneumonia in his 21st year, February 24, 1925. He is said to have resembled his brother, Jonathan Howard McCaleb. He never married.

X. LUCINDA JANE McCALEB, daughter of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born January 13, 1812. She married JOHN ISAAC GUION, who was born November 18, 1802. He was a circuit judge, state Senator, and in 1850 he was a resident of Hinds County. He was acting governor of Mississippi when Gov. Quitman resigned 1850. and distinguished law partner of the famous Sargent S. Prentiss. In 1827 he moved from Adams County, Mississippi to Warren County, where he became law partner of William L. Sharkey. he died June 26, 1855 in the 52nd year of his life. He was the son of Major Isaac Guion, who served in the Revolutionary Army as Captain of Artillery and Surgeon of the 1st Regiment from New York from 1775-1783. Both John Isaac and Lucinda Jane Guion are buried at Cold Springs Cemetery, but there is no marker for her grave.

A. LAURA GUION was the daughter of John I. and Lucinda J. (McCaleb) Guion.

B. ELEANOR GUION was the daughter of John I. and Lucinda J. (McCaleb) Guion.

C. <u>CAROLINE WIRDER GUION</u>, daughter of John I. and Lucinda Jane (McCaleb) Guion, was born June 4th and died June 7, 1841. She is buried at Cold Springs.

XI. ELEANOR JEFFERSON McCALEB, daughter of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, was born April 8, 1814 and died September 16, 1816. She was buried at Cold Springs Plantation Cemetery.

XII. CHARLES DEMETRIUS McCALEB, son of David and Matilda



(Farrar) McCaleb, was born December 21, 1815 and died September 30, 1819. He is buried at Cold Springs Plantation Cemetery.

EDWIN HARROD McCALEB, son of David and Matilda XIII. (Farrar) McCaleb, was born November 4, 1817. He grew up at Cold Springs Plantation, which he later inherited from his father. He married FRANCES LUCILLE PULLIAMS in Vicksburg, Mississippi December 17, 1839.27 She was a native of Louisiana. She was an orphan niece and ward of Reverend Lane, the founder of the city of Vicksburg. (See Claiborne's Mississippi as a Province, Territory, and State, Vol. I, Appendix 4. Also note that a Vick is buried at Cold Springs.) At the outbreak of the War between the States, Edwin Harrod McCaleb and his two oldest sons entered with patriotic zeal into the Confederate military service from the State of Mississippi. T ey joined the Claiborne Guards and served in Virginia with the famous Twelfth Mississippi Volunteers, which won laurels in the brigades of Rhodes, Featherstone, Possy, and Harris. Edwin Harrod McCaleb and his wife are buried at Cold Springs. She died September 1, 1881, age 65 years, and he died December 4, 1884, age 67 years. Her will is on record in the Chancery Office, Claiborne County, Mississippi.

A. DAVID L. McCALEB, son of Edwin Harrod and Lucille (Pulliams) McCaleb, was born 1841 (Census of 1850) in Mississippi. He grew up at Cold Springs. He attended Oakland College, a Presbyterian College in Claiborne County, Mississippi. At the outbreak of the War between the States, he and his brother and father enlisted in the Claiborne Guard under Captain Hughes of Claiborne County, Mississippi. Before the end of the conflict, he became a major in the Confederate service. At the close of the war he married MARY "MOLLIE" HUNT, a childhood sweetheart. She was the daughter of Harper P. and Margaret (Tompkins) Hunt. (The Hunt family moved to Vicksburg, Mississippi when Mary Hunt was a small child. She was born at the homestead of her grandfather in Mead County, Kentucky.) Mary (Hunt) McCaleb was a poetess of some note. (See: Poets and Poetry of Texas). David McCaleb was considered a brilliant journalist, an editor of note. In 1873 the McCaleb family moved to Dallas, Texas, where David McCaleb became editor and one of the proprietors of the "Herald". David McCaleb soon moved his family to Galveston, where he was employed in the editorial department of the "Galveston News". He contracted tuberculosis and died September 9, 1882 at Cold Springs Plantation, County. Mary (Hunt) McCaleb continued to write. Hon. T. L. Odom, one of the wealthy cattle kings of Texas, was greatly attracted by one of her poems. Then followed a



correspondence. After a time Mary (Hunt) McCaleb married T. L. ODOM. Mr. Odc.n purchased her old home in Galveston and erected a handsome residence there.

1. <u>HARPER HUNT McCALEB</u>, son of David and Mary (Hunt) McCaleb, was born 1866. He married. He was managing editor of the "Fort Worth Record".

2. <u>CLAUDE HOWARD McCALEB</u>, son of David and Mary (Hunt) McCaleb, was born June 12, 1881 in Galveston, Texas. He married MARGARET JOHNSTON October 1, 1901. He was employed in the legal department of the Gulf Oil Company. He was said, by those who knew him, to be a man of unusual ability and of a striking appearance, being red-headed. He is deceased. His widow resides in Houston, Texas.

a. <u>DAVID COURTLAND McCALEB II</u>, son of Claude Howard and Margaret (Johnston) McCaleb, was born September 18, 1903. Like his father, he had red curly hair. He married at a young age (1) DOROTHY CAPPS of Fort Worth, Texas. To this union was born one son. They were divorced, and he married (2) LYLE PATTON of Fort Worth, Texas. To this union one child was born. David C. McCaleb died July 2, 1947, age 44. Lyle (Patton) McCaleb resides in Fort Worth and is employed by the Chamber of Commerce there.

2). <u>RUSSELL HAEBER McCALEB</u>, son of David Courtland and Lyle (Patton) McCaleb, was born January 6, 1930. He attended the Texas Technological College. He is married and has twins and perhaps other later children (1964).

b. <u>CLAUDE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Claude Howard and Margaret (Johnston) McCaleb, married AARON UPHAUS October 16, 1934. They have no issue.

3. <u>DAVID COURTLAND McCALEB</u>, son of David L. and Mary (Hunt) McCaleb, was born in 1875 or 1876 in Galveston, Texas. He was known to his family as "Dee". He had the family red curly hair. He served in the Spanish American War in a Texas regiment but did not go overseas. He married CLARA FENTRESS GUION of Ballinger, Texas in 1905. She was the daughter of Judge Guion, a famous Texas rancher and lawyer, and a sister to David Guion, the composer of the famous song,"Home on the Range". David Courtland McCaleb was a major in the 90th Division in World War I. He was a member of the Staff which wrote the history of his division, but his name did not appear on the publication as he was shipped home before it was completed. David McCaleb was a newspaper man of the old school and was with such papers as the "Fort Worth Star", the "Telegram", the "Austin American",




the "Galveston News", and several other papers. He had a syndicated column which originated from the capitol in Austin Texas, and several papers used it. He died from the effects of being gassed during World War I. His death occurred in Wichita Falls, Texas January 3, 1921, and he was buried in Austin with full military honors. Clara Fentress (Guion) McCaleb was killed in an automobile wreck June 24, 1928.

a. <u>GUION McCALEB</u>, son of David Courtland and Clara F. (Guion) McCaleb, was born March 7, 1907 in Fort Worth, Texas. He spent most of his early life in Austin. In 1926 he moved to Dallas, Texas, and there he married KATHERINE CHASE of that city. He served three years in the army during World War II. While overseas, he followed nearly the same route as his father did in World War I. He is now a salesman. He and his wife have no children.

b. <u>DAVID COURTLAND McCALEB</u>, JR., son of David Courtland and ClaraFentress (Guion) McCaleb, was born August 3, 1910 in San Angelo, Texas. He spent most of his early life in Austin, Texas. He married THELMA WELBORN of Shreveport, Louisiana. He is now employed by the Southwest Electric Company in Shreveport, Louisiana.

B. EDWIN HOWARD McCALEB, son of Edwin Harrod and Lucille (Pulliams) McCaleb, was born April 28, 1843 at Cold Springs, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He graduated from Oakland College in 1861. In 1861 he joined the Confederate forces. He enlisted in the Claiborne Guards of Claiborne County, Mississippi in Company K, 12th Regiment. He served with great distinction throughout the war in General Lee's Army of Virginia, and he was promoted to the rank of Captain. He was wounded three times and finally captured. He was paroled and was with President Jefferson Davis until the President of the Confederacy was captured. He surrendered in Jackson, Mississippi.²⁸ After the war Edwin Howard followed in the footsteps of his two paternal uncles and became a lawyer and a judge in New Orleans, where he lived after the war. He married MARIA IDEALIE COLLENS February 24, 1866. She was born December 7, 1840 in New Orleans. She was the daughter of Judge Thomas Wharton Collens, Louisiana jurist, political economist, and author. Her mother was Amchaide (de Milbroth) Collens, granddaughter of Count de Milbroth of Brestigne of France, Judge E. Howard and his wife were active in the social life of New Orleans. His portrait hangs alongside that of Judge T. W. Collens, in the New Orleans Court House. He died April 22, 1909, age 67, in New Orleans, Louisiana, She died September 4, 1919. Both are buried in New Orleans in the Metarie Cemetery.



1. JAMES FOULHOUZA McCALEB, son of Edwin Howard and Marie Idealie (Collens) McCaleb, was born November 26, 1866, in New Orleans. He received his A. B. and A. M. degrees from Spring Hill College, near Mobile, Alabama. He was graduated, later, in chemistry at the University of Virginia, and in 1891 he received his M. D. degree from the Tuland University of Louisiana. For a time he resided at Plaquemine Parish, Louisiana, where he grew oranges. He married UNDINE FLORENCE BYRNES, daughter of Charles R. and Catherine P. (Smith) Byrnes, a descendant of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, at Natchez, Mississippi December 18, 1900. She was born July 18, 1867 in laiborne County, Mississippi. The couple made their home at Byrnmore Plantation, near Carlisle, Mississippi. Here he farmed and practice his profession of Medicine until his death. He was a talented journalist? and for many years a valued contributor to the Port Gibson Reveille. Dr. McCaleb died of cancer July 25, 1943 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. Undine F. (Byrnes) McCaleb died October 10, 1950 in Warren County, Mississippi. Both are buried in the Wintergreen Cemetery, Port Gibson, Mississippi. Unlike his family, who were members of the Episcopal Church, Dr. McCaleb was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church. Undine F. (Byrnes) McCaleb and her children were members of Epiphany Episcopal Church at Hermanville, Mississippi.

a. WILLIAM HOWARD McCALEB, son of James Foulhouza and Undine (Byrnes) McCaleb, was born November 23, 1903 in lives on the Byrnmore Plantation which he inherited from his father, and he is considered a progressive and successful farmer. He married PEARL TAYLOR, a native of Lennon County, Texas July 20, 1937. She was born April 3 1902. She is a first grade teacher in the Port Gibson Elementary School. Both are members of Epiphany Church, Hermanville, Mississippi.

1). <u>KATHERINE ANN McCALEB</u>, daughter of William H. and Pearl (Taylor) McCaleb, was born January 28, 1942 in Warren County, Mississippi. She graduated from the Port Gibson High school and attended Copiah-Lincoln Junior College for two years. She attended Mississippi State College for Women and graduated from Mississippi State University. She married JOE TURNER BILBRA, son of Oscar Henry and Ruth L. (Holmes) Bilbra, of Leesburg, Mississippi February 2, 1963 at Epiphany Church in Claiborne County.

b. JAMES McCALEB, son of James Foulhouza and Undine (Byrnes) McCaleb, was born September 19, 1905. He was never very well, and he died in New Orleans at the age of 14 years, December 21, 1919.



c. <u>KATHERINE BYRNES McCALEB</u>, daughter of James Foulhouza and Undine (Byrnes) McCaleb, was born January 8, 1908. She lives in Memphis, Tennessee. She is unmarried

2. EDWIN HOWARD McCALEB, JR., son of Edwin Howard and Marie Idealie (Collins) McCaleb, was born December 23, 1868 in New Orleans, Louisiana. He was a lawyer by profession and was highly respected for his ability. He married ELODIE BARRIERE³⁰ October 27, 1891. She was the only daughter of Charles Barriere and a niece of Countess de Viel Castel of Paris, whose deceased husband was at one time French Minister to Mexico, and of Baroness Daelman, wife of the Belgium Minister to Norway.

a. <u>EDWIN HOWARD McCALEB III</u>, son of Edwin Howard and Elodie (Barriere) McCaleb, was born December 25, 1897, in New Orleans. He received his law degree from Washington and Lee in 1919 and is now a Federal Judge of the Court of Appeals in New Orleans. He married LOUISE MARION WRIGHT July 9, 1920. The family lives in New Orleans, Louisiana.

1). MARION WRIGHT McCALEB, daughter of Edwin Howard and Louise Marion (Wright) McCaleb, was born October 1, 1921. She married JOHN FREDERICK MARSHALL March 21, 1942. The family resides in Dallas, Texas.

a). JOHN FREDERICK MARSHALL, son of John F. and Marion W. (McCaleb) Marshall, was born February 7, 1943.

b). HOWARD McCALEB MARSHALL, son of John F. and Marion W. McCaleb) Marshall, was born April 3, 1946.



4. IGNATIUS DAVID McCALEB, son of Edwin Howard and Marie Idealie (Collens) McCaleb, died in infancy. He was a twin to Louis Jonathan McCaleb.

5. LOUIS JONATHAN McCALEB, son of Edwin Howard and Marie Idealie (Collens) McCaleb, married CLARA KOHN MEYER, daughter of Eveleen (Kohn) and Adolph Meyers, January 31, 1900. He is deceased. His wife lives in New York City with her son,

a. KARL KOHN McCALEB, son of Louis Jonathan and Clara K. (Meyer) McCaleb, was born February 24, 1901.

b. <u>KENNETH McCALEB</u>, son of Louis Jonathan and Clara K. (Meyer) McCaleb, is an editor on the "New Jersey Post".


6. DARIUS HUBERT McCALEB, son of Edwin Howard and Marie Idealie (Collens) McCaleb, was born October 8, 1874.

Among his published works are <u>The Aaron Burr</u> <u>Conspiracy</u>, <u>The Conquest of the West</u>, and <u>Theodore Roosevelt</u>, <u>A Biography</u>. The family lived for some years in Virginia. They lived in more recent years in Austin, Texas. Walter F. McCaleb's family settled in Texas from Tennessee about 1859. He is thought to be descended from a Revolutionary soldier who was a brother to Captain William McCaleb. Marie Idealie



died about 1957. Dr. McCaleb has since remarried and now lives in Austin, Texas.

a. <u>ETHEL MARGUERITE McCALEB</u>, daughter of Walter Flavius and Marie (McCaleb) McCaleb, was born February 9, 1903 at New Orleans, Louisiana. Ethel McCaleb married (1) PAUL RAIGORODSKY at Los Angelos September 10, 1924. Two children were born to this marriage. She married (2) ALLEN RAY BAKER September 1946. He is deceased, and she resides at Kerrville, Texas.

1). PAULA ELENA RAIGORODSKY, daughter of Paul and Ethel (McCaleb) Raigorodsky, was born November 4, 1926 at Hollywood. She married HOWARD LEE NORRIS.

2). MARIE LEDA NATALIA RAIGORODSKY, daughter of Paul and Ethel (McCaleb) Raigorodsky, was born July 28, 1929 at Tulsa, Oklahoma.

b. <u>AURORA MAUD McCALEB</u> was born May 26, 1907 at San Antonio, Texas. She married (1) JOSEPH STANLEY, and they had one child. She married (2) RICHARD PETKIN 1947, and they had one child.

1). LAURA MARIE STANLEY, daughter of Joseph S. and Aurora (McCaleb) Stanley, was born December 27, 1930 in New York.

2). ALICE PITKIN, daughter of Richard and Aurora (McCaleb) Pitkin, was born December 31, 1947.

c. WALTER FLAVIUS McCALEB, JR., son of Walter Flavius and Marie Idealie (McCaleb) McCaleb, was born March 4, 1912 at San Antonio. He married DOROTHY SCHAEFFLER. They live in Craddockville, Virginia.



He was born December 25, 1815 and died March 27, 1880. She died March 27, 1880. Both are buried in the Cold Springs Plantation Cemetery.

1. FRANCES LUCILLE GUILOTTE, daughter of Henry and Laura Maude (McCaleb) Guilotte, married EDWARD RIVET. They live in New Orleans, Louisiana and they have a large family of children.

2. CECILE LAURA MARIE GUILLOTTE, daughter of Hemry and Laura Maude (McCaleb) Guillotte, was born April 18, 1878. She married HENRY LOUIS FERRY December 1, 1900. He was born April 16, 1874.32

a. <u>HENRY JOSEPH FFRRY</u>, son of Henry Louis and Cecile Laura Marie (Guillotte) Ferry was born January 6, 1902. He marrried MARGUERITE CHARBONNET. They have an adopted daughter.

b. <u>CHARLES JOSEPH FERRY</u>, son of Henry Louis and Cecile Laura Marie (Guillotte) Ferry, was born June 11, 1903. He married ELIZABETH POURSINE, and they have nine children.

c. LOUIS JOSEPH FERRY, son of Henry Louis and Cecile Laura Marie (Guilotte) Ferry, was born August 1, 1905. He married CLAIRE LE BOEUF. They have four children.



FOOTNOTES

1. Dates of birth, marriage, and death of David McCaleb are recorded in the Captain William Caleb Bible. Matilda Farrar McCaleb's death is recorded in the same Bible. Their births and dates are given on their tombstones, which are in the Plantation Cemetery (Cold Springs).


2. "Port Gibson Herald", October 24, 1844. "Died-wife of David McCaleb and daughter of Col. Farrar. Died Oct. 14, 1844. Born 1788. Married 1794. Died at the residence of David McCaleb".

3. "Thomas Farrar was from South Carolina and Margaret Prince Farrar was of a distinguished Virginia family. Thomas Farrar was a lieutenant-colonel in the South Carolina line in the Revolutionary War. He fought principally under General Pickens at Charleston, Guilford Court House, and was wounded at the Battle of Savannah. At the close of the war, he was in command of Forty-Six. (See David Ramsey's <u>History</u> of South Carolina, Vol. II, p. 396 and Note IV, p. 40). His paternal grandfather, also named Thomas, immigrated to South Carolina from Yorkshire, England in 1727. He was descended from Doctor Farrar, Bishop of St. David's in Wales, who was burned at the stake for "heresy" in the time of "Bloody Queen Mary". (See Fox's <u>Book of Martyrs</u> p. 745.). Lieutenant-Colonel Farrar's grandmother, Mrs. Thomas Farrar, was Judith Jefferson, sister of the father of Thomas Jefferson, president of the United States". The above quotation was taken from "The Louisiana Sunday Review", December 23, 1894.

4. The Cold Springs Plantation stood on the site where Mr. Henry Galloway's home now stands (1964). This location is on 13 Highway about two miles north of Carlisle. The original smoke house still stands just back of the Galloway home. Just back of the smoke house, and within sight of the highway, is the old Cold Springs Oemetery where David and Matilda McCaleb, most of their children, and Matilda McCaleb most of their children, and Matilda McCaleb parents, the Farrars are buried.

5. Harmon Blennerhassett resided for some years in Claiborne County at LaCache Plantation south east of Port Gibson. He was involved with Aaron Burr in Burr's conspiracy. Burr visited LaCache several times before his arrest on the Mississippi River below Grand Gulf, Mississippi.

6. John Booth's daughter, Indiana, married David McCaleb's nephew, John McCaleb. The Barnes were related to the Booths.



7. The Shelby family intermarried with the family of James McCaleb, a Revolutionary soldier from Cabarrus County, North Carolina, and possible a brother to Capt. William McCaleb.

8. This organ is still being used at Epiphany Church. It is considered a museum piece.

9. Thomas and Mary Ann (Curtis) McCaleb did not marry in New Orleans, Louisiana. They probably married in some town in Louisiana. She appears to have been a widow with children when she married.

10. Charles Eugenius McCaleb inherited the two vases from his father, who told him they were brought to America in 1746 by William and Sarah (MacAlpin) McCaleb. The vases are now owned by Charles Albertus McCaleb of Galveston, Texas.

11. Joseph Aken died 1913. He and his wife are buried in the Biloxi cemetery within sight of the beach. He was the owner of much property in Biloxi and owned Deer Island in the Gulf of Mexico.

12. Albertus King Aken of France first met Lady Mundy in Newark, New Jersey. They married there and then moved to New Orleans. They had a summer home on the Gulf coast and a winter home in New Orleans.


13. These children of Thomas McCaleb, Sr. may be incorrect.

14. The Hurricane and Brierfield Plantations were located on what is now Palmyra Island in the Mississippi River below Vicksburg, Mississippi. Jefferson Davis lived at Brierfield, and General Joseph Davis lived on Hurricane Plantation. Originally these plantations formed a peninsula in the Mississippi River. Joseph Davis' will is on record in Claiborne County Mississippi Chancery Court Records.

15. Dr. James McCaleb had the stone moved to the Cold Springs Cemetery.

16. Information on Charles Ralston Byrnes and his descendants was compiled by Mrs. Nell Regan McCay August 1958. Mrs. McCay resided at this time in Memphis, Tenn.

17. The Drexler family were residents of Grand Gulf, Mississippi. They moved to the Rocky Springs community, Claiborne County, Mississippi, when the Yankees burned their home in Grand Gulf during the War between the States,

18. James G. Horn, Jr., son of James G. and Dorothy (McCaleb) Horn, and a distant kinsman of "Miss Nelle" served as acolyte at her funeral and that of Mrs. Cornelia Clarke, another kinswoman. Rev. Pipes Jones, another distant cousin of both, conducted the funeral services at Epiphany Church, Hermanville, Mississippi. None of the participants knew of the relationship.

19. Information concerning this family was obtained from Mrs. Priscilla Byrnes of Port Gibson, Mississippi.

20. Information concerning Percy Shields Byrnes and his descendants was given Mrs. Priscilla (Byrnes) Regan of Port Gibson, Mississippi. Mrs. Nell McCay gives birth of P. S. Byrnes as March 10, 1858.

21. Information concerning the descendants of Robert Ralston and Martha Ariementa (McCaleb) Byrnes and their descendants was furnished by Mrs. William Lum McCay of Memphis, Tennessee, Mrs. Priscilla Byrnes Regan of Port Gibson, Mississippi, Mrs. Cornelia Regan Clarke of Carlisle, Mississippi, and from the family Bible owned by Mr. William McCaleb of Carlisle, Mississippi. Mrs. McCay kept up with most of the descendants and knew them personally.

23. Belvidere in 1964 is unoccupied and being allowed to rot down.





JOHN MCCALEB married MARIA MCRILL COLLINS

JOHN McCALEB, pioneer and planter, son of Captain William and Ann (McCaleb, was born in South Carolina March 12, 1777-He was educated as an engineer. He was only twenty-two years of age when he came to Mississippi with his parents in 1799. In 1808 he was given by or purchased from his father the land which Captain McCaleb had purchased of William Marshall in 1799, This land was about twelve miles north of Natchez in the section which came to be known as the Pine Ridge Community. The old King's Road connected this community with Natchez. Here lived many aristocratic old families among whom were the Collins, Dunbar, Samuel Marshall, Peter Bisland, Shields, and Samuel Chamberlain families. John McCaleb named this plantation Peachland, and here he engaged in merchandising and planting. Soon he gave up his merchandising business and followed planting, exclusively. In 1806 he obtained a land grant of 650 acres on the Bayou Pierre in Claiborne County, Mississippi. This plantation he named Elmwood. In 1808 he bought a large tract of land in Jefferson County, Mississippi, which he paid for with 6400 pounds of baled cotton. Each of these properties he operated as a unit, (so manty slaves to each hundred acres). He became a leading planter by increasing his lands every few years (Adams, Jefferson, and Claiborne County land deeds). He raised cotton, mules, and owned many slaves. He was thorough going and enterprising and was well on the way to becoming extremely wealthy when he died, a young man.

In 1803 John McCaleb was one of the commissioners appointed to purchase land for a county seat for Claiborne County. "On the 12th of March, 1803, the legislature had passed an Act defining the boundary between Jefferson and Claiborne counties, and establishing the seat of Justice for the latter 'the place commonly called Gibson's Landing, on the South Fork of the Bayou Pierre'. By the same Act, Thomas White, David Burnet, G. W. Humphreys, and John McCaleb were appointed commissioners to purchase two acres of land from Samuel Gibson, and to contract for the erection of a court house, jail, stock, pillory, and whipping post. Two acres, the site of the present court house and jail, were accordingly bought, and James Davenport undertook the erection of the public buildings and completed them that winter." (Biographical and Histo ical Memoirs of Mississippi by Goodspeed Pub. Co., 1891, Vol. II, p. 213).

John McCaleb married MARIA McRILL COLLINS, daughter of William and Jane (Pipes) Collins, at the home of her parents at Pine Ridge, Adams County, Mississippi, July 22, 1805 (Jefferson Co., Miss. Marriage Records). William



Collins,³ her father, owned land adjoining that of John McCaleb in Adams County. At the time of her marriage Maria Collins was under age and had to have the consent of her parents. (Capt. McCaleb gives the date of marriage as July 4, 1805).

John McCaleb built a beautiful home for his wife in his Peachland Plantation. It was not as pretentious as that of some of the later homes in the neighborhood, but it was large, graceful, and comfortable. The home stood in a large, fairly level park. It had wide upper and lower porches across the front of the white clapboard house and had several ells. It was wrecked or razed for the lumber about 1960.

John McCaleb's son, John McCaleb, Jr., often told his children about his father's encounter with Mason, the notorious Natchez Trace highwayman, who tried unsuccessfully to stop and rob his father. John McCaleb, Sr. was riding along the Trace between Rockey Springs and his home when Mason stepped from behind a tree and caught at his bridle reins. John was surprised but raised his loaded riding crop and beat Mason off and escaped. He said that it all happened so suddenly that he had no time to become frightened until it was all over and he realized that the highwayman was really Mason, who more often than not, killed his victims after robbing them.⁴

John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb had seven or eight children. Maria (Collins) McCaleb and her children inherited land and slaves from her mother and father, Jane and William Collins, (See Wills).

John McCaleb died at Peachland July 18, 1823. He was buried in the Peachland cemetery, located back of the Peachland home. His tombstone is inscribed: "Sacred to the memory of John McCaleb who departed this life July 18, 1823 aged 46 years". Maria (Collins) McCaleb and Jonathan McCaleb, brother of Jonathan McCaleb, were made guardians for John McCaleb's minor children (Adams County, Miss. Orphan Court Records).

Maria (Collins) McCaleb, an unusually beautiful woman, married (2) William A. Miskell of Natchez, September 4, 1826 (Adams Co. Book 5, p. 22). There probably was one child born to this marriage.⁵ In 1827 W. H. and Maria Miskell sold Elmwood, the plantation owned by John McCaleb in Claiborne County. Maria Miskell often went to Graham Springs, Kentucky for her health and to visit her daughter, Mary (McCaleb) Rochester, in or near Danville. It was on

one of these trips that she died about 1830. She probably was buried in the Rochester lot in Danville, Kentucky. W. A. Miskell married (2) Miss Jack.

Eliza Jane McCaleb is assumed to be a child of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, because she was buried in their cemetery behind their Peachland home.

Caroline McCaleb's name appears in the Natchez paper June 7, 1827 as follows: "Married-on Tuesday evening last, at the residence of Thomas Ford, Esq. by Rev. M. Carson, Mr. Nannen Balance to Miss Caroline McCaleb, all of this county. M. S. and M. G. June 7, 1827". This <u>Caroline McCaleb</u> is probably the daughter of Daniel McCaleb who settled about 1807 on Cole Creek and married in Jefferson County. (See Jefferson County marriage records and military service of Daniel McCaleb).


DESCENDANTS OF JOHN AND MARIA (COLLINS) MCCALEB

I. ELIZA JANE McCALEB, daughter of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, was born at Peachland Plantation, Adams County, Mississippi, the home of her parents. She was named for her mother's sister, Mrs. Elizabeth (Collins) Chamberlain, and for her grandmother, Jane (McAfee) Collins. She died as a child and was buried in the Peachland family cemetery. This cemetery caved into a bayou. Part of Eliza Jane's tombstone was found and placed in the side yard of Peachland alongside that of her father's tombstone.

II. <u>INDIANA McCALEB</u>, daughter of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, was born about 1807 or 1808 at Peachland. She married WILLIAM A. BOUGHAN January 1, 1824 in Adams County, Mississippi.(Book 3, p. 75°) Deed Book B, p. 466 Adams County Records refers to William A. Boughan as a resident of Natchez and states that his wife, Indiana Boughan, was an heir of John McCaleb and that she settled her claim with the other children of John McCaleb February 2, 1827. He may have owned property or resided in West Feliciana Parish, Louisiana before he resided in Natchez. In 1834 William A. Miskell gave a ift to Indiana B ughan and children (Adams County, Books p. 344). Evidently Indiana (McCaleb) and William H. Boughan died before 1834-1847, as their daughter , Ann Boughan, was an orphan about that time.

A. <u>ANNE ELIZABETH BOUGHAN</u>, daughter of William A. and Indiana (McCaleb) Boughan, was born about 1825 (Adams County Census). Her father left her some real estate and her great uncle, Jonathan McCaleb, willed her money. After the death of her par nts she lived in the home of her great aunt, Elizabeth (Collins) Chamberlain, whose husband Samuel Chamberlain was Anne Boughan's guardian. In 1847 Samuel Chamberlain told the Court that Anne E. Boughan was in school and that he had been supporting her. He felts that she should stay in school, but that her property was bringing in no income. He wanted to sell some of her real estate in order to keep her in school. The Coffee House was mentioned.

Anne Boúghan was married to WILLIAM STANTON in Adams County, Mississippi February 23, 1854, by Rev. B. H. Williams (Marriage Book 7, p. 229 Adams County Marriage Records). There were children born to this marriage.




Anne E. (Boughan) Stanton's portrait hangs beside that of her husband in Stanton Hall, a beautiful Natchez mansion, which at present is owned by a Natchez Pilgrimage Club.

B. INDIANA BOUGHAN, daughter of William A. and Indiana (McCaleb) Boughan was born 1831. She appears on the census of 1850 living in the home of Samuel and Eliazbeth Chamberlain, her guardians. She died before 1853

III. DAVID WILLIAM McCALEB, son of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, was born in 1809 in Adams County, Mississippi (For date of birth see Orphan Court Records, Adams County, Mississippi). He lived his adult life in Jefferson County, Mississippi, and he married ANN MATILDA DUNBAR December 21, 1828, in Adams County. She was the grand daughter of John Bisland and the daughter of James Dunbar. She inherited a large tract of land, which was a part of a Dunbar Spanish grant, from her grandfather's estate May 18, 1830. David W. became a prosperous farmer and a large slave holder. His plantation, known as Locust Grove, was located about five miles north of Fayette, Mississippi. Three children were born to David and Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb. He died November 14, 1842 at Peachland Plantation, the home of his brother, James Franklin McCaleb. Ann Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb married (2) JAMES G. GARRETT September 6, 1845 in Jefferson County. Two daughters were born to this marriage. Cordelia Jane Garrett, born July 12, 1846 and died February 25, 1925, married Ben Y. Wade February 1, 1869. Sallie Wilson Garrett, born August 22, 1862, died June 8, 1932, unmarried. Ann (Dunbar) Garrett died 1861.8

A. JAMES DUNBAR McCALEB, son of David William and Ann Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb, was born June 1, 1830. He married MARY ELIZABETH McCALEB, daughter of James Franklin and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb. December 8, 1852 in Adams County, Mississippi. Mary Elizabeth McCaleb was born in Adams County, Mississippi November 24, 1831. He died November 14, 1892, and she died November 24, 1922. They are buried in the Darden cemetery near Fayette, Mississippi.

1. <u>SOPHIE MOORE McCALEB</u>, daughter of James Dunbar and Mary Elizabeth (McCaleb) McCaleb, was born September 6, 1853 at Pine Ridge, Jefferson County, Mississippi. She married THOMAS L. DARDEN, son of John Pendleton and Margarus (Fleming) Darden, in Jefferson County, Mississippi Movember 27, 1872. They were married by Rev. Joseph B. Stratton, a Presbyterian minister, at Pine Ridge, Adams County Mississippi (Marriage Book 9, p. 373). The couple resided at Laurietta Plantation, which is two miles south of Fayette, Mississippi. They were the parents of ten children. She



died at Laurietta Plantation April 21, 1896 aged 43 years and was buried beside her husband in the Darden cemetery on Laurietta Plantation.

a. <u>WILLIAM McCALEB DARDEN</u>, son of Thomas Landrum and Sophie Moore (McCaleb) Darden, was born September 3, 1875⁹ at Laurietta Plantation, Jefferson County, Mississippi. He attended A. and M. College (now Mississippi State). He was elected State Representative and held this office for several terms. He operated a mercantile store at McNair and Cannonsburg and served as postmaster at both places. He married (1) LOTTIE FIELD, a resident of McNair, November 18, 1896 (Jefferson County, Miss. Marriage Book K, p. 176). There was no issue from this marriage. She died 1917 at McNair. He married (2) BESSIE ANDING, a native of Jefferson County. There was no issue from this second marriage. She died May 1930. William McCaleb Darden died at Cannonsburg, Mississippi October 1929 and was buried in the family plot.

b. <u>MAGGIE MAE DARDEN</u>, daughter of Thomas Landrum and Sophie Moore (McCaleb) Darden, was born December 4, 1875 at Natchez, Mississippi. She died at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, September 4, 1952. She married STEVE F. ABY, son of T. J. and Helen Augusta (Smith) Aby. T. J. Aby was born February 28, 1834 near Natchez. At the time of her marriage, she was a resident of Insmore, Mississippi. McGINTY, daughter of Robert F. and Mary Louisa (Bisland) McGinty of Fayette, Mississippi, September 30, 1896 at Fayette. (Marriage Book K, p. 167 Jefferson County). She was born in Fayette October 29, 1874 and died at Beaumont, Texas October 27, 1954. She was buried beside her husband.

Helen Kate (Darden) Robertson resides in Beaumont. There was no issue from this marriage.

h. JAMES DUNBAR DARDEN, son of Thomas Landrum and Sophie Moore (McCaleb) Darden was born September 21, 1887 at Laurietta. He was a twin to Hattie Pendleton Darden. He died in Beaumont, Texas May 6, 1944. He is buried in the



Magnolia cemetery in Beaumont. He married MINNIE HALL March 4, 1916 in Beaumont. She was born September 13, 1887 and was the daughter of E. E. and Emma Hall. She resides in Beaumont. One child was born to this union.

i. <u>HATTIE PENDLETON DARDEN</u>, daughter of Thomas Landrum and Sophie Moore (McCaleb) Darden, was born September 21, 1887 at Laurietta Plantation. She was a twin to James Dunbar Darden. She married HAROLD B. SANDERS, a newspaper man, June 19, 1912 at Fayette. Mississippi. He was born September 21, 1886. Five children were born to this couple. The family resides at Aberdeen, Mississippi.

j. JULIUS PUT DARDEN, son of Thomas Landrum and Sophie Moore (McCaleb) Darden, was born December 6, 1889 and died in Chicage May 6, 1953. He was buried in Chicago. He married (1) VIRGINIA BOREN February 3, 1917. He married a second time. There was no issue from either marriage.

2. <u>DAVID WILLIAM McCALEB</u>, son of James Dunbar and Mary Elizabeth (McCaleb) McCaleb, was born April 12, 1855 in Jefferson County, Mississippi. 



He married KATHERINE ENGLISH of Plancheville, Louisiana September 1957. She is the daughter of Hiram and Madaline (Mayeaux) English of Anoyellis Parish, Louisiana.

One son was born to this union. She married (2) I. A. KENNEDY June 18, 1927. There was no issue from this marriage.

1). <u>? HEBERT</u>, son of Norma (McCaleb) and Leslie Hebert, was born December 24, 1916 and died November 18, 1920 of asphyxiation.¹⁰



B. ELIZABETH BISLAND McCALEB, daughter of David W. and Ann Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb, was born about 1834. She married ISAAC WASHINGTON BURCH¹², son of Washington Stowers and Adeline W. (Dunbar) Burch, November 19, 1850, in Adams County, Mississippi (Goodspeed Memoirs of Mississippi, p.436, Vol. I). He was born July 4, 1834. Elizabeth B. (McCaleb) Burch died before 1912. Isaac W. Burch died December 11, 1912. He is buried at Fayette, Mississippi. Three children were born to this marriage, but they all died in infancy.



(McCaleb) Burch, died in infancy.

2. NANNIE BURCH, daughter of Isaac C. and Elizabeth Bisland (McCaleb) Burch, died in infancy.

The marriage took place in the Red Brick Church at Red Lick, Mississippi. Both her family and his opposed the marriage since they were first cousins. He died August 2, 1912, and she died June 2, 1919. Both are buried in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

1. WILLIAM DUNBAR "DUNNIE" McCALEB, son of John Moore and Catherine H. (McCaleb, was born April 21, 1866 in Jefferson County, Mississippi. He resided for some years in Port Gibson, Mississippi when he was a young man. He married MAUDE SELF May 26, 1901, and the family resided for some years in Beaumont, Texas, where he was employed by the Gulf Oil Company. He retired to live with his son, Maurice McCaleb, in Houston, where he died May 10, 1939. Both husband and wife are buried in Houston.¹³

a. <u>KATHERINE McCALEB</u>, daughter of William Dunbar and Maude (Self) McCaleb, was born at Leesville, Louisiana April 8, 1902. She married EARL HICKS DOUGLAS. He has been deceased for some years. The widow resides at 6542 Vanderbilt Street, Houston, Texas.



4. JOHN MOORE McCALEB, JR., son of John Moore and Catherine H. (McCaleb) McCaleb, died very young and without issue.

5. "DOC" McCALEB, son of John Moore and Catherine H. (McCaleb) McCaleb, died young and without issue.

IV. FRANCIS MCCALEB,¹⁴ son of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, was born about 1810. He was named for General Francis Marion of Revolutionary War fame. After his father's death, his Uncle Jonathan McCaleb was made his guardian. Orphan Court Records, Jefferson County, Mississippi show that he received his full inheritance from his father's estate February 4, 1831. He married LOUISA C. HARRISON April 8, 1830 (Jefferson County marriage records). She was the daughter of Richard and Hannah Brown (Sims) Harrison, who came to Jefferson County before 1781, and the granddaughter of Richard and Martha (Truly) Harrison of Virginia. (Richard Harrison saw service in the Revolutionary War as Lieutenant of artillery, Virginia State Troops and as captain of an Illinois Regiment under General George Rogers Clark) 49 Francis McCaleb appears on the Adams County, Mississippi census of 1830 as a male 20-30 years of age with no children. Deed Book B, Jefferson County shows that Francis McCaleb was a resident of Yazoo County, Mississippi in 1833 and that in that year he borrowed \$10, 000 from his father-in-law, Richard Harrison of Jefferson County, Mississippi, and put up his slaves, by name, as security. Francis McCaleb does not appear on the Yazoo County census, and it seems logical to believe that he died about this time. Another reason to believe that he died without issue is that his Uncle Jonathan McCaleb, who was his guardian, did not mention him, his wife, or heirs in his will of 1853.

V. JAMES FRANKLIN McCALEB, son of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb, was born February 9, 1812.16 His mother and her second husband deeded him Peachland Plantation as a gift. (See Adams County deed records). He attended College at Danville, Kentucky, where he met and married SOPHIE MOORE.



They were married September 14, 1830. (The marriage is recorded in Mercer County, Kentucky). She was born November 7, 1814. She was the daughter of Lawson and Elizabeth (Rochester) Moore of Danville, Kentucky, who had moved to Kentucky from near Wilmington, North Carolina. James and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb made their home at Peachland, where he became a successful cotton planter. (James McCaleb's sister, Mary McCaleb, married Charles Rochester, a first cousin of Sophie (Moore) McCaleb, in 1834.) Sophie (Moore) McCaleb died July 30, 1845.¹⁷ Nine children were born to James and Sophie McCaleb. He married (2) MARTHA BISLAND September 16, 1846. She was born March 8, 1822 in Adams County, Mississippi. The Bisland family were neighbors to the McCaleb family. Martha (Bisland) McCaleb was the daughter of James and Mary (King) Bisland and the granddaughter of Peter Bisland. Seven children were born to James and Martha McCaleb. He died June 9, 1878 in Adams County, Mississippi. Martha (Bisland) McCaleb died May 30, 1900. Both are buried in the Pine Ridge Presbyterian Church cemetery, Adams County.

James McCaleb was made an elder of the Pine Ridge Presbyterian Church in 1833, and from 1850-1874 he was the only elder in the Pine Ridge Church. The old church records describe him as "wise and Capable".

A. <u>MARY ELIZABETH McCALEB</u>, daughter of James Franklin and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb, was born November 24, 1831 and died June 13, 1922. She married JAMES DUNBAR McCALEB, her first cousin December 8, 1852 (Bible Record). He was the son of David and Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb. (See the descendants of David and Matilda (Dunbar) McCaleb.) In 1838 Mary McCaleb won a prize for Needlework at the Washington, Mississippi Lyceum (<u>Mississippi Historical Society Vol. I and II</u>). In 1841 "Miss McCaleb, aged 9 years", won a prize for a pair of "suspenders, elegantly wrought" (<u>Southern Planter</u>, Vol. I, No. 4, p. 18).

B. <u>Dr. WILLIAM McCALEB</u>, son of James Franklin and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb, was born October 30, 1833 at Peachland Plantation. He was educated at Oakland, a Presbyterian College which was located in Claiborne County, Mississippi. In 1856 he graduated from the medical school of the University of Kentucky. For a time he lived in Claiborne County, Mississippi in the home of his cousin, John McCaleb, and practiced his profession. The "Port Gibson Reveille" of September and November 1856 carried this announcement: "Dr. William H. McCaleb offers his Professional services to the citizens of Big Bayou Pierre. To be found at the residence of John McCaleb", He served in the War between the

States in the Claiborne Light Infantry and later in Company 4, 24th Cavalry Battalion. He was promoted Assistant Surgeon of the Division of Magruder's Partisan Rangers. He married (1) AUGUSTA MARTHA HARRIS October 12, 1870 (Bible Record). There was one child born to this union.¹⁸ Augusta Martha (Harris) McCaleb died July 1872. Dr. McCaleb married (2) ELIZABETH "BETTIE" BUCKNER December 30, 1875 in Adams County, Mississippi (Book 10, p. 80). She was the daughter of Aylette and Charlotte (Ferguson) Buckner of "Airlie", Natchez, Mississippi. There was no issue from this second marriage. He died September 16, 1896, and both he and his second wife were buried in the Pine Ridge Church Cemetery, Adams County.

1. LUCY McCALEB, daughter of Dr. William and Augusta Martha (Harris) McCaleb, was born May 10, 1872. She married her cousin, CHARLES EDGAR MORRIS, a descendant of David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb. He was born August 20, 1872 and died March 14, 1942. He was the son of William and Olivia Matilda May (McCaleb) Morris. For many years he was a merchant in Port Gibson. The Morris family resided on College Street in Port Gibson. In the home there are some very beautiful old furniture and portraits. Among these portraits are ones of David McCaleb and his son, Thomas McCaleb. Mrs. Morris died September 10, 1957. She and her husband are buried in the Wintergreen cemetery in Port Gibson, Mississippi.

a. <u>ELIZABETH "BESSIE" MORRIS</u>, daughter of Charles Edgar and Lucy (McCaleb) Morris, was born October 29, 1899. She lives with her sisters in the Morris home on College Street in Port Gibson. For some years she has been Assistant Post Mistress.

b. CHARLES EDGAR MORRIS, JR., son of Charles Edgar and Lucy McCaleb) Morris, was born November 6, 1900 and died 1907. He is buried in the Morris lot in the Wintergreen Cemetery, Port Gibson, Mississippi.

c. LUCY MORRIS, daughter of Charles Edgar and Lucy(McCaleb) Morris, was born November 15, 1901. She lives with her sisters in the Morris home in Port Gibson, Mississippi.

d. EUGENIA "GENIE" MORRIS, daughter of Charles Edgar and Lucy (McCaleb) Morris, was born October 15, 1903. She is a bookkeeper for a dress shop, and she lives with her sisters in the Morris home in Port Gibson.

e. PEARLA MORRIS, daughter of Charles Edgar and Lucy (McCaleb) Morris, was born August 22, 1905. She graduated

from the Street Sanitarium, Vicksburg, Mississippi. During World War II she served as a U. S. Navy Nurse, with the rank of Lieutenant. She is now doing private duty at the Mercy Hospital, Vicksburg, Mississippi where she is held in high esteem by doctors and patients.

f. <u>WILLIAM COLLINS MORRIS</u>, son of Charles Edgar and Lucy (McCaleb) Morris, was born September 23, 1909. He married JANNETT TRAILL, and they have two children. He is a Phd. The family lives in Cleveland, Ohio.

1). WILLIAM COLLINS MORRIS, JR., is the son of William Collins and Jannett (Traill) Morris.

2). THOMAS EDGAR MORRIS is the son of William Collins and Jannett (Traill) Morris.

g. MARTHA MORRIS, daughter of Charles Edgar and Lucy (McCaleb) Morris, was born June 17, 1913. She resides with her sisters on College Street in Port Gibson, Mississippi.

C. JAMES FRANKLIN McCALEB, JR., son of James Franklin and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb, was born March 2, 1836. During the War between the States he served as a member of the Natchez Fencibles and was killed in the battle of Bowling Green, Kentucky, January 19, 1862. She inherited money and land from her Collins grandparents, from her parents, and \$10,000 from her great uncle Jonathan McCaleb. She is described in the House of Rochester as "an wealthy and elegant young lady of Mississippi, who with her mother had been spending the summer at the famous Graham Springs near Danville, Kentucky". She also visited the family of her sister-in-law, Sophie Moore McCaleb, in Danville. On one of these visits she met CHARLES HANNAH ROCHESTER, the son of John and Sallie (Lewis) Rochester. He came to Mississippi to see Mary McCaleb, and December 10, 1834 they were married at Peachland Plantation in Adams County, Mississippi. (See Adams County, Mississippi marriage records, Book 5, p. 499.) Charles Hannah Rochester was born January 20, 1817. He was a graduate of Centre College in 1834 when he was eighteen years old. He was a man of rare culture, courtly, elegant manners, always affable and agreeable, a fine conversationalist and public

speaker. He was an active farmer and business man and railroad official.³¹ He was born in the magnificent old Rochester colonial home which was built by his father in 1798 and which was known as "Mt. Airy". In 1858 he built Chesterfield, which was very handsome. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church. He was first cousin to Sophie (Moore) McCaleb. Charles Hannah and Mary (McCaleb) Rochester had seven children. Mary (McCaleb) Rochester³² died March 19, 1849 and was buried in Danville, Kentucky. Charles H. Rochester married (2) MARY CALDWELL of Louisville, Kentucky in 1850.

VIII. JOHN McCALEB, JR., son of John and Marie (Collins) McCaleb, was born August 14, 1823 about one month after the death of his father.³³ He was born at Peachland Plantation, Adams County, Mississippi, and it was here that he spent his early years. He, like his brothers and sisters, was taught by a private tutor. He attended Centre College in Kentucky. He, as did his brothers and sisters, inherited property and money from his Collins grandparents, from his parents, and from his Uncle Jonathan McCaleb. Jonathan McCaleb and Samuel, Chamberlain, his uncle by marriage, were his guardians.³⁴ As a boy and young man John McCaleb often visited his uncle Jonathan McCaleb at the Hermitage Plantation in Claiborne County, Mississippi. It was on one of these visits that he met INDIANA BOOTH, who was born July 28, 1827 at Pleasant Hill Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi, and who was the daughter of John and Sarah (Prior) Booth and the granddaughter of John Booth, Sr., a Revolutionary War soldier. They were married April 10, 1345 at her parents' Pleasant Hill home (Book 6, p. 12) by Rev. B. H. Williams, Bishop of Presbyterian Church, Pine Ridge, Mississippi. They made their home with John and Sarah (Prior) Booth because Indiana (Booth) McCaleb was an only child, sole heir to her fathers large plantation, and her parents wanted her at home. In 1848 she inherited Pleasant Hill Plantation. Here she and John McCaleb made their home, and here their children were born. John McCaleb was very prosperous. He owned many slaves and increased his lands. He and his wife were members of Epiphany Episcopal Church and they reared their children in the Episcopal faith. John McCaleb contracted tuberculosis and died at 33 years of age December 18, 1856 at 2 P. M. Indiana (Booth) McCaleb contracted the disease from her husband, and she, too, died at 33 years of age July 6, 1860 at 3 P M. Both were buried in the Booth Pleasant Hill Cemetery within sight of their home.



Plantation, 36 Claiberne Coutny, Mississippi. He was only ten years old when his father died. His mother died four years later. He received his early schooling at home under a private tutor. He was sent to Danville, Kentucky to school when he was thirteen years old. At the outbreak of the War between the States he came home. He served in the Confederate forces in Barnes' Cavalry until a few months before the end of the war. He came home on furlough in May 1864 to find his orphan sisters living in the home of the Rollins family in Port Gibson, no one at home, Pleasant Hill ravaged, the stored cotton crop burned. He knew that the cause was hopeless and that he was needed at home. Instead of returning to the war, he married his sweetheart, ANNIE ROLLINS, May 12, 1864 at her home in Port Gibson. She was born July 14, 1845. John and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb took his young sisters back to Pleasant Hill and began the job of rebuilding the plantation which had been so neglected during the war. James Franklin McCaleb, brother of John Booth McCaleb, was still in the army of the Confederacy, but soon the war was over, and he returned to the plantation. The task of saving the plantation was too much for two young The boys, and eventually it was lost. John McCaleb37 died at Martin (Pattison) Mississippi December 15, 1911 at the age of 66 years. Annie (Rollins) McCaleb died at Pattison (Martin). Mississippi September 29, 1928 at the age of 83 years. Both are buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery. John Booth McCaleb was a member of Epiphany Episcopal Church of Claiborne County, Mississippi.

1. ROSE ANNIE McCALEB, daughter of John Booth and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb, was born July 25, 1868 at Pleasant Hill Plantation. She lived with her father and mother at Pattison, Mississippi. After the death of her father she continued to live in the family home. She was very beautiful and she worked very hard. She supported herself, her mother, and her orphaned nephew by running a boarding house. Late in life she married JOSEPH EDWIN REGAN August 18, 1924. She was later estranged from him. She died in Jackson, Mississippi in 1944 and is buried in the Wintergreen cemetery at Port Gibson, Mississippi. There was no issue from her marriage.

2. PERCY ROLLINS McCALEB, son of John Booth and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb, was born August 2, 1866 at Pleasant Hill, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He married MARGARET ELIZABETH "BESSIE" MAGEE³⁸ March 28, 1901 at Brookhaven, Mississippi. Both died young of tuberculosis. He died February 19, 1910, and she died February 23, 1911, age 28 years, 23 days. Both are buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.



a. <u>DUNCAN BENNETT HoldED</u>, Jon of Percy Rollins and Margaret Elizabeth (Magee) Mutalob, was born January 6, 1902. He attended the public school at Pattison, Mississippi and later the Presbyterian preparatory school at Union Church, Mississippi. In 1920 he enlisted in the United States Navy. He made the navy his career. During World War II he served as chief engineer and was promoted to naval commander. January 3, 1932 he married PEARL LYNN, daughter of Alma H. and Rhoroda Caroline Lynn of Panguitich, Utah, at her father's home in Sca Diege, California. She was born July 28, 1905. They were married in San Diege, California. The couple have no children. He is retired from active duty, and they reside San Diego, California.

b. MARGARET ROLLINS McCALEB, daughter of Percy Rollins and Margaret Elizabeth (Magee) McCaleb, was born March 8, 1904 and died of diptheria December 12, 1906. She is buried in the Port Gloson Wintergree: Cemetery.


3. LUCI M. McCALEB, daughter of John Booth and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb) was born August 27, 1970 and died October 17, 1972.

4. LUCY RUSSELL McGALEB, daughter of John Booth and Annie (Rollins: McCaleb, was born December 4, 1872 and died January 1, 1912. She married THOMAS B, NMSMITH June 19, 1910 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. There was no issue from this marriage. She died January 1, 1912, age 40.

5. JUNN BOOTH "MAX" McCALEB, JR., son of John Booth and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb, was born June 30, 1877 and died January 1, 1900. He was buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery. He never married.

P. <u>SARAH ELIZABETH "SALLY" McCALEB</u>, daughter of John and Indiana (Booth) McCaleb, was born January 28, 1847 at Pleasant Hill Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. She never married. She died of tuberculosis September 13, 1364 at Pleasant Hill. She was named for an ancestor, Sarah (MacAlpin) McCaleb and for her aunt, Elizabeth Booth.

C. MARY MARTIN "MOLLY" McCALEB, was born May 3, 1851 at Pleasant Hill in Clatborne County, Mississippi. She was named for her cousin Mary Martin, a descendant of James and Caroline (Buck) McCaleb. (The Martins lived on Talbot Plantation which adjoined Pleasant Hill Plantation. The Martin and McCaleb children were close friends as well as kinsmen.) Molly McCaleb was quite young when her parents died. In 1060 James Franklin McCaleb of Pine Ridge and H N. Spencer of Claiborne County were her guardians. Much against the



wishes of her family she married her first cousin, Jonathan "Bosey" McCaleb April 9, 1874. He was the son of James Franklin and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb of Pine Ridge, Adams County, Mississippi. The couple resided on his property at Pine Ridge neighborhood. (See the descendants of James F. and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb). She died June 26, 1902.39

D. JAMES FRANKLIN McCALEB, son of John and Indiana (Booth) McCaleb, was born October 29, 1848 at Pleasant Hill Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He received his early education under a private tutor. Later he boarded in the home of Judge Baldwin and attended the Seidlitz private school at Port Gibson until the war interfered with his education. At the age of fourteen he shouldered his musket, donned a uniform of gray, and went to defend his country.

James Franklin McCaleb40 was restless after his brother and his Martin cousins (Descendants of James and Caroline (Buck) McCaleb) went to join the Confederate army. He finally decided to go himself, though he was only fourteen years of age. His guardian, Dr. William McCaleb, had settled his orphan sisters with the Rollins family in Port Gibson for the duration of the war. James Franklin McCaleb bade them farewell, went to Pleasant Hill to see what could be done before leaving, to pack what he needed, and to pick up his body servant. At Pleasant Hill he found much confusion. The overseer had gone, and the negroes were very frightened at the rumors of the eminent arrival of the Yankees. While he was still at his home a detatchment of Yankee soldiers rode in. They pillaged the home, burned the stored cotton, and drove off most of the livestock. They were unable to find the silver which had been hidden by the negro houseman. They took James F. McCaleb to the graveyard, a short distance from the house, and there they threatened to hang him unless he gave them the silver. He said afterward that he did not know where the silver was hidden and that he was not afraid that they would hang him, but he was afraid that they would whip him. They did neither, and they did not get the silver. Next day he set out with his body servant to find his brother or his Martin cousins. He found the Martins and enlisted in Company C, 4th Mississippi Regiment in Magruder's Partisan Rangers. He acted mostly as courier. After the war, James Franklin McCaleb came home to Pleasant Hill and began the task of helping his brother put Pleasant Hill back into production. December 19, 1872 he married KATY HULL, 41 daughter of P. C. and Caroline (Bethea42) Hull, at her father's "Hull Home". Because Katy (Hull) McCaleb's mother had died, she felt that she had to stay at Hull Home James Franklin and Katy (Hull) McCaleb made their home at



Hull Home, and P. C. Hull willed them the home and a large portion of the plantation. Katy (Hull) McCaleb died May 25, 1896 at 3 P.M. at Hull Home. For about sixteen years after her death James Franklin McCaleb and his daughter made Hull Home⁴³ their home. Because of poor health, and because his son had lost his wife and was left with two small children, James Franklin McCaleb and his daughter decided to move into his son's home in Hermanville, Mississippi. In this way the daughter could care for her father and her brother's household. James Franklin McCaleb died in the home of his son at Hermanville September 1914. Both he and his wife were buried in the Hull-Moore Cemetery.⁴⁴

As a child James Franklin McCaleb liked to play war games and pretended that he was General Zachary Taylor, and for this reason his sisters nicknamed him "Zack". His brother called him "Tim", and his friends called him "Jimmy".

1. HOPE McCALEB, son of James Franklin and Katy (Hull) McCaleb, was born September 30, 1873 and died in 1876. He was buried in the Moore Cemetery.

2. JAMES FRANKLIN McCALEB, JR., son of James Franklin and Katy (Hull) McCaleb, was born August 10, 1875 at Hull Home, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He attended private school at home until he was seventeen years of age. This school was conducted in the large schoolroom which was an annex of the main house. The teachers were Anna and Nona Hull, aunts of James Franklin McCaleb, Jr., who were graduates of St. Mary's of Louisiana and of Whitworth College. Four neighboring planters employed these ladies to teach their children The South had not yet recovered from the war at Hull Home. and Reconstruction, and times were hard. James Franklin McCaleb could not afford to go to college. Because he had a very keen mind, a good foundation of knowledge, and a love of reading, he became a well educated person. He always believed in education, and it was largely through his untiring efforts that his community had the first consolidated public school in Claiborne County. James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. began work as a clerk in a store. He later owned his own mercantile business. He purchased a farm adjoining that of his father and farmed as a side line. At the death of his father, he and his sister inherited Hull Place.45

James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. married (1) ELLA CLARK, daughter of John and Roberta (Trim) Clark, August 25, 1904 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. She was born April 12, 1880 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. Soon after James F. and Ella (Clark) McCaleb married they bought a home in Hermanville, Mississippi. Here two children were born to them, and here

she died May 19, 1912.46

After the death of Ella (Clark) McCaleb, James McCaleb's sister and father came to live with him. The sister, Sutie (Cora) McCaleb, helped her brother care for and make a home for his children. James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. married (2) MATTIE BELLE STEGALL November 22, 1914 in Jackson, Mississippi. She was a native of Copiah County, Mississippi and was the daughter of Joel Sims and Alice (Colliers) Stegall.⁴⁷ She was born March 9, 1890. Mattye Belle (Stegall) McCaleb was known to her husband and his two children as "Stiggie". She was deeply beloved by her husband's children and was a real mother to them to the day of her death. Six years after her marriage to James Franklin McCaleb a daughter was born to them. James Franklin McCaleb retired from business at eighty years of age. His few retirement years were very happy. He died in the Claiborne County Hospital April 10, 1959 after a very short illness. Mayyte Belle (Stegall) McCaleb died at the Mercy Hospital, Vicksburg, Mississippi December 16, 1959 after she had major surgery.

Katy McCaleb Headley has the following remarks to say of her parents: " I admired my father more than anyone in the world. I coveted his approval more than anything else. Daddy had dark hair and dark brown eyes. In later years he lost the hair on the top of his head and was partially bald. He was only about five feet six inches tall. He and the most beautiful mouth and smile. He was always gentle, indulgent, and understanding. He loved to read, and he had a most rentive mind. He never made much money, but he saw to it that his family had comforts and lived graciously. He despised a liar more than anything. Above all else he loved his family and enjoyed nothing so much as having them near him. He was a generous man, and I recall that he often sent groceries to old or sick negroes. He was accustomed to negro servants and always employed one or two. His mind was keen and alert, and though in late years he became a little deaf and his eyesight became poor, his mental faculties were good until his death. He was a member of the Epiphany Episcopal Church and he was a Mason. He voted the Democratic ticket.

My mother, Ella (Clark) McCaleb, died when I was a very small child. I remember very little about her except that she was a remarkably beautiful woman.

My mother, "Stiggie" McCaleb (We never used the word "stepmother") was a small slender woman. She had golden naturally curly hair and blue eyes. She was always neat and well groomed. She was the kindest and most unselfish person I

ever knew. She was good to all of us, and she never ran out of ways to make us happy. She never made an unkind remark about anyone. She was miserable if there was any dissention, and she would not tolerate quarreling or unpleasantness. Stiggie was a member of the Epiphany Episcopal Church. When I think of her I think of love. When I lost her, I lost not only a mother but the best friend and companion I ever had".-----Katy McCaleb Headley, tribute.

a. <u>KATY McCALEB</u>, ⁴⁸ daughter of James Franklin and Ella (Clark) McCaleb, was born at her parent's home in Hermanville, Mississippi September 15, 1905. She attended a private, elementary school, which was run by Mrs. Frank Clark, until she was in the fifth grade. She then attended the Hermanville public schools. In 1923 she graduated from the Hermanville consolidated high school. She attended Mississippi State College for Women and graduated from that institution in 1927. She began teaching history in the Port Gibson Secondary School in 1927. In 1940 she was made principal. She still holds that position (1964). Since graduating from college she has attended Tulane University graduate school for several summers. She holds a Master of Education degree from Mississippi College,

December 25, 1928 Katy McCaleb married HAL STEPHEN HEADLEY, a native of Crawford Coutny, Illinois, at her father's home in Hermanville, Mississippi. He is the son of S. P. and Lanora (Vaughn) Headley, who moved from Crawford County, Illinois to Woodlawn Plantation in Claiborne County, Mississippi in 1912. He was born September 9, 1895. (The Headley family were English and settled in New Jersey and New York before the American Revolutionary War. They migrated to Licken County, Ohio49 and thence to Crawford County, Illinois. Their ancestor fought in the Revolutionary war against the British.) Hal Stephen and Katy (McCaleb) Headley live at "Ten Acres" shich they built and which is located four miles north of Port Gibson on Highway 61. Hal S. Headley was Clerk of the Circuit Court and Registrar of Claiborne County for 24 years. He is now retired from politics and operates his Woodlawn Plantation in Claiborne County.

b. JAMES FRANKLIN McCALEB III, son of James Franklin and Ella (Clark) McCaleb, was born September 3, 1908 in Hermanville, Mississippi. He graduated from the Hermanville High School and attended Hinds Junior College, Millsaps College, and the University of Mississippi. He is an insurance salesman and also works for the American Legion Club of Memphis, Tennessee.

James Franklin McCaleb III married LOU ELLA HILL at Tupelo, Mississippi. He served in World War II in the 36th Regiment of Engineers in the European Theater. He was in the landing of Anzio, Italy, the Southern Invasion of France, Strassburg seize, and in the fighting in Austria. His regiment acted as infantry as often as they did engineers. James Franklin and Lou Ella (Hill) McCaleb had only one child born to them, and this child, Sue Carrol McCaleb, lived only three days. A few weeks after Sue Carrol's death, they adopted a baby, Lou Ann McCaleb. Lou Ella McCaleb died September 27, 1960 in Memphis, Tennessee. She is buried in the Wintergreen cemetery at Port Gibson, Mississippi.

1). <u>SUE CARROL McCALEB</u>, daughter of James Franklin and Lou Ella (Hill) McCaleb, was born in 1948 and lived only a few days. She is buried in Memphis, Tennessee.

2). LOU ANN McCALEB, adopted daughter of James Franklin and Lou Ella (Hill) McCaleb, was born September 19, 1948 in Memphis, Tennessee. She was adopted when she was about two weeks old.

c. DOROTHY McCALEB, daughter of James Franklin and Mattie Belle (Stegall) McCaleb, was born June 19, 1919 at Hermanville, Mississippi. She graduated from the Hermanville High and attended Delta State College for two years. September 7, 1941 she married JAMES GROVER HORN in Epiphany Episcopal Church at Hermanville, Mississippi. He is the son of Grover Cleveland and Etoila (James) Horn.⁵⁰ He was born at Soso, Mississippi December 12, 1917. He served in the United States army for a year before the World War II, and he continued to serve in the army all dur ng the war as sergeant. Dorothy (McCaleb) Horn worked as a secretary at Camp Shelby during the war. After the war, they located in Vicksburg, where they purchased a home. He is a district manager with Lamar Life Insurance in Vicksburg. She is employed by the Warren County Welfare Office. The family are all members of Christ Episcopal Church in Vicksburg.

1). JAMES GROVER HORN, JR., son of James Grover and Dorothy (McCaleb) Horn was born May 20, 1946 at Mercy Hospital in Vicksburg, Mississippi. He graduated from Cooper High School in Vicksburg, Mississippi (1964) and plans to attend college. He is an acolyte at Christ Episcopal Church in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

2). <u>SUSAN HORN</u>, daughter of James Grover and Dorothy (McCaleb) Horn, was born July 2, 1949 in Vicksburg, Mississippi at the Mercy Hospital. She completed Carl Central Junior High in 1964, with honors, and will attend Cooper high school.



3). MARILYN HORN, daughter of James Grover and Dorothy (McCaleb) Horn, was born September 21, 1955 in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

3. <u>CORA MOORE "SUTIE" McCALEB</u>, daughter of James Franklin and Katy (Hull) McCaleb, was born March 7, 1677 at Hull Home, Claiborne County, Mississippi. She attended the Presbyterian School at Union Church, Mississippi. For some years after the death of her mother she made a home for her father at Hull H me. When her brother's wife died she and her father moved into the brother's home in Hermanville so that she could take care of her father and look after her brother and his small children. After her father died and her brother remarried, she entered the business world and was employed for many years as a secretary at Mississippi State College. After her retirement she made her home in Port Gibson at Ten Acres, the home of her niece. She died at Claiborne County Hospital December 16, 1954, and she is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.


E. <u>ANNA COLEGATE McCALEB</u>, daughter of John and Indiana (Booth) McCaleb, was born January 21, 1856 at Pleasant Hill Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. She was left an orphan at a very young age. After the death of her parents, her brother John Booth McCaleb and his wife made a home for her and her brother and sisters at Pleasant Hill. November 22, 1676 Colgate McCaleb married TOM PARKS ELLIS at Pleasant Hill Plantation. The couple lived at the old Ellis home, which was located two miles north of Port Gibson.⁹¹ She died of tuberculosis and was buried from the Port Gibson Christian Church January 20, 1890 ("Port Gibson Reveille"). She is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery. He died of yellow fever and was buried at Giraud, Louisiana.

1. <u>DAVID ELLIS</u>, son of Tom P. and Anna Colgate (McCaleb) Ellis, was born November 1877. He married LIZZIE ADAMS of Oklahoma, Louisiana. Both are deceased.

a. DAVID ELLIS, son of David and Lizzie (Adams) Ellis, is known to this family as "D. M." He lives in El Paso, Texas.

c. FRED ELLIS, son of David and Lizzie (Adams) Ellis, lives in El Paso, Texas.

2. ANNA LEOLA ELLIS, daughter of Tom P. and Anna Colgate (McCaleb) Ellis, was born January 10, 1880. She married ZOE HIGGENBOTHAM. The family lived on a plantation near Oak Grove, Louisiana. He is deceased. She runs the plantation and plantation store. There were no children born to



Joe and Anna Leola (Ellis) Higgenbotham, but they adopted a son.

3. <u>SALLIE WILLIE ELLIS</u>, daughter of Tom P. and Anna (Colgate) (McCaleb) Ellis, was born March 1882. She married JOHN T. MASON.

a. EMMA MASON, daughter of John T. and Sallie Willie (Ellis) Mason, married ? SIMS. They resied at Benzola, Mississippi.

4.FRED ELLIS, son of Tom P. and Anna Colgate (McCaleb) Ellis, was born in 1884. He married EMMA DURMOT.

a. FRED ELLIS, JR., son of Fred and Emma (Durmot) Ellis, married Miss BULLOCK. They live at Shreveport, Louisiana.

1). DOROTHY ELLIS is the daughter of Fred and ? (Bullock) Ellis.

b. WILLIAM BURTROM ELLIS, married GLADYS HOOKS. They live at Durmott, Arkansas.

1). SARAH ELLIS is the daughter of William B. and Gladys (Hooks) Ellis.

2), TOMMY ELLIS is the son of William B. and Gladys (Hooks) Ellis.

c. COLGATE ELLIS, daughter of Fred and Emma (Durmot) Ellis, married SAM NELSON.

1). JOE ANN "DUCHESS" NELSON is the daughter of Sam and Colgate (Ellis) Nelson. She lives (1964) in Pasadena, Texas.

2). PAT ELLIS NELSON is the son of Sam and Colgate (Ellis) Nelson.

3). SAM ELLIS is the son of Sam and Colgate (Ellis) Nelson.

d. ZOE ELLIS, daughter of Fred and Emma (Durmot) Ellis, married CLAUDE FARR. They have no children and reside at Shreveport, Louisiana.

e. JACK ELLIS, son of Fred and Emma (Durmot) Ellis, married REED HOPSON. They reside at Magee, Arkansas. She was a Major in the U.S. armed service in World War II. No children were born to this marriage.

FOOTNOTES

1. Notation by Katy McCaleb Headley: Though I know several members of the family who have seen the John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb family Bible, I have been unable to locate it.

John McCaleb's birth, marriage, and death dates are recorded in the Captain William McCaleb Bible. His birth and age are recorded on his tombstone. The tombstones of John McCaleb and "Eliza Jane" were found half buried in the ground on the side of a stream bank back of the Peachland home by Mrs. Louise Henderson, owner of Peachland and a descendant of John McCaleb. These tombstones are all that is left of the Peachland cemetery which caved into the stream. Mrs. Henderson placed the stones in the side yard of Peachland where they still remain.

<u>Biographical Memoirs of Mississippi</u>, published by the Goodspeed Company, Vol. I, p. 1170 gives a short biography of John McCaleb. The account has one serious error. It names Caroline Calvert instead of Sarah MacAlpin as the paternal grandmother of John McCaleb. This is probably the origin of the error which has caused confusion to some.

Census records give John McCaleb as John N. McCaleb.

2. William Collins, born in Ireland, was the son of John and Mary Abraham (Odam) Collins who came to Natchez and obtained a land grant March 20, 1778. Mary (Odam) Collins married (2) Parker Carradine. She and John Collins had three sons, John, born 1766, Joshua, born 1758, and William, born 1759. (McBee Collection of Miss. Court Records).

Jane Pipes, b. Nov. 18, 1769, d. Adams County, Miss. 1830. She was daughter of Jane or Jeannete (MacAfee) and Windsor Pipes. (See <u>Pipes Family</u> published by Mrs. Elizabeth Prather Ellsberry of Chillicothe, Mo.



28. Captain John Girault, son of John Girault, was born in London, England February 24, 1755. He served as Captain under George Rogers Clark in the American Revolutionary War.



The D. A. R. Chapter in Natches erected a statue in commemoration of his Revolutionary Mar service, John Girault's family were Huguenot refugees. The Huguenot Society Founders of Maniken, Virginia contains a Girault name. John Girault came to the Natchez area of Mississippi where he held various political offices under Spanish appointment and later under governors Sargent and Claiborne. He died May 28, 1813. His will, made in New Orleans May 24, 1813, lists only nine living Children. (Information from Mrs, Pipes Jones of Vicksburg, Miss.).

29. John Anderson had a previous marriage by which he had one daughter- Mrs. Vernon Moore of Claiborne County.

30. Elizabeth Girault Shaifer's ancestor Jane (Pipes) Collins, daughter of Windsor and Jane or Jeannette (McAfee) Pipes of Pennsylvania and Adams County, Mississippi, Was the sister to Ackland Harley Jones' ancestor, Charles Pipes.


31. Once while waiding for a train in Jackson, Mississippi, James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. of Claiborne County, Mississippi noticed a pullman car which bore the name of "McCaleb".

32. Information concerning Charles H. and Mary (McCaleb) Rochester and their descendants was obtained from <u>The House</u> of Rochester and from Mrs. Grace Rochester Coyle, 604 Pine St., Orange, Texas. (The copy of <u>The House of Rochester</u> was owned by the Whitney family of Fayette, Miss.).

33. Birth, marriage, and death dates of John and Indiana (Booth) McCaleb and for their descendants were taken from their family Bible, tombstone inscriptions, and from the marriage records of Claiborne and Hinds Counties, Mississippi. (See the Addenda.) The John and Indiana McCaleb Bible is now in the possession of Duncan B. McCaleb. Mrs. K. McCaleb Headley has photostatic copies, and so have the Children of the American Revolution.

34. See Adams County, Mississippi Guardian Records; wills of William and Jane Collins, Adams County, Mississippi; the will of Jonathan McCaleb, Claiborne County, Mississippi.

35. John Booth, Sr. was a Sergeant Major in the Revolutionary War. He was born in Maryland in 1745. He came to Mississippi by way of Georgia about 1785. He served as Sergeant in the 1st Regiment of Mississippi Volunteers in the War of 1812. He and his wife, Hester, are buried at Pleasant Hill Cemetery. Proof of John Booth's service can be found in Family Records-Mississippi Revolutionary War Records by Alice Tracy Welsh, and in Maryland Revolutionary



War Records. John Booth, Jr. was born September 10, 1797 in Claiborne County and died there June 14, 1848. He married Sarah Prior in Claiborne County August 31, 1826 (Book 2, p. 265). She was born 1800 and died June 14,1848. (Tombstone records from Booth cemetery in Claiborne County.) A portrait of John Booth, Jr. and his grandson, John Booth McCaleb, hangs in the home of Mrs. Katy McCaleb Headley.

36. The Pleasant Hill Plantation was comprised of rich Bayou Pierre bottom land, This land was originally a land grant to John Booth, Sr. about 1795. Booth Creek, which ran through this property, was named for John Booth. The plantation was comprised partly of land which now belongs to Eugene and Reed Montgomery, land belonging to Mrs. Nellie Williams, and part of the Valley of the Moon Plantation. This land is located about two or three miles northwest of Hermanville on a road turning north from 18 Highway about one-fourth mile west from Hermanville, The home burned about 1885, It stood about where Mrs. Williams' home now stands. The house site was probably chosen because of the magnificent view. Here the highland drops to the low bottom land, and the view is breath taking. The home was a large two story plantation, colonial type. Along the front of the house upper and lower porches extended the full breadth. An upper and a lower hall ran through the depth of the house. On eigher side of the halls were two large rooms. On the ground floor two of these adjoining rooms were separated by folding doors and were used as double parlors. The kitchen was back of the house and separate from it. Within sight of the house was the burial ground, (This description of Pleasant Hill was given to Katy McCaleb Headley by her grandfather and her father.)

37. A portrait of John McCaleb, as a small child, on the lap of his grandfather John Booth, hangs in the home of Mrs. Katy McCaleb Headley of Port Gibson, Mississippi. All of the Booth-McCaleb furniture and household goods were owned by John B, and Annie (Rollins) McCaleb.

38. See Lumber River Scots and Their Descendants p. 615. Margaret Elizabeth Magee was the daughter of Duncan and Fannie (Gilchrist) Magee. She was the fourth daughter of John Gilchrist and Martha Ann (McMillan) Gilchrist. John Gilchrist was the son of Malcolm and Amy (Galbraith) Gilchrist, who married in either Jefferson or Lincoln County, Mississippi. Duncan and Fannie (Gilchrist) Magee lived in or near Brookhaven, Miss.

39. Jas. McCaleb, of Pine Ridge, family Bible.

40, "Our grandfather was about five feet six or seven inches tall. He was always slender, and he wore a close clipped mustache. He had dark hair and black piercing eyes. He was never a very strong man. I thought him very handsome, but I remember him mostly for his extreme gentleness and kindness. He read us <u>Uncle Remus</u>, and he liked to tell us of his hunting and fishing trips. He liked to tell us about his army experiences, and he never forgot or forgave the Yankees who raided Pleasant Hill and although he forgave them much, never forgave them taking his broad-cloth coat". K. H.

41. Dr. Roy Hull McCormick, Box 555, Manhattan, Kansas has published a Hull genealogy.

The Hulls (Hohls, Holls, and Holes) were from Switzerland. They immigrated to Germany and then to Holland. Peter Thomas Hull (Hohl) and his two sons, Francis and Peter, sailed from Holland to Philadelphia aboard the Francis Ann Ship and landed in Philadelphia May 30, 1741. From Philadelphia they went to Holland, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. Peter T. Hull soon married (2) Susannah Margarethea Diffenback at Trinity Lutheran Church. Peter T. Hull, his wife, and his two sons soon moved to Augusta County, (Rockbridge County) Virginia. She rode a grey mare and carried in the saddle bags behind her all of their money. Peter Hull, son of Peter T. Hull, married Mary Lenkinfelter about 1782. Peter Hull, son of Peter and Mary (Lenkinfelter) Hull, was born 1783 and died 1854. He married Jenny Dickey in 1805.

Peter Cassius Hull, son of Peter and Jenny (Dickey) Hull, was born July 17, 1814 in Rockbridge County, Virginia and died January 18, 1878 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He served as a Captain in the Mexican War. (His great-greatgrandson, James G. Horn, Jr. of Vicksburg has his sword.) He married Mrs. Caroline (Bethea) Moore, widow of James Moore, in Claiborne County. They had five daughters, and he named them all four letter names. He had the Mississippi legislature change his name from Peter C. to Pinkard C. P. C. Hull and his wife are buried in the Hull-Moore cemetery which is located about two miles south of Hermanville on property now owned by James Sawyer.

42. There is a Bethea Family History, <u>Kinfolk</u>, which was compiled by Mr. Bethea of Dillon, S. C.

43. The home was built by P. C. Hull about 1870 for his family. He had lived in the Moore home and helped his wife raise her children by her first marriage. When they were grown, he turned their property over to them and built Hull Home for his family. The house was not too pretentious,



but it did have beautiful woodwork. It was one story. Across the front was a wide front porch which faced west. Large double doors led into a wide T shaped hall. The back of the hall, or the cross of the T was used as a parlor and sitting room. A large fireplace at the north end was used to heat it. Here was the roscwood plano, the whatnot, the love-seats, and the large mahogany secretary. Opening off the south end of the cross of the T wa an ell which consisted of a dining room and kitchen. (The main kitchen was in the backyare.) On either side of the stem of the T were two large oedrooms. Across the back of the house was a very wide porch. Out from the south end of the porch and connected to the porch by a covered walkway was a large room which was used for a schoolroom for the children of the family. Back some distance from the house was a smoke-house, a large barn, a blacksmith shop, a cotton gin, and a sawmill. In the back was also a large orchard, a garden, and a pecan grove.

44. The Moore-Hull Cemetery is located on what used to be the James Moore Plactation. It is about two miles south of Hermanville and is located on property now belonging to James Sawyer. There are markers for P. C. Hull and his wife. There are no markers for Katy (Hull) and James F. McCaleb. A C. S. A. marker is over the grave. The stones were destroyed by vandals.

45. The hone was "Hull Home"; the plantation was "Hull Place".

46. Ella (Clark) McCaleb is buried on the Clark lot in the Hermanville, Mississippi cemetery. A large tombstone marks her grave. Here her parents and brothers and sisters are buried.

47. Joel Sims Stegall was born 1853 at Selma, Alabama. He died 1916, age 63, in Copiah County, Mississippi. Mattye Alice (Colliers) Stegall was born at Bayou Sara, Louisiana, 1855 and died 1928 in Greenwood, Miss. Her father was ? Colliers and her mother's maiden name was Marrie Arelia Cheek. Joel S. and Mattye Alice (Colliers) Stegall are buried in a family cemetery about six miles west of Hazlehurst, Miss.

48. A picture and short biography of Katy McCaleb Headley appears in Who's Who in American Education and in Who's Who American Women. A portrait, given by a Senior Class, hangs in the Port Gibson High School auditorium.

49. The Old Headley Inn, located on U. S. Route 40 near Zanesville, Ohio, established by Usual Headley before 1802

50. Grover Cleveland Horn was born at Bay Springs, Jasper County, Miss. Etoila (James) Horn was born in Little Rock, Miss. At present they reside in Jackson, Miss.

51. The Ellis home is the home two miles north of Port Gibson and is the same house in which Clyde Hayes resides (1964).

MARY McCALEB married LARKIN WHITE

MARY McCALEB, daughter of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born June 16, 1779 in the Pendleton District of South Carolina. She was named for her paternal great grandmother Mary (Macdonell) McCaleb. She came with her parents to Claiborne County, Mississippi in the year 1799. She married LARKIN WHITE at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County Mississippi in 1803.¹ The Whites were an early and distinguished family in Claiborne County. Larkin White's father was Captain Thomas White, Jr., a Revolutionary soldier who served in the 6th North Carolina Regiment as lieutenant and later as captain and signed the Cumberland Association Pact. Larkin White's grandfather was Colonel Thomas White, Sr., a Revolutionary soldier who came to Claiborne County from Chester County, South Carolina. He served in the Mississippi Territorial Militia against the Indians when he was ninety years of age.² Larkin White's mother and grandmother White were both named Sarah.

Larkin White and Mary (McCaleb) White made their home on their plantation on Big Sand Creek in Claiborne County, Mississippi in the Rocky Springs area. She died in 1817 from the bite of a poisonous snake received while she was walking in her garden. She is buried near her father and mother in the Hermitage Plantation graveyard. The marker over her grave is a large talbe slab which covers the entire grave. It bears the inscription "Dear Mary". Larkin White died in 1820.4 (His will, probated in 1820, is in the Chancery Clerk's office, Claiborne County.)

After the death of theirparents the three White children spent much of their time at the Hermitage Plantation in the home of their Uncle Jonathan McCaleb.


I. LOUISA WHITE, denghter of Larkin and Mary (McCaleb) White, was born August 18, 1804 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. After the death of her parents she made her home at the Hermitage. She was educated at Elizabeth Academy, Washington Mississippi. August 18, 1824, on her twentieth birthday, she married LOUIS CRONLY at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County. He was a merchant in Port Gibson, Mississippi and was a native of Tullarmore, Kings County, Ireland, In 1834 the family moved from Port Gibson to Grand Gulf, Claiborne County, Mississippi. Louis Cronly died at Grand Gulf July 9, 1846 at the age of 46 years, and he was buried in the historic Grand Gulf Cemetery, Louisa (White) Cronly died September 5, 1887, aged 83 years and 18 days (tombstone inscription). She was buried in the Port Gibson

A. MARY CATHERINE "KATE" CRONLY, daughter of Louis and Louisa (White) Cronly, Was born July 15, 1827 in Port Gibson, Mississippi and died in Port Gibson January 28, 1865. She moved with her parents to Grand Gulf in 1834. She married RICHARD GOODE WHARTON, M. D. October 9, 1845 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. Dr. Wharton was born January 11, 1815 at Fine Creek, Powhatan County, Virginia, and he died July 23, 1896 in Port Gibson, Mississippi. He attended the University of Virginia for one year and graduated in medicine from Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. Dr. Wharton and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton lived at Grand Gulf from 1845-March 1851. From March 1851 to May 1851 they lived in St. Louis, Missouri. In May 1851 they moved to Port Gibson. In June 1853 they moved into they moved into the house which they had bought in St. Louis and had floated down the river to Grand Gulf and transported from Grand Gulf overland to Port Gibson. 7 The Whartons were Presbyterian, and Dr. Wharton was a ruling Elder. Dr. and Mrs. Wharton are buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

1. CHARLES DABNEY WHARTON, son of Dr. Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton, was born July 11, 1846 and died October 1, 1898 of yellow fever. He was organist in the Port Gibson Presbyterian Church. He married SUE JOHNSTON HOPKINS, who was born February 12, 1848 and died July 27, 1917.

a. <u>CHARLES RICHARD WHARTON</u>, son of Charles Dabney and Sue Johnston (Hopkins) Wharton, was born May 3, 1875 and died September 24, 1945. He was for some years town clerk of Port Gibson. He never married.

b. ENFIELD WHARTON, daughter of Charles Dabney and Sue



Johnston (Hopkins) Marton, was born September 14, 1881 and died September 2, 1941. She was postmistress of Port Gibson for many years. She never married.

c. <u>PAUL HOPKINS WHARTON</u>, son of Charles Dabney and Sue Johnston (Hopkins) Wharton, was born January 29, 1887. He married (1) Nancy Humphreys. She died and he married (2) ?. He is retired and resides on a small farm just north of Port Gibson. There were no children born to either of his marriages.

d. MARY WHARTON, daughter of Charles Dabney and Sue Johnston (Hopkins) Wharton, was born March 1, 1889. She is known as a very talented pianist and fro many years taught piano. She lives in the family home on Church Street, Port Gibson, Mississippi.

2. <u>HARRIET LOUISA WHARTON</u>, daughter of Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton, was born July 12, 1848 at Grand Gulf, Mississippi. She died September 26, 1922. She married ROBERT MOORE HASTINGS April 9, 1874 in Port Gibson, Mississippi. They were married by Dr. Zebulon Butler, earliest resident Presbyterian minister in Claiborne County. Robert Moore Hastings was born November 30, 1842 in Port Gibson and died May 23, 1879 in Port Gibson. Both Robert Moore and Harriet L. (Wharton) Hastings are buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

a. <u>RICHARD GRANDBERRY HASTINGS</u>, son of Robert Moore and Harriet Louisa (Wharton) Hastings, was born October 21, 1875 in Port Gibson, Mississippi. December 8, 1905 he married MARY AILEEN BAGNELL,⁸ a native of Claiborne County, Mississippi. She was born June 27, 1880. Richard G. Hastings and his wife spent their lives in Claiborne County. Their home is located at the south of Port Gibson near the city limits. Richard G. Hastings was employed as cashier of Port Gibson Bank until he died November 15, 1931. He is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

1). <u>RICHARD GRANDBERRY HASTINGS</u>, JR., son of Richard Grandberry and Mary Aileen (Bagnell) Hastings, was born in Port Gibson, Mississippi December 4, 1909. He married CHARLOTTE LOUISE STANLEY August 4, 1937. She was born in Columbus, Mississippi November 4, 1914. Richard Grandberry Hastings is employed as President of the Mississippi Southern Bank of Port Gibson. Two sons were born to Richard G. and Charlotte (Stanley) Hastings. The family is Episcopal and members of St. James Episcopal Church of Port Gibson. Charlotte (Stanley) Hastings died June 29, 1961 and is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

a). <u>RICHARD GRANDBERRY HASTINGS III</u>, son of Richard Grandberry and Charlotte (Stanley) Hastings, was born in Port Gibson, Mississippi March 14, 1941. He graduated from the Port Gibson High School and is now attending the University of Tulsa.

b). HERBERT STANLEY HASTINGS, son of Richard Grandberry and Charlotte Louise (Stanley) Hastings, was born in Vicksburg, Mississippi December 31, 1953. He lives eith his father in Port Gibson.

2). MARY ALICE HASTINGS, daughter of Richard Grandberry and Mary Aileen (Bagnell) Hastings, was born in Port Gibson, Mississippi October 19, 1912. She married DR. GEORGE V. ABRAHAM July 14, 1946. Dr. Abraham, a dentist, was born January 31, 1907 in Hermanville, Mississippi. He is the son of Michael and Martha (Simon) Abraham. The family reside in Port Gibson, Mississippi where Dr. Abraham practices his profession. Mary Alice (Hastings) Abraham is a talented pianist and is organist at St. James Episcopal Church. The family are all members of the St. James Episcopal Church.





3. <u>AUSTIN C. WHARTON</u>, son of Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton, was born June 22, 1850 and died August 3, 1917. He is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

4. CHARLOTTE INDIANA WHARTON, daughter of Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton, was born November 23,1852 and died February 21, 1929. She is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

5. LEWIS WHARTON, son of Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton, was born October 3, 1854 and died in infancy October 9, 1856. He is buried in the Port Gibson Wintergreen Cemetery.

6. LUCY WHARTON, daughter of Richard Goode and Mary Catherine (Cronly) Wharton was born May 4, 1860 and died of yellow fever August 10, 1885.



Gulf Cemetery.

D. <u>HARRIET LOUISA CRONLY</u>, daughter of Louis and Louisa (White) Cronly, was born November 9, 1836 and died January 15, 1844. She is buried in the Grand Gulf Cemetery.

E. LUCIUS HIGGINS CRONLY, son of Louis and Louisa (White) Cronly, died September 20, 1828, aged 5 years, and is buried in the Grand Gulf Cemetery.


II. <u>INDIANA WHITE</u>, daughter of Larkin and Mary (McCaleb) White, was born 1806 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. After the death of her parents, she made her home at the Hermitage until she married . April 15, 1824 she married (1) ALFRED FAULK of Tennessee at the Hermitage Plantation. Two children were born to this marriage. He died of cholera in 1832-1833. She married (2) HENRY H. HALL⁹ May 18, 1842 at the Hermitage Plantation, by Rev. Z. Butler ("Port Gibson Herald" May 25, 1843). By this second marriage there was only one child. Indiana Hall died May 9, 1846 and was buried in the Grand Gulf Cemetery. H. H. Hall served as Second Lieutenant in the Claiborne Volunteers in the Mexican War.

A. <u>CHARLES WILSON FAULK</u>, son of Alfred and Indiana (White) Faulk, was born July 28, 1825. He died September 26, 1833 and was buried at the Hermitage Plantation Cemetery. The Faulk or "Faulke" family are thought to have come from North Carolina. Thomas, John, James, and Joseph fought as patriots in the Revolutionary War.

B. WILLIAM S. FAULK, son of Alfred and Indiana (White) Faulk, was a captain in the army of the Confederacy. His Uncle Jonathan McCaleb willed him \$6,000.

C. JOHN ISBORNE HALL was the son of Henry H. and Indiana (White) Hall. His uncle, Jonathan McCaleb, willed him \$4, 000.

III. WILLIAM L. WHITE, son of Larkin and Mary (McCaleb) White, was born June 5, 1808. He died July 1822 and was buried in the Hermitage Plantation Cemetery.10

SAMUEL McCALEB married SARAH SMITH

SAMUEL McCALEB, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born February 16, 1782 in South Carolina. He came to Mississip i in 1799 with his parents. In 1806, December 20, he was franted 350 acres of land on Bayou Pierre adjoining that of his father. While visiting his brother, John McCaleb, at Pine Ridge he met Sarah Smith, the daughter of Richard Philetus Smith and granddaughter of Reverend Jedediah Smith of Granville, Massachusetts, who had come to Mississippi in 1776. (Rev. Jedediah Smith came with the Lyman group and settled on the Lyman Mandamus on Bib Black River in 1773. He was a Congregational Minister in Greenville, Massachusetts, and he was the father of ten children.) September 12, 1809 Samuel McCaleb and SARAH SMITH married in Adams County, Mississippi. "The Weekly Chronicle" of Adams County, September 16, 1809 states: "Married on Tuesday the 12th inst. on Second Creek, Adams County by Hon. Samuel Brooks -- Mr. Samuel McCaleb to Miss Sarah Smith, all of this county". Until 1816 they made their home in Claiborne County, Mississippi. In 1816 he sold some of their land in Claiborne County and moved his family to Feliciana Parish, Louisiana.² In 1817 he sold land in Claiborne County to his brother Jonathan McCaleb for \$1400. In 1840 he sold land in Claiborne County to J. W. John. These lands are described as lying on Bayou Pierre. In 1826 Samuel McCaleb represented West Feliciana Parish in the Louisiana legislature.³ He was named along with his living brothers as one of the administrators of his father's estate. He became a leading planter in West Feliciana Parish, and he owned many slaves. He was very generous to his children giving them much property and large sums of money before he died. Sarah (Smith) McCaleb died in 1838. Samuel McCaleb died December 18, 1843 in Feliciana Parish, and he and his wife were both buried in Feliciana Parish. His will is on record in Feliciana Parish, La.

DESCENDANTS OF SAMUEL AND SARAH (SMITH) MCCALEB

I. <u>ANN MARIE McCALEB</u>, ⁴daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCalob, was born in Claiborne County, Mississippi (Census Record). She married HON. SOLOMAN W. DOWNS May 30, 1830 in West Feliciana Parish, Louisiana. At one time he had tutored Lucinda Jane McCaleb, youngest daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb. Samuel McCaleb gave the couple a present of \$6450.00 December 27, 1837. Solomon W. Downs was at one time United States Senator from Louisiana. In 1853 Jonathan McCaleb willed \$3000.00 to his niece Ann Marie McCaleb. Soloman Downs belonged to the prominent Downs family of Ouachita Parish, Louisiana. In 1843 Soloman Downs and Ann Marie (McCaleb) were living in Ouachita Parish. Two children were born to this marriage. She died April 28, 1857.⁵

A. <u>SAMUEL ALFRED DOWNS</u> was the son of Soloman W. and Ann Marie (McCaleb) Downs.

B. SARAH MARY DOWNS was the daughter of Soloman and Marie (McCaleb) Downs.

II. THADDEUS CONSTANTINE McCALEB, son of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb, was born in 1812 in Claiborne County, Mississippi.⁶ His Uncle Jonathan McCaleb willed him \$6000.00. The census of 1850 states that he was a planter and worth \$6,000, and that he owned 13 slaves. He married DORINDA C. ? They were not married in West Feliciana Parish, and her maiden name is not known. The census of 1850 does show that she was born 1822 in Louisiana. Thaddeus C. McCaleb died October 1, 1853. Ho left a will leaving all that he owned to his wife and children.



A. THADDEUS McCALET, son of Thaddeus and Dorinda C. McCaleb, either was grown and had left home or was deceased in 1850, as his name does not appear on the census of 1850 in West Feliciana Parish.

B. <u>SAMUEL W. McCALEB</u>, son of Thaddeus and Dorinda C. McCaleb, was born in 1841.7

C. CATHERINE E. McCALEB, daughter of Thaddeus C. and Dorinda McCaleb, was born in 1843 in Louisiana.

D. WILLIAM A. McCALEB, son of Thaddeus C. and Dorinda Mc-Caleb, was born in 1848 in Louisiana.

III. <u>WILLIAM BRIGGS McCALEB</u>, son of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb, was born in West Feliciana Parish, Louisiana in 1816.² Samuel McCaleb gave his son William Briggs a gift of \$3000.00. Jonathan McGaleb, his Uncle willed him \$5000.00. Samuel McGaleb stated in his will that William Briggs McCaleb was not temperate and was given to wasting his property so he left his inheritance in trust with Soloman W. Downs as trustee. May 6, 1845 William Briggs McCaleb married ELIZA PARKER in Ouachita Parish, Louisiana. In 1882 he sold land there.



B. <u>SARAH ANN FORT</u>, daughter of William Briggs and Mary Marie (McCaleb) Fort, was a minor in 1043. She was educated at a convent. Soloman Downs was her guardian. Her unclo, Jonathan McCaleb, willed her \$3000.00



V. <u>ALFRED McCALEB</u>, son of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb, died before 1843 without issue. Samuel McCaleb's will reads: "To my sisterly friend Mrs. Ben Smith my son Alfred's watch".

VI. <u>SAMUEL SCOTT McCALEB</u>, son of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb, married JANE M. BROWN in West Feliciana Parish, Louisiana July 11, 1844. He willed all of his worldly goods to his wife. He died May 1, 1849.

VII. LUCINDA JANE McCALEB, daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1828. Soloman Downs was tutor for her and Samuel Scott McCaleb. In 1850 she was 22 years old and was head of the house (Ouachita Parish) and Samuel McCaleb age 6 years was living in the same house.

ANN McCALEB married JOSEPH LOGAN BRIGGS

ANN McCALEB, daughter of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born May 24, 1784 in South Carolina.l She came to Mississippi with her parents in 1799. November 17, 1808 she narried JOSEPH LOGAN BRIGGS² at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. He was born May 8, 1780, and he was the son of Samuel and Mary (Logan) Briggs of Kentucky. (Samuel Briggs Will was dated May 27, 1792. Wife Mary (Logan) Briggs and son, Joseph. Kentucky Pioneers and Court House Records by McAdams, p. 49.) The Briggs family were closely related to the Todd family of Kentucky. Joseph Briggs owned land on the North Fork of the Bayou Pierre adjoining lands of Jonathan McCaleb. He was several times Sheriff of Claiborne County.³ Ann (McCaleb) Briggs died April 6, 1823, and Joseph Briggs died September 1830. Both are buried in the Hermitage Plantation graveyard.

Ann (McCaleb) Briggs and her children made visits to her brother Jonathan McCaleb at his Mosguito Plantation on Lake Washington, Washington County, Mississippi. St. John's Episcopal Church records, Washington County, state that the "young Briggs sang in the Choire".

II. <u>DAVID TODD BRIGGS</u>, son of Joseph Logan and Ann (McCaleb) Briggs, was born November 27, 18154 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. David and Joseph Briggs probably made their home at the Hermitage after the death of their mother. Jonathan McCaleb was especially fond of David Todd Briggs and willed him \$7,000.00. March 31, 1847 David Briggs married MEHITABLE MELVIN in Claiborne County, Mississippi March 31, 1847 (Bible Record). She was born July 15, 1829.4 He died July 6, 18512 and was buried at the Hermitage Plantation graveyard. Two children were born to David Todd and Mehitable (Melvin) Briggs. The widow married (2) WILLIAM LARKIN FAULK, son of Joseph Faulk, June 20, 1855. William L. Faulk was a Confederate soldier, and for many years he was Sheriff of Jefferson County, Mississippi. Several children were born to this second marriage. Alfred, Harry Hall (Henry Hall), Melvin Monroe, Emily.


A. <u>MARY LILLIAN BRIGGS</u>, daughter of David Todd and Mehitable (Melvin) Briggs, was born July 3, 1849° and died March 1934. She married CHARLES EDWARD JOHNSON December 24, 1877.° Charles Edward Johnson was the brother of Clara Johnson who married Alfred Faulk.

Briggs married BIRDIE PORTER February 2, 1875. David Todd Briggs, Jr. moved to Texas when he was about twenty years old. He lived at Georgetown, Texas and then at Lampasas County, Texas. After the War between the States, the Briggs family, like many other southern families, lost all of their wealth, and David T. Briggs, Jr. began life as a school teacher. Later he became a farmer. Birdie (Porter) Briggs was still living on the farm or ranch, which was located a few miles from Lampasas, Texas as late as 1945. David Briggs died May 9, 1896.

(Porter) Briggs, lived at Lampasas, Texas. He married and had a family. He died 1949.



George Lake had been married previously to Malinda Ann McCaleb, daughter of Louis James and Caroline (Buck) McCaleb, and first cousin to Matilda Jane Briggs. (Malinda Ann lived only a short time after her marriage.)

George and Matilda Jane (Briggs) Lake had three children. Deed records of Claiborne County show that Jonathan Mc-Caleb made a deed of gift to Matilda Jane (Briggs) Lake and her three children. This gift consisted of lots in Grand Gulf, Mississippi. At this time Grand Gulf was a thriving river town. The gift also included at least twenty slaves.

A. MATILDA T. LAKE was the daughter of George and Matilda Jane (Briggs) Lake.

B. ALICE LAKE was the daughter of George and Matilda Jane (Briggs) Lake. She married STEPHEN F. SMITH January 21, 1854 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He is buried at the Cold Springs Plantation Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. His tombstone states that he was born October 23, 1829 and died November 18, 1886 and that he was a lieutenant in the army of the Confederacy.

3. GEORGE LAKE, JR. was the son of George and Matilda Jane (Briggs) Lake.



JONATHAN MCCALEB

JONATHAN McCALEB, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born in the Pendleton District, South Carolina December 16, 1786.1 At the age of eleven years he came to Mississippi when his parents emigrated from South Carolina to the Natchez District of West Florida and settled on the north fork of Bayou Pierre in what is now Claiborne County, Mississippi. Jonathan McCaleb was afflicted with a club foot about which he was sensitive but never morbid. He, like his brothers, was an educated and Christian gentleman. There are at least two portraits of Jonathan McCaleb in existence. Both were painted by Thomas Healy, an artist and portrait painter of some note.² Jonathan McCaleb inherited all of his father's estate with the understanding that any of the family who needed financial aid was to get it, but that the bulk of the property would be held together until it had increased enough in value or until Johathan McCaleb thought it wise to divide it. Jonathan McCaleb increased the value of the property and acquired and in-creased the slaves. He also bought land of his own in Claiborne and Adams counties. When the Mississippi Delta was opened to settlers he acquired a very large plantation known as "Mosquito Flantation" and another plantation in the Delta near Glenn Allen which he called "Greenfield Plantation". To visit and oversee these plantation he traveled by horse or carriage from the Hernitage to Grand Gulf and there took a river boat to the Delta. Greenfield Plantation consisted of 244 acres and brought \$110,000.00 when it was sold after his death. The negroes from this plantation sold for \$40,650.00, and the equipment brought \$9,032. Jonathan McCaleb became one of the wealthiest men in the rich section where he lived. It is estimated that at one time he owned about 30,000 acres of land, and at his death he left \$134,000.00 in cash to his relatives. During his life, though he never married, he always had several nieces and nephews living in his home. He gave large sums of money, slaves, plantations, and lots to the less fort-unate members of his family in his life time. He willed the Hermitage Plantation to his nephew Theodore Howard McCaleb. Although he was beloved by his family for his generosity and lavish gifts, it was his kindness and gentleness and fairness which endeared him to each member of the family. He believed in the Church and a deed of gift in Washington County, Mississippi shows that he gave four acres of land on Lake Washington on which to erect St. John's Episcopal Church. The materials for this church were imported. He left a yearly income to his Episcopal minister and a lump sum seem to the minister's daughter. Jonathan McCaleb died April 11, 1853 at the Hermitage. He was buried in the

Hermitage cemetery and his grave like most of the other graves is covered by a large table top marble slab, and the sides are bricked in to make a vault.

JANE MCCALEB

JANE McCALEB, daughter of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born April 22, 1789 in the Pendleton District, South Carolina. She came to Mississippi in 1799 with her parents. She never married, and she made her home at the Hermitage with her parents until her death, March 31, 1813, aged 25 years, and she is buried in the Hermitage cemetery alongside her parents.

MATILDA McCALEB, the youngest child of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born in the Pendleton District of South Carolina February 23, 1793. There seems to be little doubt that she died in South Carolina before her parents came to Mississippi in 1799.4

FOOTNOTES

1. Dates of birth and death can be verified in the Captain William McCaleb Bible and by the inscription on his tomb-stone.

2. One is owned by Mrs. Katy McCaleb of Port Gibson and the other by William McCaleb of Carlisle, Mississippi.

3. Dates of birth and death were taken from her tombstone and from the Captain William McCaleb Bible.

4. The Captain McCaleb Bible lists birth, marriages, and deaths in chronological order. Matilda McCaleb is listed as the first death. The date was burned off when the Bible partially burned. In Captain McCaleb's will Jane McCaleb is mentioned as the youngest living daughter. There is no tombstone at the Hermitage for Matilua McCaleb as there is for each other child.

FAMILY RECORDS-FROM THE WILLIAM AND ANN (MACKEY) MCCALEB BIBLE.

The following sworn statement by Alfred Francis McCaleb, along with photostatic copies of the remains of the Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb Bible are in the possession of Katy McC. Headley, Port Gibson, Mississippi.

"I have in my possession a family Bible published by Phoenix N. Wood & Company of Baltimore, John D. Toy, Printer. The date of publication is not shown but it was prior to 1864 because some of the family entries in the gandwriting of my grandfather, Theodore Howard McCaleb, who died in that year at the Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County, Mississippi. The direct entries in that Bible concern him and his wife, children and descendants. With this Bible, however, is a family record from an older Bible. My father, Dr. Jonathan Howard McCaleb, brought both Bibles, along with numerous other books and records, from the old Hermitage Library to my mother's family home at China Grove Plantation, near Lettersworth, Pointe Coupee Parish, Louisiana, in the 1890's. About 1900 China Grove House burned and most of the library was destroyed including most of the older Bible. Some of the family record from the old Bible was salvaged and attached hereto is a photostatic copy of that old family record which I have in my possession.



She had them brought and placed in the side yard of Peachland where they were when the above inscription was copied. K. McC. H. has been trying (1963) to get Mrs. Louise Henderson's heirs to agree to remove the stones to the Hermitage Plantation cemetory, Claiborne County, Miss.

HISTORY TOLD IN OLD LETTERS AND LEGENDS

EXCERPTS FROM A GENEALOGY COMPILED BY DR. JAMES FOULHOUZA

MCCALEB

"William McCaleb, or McKillop, as the name was originally spelled, was born in Invernesshire, Scotland, 1715, son of the Highland Chieftan, William McCaleb and his wife, Mary McDonnell of the clan McDonnell. His father fought at the battle of Preston-Moor. He fought with his major clan McDonald at the battle of Culloden 1746. Being pursued by the army of William Duke of Cumberland, he fled to Ireland with his consort, Sarah McAlpin, daughter of Chief McAlpin and immigrated from Dublin, landing in Charleston, province of South Carolina in the same year.

"William McCaleb and his family settled with the exiled followers of Bonnie Prince Charlie in the south of Saluda in Pendleton District, South Carolina. He died in 1775. His son, William McCaleb, pioneer, soldier and legislator, was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina 1747. He fought under General Marion and Pickens in the American Revolutionary War, commanding a company of Hussars or Horse of the 91st Militia, South Carolina Line. He participated in the battle of Camden, Eutaw Springs, 96 and the siege of Charleston. After the war he represented the South of Saluda with his colleague, General Wade Hampton, in the South Carolina convention that ratified the Federal Constitution. Captain McCaleb married Ann Makey, a South Carolina heroine of the Revolutionary War, whose clan colors are Blue and Green, like those of the Marquis of Lorne. They migrated in 1798 to the Spanish province of Florida, Natchez District, settling on the Big Bayou Pierre, Claiborne County, Mississippi where they established the Hermitage Plantation. He died in 1813 and is buried on that plantation."

The above was included in a letter to Mrs. Katy McC. Headley by Dr. McCaleb. It was written only a few months before his death.

THE OLD SLAVE'S STORY

Loud and clear across the mountain Came the shrill blast of the bugle Winding, warbling through the walley, And the Tories paused and listened; Listened to that danger signal



For an instant there in silence. "Marion's men?" they quickly shouted; At the word of their commander Every man sprang to his saddle; Every coward of them trembled At the thought of Marion's vengence, Should his brave men dash upon them.

One, relenting, drew his sabre As he passed the swinging figure, Cut the rope-the childish body Swayed, and fell before his mother With a dull dead thud of horror, Like the first clods on a coffin; Then his old black nurse rushed wildly, Pressed him closely to her bosom Saying, "Bless Gawd, he's livin' I can feel his heart a beatin' Jis' a tremble-but I kin feel It." Then she bore him to his chamber While his mother followed after-

Followed like a dreaming woman Walking in the land of slumber. Far adown the verdent valley Lying eastward of the mountains, Came the gallant men of Marion With their brave and daring leader Bearing down upon the Tories. Right and left they came upon them, Taking not a single capture, For their War-cry was "no quarters" And few indeed were living When their vengence had been sated.

One or two crawled through the bushes Bleeding, weakly seeking shelter; On their hands and knees they groveled, Making slow and painful headway, From the bloody field of battle. When the gory struggle ended, And the valley with its ghastly Load of death and blood was littered, Then the gallant General Marion Called his valiant men about him Gave them sad and gloomy orders-

For the dead must all be buried And the living must attend them-Then he rode in silence onward,

To the homestead of McCaleb With his loved and loyal Captain Riding swiftly on beside him. When they reached the grand old Mansion There were lights in all the windows; Many forms were flitting past them In the hurry of excitement.

McCaleb's foot scarce rested On the broad and open door-way When his wife rushed out to meet him Falling senseless on his bosom. When the eyes of little David Opened up to life and reason, His father knelt beside him-Weeping, sobbing on his pillow. The childish fingers rested Softly on the soldier's temple, And the first words that he uttered Were-"I did not tell them, Father, I did as mother bade me; I would have died to save you".

Then they all knelt there about him Knelt in silence, thanking heaven For the son spared to the father Through the courage of the mother, And his own undaunted spirit. Not a whispered word was spoken,-Words seemed meaningless and idle, While this saintly, baby hero Rose above them, grand and lovely; Dwarfing all their boasted courage With the greatness born within him Like the Christ in the Temple There among them crowned with glory. ***********

An hundred years have blossomed Borne their fruitage, and have fallen And those war clouds long have vanished From the peaceful skies above us. Little David, loved and honored, Grew to bright and happy manhood. Left his father and his mother And his home in South Carolina; Sought the rolling Mississippi In the vale of Bayou Pierre. Brought a fair young wife beside him, Sons and daughters grew about him Strong and manly, sweet and pleasing;

Peace and plenty crowned his hearthstone Filled his years with happy measure.

From the broad old-fashioned windows Of the mansion that he builded, One can see the gleaming marble Of his tomb upon the hill side. Trees he planted bend above him Like a silent guard of honor Where six generations slumber Of the grand race of McCaleb.

Old Simon's voice grew fainter, Fainter still, as darkness gathered; And the children listened-listened-Crept up to him, leaned upon him But the silence and the darkness Wrapped him closely like a mantle-The old man had told his story And he died there as he told it.

The above was copied by Mrs. Katy MoC. Headley from the "Port Gibson Reveille" of May 19, 1921. Mrs. Mary (Hunt) McCaleb was married (1) to David McCaleb III, son of Edwin McCaleb. For some years the couple resided in Vicksburg and later moved to Texas. She became a poetess of some note.

EASTER ON THE NATCHEZ TRACE

On April 17, 1808, which happened to fall on Easter, many people along the Natchez Trace in Jefferson and Claiborne Counties celebrated the great feast of the Resurrection. Those living in the Bayou Pierre valley of Claiborne County met at Grindstone Ford. Those of the Cole Creek area in Jefferson County met at Church Hill where Christ Church now stands. Pine Straw was hauled to these places so that the heavy dews of early morning would not wet the boots and shoes of those coming for the celebration. They began coming on Easter Eve and continued through the next day. Some stopped at the Inns of old Granville and of Grindstone Ford, while others spent the night with friends nearby. They came on foot as well as on horseback; a few came in carriages and covered wagons.

Usually the roads were very good from Natchez to Grindstone

Ford on the Natchez Trace, and they were surely lively with vehicles and pedestrians that Easter Eve and Easter Morn. They brought food for breakfast and dinner on the grounds.

As time came to dress the men parted their hair in the middle, wore knee breeches, cotton or silk stockings with buckled shoes, and triangle hats. The women were in colors that brightened the day, long to be remembered and talked about.

Just as the sun was beginning to rise, the people assembled with their fronts to the east. They bowed their heads in prayer and just as the sun arose, lifted their faces to heaven while singing Easter hymns such as 'Christ the Lord Is Risen Today' and 'Angels, Roll the Rock Away'. There was no instrumental musical but there was depth and sweetness in their songs.

Many of the dresses worn on this occasion were of silks and brocades. Especially was that true of the gentle Green women of 'Springfield'. The most colorful were those worn by the Scotch lady descendants of the Highland Clans; for the tartans and kilts had lasted for three centuries longer than any other native costumes among the different races of Europe. After the Battle of Culloden 1746, the English Parliament prohibited wearing of the Scotch garb in order to punish those yet faithful to the Jacobite cause--at last lost forever.

The mention of tartans and plaids is made of the ladies who wore them because they were descendants of the followers of Bonnie Prince Charlie. So on Sunday at Church Hill, on that particular Easter, Mrs. James McIntosh was clad in red squares with brown, green, and blue chiecks with blue lines of the clan McIntosh. Mrs. D.McGillivray in red ground with small squares of dark blue and green with narrow blue lines of the clan McGillivray.

Mrs. William McDougal of the McDougle clan in brown, green and red backgrounds with green and white narrow lines. Mrs. Isaac Ross represented the clan Ross in red squares with brown, blue and green lines. Mrs. James Magruder, corrupted from the clan McGregor, in large green and red squares with a broad white line. Roby Roy of this clan had alternate checks of red and black, peculiar to his own. Mrs. James Stewart of the Royal Stewarts in red, dark blue and black with a fine white line crossing the plaid. Mrs. James Cameron had on a red and blue with broader white lines of the clan, Cameron of Lochiel. Mrs. Willis Mc-Donald in dark blue, dark green and light green small

squares with narrow lines of the clan McDonald.

All these clanswomen wore the blue bonnets without peaks at the Church Hill Easter day.

At Grindstone Ford, Mrs. E. Frazer was attired in the tartan of the clan Frazer, having very broad red squares with small blue and green checks and narrow bands with narrow white plaid that cross the background of red. Mrs. Duncan McLean was dressed in tartan similar to the Stewarts with small white squares and a double white line of the clan McLean. Mrs. Hector McNeill, Mrs. James McMillan, also Mrs. John McGill were in yellow and red squares with narrow red lines and red squares of the clan McMillan. Mrs. H. McDonnell was in blue, green and black with red and white lines of the clan McDonnell. Mrs. William McIntyre was in broad blue and green squares with narrow red and white lines. Mrs. William McCaleb or McKillop (as originally spelt, a sept. of the clan McDonald) was dressed in her MacKey clan colors of blue and green, similar to that of the Marquis of Forne. She wore a cone pointed hat with a blue veil streaming behind her headdress; Mrs. John McCaleb was in her husband's grandmother's clan MacAlpin tartan of green and blue with yellow and white lines and was the best dressed woman in the Natchez Country.

After the battle of Culloden a great number of Highland clans were corruped in name to escape the fury of the Duke of Cumberland's soldiers.

A preaching service was held at ten o'clock that Easter Day by Rev. James Thomson. He had come by coach, carrying three other passengers. He wore a scarlet coat, knee breeches, silver buckled shoes and a tricorn hat. The people were amazed that a preacher would be clad in such clothing and they were provoked to gossip. Soon, however, he exchanged this for sombre black with a clerical collar having two cut pendulants of white escaping down his chest. He did not read a text, but his sermon was, 'He is Risen' and he added another text found in John VIII-44, so he said, and he said it was not necessary to read it. The verse begins, 'Ye are of your father the devil'. He was a fine looking young man and had a fine delivery. Just before the service was over he passed the plate himself. The men dropped their coins in with emphasis, but the women kept their purses closed.

Many of the guests remained at Wooldridge Inn for the dancing and games the following day, Monday. The Rev. Thomson was not at the supper table. Upon rising the next morning.

and the second sec

the ladies discovered that their purses had been robbed all their monies had been taken from them. Since Mr. Thomson was nowhere to be found on the Matchez Trace, they suspicioned him all the more. They wondered if he was a robber.

The Highland Fling and Irish gigs were in full flavor at the dances Monday night. The men played curling in the morning, but instead of ice they used pine straw on the rinks. The winners urged on with fierce Highland yells.

Night fell and the people were still having fun. A traveler alighted to join the crowds They informed him of the robbery by the sanctimonious preacher. This traveler inforthem that this preacher was none other than James Thompson Hare, a robber and a successor of the bold highwayman of the Natchez Trace, Samuel Mason; moreover, that he had been perfecting thefts from New Orleans to Baltimore, and his victims were usually women. No doubt the pilfering was done in revenge on the women for having withheld Easter contributions,

As the years rolled by the Sunrise Easter service fell into disuse, for innumerable churches had sprung up all along the Natchez Trace in both town and country, thus passed away into memory and tradition one custom and spiritual feature of pioneer life in the Sou hwest which had color and distinction all its own.

This above account by Jos, Foulhouza McCaleb was found among his old papers. The original is in the possession of William McCaleb, Burnsmore Plantation, Carlisle, Mississippi and was copied for K. H. by Mrs. Wm. McCaleb.

LETTER CONCERNING FARRAR FAMILY

The following letter was written on the business stationery of E. Howard McCalol, Attorney at Law, 164 Common Street, New Orleans, May 17th, 1893. The original letter is in the possession of Alfred Trancis McCaleb of Past Christian, Mississippi, who sent Mrs. Katy McC. Headley a photostatic copy. The letter follows:

My dear Ned:

The following were the inscriptions on our greatgrandfather's and great grandmother's tombs in the Cold

Springs burying ground. The tombstone was broken by the falling of a tree upon it, and it ought to be replaced by us.

"Erected to the Memory of Colonel Thomas Farrar, Born October 1, 1754, Died August 24, 1833

"Erected to the Memory of Margaret Farrar, Born March 4, 1750, Died November 8, 1830.

Cousin Fred Farrar writes me: "Our common ancestor, my grandfather, your great-grandfather, Col. Thomas Farrar, was either born in Pendleton, S. C., or came there from Virginia at a very early age. He married Miss Margaret Prince. They both died at your grandfather's (David McCaleb) house between 1830 and 1833. He was a Revolutionary officer, rising to the grade of Lieutenant-Colonel, and was in command of Fort 96, in 1783, at the close of the war. He served principally under General Pickens, of South Carolina. He was at the fights of Charleston, Savannah, and either Guilford Court House, or the Cowpens. I forget which, and besides engaged in inumerable brushes with the Tories.

Your paternal grandfather, William McCaleb, was a brother Captain serving in the army at the same time." Mrs. C. R. Byrnes writes: "In old family conversations

Mrs. C. R. Byrnes writes: "In old family conversations with Aunt Lucinda Hankinson (born Farrar, daughter of Col. Thomas Farrar), she told me that the family lived there (Pendleton District, South Carolina) as far back as she could remember; and that the Farrars too, lived nearby; also Jeff Davis' father. And she often recalled the time she met old Joe Davis at the stile, where the path led from her father's field into the Davis's field, or pasture. Nor did she deny that he made love to her. The Davis family sold out, and her father, Col. Thomas Farrar, bought the property, the Davis family going to Kentucky.

In The War of the Revolution of South Carolina, by David Ramsey, published at Trenton by Isaac Collins, in 1785, Vol. 2, page 393, note 4 to page 40, there appears among the list of the wounded officers, in the attack on the Lines of Savannah, on the 9th October, 1779, the name of Thomas Farrar".

I write these facts to you in order that you may preserve them for your children.

WILLIAM FARRAR MARRIED CICELY JORDAN

The following is extracted from a letter from Dr. James Foulhouza McCaleb to Dean Ella McCaleb of Vassar College.

"In colonial Virginia William Farrar and one Stephen Pouley courted a Widow Cicely Jordan. They both became engaged to her at the same time. She married William Farrar in preference to Rev. Pouley. Thereupon the rejected suitor sued her for breach of promise. The suit was tried and the minister lost his cause. It created such a furor among the people of Virginia that the colonial council passed a law prohibiting any woman from being engaged to two men at the same time. And this law has never been repealed. And I may add that in the Southern states no man yet has won a breach of promise suit in its courts."

The above letter was dated December 19, 1931. Miss Ella McCaleb's home was in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She was of the Pennsylvania McCaleb family. For some years she was Dean of Vassar College.

EARLY CHURCHES ATTENDED BY McCALEBS

THE STONE MEETING HOUSE AT HOPEWELL, SOUTH CAROLINA

From: To Live the Dream by Pearl Smith McFall, p. 32. Comet Press Books, New York, 1953.

"The first church at Hopewell 1789-90 was built of logs and was soon destroyed by a forest fire. It was built on land donated by (Printer) John Miller, who gave sixteen acres of land for a church and cemetery. The site of the first church is marked.

"The Stone meeting House", as the next church was called, was built by popular subscription about 1797-1802 on the same tract of land. It stands an enduring monument to its founders: General Andrew Pickens, General Robert Anderson, George Reese, William Steele, <u>Captain McCaleb</u>, Major Taylor, Mr. Neale, Mr. McGuffin, Handy Owens, Mr. Whitner, Mr. Calhoun, General Earle, and John Miller. The seats and pulpit were given by General Andrew Pickens."

This was a Presbyterian meeting house near Pendleton, S. C. In the churchyard is a cemetery. Many of the early graves are marked with field stones and have no inscriptions. General Pickens is buried here. No graves bearing tombstone inscriptions are McCalebs.

THE OLD BRICK CHURCH, PINE RIDGE, ADAMS COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

This church was an early Presbyterian church in Miss. James son of John McCaleb, for a time was a ruling elder in the church.

CHURCH OF THE EPIPHANY

"The Church was organized in 1843 at "the McCaleb settlement" about 5 miles northeast of Hermanville on the road to Utica and Jackson. A Dr. Styles and the McCalebs seem to have been among the founders. Twenty acres of land was obtained and a church, school, and rectory were built. James S. Greene was teacher of the school and priest to the Church. The church was consecrated by Bishop Otey April 19, 1844. A 3350 organ was installed in 1849, but I have no record of its being a memorial. The church had 22 communicants in 1852 and in 1860, for example, Bishop Green con-

firmed 9 whites and 5 colored persons there. The parish languished after the Civil War but continued. The address by then was usually given as St. Elmo, the name of the nearest railroad station and post-office.

In the 1880's a mission was organized at Hermanville by Bishop Thompson and the members of the Old Church at St. Elmo or the McCaleb settlement. The Church building was even taken down and the materials used at Hermanville.

A few graves and foundation stones were all that I could find at the original site of the Church when I visited it about 5 years ago. The site, as mentioned, is about 5 miles from Hermanville and on the left-hand side of the road as one goes to Hermanville to Utica."

The above material concerning Epiphany Church was derived from the Journals of the Diocese of Mississippi.

My father, James Franklin McCaleb, Jr. thought that Epiphany originally stood about where 13 Highway intersects with the county road leading to Old St. Elmo Station and the plantation Valley of the Moon. K. M. H.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH

t

"This Church was originated in 1844 by Bishop Otey and G. G. Skipworth and other planters of the Delta. Early services were held in a temporary frame Church on Lake Washington. The Rev. William T. Leacock was the first rector, and the Church was received into the Diocese in 1848. In the 1850's a brick Church and a rectory were built on the south end of Lake Washington. This building was consecrated April 5, 1857. The building was defaced and made unfit for use during the Civil War, but services have continued at one place or another--at present, I believe, in a brick, union church used by various denominations."

The above material concerning St. John's Episcopal Church was derived from the Journals of the Diocese of Miss.

ST. JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH

(Copied from <u>Mississippi</u> by Federal Writers Project, published by the Vicking Press, N. Y. pp. 356-357.)

"Right our from Glen Allen on a narrow paved road are the ruins of St. John's Episcopal Church, completed 1857, the first Episcopal structure in the Delta. The group of planters who settled around Lake Washington in the 1800's were of English descent, some of them were English born, extensive land owners in older Southern States, they had come to Mississippi in the boom times, and from the proceeds of the sale of their former holdings, had invested in the fertile acres of what were then known as the Mississippi Bottoms. The mansions they built are the remaining evidence of their prosperity. To them in 1844 came Bishop Otey of Tennessee, and the fruit of his visit was the gift by Jonathan McCaleb of five acres of land to be used as a site for the church and a glebe.

In October 1852, at which time the families which leave that region in summer generally return to their plantations, the building was begun. There was delay because of the necessity to import material from England and an organ for the wilderness. When the church was dedicated 1857, the services were stopped by a snow storm.

Slaves were given their own gallery, and the richly carved chancel, pulpit, and altar were fashioned by the negro sexton, James Cromwell, who was buried from the church, and was afterwards given a place in the adjacent cemetery. After the War between the States, the Church began to decay, and a cyclone completed the ruin. Still evident is the outline of the corner tower with circular brick windows webbed with vines. Its design is based upon that of the English Gothic. The Church yard still bears the name of "Greenfield", the plantation of Jonathan McCaleb. In its well kept enclosure, a number of Iron crosses mark the graves of Confederate dead."

DAVID MCCALEB SAMPLER.

(Mrs. Cornelia Regan Clarke gave this information to K.M.H.)

Matilda Eveline Metcalf Hammett made an exquisite sampler. She embroidered it herself. It has the names of her father and mother, David and Matilda (Farrar) McCaleb, and the dates of their births. She also embroidered, on the same sampler, the names of the children of this couple and their birth dates. This sampler is still in her family.

"HISTORY OF ST. JAMES CHURCH" by Grace G. Everman and Lavisa D. Fort, pages 167-168

"Jonathan McCaleb"

"Jonathan McCaleb was born December 16, 1786, the son of William McNeal and Mary Ann McCaleb. As a lad of twelve he was brought by his parents to what is now the Southern part of Mississippi while it was still under Spanish rule and known as West Florida.

William McCaleb, according to the inscription on his tomb on "Hermitage" plantation in Claiborne County, was born 1747, fought in several battles in his native state of South Carolina, as a captain in the Revolutionary War, and was a member of the South Carolina convention which ratified the Federal Constitution.

Of the children of William and Mary Ann, David married Matilda Farrar and their daughter, Evelina Matilda, married Albert Metcalf. A number of their descendants are now members of St. James' church in Greenville. Ann McCaleb, another daughter of William and Mary Ann McCaleb, married 1808, Joseph Briggs. Mrs. Briggs spent part of her time in Washington County as home maker for her brother, Jonathan McOaleb, who was unmarried. The "Young Briggs" who are mentioned as members of the Choir of St. Johns' Church at one time were presumably her grandsons. There was a David I. Briggs who owned land in Washington as early as 1838.

Jonathan McCaleb, at the time of his death on April 11, 1853, was 67 years of age. As he was unmarried he left his large estate to be divided among his brothers and sisters. His will is on file in Claiborne County, where he had large holdings. His lands in Washington County, which he had acquired as early as 1829, were during his life time known as "Mosquite Point", but at a later date came to be known as Greenfield Plantation. This property when sold in the late 1850's consisted of 2444 acres of land which brought \$10,000; the Negroes brought \$40,650, and the plantation equipment \$9,032.

The Deed of Gift of about four acres of this land to St. John's Church was drawn in 1852, but no month or day is mentioned in the deed. It was recorded in Washington County on May 7, 1853, nearly four weeks after the death of the donor. Apparently the deed was drawn in Claiborne County as not one of the three witnesses was a Washington Countian".

EXCERPT FROM THE CIVIL WAR JOURNAL OF BISHOP GREEN

"Tuesday (February 5th 1861) Accompanied by Rev. (Frederick W.) Damus, I reached Diamond Plantation, the residence of Mr. Laughlin, and preached that day to his family and servants and a few of his neighbors. Seven of his servants were at the same time confirmed. In preparing them for this holy rite, much pains had been taken not only by the Rev. Mr. Damus, lately in charge, but by the pious and zealous lady whom they are privileged to call their mistress."

Diamond Plantation was located a few miles south of Vicksburg. It was willed by General Joseph Davis, brother to the President of the Confederate States of America, to his daughter whose first husband was David McCaleb, Jr. and whose second husband was Mr. Laughlin.

DEED: W. MARSHALL (GRANTOR) TO WILLIAM McCALEB. DATED June 27, 1799. Deed Book A. pp. 246, 247,248, Natchez, Miss. THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

Know all men by these present that I, William Marshall of the city of Charleston in the State aforesaid in consideration of the sum of one thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars to me paid by William McCaleb of Pendleton County in the state aforesaid have granted, bargained sold and released, and by those present do grant, bargain, sell and release unto the said William McCaleb all that Plantation or Tract of land situated, lying and being in West Florida containing nine hundred and fifty acres East from the Milk Clift on the River Mississippi about eleven miles.Bounded on the west by a Tract of 20,000 acres surveyed unto Governor Brown, and the other side by vacant lands, granted to Barnard Litot on the 4th day of August by Peter Chester the then Governor of West Florida which said tract was conveyed by the said Bernard Lintot to William Marshall Esq.-Father of the said William Marshall Party here unto on the 9th and 10th days of August 1777. Also all that other Plantation or Tract of land containing six Hundred acres (being part of the original grant of 1000 acres) situated on the South Branch of Fairchilds' Creek about twelve miles northeastwardly from the old Fort at the Natchez Butting and Bounding the East Line on land granted to Captn. Thomas Boyd, north by land surveyed for Thomas Collins Junr and vacant land and East by vacant land and South by land surveyed to Elizabeth Augusta Carrigue and Mary Ogden, which said Tract of Land was granted on the 27th day of March 1777 by Peter Chester Governor of West Florida to William Marshall Esqr. Father of said William Marshall Party here unto together with all and singular the rights members Herediaments and appurtenances to the said Premises belonging, or in any wise incident or appertaining To have and to hold all and singular the Premises before mentioned, unto the said William McCaleb his Heirs and assigns forever. And I do hereby bind myself, my heirs Executors and Administrators to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said premises unto the said William McCaleb his heirs and assigns against me and my heirs and against every person who s ever lawfully claiming, or to claim the same or any part ther of-Witness my hand and Seal this twenty seventh Day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Ninety nine, and in the twenty third year of the Independence of the United States of America. McKeys (Mackays) were numerous along the North Carolina border and many of the Scotch emmigrants by the name of McKay resided in the old Cheraw District, which at one time bordered on old Bladen and Cumberland Counties in North Carolina before Robeson County, North Carolina, which separated Bladen and Cumberland from South Carolina and old Cheraw District, was formed.

Immigrant Lists-No McCaleb shows in the list 1762-1772. It will be rather expensive to check the Council Journals without an index Before 1762 to see if William McCaleb shows as landing in Charleston circa 1746.

Land Grants from the King-No McCaleb shows in the Royal Land grants. No memorial tax return made on Royal grants by original owners or by purchasers show for any McCaleb or like spelling.

Oct. 26,1787 William McCaleb collected for John Conner of Abbeville. Aug. 23 and Oct. 26, 1787 William McCaleb collected for W. Bretor or Breton.

BOOKS AND NEWSPAPERS

"THE LOUISIANA SUNDAY REVIEW", December 23, 1894 and December 30, 1894 featured The McCaleb Family in America. This article states that Captain William McCaleb's father "was a member of a Scottish Highland family which gave many brave chiefs and soldiers to Scotland in the past", and that William McCaleb fought at Culloden for Bonnie Prince Charles After the battle of Culloden William McCaleb and his wife came to America and settled in the Pendleton District of South Carolina. The article states that Captain William McCaleb, son of William McCaleb, served the cause of Independence as Captain of a company of Hussars at Cowpens, Guilford Court House, Eutaw Springs, and Ninety-Six. He was a member of the South Carolina Convention which ratified the Federal Constitution. The rest of the article has to do with the descendants of David McCaleb. There are pictures of David McCaleb, Laura McCaleb Simonds, Theodore Howard McCaleb, Mr. and Mrs. E. Howard McCaleb, Thomas McCaleb, and T. Wharton Collens.

<u>A HISTORY OF MISSISSIPPI</u> by Robert Lowry and William H. McCardle, published at Jackson, Mississippi by R. H. Henry and Co., 1891, p. 458. This history has this to say: "Among the early settlers were David, James, John, Samuel, and Jonathan McCaleb, all natives of South Carolina and sons of Captain William McCaleb, an officer of the Revolutionary War."

THE TULANE NEWS BULLETIN. Vol. II, May 1931, Number 8, Published by the Tuland University of Louisiana, New Orleans La. This bulletin gives a biography of Theodore Howard McCaleb. The bulletin states that Theodore Howard McCaleb's great grandfather, "William McCaleb (or McKillip, as the name was originally spelled), after taking part in the battle of Culloden, 1746, in behalf of Bonnie Prince Charlie, fled to Ireland for refuge and in 1747 emigrated to South Carolina. His grandfather, William McCaleb, served as a captain in the American Revolutionary army, was a member of the South Carolina convention that ratified the federal constitution and in 1787 moved to the Spanish province of West Florida and settled in the Natchez District.

His father, David McCaleb was high sheriff of Pendleton District, S. C. and moved to the Mississippi Territory in 1802." The rest of the article deals with the career of Theodore Howard McCaleb, who served as judge of the United States District of Louisiana and who was a member of the law school faculty of the University of Louisiana. Later he served the University as professor of admiralty and international law and then as president.

BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL MEMOIRS OF LOUISIANA, Vol. II, Published 1892. This is a biography of Edwin Howard McCaleb. It verifies the service of William McCaleb at Culloden, and the military service of Captain William Mc-Caleb and Colonel Farrar in the patriot army which fought for Independence in the Revolutionary War.

THE DICTIONARY OF AMERICAN BIOGRAPHY, Vol. II, pp. 560-561 This biography of Theodore Howard McCaleb verifies the military service of William McCaleb at Culloden. It states that William McCaleb fled Scotland after the defeat of Bonnie Prince Charlie and went to Ireland. From Ireland he emigrated to South Carolina. The article states that Theodore Howard McCaleb's grandfather William McCaleb, son of William McCaleb, served in the Revolutionary Army and was a member of the South Carolina Convention which ratified the Federal Constitution.

THE LOUISIANA BOOK, 1894

BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL MEMOIRS OF MISSISSIPPI, Vol. I, Published by the Goodspeed Publishing Company of Chicago in 1891. Page 1170. This biography is of Dr. William Collins McCaleb, son of James F. and Sophie (Moore) McCaleb. He was grandson of John and Maria (Collins) McCaleb. The biography states that "Capt. William McCaleb, the great grandfather of Dr. McCaleb, was a native of Maryland, where he married Caroline Calvert, who was a native of Maryland." The biography also states that "John McCaleb was born in Claiborne County, Mississippi", and that he was educated as an engineer. The biography states that William Collins came to North Carolina from Ireland.

(This is the beginning of the error that William McCaleb married Caroline Calvert of Maryland. Captain William McCaleb married Ann MacKey in South Carolina. This is proven by their tombstone inscription and by their family Bible. The father, William McCaleb married Sarah MacAlpin before they left Scotland in 1746.) (John McCaleb, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) Mc-Caleb, was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina.

BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL MEMOIRS OF MISSISSIPPI, 1891. Published by The Goodspeed Company, Chicago. This biography of Jonathan McCaleb Martin, names his parents, his sisters and brothers, and gives his military service in the War between the States.

FAMILY RECORDS MISSISSIPPI REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS compiled by Alice Tracy Welch and published by the Miss. Society of D. A. R., pp. 186-189. This record states that Captain William McCaleb was the son of William and Sarah (McAlpin) McCaleb and that he was born in Pendleton County, South Carolina in 1747. The record gives the military service of Captain McCaleb, the date of his marriage to Ann MacKey, and the birth and death dates for Ann MacKey. The children and grandchildren of Capt. William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb are named. This record states that William Neil McCaleb, son of Captain and Ann McCaleb, was born November 17, 1780 and that "Another record says 27 Nov. 1770", and that he had children.

WILKERSON AND ALLIED FAMILIES by M. M. Wilkinson of Shelby, Mississippi. Mrs. Wilkinson relates the ancestry of Caroline Calvert. She says that Caroline Calvert was born in Maryland in 1730 and that in 1747 she married William McCaleb, who had emigrated to America from Scotland in 1747 after the battle of Culloden. She claims that William McCaleb, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, was born November 27, 1780. The rest of her work has to do with the descendants of William (who she designates as William III) and his wife, Rhoda Gordon Wood. She states that William III settled near Richmond, Virginia.




