ORIGIN OF THE NAME McCALEB¹

FROM THE CITY LIBRARIAN, THE MITCHELL LIBRARY-Glasgow, Scotland

McKillop is a corruption of the Gaelic Mac Fhilib, son of Philip (See: Surnames of Scotland by Dr. George F. Black, New York, 1946).

From The Catholic Highlands of Scotland by Don Blundell, p. 139: "Another family of influence were the Mcdonalds of Sherrabeg. They were originally M^oKillops, but took the name Mcdonald on their marrying into the Keppoch family."

From Douglas Thompson of the SCOTS ANCESTRY RESEARCH SOCIETY, 4 N. St., Edinburg, Scotland: JOHN McKILLOP is the only McKillop mentioned as being a prisoner in the '45 Rebellion. John, whose home was in Sterling and who was a malster, was in prison of Linlithgow and Leith for about three weeks in 1747 and was liberated July 2, 1746.

Surname of McKillop has never been common. The name was derived from the Gaelic Mac Fhilib, son of Philip. Some were said to belong to the Campbells of Dunstaffnage, the others to Macdonald of Glencoe and Macdonell of Keppoch.

But who the Philip was who first gave the name is now unknown. The asperation of the "f" in the genitive case causes it to disappear. Philip is originally a Greek personal name (Phillippos) meaning "Horse Lover". Some of these names are said to have been standard bearers to the Campbells of Dunstaddnage. Others are included in the Septs of MacDonalds of Glencoe and of MacDonnells of Keppoch, and "MacKillop" also occurs as a surname in Arran.

FINLAIUS MacPILIBB, priest of the Diocese of Argyll, is in record in 1433 (Pa. Lett. VIII, p. 470), and in 1437 JOHN, son of FYNLAUIS PRIORIS MacPHILIB, appears as perpetual vicar on Kilcalmonell. (Santi Colmanelli) in Cnapdul (ibid p. 625). WILLIAM McKILLOP, a follower of the Earl of Cassilis, was respited for murder in 1520 (REE., I 3386). DONALD M^oGILLIP is mentioned in 1532 (MaGregor, I, p. 87). ROBERT MakILLIP was a witness at Penkill, Ayrshire in Bond of Manrent in 1547, CHARLOCHT M^oKILLIB was a witness at Iill of Lochtay in 1649 (BBT. p. 185, 189), and DUNCAN M^oGILLOP in the Kirkstone of Weeme is in record in 1692. MAKELLOP 1509. The name is also current in the abbreviated form MacGILP. A family of

this name took the name MacDoneld on their inter-marrying with the Keppoch family (Blundell, The Catholic Highlands, 1909, p. 139). The Gaelic "Motto" of the Family "Cadai Cha'n Aom Air Fear Faire" is of Twentieth century.

McKillip and McKyllap 1692. See also Mac Gilip.

COAT OF ARMS

Both English and Scotland Families of McKillops had a coat of arms.

THEORIES AND TRADITIONS--McCalebs

Descendants of William and Sara (McAlpin) McCaleb, who came to America 1746, say that their ancestors came from Invernesshire or "near Inverness" Scotland.

Descendants of John McCaleb of Orange, North Carolina say that their ancestor John, his brother William McCaleb, two brothers, came from Loch Aber, Scotland. John settled in North Carolina, and William settled in South Carolina.

Mrs. Hermie Hauger of New London, Ohio said that Dr. James McCaleb of Carlisle, Mississippi wrote the following information to Miss Ella McCaleb, of the Pennsylvania McCalebs: Four brothers came together from Scotland by way of Dublin, Ireland. They landed on the Carolina Coast. One of these brothers was married to Sarah McAlpin, daughter of Highland Chief McAlpin, and they settled in South Carolina. Two brothers settled in North Carolina. One of these brothers went West and married an Indian woman, and one remained in North Carolina. One brother settled in the Connellsville Basin (Fayette County), Pennsylvania.

A "McCaleb", of the Pennsylvania family, who was living in California wrote to K. McC. H. in 1950 that Miss Unis McCaleb, who was working on McCaleb genealogy, said that all McCalebs in America originated from Mill Run, Pennsylvania.

The Virginia family of McCalebs descended from Joseph McCaleb thought their ancestor "McCaleb" and a brother came from Scotland by way of Belgium to Pennsylvania.

Most McCaleb families claim kinship with Robert Bruce and the Stuarts of Scotland.

Most McCaleb families agree that McCalebs, McCalops, McKillops, McKalebs, and like spelling were kin, but that the McCALIPS were a different family.

WILLIAM NEIL (McKILLOPE) McCALEB 1715-1775
From Scotland to South Carolina

WILLIAM McCaleb, of Scotland, and his Descendants:¹

WILLIAM McCaleb, whom tradition says lived in Invernesshire, Scotland, married MARY (McDONELL) McDONALD of the Keppoch Clan. He is said to have fought at Preston-Moor under the leadership of the major clan McDonald of Keppoch.

WILLIAM NEIL (McKILLOP) McCaleb was born 1715 in Scotland. He fought at Culloden with the major Clan McDonell. Because the army of William Duke of Cumberland was hunting down the followers of Bonnie Prince Charles, William Neil McCaleb married SARAH McALPIN, daughter of Highland Chieftan McAlpin, and they fled to Dublin, Ireland. (Tradition says that they eloped). From Dublin the couple sailed the same year (1746) to Charleston, South Carolina. They moved inland from Charleston and settled with other exiled followers of Bonnie Prince Charles. It is thought that this was in the vicinity of Lancaster County South Carolina. "Neil McKillop" appears in 1766 as a member of Adam Alexander's company of militia in the Indian Wars. (Adam Alexander lived in that part of Mecklinburg County, North Carolina which became Cabarrus County).²

WILLIAM McCaleb, son of William Neil and Sarah (McAlpin) McKillop, was born 1747 and died March 7, 1813 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He married ANN MACKEY in South Carolina October 23, 1769. She was born 1748 and died October 10, 1821 in Claiborne County, Mississippi.

William McCaleb served as Captain in the patriot army in the Revolutionary War under Generals Marion and Pickens. He commanded a company of Hussars or Horse of the 91st Militia, South Carolina Line. He participated in the battles of Camden, the Cowpens, Eutaw Springs, Ninety-Six, the seige of Charleston, and Guilford Court House.

William McCaleb and his family were living in the Pendleton District of South Carolina in 1784, next door to General Pickens and General Robert Anderson. William McCaleb and Wade Hampton represented the South of Saluda District at the South Carolina Convention which ratified the Federal Constitution. (Elliott's Debates on the Federal Constitution, Vol. IV, p. 239). In 1799 William McCaleb and his family moved from the Pendleton District, S. C. to Mississippi settling on the Bayou Pierre, Claiborne County, Mississippi. William McCaleb became a leading planter in Mississippi and served as a member of the territorial legislature of Mississippi. He and his wife are buried on his Hermitage Plantation, Claiborne County, and a double marble tombstone covers their graves.

WILLIAM AND ANN (MACKEY) McCALEB had the following children:

- I. WILLIAM NEIL McCALEB, b. August 8, 1770 in S. C. and died in S. C. 1790-1813. Unmarried.
- II. LOUIS JAMES McCALEB, b. February 1772 in S. C. and died in Miss. Feb. 1823. Married (1) PAMELIA TRIGG (2) Mrs. CAROLINE BUCK.
- III. DAVID McCALEB, b. April 2, 1774 in S. C. and died March 4, 1850 in Miss. Married MATILDA FARRAR Nov. 20, 1794 in S. C.
- IV. JOHN McCALEB, b. March 12, 1777 in S. C. and died Aug. 18, 1823 in Miss. Married MARIA COLLINS July 22, 1805 Jefferson Co., Miss.
- V. MARY McCALEB, b. June 16, 1779 in S. C. and died 1817 in Claiborne Co., Miss. Married LARKIN WHITE
- VI. SAMUEL McCALEB, b. Feb. 16, 1782 in S. C. and died Dec. 18, 1843 in Louisiana. Married SARAH SMITH Sept. 12, 1809 in Adams County, Miss.
- VII. ANN McCALEB, b. May 24, 1784 in S. C. and died April 6, 1823 in Miss. Married JOSEPH BRIGGS Nov. 17, 1808, Claiborne Co., Miss.
- VIII. JONATHAN McCALEB, b. Dec. 18, 1786 in S. C. and died April 11, 1853 in Miss. Unmarried.
- IX. JANE McCALEB, b. April 22, 1789 in S. C. and died March 31, 1813 in Miss. Unmarried.
- X. MATILDA McCALEB, b. Feb. 23, 1793 in S. C. and died before 1799 in S. C. Unmarried.

Dates of birth, marriage and death of Capt. William McCaleb, his wife, and children, are from the William McCaleb Bible and from Tombstone Inscriptions. Bible is owned by A. F. McCaleb of Bay St. Louis, Miss.

It seems logical to suppose that Capt. William McCaleb had brothers. James McCaleb of Cabarrus County, N. C. evidently was a brother. Archibald McCaleb who settled from S. C. to Knox County, Tenn. may have been a brother. John McCalop, Rev. soldier from N. C. may have been a brother.

ARCHIBALD McCaleb

(Soldier in the Revolutionary War)

From South Carolina to Knox County, Tennessee

ARCHIBALD AND MARY (?) McCALEB OF SOUTH CAROLINA AND
KNOX COUNTY, TENNESSEE.

ARCHIBALD McCALEB, a native of South Carolina,¹ served in the American Revolutionary War as a patriot.² He married Mary or "Polly" (?) about 1786 presumably in South Carolina. Archibald McCaleb, along with Colonel Campbell, their families, and one other man who assisted them to move, settled Campbell's Station (Fonta Campbell) in what is now Knox County, Tennessee, arriving at that place March 7, 1787.³ (See account of this settlement by David Campbell in which he describes their hardships). Soon other settlers joined the McCalebs and Campbells at the Station. In this wild country lived John Sevier, who at least once brought help to Fonta Campbell. Fear of the Indians was constant at Fonta Campbell. They received little or no protection from the North Carolina government. It was seven years after the settlement was made before the settlers felt safe to leave the fort and move on to their lands.

When war was declared with England in 1812 most of the grown men of Fonta Campbell joined the army. Goodspeed says that fifteen members of the McCaleb family fought in the War of 1812.⁴ Archibald McCaleb died in 1813 at the head of Turkey Creek, Knox County, Tennessee, while on his way with the army to fight the Creek Indians. (Goodspeed).⁵

Robert Tunnell and William Campbell, Esqrs. were commissioners to settle the estate of Archibald McCaleb. In 1819 the estate was settled. At that time Mary McCaleb was living. Living children of Archibald and Mary McCaleb who shared in his estate were: Samuel, John, James W., Andrew,⁶ and Polly McCaleb, Rosegill Wells, and sons-in-law, John Hagler, John Ewen, and Evan Evans.

DESCENDANTS OF ARCHIBALD AND MARY McCALEB:

ANDREW McCALEB,⁸ son of Archibald and Mary McCaleb, was born on Christmas Day, December 25, 1788 in Fonta Campbell Station. He served in the War of 1812 and was in the Battle of Horse-shoe Bend. He married ANN BOYD in Knox County, Tennessee October 8, 1814. She was a native of Pennsylvania and came to east Tennessee with her parents when she was eight years of age. Andrew and Ann (Boyd) McCaleb had nine children.

About 1828 Andrew McCaleb and his family moved to Roane County, Tennessee. Five years later they settled in Rhea County, Tennessee where he died July 9, 1860. He was a successful farmer and in politics he was a Whig. Ann (Boyd) McCaleb was a devout member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. She died in Rhea County, April 30, 1853. Of the nine children born to Andrew and Ann (Boyd) McCaleb, only two were living in 1887.

I. ARCHIBALD McCALEB,⁹ son of Andrew and Ann (Boyd) McCaleb, was born in Knox County, Tennessee November 11, 1818. He was known to his family as "Arch". He grew to be six feet four or five inches tall. He received such education as the schools of the day afforded. By continuous reading and close observation he gained considerable knowledge. He became a leading farmer in the second district of Rhea County where he resided for over fifty years. He was an enterprising and prosperous farmer and improved the property which he inherited. In 1837 he was engaged by the Government to assist in removing the Indians to Arkansas. November 2, 1848 he married NANCY J. GIBSON, daughter of Hiram and Mary (Stockton) Gibson, in Knox County. She was born June 11, 1826, seven miles south of Decatur, Meigs County, Tennessee. Two children were born to Archibald and Nancy J. (Gibson) McCaleb. Both died in infancy in Roane County. Archibald McCaleb was too old to fight in the War between the States, and he had to be satisfied as a member of the Home Guard.

II. ANDREW McCALEB, son of Andrew and Ann (Boyd) McCaleb, was born in Knox County, Tennessee. He married ELIZABETH STORK April 3, 1856 in Roane County, Tennessee.

POLLY McCALEB, daughter of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, was mentioned in the settlement of her father's estate in 1819. August 5, 1811 she married ISAAC JONES in Knox County.

JOHN McCALEB,¹⁰ son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, served in the War of 1812. He enlisted June 23, 1812 and served as Private under General Johnston and Captain Oban, 36th Infantry.

He enlisted November 13, 1814 and served under Colonel Rouhton and Captain Newman. In 1819 John McCaleb shared in the settlement of his father's estate. The census of 1830 (Knox County) shows John McCaleb 40-50 years of age, a wife 40-50 years of age, one son 10-15 years of age, five daughters 5-20.

HIRAM McCaleb, son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, served in the War of 1812. He enlisted May 13, 1812 and served in Lt. Col. Philip's Infantry. He enlisted June 23, 1812 and served under General Johnston, Captain Oban in the 36th Infantry. He did not share in his father's estate in 1819, so he is assumed to have been dead then. He may have been killed in the war. He does not appear in any other Knox County record.

ALFRED McCaleb, son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, enlisted in the War of 1812 November 23, 1814 and served under Colonel Coche and Captain Dalton in the Infantry. He died January 18, 1815.

SAMUEL McCaleb, son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, was born 1794 in Knox County, Tennessee (See Census of 1850, Hamilton County, Tennessee). He served in the War of 1812. He enlisted September 20, 1814 and served under Major Chiles, Captain Conway. He shared in his father's estate in 1819. He married JANE SMITH in Knox County, Tennessee May 5, 1818. She was born 1797 (1850 Census of Hamilton County). Between 1830-1840 Samuel McCaleb and his family moved to Hamilton County, Tennessee, where they appear on the 1850 Census. According to the census of 1830, of Knox County, and the census of 1850, Hamilton County, Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb must have had four sons and six or seven daughters.

- I. WILLIAM McCaleb, son of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, died very young.
- II. ELIZABETH McCaleb, daughter of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1820 in Knox County, Tennessee (Hamilton County Census 1850).
- III. ADDISON McCaleb, son of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1830 (Census 1850, Hamilton County). He fought for the Union in the War between the States and was killed. The place of death is unknown.¹¹
- IV. CLEMINTINE McCaleb, a daughter of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1836 (Census 1850, Hamilton County). She was baptized in the Pleasant Grove Presbyterian Church, Knox County, Tennessee May 10, 1835.
- V. JANE McCaleb, daughter of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1838 (Census 1850, Hamilton County).
- VI. JAMES THOMPSON McCaleb,¹² son of Samuel and Jane (Smith) McCaleb, was born 1819.

VII. SAMUEL McCALEB, JR., son of Samuel and Jane (Smith)

McCaleb, died August 17, 1849.

VIII. CHARLES CASSIDY McCALEB, son of Samuel and Jane (Smith)

McCaleb, was born in Tennessee. He married ELIZABETH GARDENHEIR, who was one-eighth Cherokee. He served as Lt. Col. in the U. S. Army in the War between the States. He served in the Fifth Tennessee 23rd Army Corps, Brig. Gen. Jacob D. Cox and 3rd East Tenn. Brigade, Brig. Gen. James G. Spears. He was a large slave holder, but he did not believe in secession. His cousins are said to have fought for the Confederacy. He died at his farm near Chattanooga in 1864.

A. ADDISON FOX McCALEB, son of Charles Cassidy and Elizabeth Gardenheir McCaleb, was born January 10, 1861 and was an only child.¹³ He moved to the Indian Territory in 1871. There he married IDA HARWOOD. She was born in Shelbyville, Indiana and died in Bartlesville, Oklahoma 1916. Addison Fox McCaleb died June 19, 1943 in Phoenix, Arizona.

I. CHARLES GARNETT McCALEB, son of Addison Fox and Ida (Harwood) McCaleb, was born April 22, 1897 in Lenepa, Oklahoma. He married MILDRED HANNA.

a. JAMES McCALEB is the son of Charles Garnett and Mildred (Hanna) McCaleb.

b. CHARLES GARNETT McCALEB, JR., is the son of Charles Garnett and Mildred (Hanna) McCaleb.

c. JOHN CAMERON McCALEB is the son of Charles Garnett and Mildred (Hanna) McCaleb.

JAMES N. McCALEB,¹⁴ son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, received a child's share of his father's estate. He does not appear on any census of Knox County as head of a family. He may have been James Newton instead of James W. On the other hand, he could be James William and the same person as William, Fifer in War of 1812.

Census of 1830 shows James N. McCaleb, 30-40 years of age, living in Campbell County, Tennessee. He had a wife 20-30, 2 sons under 5, and 1 daughter under 5.

Census of 1849 shows James N. McCaleb living in Roane County, Tennessee. At this time James N. was 40-50 years of age, his wife 30-40, two sons under 5, two sons 5-10, one son 10-15, 1 daughter under 5, and one daughter 15-20.

Descendants of Charles Cassidy McCaleb say that he had a brother Newton¹⁵ who settled in Arkansas and a brother, John, who went to Illinois.

WILLIAM McCaleb, son of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, enlisted in the War of 1812 and served in Captain Uraih Allison's Company as Fifer. (See Wells's History of Roane County, page 37.)

ROSEGILL McCaleb, daughter of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, was married to ? WELLS. In 1819 she shared in her father's estate.

? McCaleb, daughter of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, shared in her father's estate in 1819. She married JOHN HAGLER

? McCaleb, daughter of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, married JOHN McEWEN. She shared in her father's estate in 1819

? McCaleb, daughter of Archibald and Mary (?) McCaleb, married EVAN EVANS. She shared in her father's estate in 1819.

UNIDENTIFIED McCALEBS OF KNOX AND ROANE COUNTIES, TENNESSEE

JOHN McCaleb appears on the 1850 Census of Knox County as age 21, born in Tennessee and living in the home of William Hope (P. 383, House 845-889)

ANDREW McCaleb married ELIZA STORK April 3, 1856 in Roane County.

GEORGE McCaleb appears on the 1850 Census of Knox County. He was 18 years of age, born in Tennessee and living in the home of Walter Christian and his wife, who were born in Virginia.

EMILY McCaleb appears on the Census of 1850 in the home of Walter and Jane Christian. She was 17 years of age and was born in Tennessee.

CAMPBELL STATION, TENN.¹⁶

by

Judge David Campbell of Campbell Station, Tenn.

"Pleasant Grove, Wilson County, Tenn., July 4, 1829

"Dear Sir:

"I now take up my pen to comply with your request in giving you a statement of the first settling of Campbell Station in east Tennessee and the incidental events occurring. On the 7th day of March in the year 1787 Mr. Archibald McCaleb and his family with myself and family and one other man, who we got to assist us to move, arrived at the place. We erected a Camp for a Shelter for our family, and in the course of a few days built two small cabins, one for each family. In the course of a week or ten days after we took possession Alexander and David Campbell and their families came to the place and a while after them, Jonathan Douglass and family came also. We had but one man to each family. We built one or two small cabins and commenced clearing land. And planted as much corn as we could get done in time- Some time after we had gotten our corn planted and was working it, we discovered that there was signs of Indians in the woods about us- (No other settlement being nigher than nine or ten miles) We thought it best to be on our guard lest their intention might be hostile and kept our guns near us when we were working our corn- One day two of the men were from home and the other three of us were working our corn near the cabbins with our guns by us-There was two guns fired about two or three hundred yards from us over a rise or

low ridge- We first thought we would go and try to see who it was-but on further reflection concluded that it might be a scheme of the Indians to drqw us off from the cabbins so that they could have easy access to plunder or to do as they pleased and we went and stayed with the families to guard them- The next day they gathered up all our horses fourteen head about five hundred yards from the cabbins about the middle of the day and took them off- Crossed the Tennessee River.

John Martin an Indian Country man, and George Fields a half breed who lived in Chucky met them about eight miles from where they took the horses and came and informed us but we could not raise men to follow them. There was about twenty of the party of Indians- and but five of us- One of the horses that was taken was a two years old Stud colt of as good blood as any in the western country- A short time before he was taken I gave three hundred acres of first rate lands for him- Shortly after our horses were taken we discovered where a part of the Indians had him themselves behind logs trees and blinds at the time the two guns were fired quite on the other side of the cabbins within about one hundred and twenty yards which fully convinced us that their object was to take the advantage of us if they could have the chance of doing it without much risk.

This was a trying time with us- We had not a horse to go to Mill- the nighest being about thirty miles from us- fifteen above where Knoxville now is- Captain John Baird who lived some distance up the country above us- and where the country was much thicker settled- heard of our situation raised a company of men came down to see us, and we ranged the country between the Rivers Holston and Clinch for a few days- in order to drive off the Indians should there be any remaining- We now concluded to move our families up to Captain Amos Byrds who a short time before had settled with his family and a few more families about six miles above us on the River Holston and got the assistance of Capt. Baird and his company to help us to take our families and property to River about two miles and from there we went up by water in canoes to Byrds- While we were there we tried to work our crops of corn as well as we could at the Station but could not get them well attended and had but sorry crops- Those of us who had lost our horses went several times up to the Indian Towns on the Tennessee River and had not a horse to ride- Went on foot and waded the Holston and Tennessee rivers- Got the Indians to meet us at Chota where we held several talks with them on the subject of our horses- We tried to hire them to search for our horses and offered a considerable reward if they should find them and bring them back to us but none of them would undertake it- They said it was Creeke Indians that took our horses and they were afraid of them-however we heard two or three years afterwards of some of our horses being in the lower Towns of the Cherokees but

never got them- We moved our families back to the Station late in the fall- Gathered our corn through the winter and prepared for raising a crop the next season- Some of us had procured some horses to work and go to mill. (One being erected where Knoxville now is). We had gotten our crops of corn planted and a tolerable prospect of working them- but about the latter part of June or beginning of July the Indians killed Kirks family in the part of the country that is now Blount county- this circumstance opened a new scene of difficulties to us- a party of men who lived above where Knoxville now is when they heard of the murder being done raised and came on down to the station with intention of going down and distroying the Indian town on the south side of the Tennessee River a small distance above the mouth of the Holston- When they came to the Station we were rather opposed to our going as we had some hopes the matter could be settled without coming to an open war- but they could not be prevailed upon to decline their enterprise- and insisted on some of us to go with them from the Station- Several of us went some by water taking down in canoes to take the rest of us over the River- it was daylight before we got into the Twon- any that were there took the alarm when we approached the Town and fled- the orders were not to injure the women and children- all that was done one fellow got severely wounded and a woman and child killed.

Susanne the wife of John Martin and Mother of George Fields and her family we saved and did not let them be interrupted as Suzanne had been uniformly friendly to the white people from the commencement of the revolutionary war several times giving them notice when any plot was in the agitation against them- we conceived it right to favor her and family- Soon after we returned home from this little expedition an open war being now expected the general of the Brigade gave orders for several of the Frontier stations to break up and join others to strengthen them and promised to give them aid- Our Station was directed to join White Station where Knoxville now is- which we did- This summer of Fall Brigadier General Joseph Martin commanded an expedition against the Cherokees of the lower Towns had a skirmish with the Indians on the end of the Lookout Mountain where the road crosses it- after we returned home from this campaign, we began to prepare to move back to the station and in the latter part of the fall we took possession of it again and never broke up any more.

The Assembly of North Carolina this year (1788) passed a law authorizing a small company of men to be raised to be continued one years in service if not sooner discharged by the Governor for the protection of the frontier and families moving through the wilderness to Cumberland- and authorized the commanding Colonels of Sullivan Washington Hawkins and Green to carry this law into effect by appointing the officers to raise

and command the men and appoint the place the company should be stationed- it so happened that our Station was the place the company be fixed and I was appointed to raise and command it- the company was not to be over thirty three privates- I tried to raise the men but never could succeed in raising the whole of them perhaps about half- but with what I raised we built some Block houses and other houses as we needed and some stock-ading- we made a very good fort-however the company was discharged by Governor of North Carolina a considerable time before the years was out- in all time that we were under the Government of North Carolina which was about four years or nearly that length of time before we became a territorial Government we had but very moderate protection- when the militia were ordered out for our protection the commissary could very seldom furnish any thing to support them and would get the families to take them in and board with an expectation and promise of the commissary making a return of their rations to government and drawing pay for them- Whether the returns were made or not or whether government refused to pay I never learned- but I know in the four years just before the Holston Treaty that some of us would have from three to six or eight at a time boarding with us several months in the year- that we never got a cent for but we were glad to meet with protection on almost any terms altho this made bore very heavy upon us- after the Territorial government took place it was quite otherwise- we were well protected and paid for everything we could expect government had a right to pay us for- the number of families increased after we got a good fort built- about the time the Territorial Government took place was about ten or twelve families in the station- from the second year after we settled the place untill the Holston Treaty took place we experienced a kind of half peace half war- and indeed the same scene took place and kept on shortly after the Treaty- the Indians frequently stealing our horses and leaving some of us without any- about two years after the Holston Treaty the Indians became rather more troublesome- frequently killing and stealing horses in different parts of the country- Col. John Sevier marched about six or seven hundred men down to the frontier and camped at Ishes Fort on the south side of the Holston River about five miles from Campbells station- while this army were encamped there the Indians raised an army of perhaps fourteen or fifteen hundred when they came to the Tennessee about fourteen or fifteen miles below our station- they sent spies Double Head and his brother the Pumpkin Boy to view Sevier's encampment in the night- they came so near to where the sentry stood that he shot and killed the Pumpkin Boy- about the same time another spying party went up as far as Cavetts about half way between our station and Knoxville and stole a horse from Cavett and came back by (illegible) and took a horse out of the field about the middle of the day without being discovered till some hours after and the second night

after taking these horses the army of Indians passed along up within about four or five hundred yards of our station went on to Cavits and destroyed them all- burned the houses and went across the country to Clinch River burning some houses as they went along- we did not know of their passing along untill the next morning when we found their trails where they marched along- we concluded at least two thousand- and that their views was to take Knoxville and then return by us and take the station on their way back- we immediately sent two of our men on two of our best horses to inform Col. Sweyn and request (help). There was just eleven men of us in the station at the time (Some being from home). We unanimously concluded to try to defend the place while we were able to shot a gun. The most were good guns and tryed soldiers- each man had two gun muskets and an excellent Rifle. All well loaded and redy by his syand- we fixed everything in as good order as we could- filled all our vessels with water- least they might attempt to set the houses on fire and then watched for their coming with anxiety- every moment expecting to see them coming- until toward evening a party of men from Knoxville who had heard of Calvits family came to the place to see what was done- and when they came there They concluded to ride down to our Station to see what had become of us- the indians crossed Clinch River went down and recrossed the Tennessee below the mouth of Clinch- dispersed and went home without being checked- Col. Sevier commanded an army of Militia into the Indian country in the fall season had a skirmish with them and killed some of them and destroyed some of their towns- there was still a kind of partial warfare with the Cherokees untill the Nichijack campaign which put an end to the war with that nation- We were confined to the Station for about nine years before we could settle safely out on farms-"

"Mem:- this valuable statement was written by Col. David Campbell of Campbell Station, Tenn.- and given by his grandson Gen. W. B. Campbell of Carthage, Tenn.-"

The above account of the founding of Campbell's station was written by David Campbell in his own hand writing. The paper is very old and had been written on before. David Campbell turned the paper sidewise and wrote over the old writing. The original account may be found in the Archives of History-Wisconsin.

Archibald McCaleb was a member of the Militia in the War of 1812. He was killed on Turkey Creek while fighting the Indians. It is said that 15 McCalebs fought in the Battle of Horseshoe Bend. (See Arch. McCaleb-Goodspeed).

Col. Sevier had a plantation on the Nolichucky River.

Col. Arthur Campbell fought Indians in Tennessee during the American Revolutionary War.

Col. William Campbell was of the Virginia Militia-Revolutionary War.

Evan Shelby went down the Tennessee River during the Revolutionary War and burned Chickamauga and destroyed Indian towns on that river.

Isaac Shelby, son of Evan, "smoke smeared face and red rimmed eyes who glared about him fiercely, whom the Cherokee hated with a wild and vengeful hate", Isaac Shelby was reported by the Indians to be more dangerous than his father.

The Evan Shelby family married into the James McCaleb family of Cabarrus County, North Carolina.

JAMES McCaleb married SARAH (?).

JAMES McCaleb first appears on the records of Cabarrus County, North Carolina 1784. From that date until 1827 he is on record as holding land on Rocky River and Coddle Creek. Some of his land touched the old Barony line.

Descendants of James McCaleb's daughter, Mary (McCaleb) Wiley¹ claim that James McCaleb was born 1744 in Scotland and died 1827 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. Some claim that his wife was Mary ("Sarah"), and some claim that she was Mary ("Polly"). They claim that this is the same James McCaleb who served in the Revolutionary army from North Carolina, and that he was a member and secretary of the North Carolina Convention which passed the Mecklinburg Declaration of Independence.

James McCaleb enlisted in 1775 and was payed October 12, 1775 for 31 days.² At this time he served under Captain John Walker 1st North Carolina Regiment. James McCaleb enlisted in 1777 in Captain Reed's Company, 1st North Carolina Regiment, commanded by Col. Thomas Clark. His name appears on the roll of Captain Brown's Company, 1st North Carolina Regiment, with the remark that he enlisted November 1777 to serve for the duration of the war. His name appears on the roll of Captain Reed's Company October 8, 1778 with the remark: "Sick Valley Forge"³ Neither the date of the manner of his separation from the army has been found on record. James McCaleb appears on a list of North Carolina soldiers accounts settled April 1, 1786 by Macon McCulloch and Montford⁴ and again in 1786 he received a settlement for army service at Warrenton.⁵ Both of these payments were receipted by Major F. Dixon. James McCaleb received at least three land grants in Cabarrus. (See Addenda). He was grantor and grantee of land deeds in Cabarrus from 1784-1827. In 1800 he sold land on Rocky River "containing land originally granted to William Flemington in trust for said⁶ James McCaleb, all of which is on record November 2, 1784.⁶ January 18, 1820 James McCaleb made a deed of gift of slaves to his grandchildren" born to my daughter Mary Wilie, wife of Col. Evan Wilie. He also made deeds of gift to his sons John S. and Hugh S. January 22, 1824 James McCaleb made his will. In this will he mentioned his wife "SARAH" and his living children.⁷ (See Addenda). The will was probated in Cabarrus July 1827. D. A. R. Lineage Records say that the wife died 1828.

WILLIAM NEIL McCaleb⁹ may or may not have been the son of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb. He is buried in the Popular Tent Grave Yard in Cabarrus County. Here also is buried Ann (McCaleb) Jamison, daughter of James and Sarah McCaleb. This William Neil died August 21, 1813, and at his death was aged 3, 6 months, and 6 days. (The stone is broken. Mrs. Ray Smith, a professional researcher, of Charlotte, North Carolina copied the inscription).

ANN McCaleb, daughter of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born 1781 in North Carolina. She married (?) JAMISON. Her two children were mentioned in her father's will. She died June 30, 1808, age 27 years, and was buried in the Popular Tent Grave Yard which lies between Coddle Creek and Rocky River in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. (Mrs. Ray Smith of Charlotte, North Carolina copied the inscription.)

I. JAMES LEE JAMISON was the son of (?) and Ann (McCaleb) Jamison.

II. CATHERINE JAMISON was the daughter of (?) and Ann (McCaleb) Jamison.

JOHN STUART McCaleb, son of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born 1784 in North Carolina. (See Census of Gibson County, Tennessee, 1850). He married ANN McCREE, daughter of Hugh McCree, in Cabarrus County, North Carolina.¹⁰ (She had a sister, Mary, who married Joseph Gibson). His father gave him land, for love and affection, adjoining his own. He is also mentioned in his father's will with affection. The census of 1810 shows him married with a small child. He appears on the census of 1830, Cabbarus County, North Carolina, as a member of Captain McCaleb's Company of Militia of Cabarrus County.¹¹ Between 1830 and 1840 John Stuart McCaleb moved his family to Gibson County, Tennessee. They appear on the census of that county in 1840 and 1850. In 1850 both John and Ann McCaleb were 66 years of age.

In 1855 he witnessed the signature of his uncle Hugh Stewart McCaleb when Hugh Stewart McCaleb applied for a veteran's pension. John Stuart McCaleb married and had children.

III. JOHN FRANKLIN McCALEB, son of James and Ann (McCree) McCaleb, was born 1817 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. (Census 1850, Gibson County). He married CAROLINE SHIPMAN, who was born in Tennessee 1830, in Gibson County, Tennessee February 24, 1848. (Census Record). He was known as "Franklin". He, with a wife and small daughter, appear on the census of Gibson County in 1850, but do not appear on the census of 1860. The family probably moved to Hamilton County, Texas.

He is buried at Indian Gap, Texas.

MARY McCALEB, daughter of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born 1786 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina, and she died in 1840 in Sumerville, Alabama. She married Colonel EVAN SHELBY WILEY¹³ December 26, 1804 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. (Marriage Records, Cabarrus County, N. C.). Evan Shelby (1783-1825) was the son of Oliver Wiley¹⁴ and Mary (Shelby) Wiley. Mary (Shelby) Wiley was the daughter of Moses and Elizabeth (Neal) Shelby, and Oliver Wiley was the son of Moses and Mary (Harris) Wiley. (Moses Shelby was an Indian fighter, a Revolutionary War soldier and brother to General Evan Shelby). Col. Evan S. Wiley was a soldier in War of 1812. January 4, 1820 James McCaleb made a gift of slaves to the children of Col. Evan and Mary (McCaleb) Wiley. (Note: Harris, Shelby relationships in Maryland, N. C. and Pa.)

HUGH STUART McCALEB,¹⁵ son of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born in Cabbarus County, North Carolina 1789. (1789 is the date of birth given in his application for a pension. Census records give 1796.) James McCaleb wrote his son's name "Stuart",¹⁶ but Hugh Stuart wrote his name "Stewart". His signature is often just "Stewart McCaleb".

Stewart McCaleb was given land by his father, and his father remembered him with affection in his will. He served in the War of 1812. In his application for a pension he stated that he served in Captain Pitt Waugh's Company of North Carolina

Militia from the 1st to the 28th of February, 1814, and that he served sixty days in Volunteer and Cavalry Service in the War of 1812. Another paper shows that he served in Captain Waugh's Company, Col. Pierson's Regiment, and was discharged at Fort Hawkins July 8, 1813. Hugh Stewart McCaleb's widow said in her application for a pension in 1878 that her husband served under Captain Horton, Regiment of Colonel Houston in the War of 1812. She stated that her husband volunteered for six months, but that his service was terminated after 45 days by reason of peace being made at Salisbury, North Carolina.

Hugh Stewart McCaleb married (1) JANE OSBURN in North Carolina, and by this marriage had at least one child. He married (2) SARAH PARROT in North Carolina, and by this marriage had at least one child. Both wives died and were buried near Charlotte, North Carolina.

Hugh Stewart resided in Cabarrus County, North Carolina on land adjoining that of his father. This land was given him by his father and was part of three land grants given to James McCaleb. Hugh Stewart did not seem to have prospered in North Carolina as much as his brothers. In 1830 he sold his land and between 1830-45 moved to Gibson County, Tennessee. There he married (3) NANCY DEWBERRY October 10, 1846. (The marriage bond says "Babney", but in her application for a pension she said that her maiden name was "Dewberry", also given as "Deberry". The marriage was performed by C. D. Simmons, J. P. near Euton, Tennessee). He died in 1875, and the widow applied for and received a pension for his war service. She died February 1898 in Bradford, Tennessee.

I. JANE OSBURN McCALEB, daughter of Hugh Stewart and Jane Osburn McCaleb, was born in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. She was born before James McCaleb, her grandfather, made his will in 1824, because he mentions her in the will. It is probable that she did not follow her father to Tennessee. Her

mother died, and she probably lived with some of her mother's people. She married JOHN GIBSON in Cabarrus County, North Carolina January 31, 1855.

II. SARAH SUSAN McCALEB was probably the daughter of Hugh Stewart and his second wife, Sarah (Parrot) McCaleb (was born April 26, 1831 and died June 16, 1860). In 1850 she seems to have been living in Mecklinburg County, North Carolina in the home of Moses and Matilda Alexander (Census Record)¹⁷. At this time she was 19, Moses McCaleb was 75, and Matilda Alexander was 54. She married WILLIAM L. COCHRAN January 14, 1853 in Cabarrus County. He was born July 8, 1825 and died February 17, 1892. Both are buried in the ARP (Presbyterian Cemetery) in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

Another Sarah Susan McCaleb married Samuel Lawing September 23, 1856 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina.

III. S. E. McCALEB, daughter of Hugh Stewart and Sarah (Parrot) McCaleb, moved to Tennessee with her father and there married JOHN A. RENTFRO July 25, 1848 in Gibson County. (Note: John Stuart McCaleb, too, had a daughter Sarah Elizabeth McCaleb).

IV. CICERO LEROY McCALEB, son of Hugh Stewart and Nancy (Dewberry) McCaleb, married PATIENCE ELIZABETH (?). They moved to Weekly County, Tennessee and are buried at Gleason, Tennessee.

JAMES KNOX McCALEB¹⁸, son of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born July 6, 1804 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina and died April 5, 1846 in Crockett County, Tennessee.

James Knox McCaleb married ANNE WOODSIDES, daughter of Archibald M. Woodsides, in Rowan County, North Carolina August 15, 1826. Archibald M. Woodsides and Hy Giles signed the marriage bond August 15, 1826. (Note that Archibald M. Woodsides was a Revolutionary War Veteran. In 1840 he was living in Rowan County, North Carolina and was drawing a pension for his war service. He is buried in the Coddle Creek A. R. Presbyterian Cemetery, which is located at the edge of Iradell and Cabarrus Counties.)

James McCaleb gave land in Cabarrus County to his son James Knox McCaleb and willed him his home. June 2, 1829 James Knox sold his land on Coddle Creek, Cabarrus County for \$1120, and he and his family moved to Gibson County, Tennessee. He appears on the Census of Gibson County, Tennessee 1830. In 1844 James K. McCaleb was a magistrate in Gibson County. He was also a Presbyterian Minister. His tombstone inscription reads: "Rev. James McCaleb".

After the death of James Knox McCaleb, his widow and James A. Harwood were guardians for his children.¹⁹ Anne (Woodsides) McCaleb, who was born June 12, 1806, died January 6, 1850, age 44 years. She was buried beside her husband in the Old Bethesda Grave Yard, Crockett County, Tennessee.

I. JAMES MONROE McCALEB, son of James Knox and Anne (Wood-sides) McCaleb, was born November 13, 1827 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. He married JANE ELIZABETH BRADFORD July 31, 1850. She was born November 2, 1828 and was of Scot ancestry.²⁰

James Monroe served as a lieutenant under General Forrest in the War between the States. He enlisted 1862 and served until the end of the war. After the War he moved to Lauderdale County, Tennessee on a river called "Fork of the Dees", near Ripley, Tennessee. He was elected Sheriff of Lauderdale County. While acting as sheriff he had to kill a man in self defense. This act disturbed him very much, though he was not to blame. He decided to move elsewhere and located in Lexington, Mississippi, 1871.

ANN OLIVIA McCALEB, daughter of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, was born 1809. She is mentioned in her father's will as "Olivia". She married JAMES IRWIN January 5, 1821 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina. She is buried with the Knox family in the Centre Presbyterian Cemetery in Iradell County. This cemetery is located near the corner of Cabarrus County. Her tombstone inscription states that she was the wife of James Irwin, and that she died June 30, 1845, aged 36 years, 2 months and 26 days.

LUVISA McCALEB, daughter of James and Sarah (?) McCaleb, married (?) WINSLOW. She died before her father's death. She is not mentioned in his will, but her son is. Her son was living with his father on land belonging to James McCaleb in 1827.

WILL OF JAMES McCaleb (Recorded in Cabarrus County, N. C.)

In the name of God, Amen: the twenty second day of January in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and twenty four, I, James McCaleb do make and publish this as my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say-

First- I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife, Sarah, all my household furniture and kitchen furniture and my negro wench named Fan, and my Black mare named Mink, two cows and two ewes, and the use of my dwelling and other necessary buildings during her natural life, but the household and kitchen furniture, negro wench named Fan and black mare named Mink, two cows and two sheep, I give and bequeath to her, her heirs and assigns forever.

2nd- I give and bequeath to my well beloved son, John, one dollar together with all he has received already, to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

3rd- I give and bequeath to my well beloved son, Hugh Stuart, ten dollars which he borrowed from me, to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

4th- I give and bequeath to my well beloved son, James Knox, all the plantation of land whereon I now dwell, excepting what I hereafter reserve which is this, he is to let my dearly beloved wife, Sarah, have a sufficient living off said land together with the use of my dwelling and other convenient buildings during her natural life and let his brother Hugh Stuart have fifty acres of said land as I shall hereafter in this my last will direct-also I give and bequeath to my son, James Knox, one negro boy named Silas, my wagon and furniture and all my farming eutentials his horse named Farmer and saddle and rifle gun to him his heirs and assigns forever reserving as afore reserved.

5th- I give and bequeath to my well beloved daughter Jennie Hunter, all the property that she has already received together with what shall be hereafter mentioned to her, her heirs and assigns forever.

6th- I give and bequeath to my well beloved daughter, Matilda, one three year old horse colt named Gray and her saddle and bridle and her bed and furniture, one cow and calf and one cow heifer- to her, her heirs and assigns forever.

7th- I give and bequeath to my well beloved grandson, James Winslow, fifty acres of land whereon his father now dwells to be laid off to him of the tract of land whereon I now dwell to be laid off to him on the south side of the State road joining land of George Irvin and Duease and including the house wherein his father now dwells, to him his heirs and assigns forever.

8th- I will that my negro man, named Henry, remain on my plantation to labor for the use and purpose of supporting my wife and family as formerly he has dun untill the twenty fifth day of December next and then he is to be sold at one year

credit and the moneys arising from the sale for him to be divided in the following manner, viz.- the one fourth of the money arising from the sale of the said negro, Henry, to my well beloved son Hugh Stuart and to his daughter, Jean Osburn, to them share and share alike and the other three fourths of the moneys arising from the sale of the said negro, Henry to my three daughters, Jenny Hunter, Matilda, and Olivia Irvin to them share and share alike excepting my daughter, Matilda which I will twenty dollars more of the said moneys than the other two sisters for the purpose of furnishing her with a beaurow and also I will that all the moneys that can be raised or recovered from my grandchildren, children of my daughter, Ann Jamison, for the trouble and expense of raising feeding and clothing of four negro children the property of James Lee and Catherine Jamison, my grandchildren aforesaid, to be divided to my two daughters, Jenny Hunter and Matilda to them share and share alike to them, their heirs and assigns forever. 9th- I will all the remainder of my personal estate to be sold for the just purpose of paying my just debts.

10th- I hereby make and ordain my well beloved son, John and my worthy son-in-law, Giles Hunter executor of my last will and testament in witness whereof I the said James McCaleb have to this my last will and testament set my hand and seal the day and year above written. Signed and sealed published and declared by the said James McCaleb the testator as the last will and testament in the presence of us who were present at the time of the signing thereof.

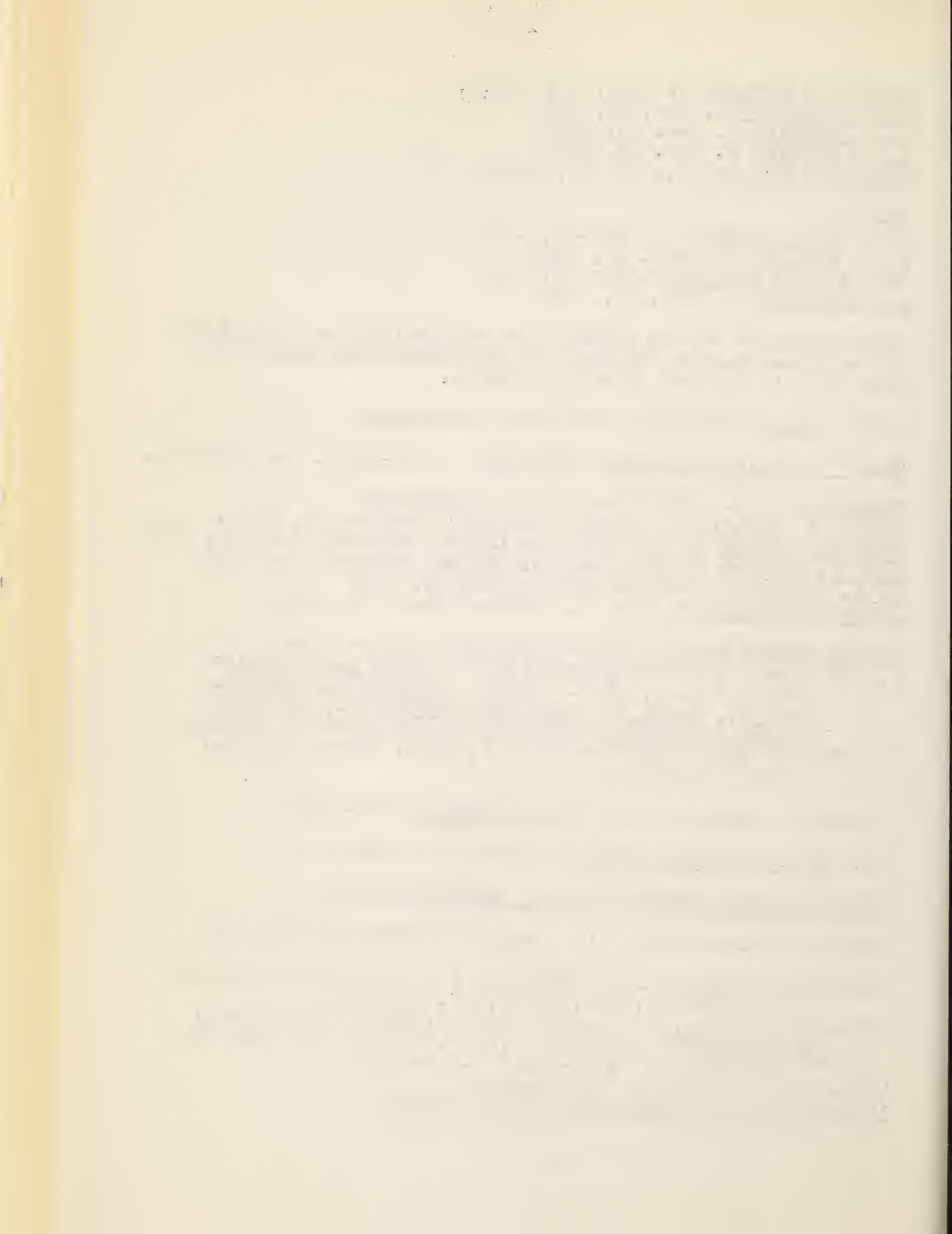

They claim that this James McCaleb was born in Scotland in 1744 and died in Cabarrus County, N. C. in 1827. They claim that his wife was Sarah ("Mary") or Mary ("Polly") and that she died in 1828.

A search of the records of Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Anson, Iradell, and Rowan Counties, N. C. by Mrs. R. Smith of Charlotte and Eugenia W. Lore of Concord, professional researchers, revealed only one McCaleb in this section before

James McCaleb appears in 1784. Colonial Papers of North Carolina, Vol. 22, p. 396 shows Neil McKillope in Adam Alexander's Company of Militia-Indian Wars. No McCaleb appears on any census record of these counties until 1800. In 1800 James McCaleb appears in Cabarrus as under 45 with a wife under 45, 1 m. under 10, 1 M. 10-15, 3 f. under 10, 2 f. 10-15. Neither James or his wife appear on the census of 1810. James McCaleb owned land in Cabarrus County adjoining that of Adam Alexander. (See Addenda).

Comment by Katy McC. Headley: James McCaleb, who appears first on the records of Cabarrus in 1784, may be the same person as the Revolutionary soldier, James McCaleb. If he is the Revolutionary soldier, and if the D. A. R. Records of his birth are correct, he must have been at least 40 years old when he married and had children. (See Census of Cabarrus 1800 for birth of James McCaleb, and note that James McCaleb and his wife were under 45 years of age.) It would be interesting to know where the D. A. R. members found the date 1744. A correspondence between me and the original Willey D. A. R. members did not clarify this point. They say they found their information in the Court House in Cabarrus. Research which have had done did not find such records. Mrs. Roy Smith found no record of James McCaleb as secretary or a member of the Mecklenburg Convention.

6. It has been suggested that there were two James McCalebs in Cabbarus-one on Coddle Creek and one on Rocky River. A very through investigation of records does not bear out this theory.

7. William Neil McCaleb, who died August 21, 1813, aged ?3

years, 6 months, and 6 days, is buried in the Popular Tent Graveyard, which is located between Rocky River and Coddle Creek, may be the son of James McCaleb, since Jame's daughter Ann Jamison is buried there, too. There seems definitely to be a kinship between James McCaleb of Cabarrus and Captain William McCaleb of Pendleton District, South Carolina.

There is a kinship between the McCalebs and Alexanders. Neil McKillope served under Adam Alexander 1766. James McCaleb owned land adjoining Adam Alexander. Hugh S. McCaleb owed money to Alexanders of Iradell County. In 1850 Susan McCaleb, age ___, was living in the home of Moses and Matilda Alexander of Cabarrus.

8. Sara, who married James McCaleb, may have been Sara Knox.

9. William Neil McCaleb, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb (S. C. and Claiborne County, Miss.) was born August 8, 1770 and died before March 1813. William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb also had children: Mary, Ann, Matilda, John, James.

10. The family name of "Hugh" comes from the McCree line and not the McCaleb line.

11. Census of Cabbarus County, N. C. 1810 gives Patrick McCaleb, under 45, 1 f. over 45, 1 m. under 10, 1 m. 16-26, 2 f. 10-16, 1 f. 16-26. He was probably from Maryland.

12. Names of Descendants of John Stewart McCaleb came from Mrs. Ollie John, of Gibson County, Tenn., who was a very old lady whose memory was poor.

13. Information about Col. Evan and Mary (McCaleb) Wiley came mostly from Wiley D. A. R. Lineage Records. Information about the Shelbys came from Lineage and Traditions of John Spring III. Deed Book G, p. 440 Cabarrus Records names the children of Evan and Mary (McCaleb) Wiley.

14. Geo. McWhorter in pension claim states he "served under Capt. Oliver Wiley". Pension Record, Washington, S-9011.

15. Information concerning Hugh Stuart McCaleb came from Census Records of Cabarrus County, North Carolina, Census Records of Gibson County, Tennessee, his and his wife's applications for pensions, deed records and marriage records from Cabarrus and Gibson Counties, from Mr. W. L. McCaleb of Gleason, Tennessee, and from correspondence with Finis McCaleb of Columbus, Mississippi. (See Addenda).

16. McCaleb claim to kinship with the royal Stuart family of Scotland and with Robert Bruce. The names "Stuart" and "Bruce" appear in several lines of McCalebs.

17. James McCaleb (1744-1827) owned land adjoining that of Adam Alexander. Capt. William McCaleb's (1747-1813) father William Neil McKillope served under Adam Alexander in 1766, in the Indian Wars. (See Vol. I of McKillope (McCaleb), Capt. William McCaleb came to Claiborne County, Miss. 1799.

18. Records of births, marriages, and deaths of James McCaleb, his wife, and children are taken from the James and Anne (Woodsides) family Bible and were copied by George David McCaleb of Lexington, Mississippi for Katy McCaleb Headley. Dates of births and deaths of James K. and Anne McCaleb were transcribed from their tombstones by Lon McCaleb of Austin, Texas.

19. Guardian Record Books, Gibson County, Tenn. name the heirs of James K. McCaleb. Book Oct. 3, 1848, p. 105, Dec. 4, 1848, p. 279.

20. James K. and Anne (Woodsides) McCaleb Bible.

21. Names of James W. and Dora (Irby) McCaleb's children were given to me by Mrs. S. J. McCaleb, Box 223, Athens, Texas. K. McC. H.

22. Information concerning this family came from Mrs. B. W. Gaston of Starkville, Mississippi. She is a niece of Henry Y. McCaleb.

23. Records concerning Sara Elizabeth McCaleb, her husband and children were copied from the John C. Thompson Bible (1964) by Mrs. Charles C. Mason, 605 West South St., Pinckneyville, Illinois. The Bible is owned by Eleven Coa Adams, Iberia, Missouri. All other records concerning descendants of Sara Elizabeth McCaleb came from Mrs. Charles C. Mason.

JOHN McCALOP drew due bills drawn by Thomas Butcher and payed to officers and soldiers of the Continental Line of the State of North Carolina. Number of the account was 1270, and he received 186, 12.8 (Vol. III, p. 104, folio 1, North Carolina Revolutionary Army Accounts).

James McCaleb and John McCalop accounts appear on the same page in the records.

John McCalop has not been found on any other record in North Carolina. He may have been the husband of Catherine (McCalop) McCaleb, who drew pay for sundries furnished the army of North Carolina and Virginia in the upper Salisbury District and who received a land grant in Guilford County, North Carolina. (See Catherine McCaleb).

CATHRIN McCALIP² received 500 acres in Guilford County on both sides of Little Trouble-Waters of Haw River beginning at a black oak to a white oak-to a post-to a small post oak-to a black oak-Dated 1st March 1780. Entered 21st Nov. 1778-Land Grant-Also recorded in Guilford County, Record Book 2, p. 155.

JAMES McCALEB (also spelled McCalib) sold 300 acres of land on Little Troublesome Creek which had originally been a part of 500 acres lying on both sides of Troublesome Creek granted to Catherine McCaleb (that spelling). This land joined that of Andrew Boyd and James Nichol. Witnessed by: A. Philip, John Harris, Thomas North. This land deed was dated Oct. 28, 1795. James McCaleb is described in the deed as being from Rockingham County, North Carolina-The deed is on record in Rockingham County. Catherine McCaleb received a land grant of 70 acres in behalf of JEAN McCALIP-This land was in Guilford County on the South Branch of Reedy Fork beginning at a forked black oak on the said bank in Orange County line-on said County line to a black oak and a hickory Nichlas Kift's corner-to a black oar and poplar in a branch along the various courses of said branch to the mouth therof-along the meanders

of the South branch of Reedy Fork to the beginning. Dated June 7, 1799. Entered May 15th 1794. Guilford County, Book 7, p. 177-Land Grant.

FOOTNOTES

1. This may or may not have been the same Catherine McCaleb who had sons-James and John and a daughter Jennie-who obtained land grants in Guilford County. There may be two Catherines. It would seem strange for Catherine, Wilmington District, Bladen, to be drawing pay in 1782 in the Upper Salisbury District.

Catherine McCaleb of Upper Salisbury District probably had children-James, Jean, Andrew who settled in Surry County 1799, and Hugh who settled in _____ in County 1790. There was a Hugh McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier.

2. This may or may not be the same Catherine McCaleb who drew pay for Sundries furnished the army of N. C. during the Revolutionary War, in the Upper Salisbury District. She evidently was a widow. She is probably not the same Catherine McCaleb who appears on the Census of 1790 in the Wilmington District of Bladen County, North Carolina.

3. James McCaleb evidently was the son of Catherine McCaleb. Jean McCaleb is a daughter of Catherine McCaleb.

JAMES McCaleb married MARY (Polly) ?

JAMES McCaleb, was born in North Carolina about 1770.¹ He evidently married MARY (Polly) ? in North Carolina, since he had at least two children born in North Carolina. He may have been twice married. May 1810 he purchased 400 acres on Duck River, Hickman County, Tennessee. This land was located about one mile below the mouth of Lick Creek and was part of a grant of ten thousand acres granted to Martin Armstrong (Grant 253) by the State of North Carolina. The purchase price was \$1600 (Deed Book B, P. 158 Hickman County, Tennessee Land Records . James McCaleb deed to 400 acres on Duck River. A Martin Armstrong grant to Abner Neal, who conveyed to McCaleb No. 253, May 15, 1813. Also noted as registered in Circuit Court of Williamson County). James McCaleb is described in this deed as being from Hickman County, Tennessee and seems to have owned land there prior to this purchase. James McCaleb and Benjamin Greer lived near Baird's Ferry in 1811. They owned lands on which the western portion of Little Lot now stands and a large portion, if not all, of the land from Little Lot to Baird's Ferry. James McCaleb had a gin here in 1820. He was a man of energy and cleared much of the land between the present site of Little Lot and Baird's Ferry. He was the owner of several slaves and with their help operated his gin and also engaged in the raising of cotton. His neighbors also cultivated cotton which he ginner for them, thereby encouraging the culture of this plant at an early date.² James McCaleb seems to have died between 1820-1830 in Hickman County, Tennessee. (He appears on the census of 1820 as head of his family. The census of 1830 shows his wife Mary (Polly) McCaleb as head of the house). His descendants say he was buried in the Old Peach Orchard Cemetery near the place where Zebulon Hassell lived.³ Because of several minor children, his estate was not settled until December 18, 1849. (Hickman County Minute Book 1844-55, p. 189). He seems to have been worth about \$50,000 at his death.

According to the Census Records Polly McCaleb was born about 1770. In 1841 she gave her age as 70. After her husband's death, she seems to have made her home with her daughter and son-in-law, Mary (McCaleb) and Zebulon Hassell. Shortly after 1841 her daughter, Mary (McCaleb) Hassell died, and Zebulon Hassell soon married again.⁴ She did not seem to get along anymore there, and she got on her horse and left. She brought Court action against Zebulon Hassell for non-support. It seems that for her 100 acres and seven slaves, which she had inherited from her husband, Zebulon Hassell had contracted to support her. (Contract made Jan. 26, 1841, Hickman County, Tenn.) In this action she claimed that he had not supported her in many months. The case was settled March 1, 1848 when Zebulon Hassell agreed to pay her \$50 per year for the remainder of her life.⁵

I. EPHRAIM McCALEB, son of James and Mary "Polly" McCaleb, was born in North Carolina. He came to Tennessee with his parents when quite young. In 1809 and again 1812 he is listed as Captain of the Hickman County Militia. In 1827 he was Justice of the Peace in Hickman County. He may have moved to Mississippi and be the same Ephraim McCaleb who was Justice of the Peace in Lawrence County, Mississippi June 10, 1822.

II. JOHN McCALEB, son of James and Mary "Polly" McCaleb, was born in North Carolina January 11, 1789. He came to Tennessee with his parents when he was quite young. The census of 1820, Hickman County, lists John McCaleb, Jr.⁸ and his wife as parents of seven children-4 boys and 3 girls. November 22, 1810 he was elected trustee of the Academy of Hickman County. He married (1) (?). He and this wife are said to have had twenty children. He married (2) RACHEL STILTZ, who was born 1810 in Kentucky. Six children were born to this second marriage.

John McCaleb appears as Chancery Clerk of Hickman County in a suit in which Robert S. Wiley, R. Anderson, Dr. and Mary Shelby, and Moses Wiley were mentioned. (Minute Book, p. 657 Hickman County. Evan Shelby Wiley lived near McCalebs July 1854.)

When the War between the States began in 1861, Franklin Polk McCaleb was among the first to volunteer from Hickman County. He was a member of Company H, 21st Infantry. When the boys left Centerville, Tennessee they were singing "That Pretty Little Girl I Left Behind". Franklin McCaleb was wounded in the Battle of Shiloh. His gun, which he carried during the war, is in the Museum at Shiloh.

Franklin Polk McCaleb married (1) MARY ANN BINGHAM October 6, 1865. She was the daughter of J. Nelson and Rebecca (Smith) Bingham, who lived near Shady Grove, Tenn. After their marriage, Franklin Polk and his wife bought a farm and lived at Anderson Bend, near Bluff Point Post Office. After the death of his first wife, Franklin Polk McCaleb married (2) DORA ANDERSON, daughter of Richard M. Anderson, who was postmaster of Bluff Point. Franklin Polk McCaleb died November 1903.

1. ANNA EUGENIA McCALEB, daughter of Franklin Polk and Mary Ann (Bingham) McCaleb, was born October 17, 1866. She married DAVID REGEON September 27, 1888. He was born June 28, 1866. They lived in Anderson Bend, Tennessee for a time but moved to Oklahoma September 11, 1900. January 1905 they moved to Grayson County, Texas. He died September 11, 1907 and was buried near Cedar Mills, Grayson County, Texas. She then moved with her family to Ellis County near Regeon Springs. December 12, 1911 she and her family moved to Jones County near Hedges, Texas. Later, she and her daughter, Lois, lived in Dalhart, Texas.

Those witnessing the wedding were Matilda Cotton, M. G. Grimes, S. B. Bates, James S. Grimes. William Harrington, father of Susan (Harrington) McCaleb, was born in Chatham County, North Carolina. He came to Little Lot, Tennessee about 1809. He was guardian of Alton McCaleb and settled with him in March 1848.

The History of Hickman County¹³ gives a biography of Alton McCaleb. Spence says that Alton McCaleb bought a farm on Blue Buck Creek soon after he married and that he lived many years in the Fourteenth District of Hickman County and died there. He says that Alton McCaleb was the son of James McCaleb, whose father was James McCaleb of North Carolina. He was born in the 3rd District, according to this source in 1823, and was for many years magistrate of the 14th District and was an influential citizen. Blue Creek, where Alton and Susan McCaleb settled is the principal stream of this district, about 7 miles long and flows into Swan Creek. Long before the early settlers came, this creek was known as "Blue Buck", from the fact that on this creek a hunter had killed a deer at that season when their hair had a bluish tinge.

When the War between the States came, Alton McCaleb left his family, which now consisted of one girl and seven boys, and became a Lieutenant in the Ninth Battalion, Company D of Tennessee Cavalry, C. S. A. He was taken prisoner by the Federal soldiers on February 16, 1862 at Fort Donaldson. According to Spence, he was a "gallant soldier".

After a four year war, Tennessee was left in ruins. Hard times followed. Jasper, the last child of Alton and Susan Ann McCaleb, was born in 1866. The hard work and exposure of the war had impaired the health of both Alton and Susan. In 1803 they bought a farm from Robert Cochran on Beat Branch. Beat Branch was so called for two reasons: (1) at its mouth, flat boats from up the river frequently tied up and remained over night (2) at the mouth of the branch numerous flat boats were built and floated down the river where they were sold. In addition to this, corn was shipped in these flat boats from Anderson's Bend to New Orleans. The boatmen, when they reached New Orleans, either returned home on foot or returned to Nashville by steamboat and walked from Nashville, about sixty miles. Some of the children grew up and left home. Andrew McCaleb had died three years before they purchased this farm and was buried by the roadside on a knoll near their home. Melvin DeCalb McCaleb stayed on in the old home

place, later buying it. Thus they had only three sons to move with them to their new home-Mark, Rush, and Jasper. As time passed, the health of the older McCalebs became more delicate. Late in the evening of June 15, 1895, Susan McCaleb passed away. Just two months later, August 15, 1895, Alton McCaleb followed her. They were buried in the Popular Union Cemetery about five miles from the old home.

Later he moved to Lawrence County, Tennessee. In 1903 the family moved to Ellis County, Texas, near Waxahachie. After seven years there, they moved to Vernon, Texas, 1910. He was a farmer and owned a farm in each of the places where he lived. He died December 4, 1923, and he was buried, as he requested, in a grey uniform which he had worn to the last convention which he attended. He is buried at Vernon, Texas alongside his wife.

He was a member of the Baptist faith. "Possession of a keen sense of humor endeared him to his friends with his shrewd and understanding philosophy. Many of his stories and home-spun epigrams have become a tradition". Oscar A. McCaleb died some years ago.

John McCaleb was a Republican in politics. When war broke out between the North and South in 1861, he was a Union sympathizer, though his brother, Alton, was a southern sympathizer. John McCaleb was killed in Humphreys County, Tennessee by Confederates February 4, 1862 while trying to get through the Confederate lines to join the Union army. He was crossing a stream of water which poured from a cliff, and the waterfall made so much noise that he did not hear the Confederate sentry's command to halt. He was shot and killed. He was buried in the family cemetery at Buck Branch, Tennessee. His tombstone inscription states: "A friend of his country all of his life. Killed by the Rebels and their Strife". At the time of his death, all of John McCaleb's children were small, and one was not yet born. The widow died 1882 and was buried beside her husband.

Someone asked Lucy Jane (Beasley) McCaleb why she named two sons "John". She replied that it would not hurt to have two named for such a good man as her husband.¹⁷

IV. ZILL McCALEB, son of James and Mary "Polly" McCaleb, was born 1792 in North Carolina.²⁰ At an early age he moved with his family to Hickman County, Tennessee. As early as 1810 he was holding or owning land in Hickman County.²¹ He served in the War of 1812 as a private in the Company of Captain Hannah, Regiment of Tennessee Volunteers for six months.²² He was given a land bounty for his service in the Seminole War of 1818. May 29, 1822 he married MARY MARTIN.²³ She was born 1804.

In 1826 and again in 1836 Zill McCaleb was a Justice of the Peace in Hickman County. The census shows him with a wife, three sons and two daughters under ten years of age (1830 census). In 1838 he owned land in Hickman on Duck River (Minute Book 1838, p. 170). In 1839 he moved his family to Fall County, Texas, near Bremond.²⁴ He shared in the settlement of his father's estate. He died in Fall County, Texas April 25, 1870. Both he and his wife are buried at Bremond, Texas.

McCaleb received a good literary education in the Academy of Thornton and the Southwestern University of Georgetown, 1874 and in 1880 began the study of medicine under the direction of a competent medical practitioner, and at the same time was engaged in teaching school. He attended lectures in Tulane University, of New Orleans, and graduated from the same. He began the practice of his profession in Caldwell County, and there he continued to reside for several years. In 1889-90 he took a post-graduate course in New Orleans including the study of the eye, ear, nose and throat. In 1890 he took a post graduate course in the New York Polyclinic, and this time he devoted almost his whole attention to surgery and diseases of women and children. Upon his return from New York City he located in Gonzales where he has built up a practice of which many older physicians might well be proud. He is making a name for himself and will, without doubt, rise to a still higher position in his profession. He is a member of the State Medical Society, belongs to Gonzales Lodge of the A. F. & A. M., and he is also a member of Gonzales Lodge No. 105 of the Knights of Pythias." (History of Texas, p. 279). He died 1908.

After Mary died, about 1841 (Court Record), Zebulon Hassell II remarried and refused to support his mother-in-law, Polly, as he had contracted to do. Polly McCaleb left his house and sued in Court for her property, which was left to her by her husband. She claimed that Zebulon Hassell had used her affection for her daughter and beat her out of her property by false promises and that at the time of the suit he was trying to dispose of the property and move to Texas without paying her anything. Zebulon contracted to pay her a given sum yearly for the remainder of her life, and the case was closed.²⁸

The widow, Mary McCaleb, age 78 filed claim in Texas, Falls
County, Aug. 26, 1882, states she is the widow of Zill McCaleb,
who was a private in Company of Capt. Hannah, Regiment of
Tenn. volunteers, enlisted at Hickman County, Tennessee 1812
for six months, and served six months, that her husband was
age 20 when he enlisted, and that he was born in Hickman County,
Tenn.

Zill McCaleb had dark hair and eyes, fair complexion, that she
married Zill McCaleb in Hickman County, Tennessee May 29,
1822, by Jerry Harlan, who was a justice of the peace, and
that her name before marriage was Mary Martin, that neither
of them had been married previously, and that he died April
25, 1870, that since his discharge they had resided in Hick-
man County, Tenn. until 1839 when they came to Texas and
remained in Texas until his death, that her residence is
Falls County, Texas, P. O. Box Bremond, Robertson County,
Texas. (Both counties are given). When she wrote about her
pension in 1885 her P. O. Box was Re gan, Falls County, Texas.

EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER FROM MRS. LALLA McCALEB DIXON TO MRS. KATY McC. HEADLEY. DATED FEBRUARY 7, 1953.

"When I was a small girl my father took me to visit there (Zill McCaleb Sr. home). We were met at the station of Bremond and taken a few miles into the country in Falls County. Bremond was the post office and nearest railway stop, being very near the border-line between the two counties, Falls and Robertson: Martin is the county seat of Falls County. My father, Jesse McCaleb, was born in or near Memphis, Tennessee June 26, 1827--died July 6, 1888,--was twice married and ran Great Uncle John a close second in the production of offspring, being the father of twelve sons and five daughters, of which I am the youngest daughter of the second marriage.

About the close of the Civil War, I think it was, my father purchased a piece of land in Montgomery County, about five miles west of Willis, Texas, and built a home there. From time to time he added other tracts until he had a very large plantation. My earliest recollections are of the large white house, with green blinds, set among the trees, --four immense moss covered oaks in the left half of the front yard and a beautiful flower garden on the right. Walnut, sycamore, locust, sage and cedars of Lebanon were other trees around the sides and back of the house. To the rear, beyond the large back yard, was the orchard, with many beehives and a grape arbor. On the left, and extending back as far as the grape arbor, was another yard. In this yard was an old log kitchen with a huge fireplace and big wood range where our meals were prepared. This was connected to the dining room, in the house, by a little covered board walk.

In this side yard was the cistern house and dairy, the potato bin, the smoke house and a large double chicken house. South of this large yard was the carriage house, blacksmith shop and a large barbecue pit under one roof but divided from each other. I have seen whole animals barbecued there for weddings, big church or Grange dinners, etc. There were fig trees and what I have always known as "Heaven trees" growing in this yard. Still further to the left of these yards was a large pasture of clover and grass, and cottonwood trees (planted by my father) and a tank of water for the animals. In the corner of the pasture, nearest the shop yard, was a wide spreading pecan tree. Separated by a picket fence from the front yard and the shop yard was a big lawn with grass and many kinds of young trees (planted by my father). A walk led through this, from the front yard gate, to the lane.

The vegetable garden lay beyond the flower garden to the west, and still further beyond this and the lawn, were the mill yard and barnyard. In the first of these was the sugar mill and a tank, and west of this, a large structure containing a saw-mill, a cotton gin and press, a grist-mill and running gear. Water for running these was obtained from a large tank on the

side. North of the mill was the barnyard containing a well and watering-trough, a big corn crib and barn, also a saddle and harness house. I once fell in the well--but that is another story.

Beyond all this was a road crossing the lane and, on the other side of the road was a thickly wooded section containing pines, sweet gum, red and black haws, grape vines, huckleberries, dogwood, redbud, magnolia trees and others. Across the lane lay a large field; here also was the store and a negro quarter containing many little cabins.--It was nice to hear the darkies sing at sunset. Some of them were trained for house servants or baby nurses while others worked in the fields or mills, etc. There were also a number of white families living on the place, the men acting as overseers--ginners, sawyers, millers, engineers, cotton weighers, blacksmiths carpenters, etc. One old Englishman and his wife, I remember lived in the lane. He took care of the trees--pruning, budding or planting.

My father always kept an easy riding horse for himself alone. It usually stood saddled and bridled at the gate ready to use at any time to go to town, to distant fields or elsewhere on inspection tours. Jesse McCaleb Esq. had very little education but he made his way to the top of his chosen line. He was a fine Christian Gentleman, loved and honored by both white and black. He served as Justice of the Peace of his community and in later years was twice sent to the House of Representatives of Texas. The chief products were cotton, lumber, and wool. The corn, oats, hay, etc. produced were mostly used on the place. There were also sugar cane syrup, watermelons, sweet and Irish potatoes and an abundance of fruit and vegetables for home consumption. There were cows, oxen, horses, mules, sheep, goats, hogs, turkeys, chickens, ducks, guineas and geese.

There were no schools near enough for the children to go to, so my father had a school house, with home-made benches and desks, built in the back yard. He employed one of my mother's young sisters to teach. Any white children in the surrounding country could attend. Five younger children, of which I was one, never attended this school. As soon as the others were old enough they were sent away to school.

My father, as I remember him, was a grey-haired, grey-bearded, blue-eyed, broad shouldered man, and I always thought he bore a striking resemblance to the pictures of General Robert E. Lee. His hair, originally, was almost black. When I was a little girl someone offended me very much by assuming that he was my grandfather".

Mary McCaleb Feb. 26, 1841, deeded 100 acres and 7 slaves, which she inherited from James McCaleb's will, provided that he "keep her in possession of the room she now occupies, with her household furniture and also to feed and take care of her riding nag and flock of geese".

FOOTNOTES

1. James McCaleb sold 300 acres of land on Little Troublesom Creek, Guilford County, N. C. which was part of 500 acres granted to Catherine McCalib adjoining land of Andrew Boyd. Wit: John Harris.

This seems to be the same James McCaleb who appears on the census of Rockingham County, N. C. in 1790 with a wife (1 f.) and two minor children. (Probably John and Ephraim McCaleb).

James McCaleb of Rockingham was no doubt the son of Catherine MaCaleb (also spelled McCalop), who received a land grant of 500 acres in Guilford County, N. C. The land was on Little Troublesome on the waters of Haw River. It was entered November 1778 and dated March 1, 1780. October 28, 1795 James McCaleb sold 300 acres granted to Catherine McCaleb.

Catherine McCaleb (that spelling) received pay for Sundries furnished the Militia of North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia as allowed by Bruce and Bagge, auditors of the upper Board of Salisbury District as P. Report No. 45. No. 8301 and 8386 and dated about 1783. (Accounts of the U. S. with North Carolina, War of Revolution, Book A. pp. 259-264.)

Catherine McCaleb seems to have been the widow of JOHN McCALOP who received due bills and certificates payable to officers and soldiers from Thomas Butcher, No. 1270 (Vol. III, p. 104, folio 1, North Carolina Army Account. See also: N. C. Colonial Records-2658 John McCalop of N. C. Line-Army pay, amount 186-12-6. Vol. 17, p. 233. Settled 1784 at Halifax, N. C., Warrenton.) He was an officer in the army, as settlement was made to officers.

Catherine McCaleb seems to have had children: JAMES McCALEB, who sold lands which had belonged to Catherine McCaleb in 1795; JOHN McCALIB who purchased land in Orange County in 1808 married Catherine Allison in 1810 and settled in Putnam County, Tennessee; JEAN McCALIP for whom Catherine McCaleb obtained a land grant in Guilford in 1799.

She gave her address as Bremond, Robertson County, Texas. When she wrote for her pension in 1885 her post office address was Reagan, Falls County, Texas. Mary McCaleb's application for a widow's pension was filed 9?11?1882.

24. History of Texas, page 270 gives a biography of Dr. G. W. McCaleb. This history states: "Zill McCaleb immigrated to this State from Tennessee, was in the Texas Revolution, and was a participant in the battle of San Jacinto. He afterward settled at Linnville, but fled from that place during the noted Indian raid of 1840, when the town was burned, and took

refuge in Montgomery County, and later moved to Fall County, where he was called on to pay the last debt of nature in 1869".

Comment by K. McC. H.: This seems to be in disagreement with Mary (Martin) McCaleb's statement in her pension application. She said the family moved to Texas in 1839. Her statement agrees with the Hickman County Records. The battle of San Jacinto was fought in 1836.

25. The family say that the Bible record says that he was born in or near Memphis, Tennessee. This does not agree with facts stated by Mary Martin McCaleb. They probably meant that Hickman County is nearer Memphis than any other large city. Information concerning this family and descendants came from Mrs. L. Dixon, 1015 Dakin St., Chicago 13, Ill. She has a copy of the Bible Records. The original Bible is owned by Gladys Maffey of Conroe, Texas. Mrs. Dixon states that her ancestor came from Scotland to New York City and migrated eventually to Tennessee.

26. Dorcas (Cude) McCaleb is buried in the Cude Cemetery 5 miles west of Willis, Texas. Timothy W. Cude, b. 1804 in Kentucky, was the son of William Cude, Sr. and Dorcus Jones.

27. Jesse McCaleb, assumed to be the above mentioned, served under Col. Talton Greene and Col. Greene stated in a letter that Lieut. JOHN McCALEB (McCALOP)

John McCaleb (McCalop) served as an officer in the North Carolina Line against the British in the American Revolutionary War. John McCalop seems to have been an officer, and he drew pay or certificates from a commission set up to pay due bills to officers and soldiers of the Continental Line of the State of North Carolina.¹ His name has not been found on census of 1790 in North Carolina.

Ira McCaleb, a grandson of John McCaleb, says that two brothers came from Scotland and fought in the Revolutionary War—John and William McCaleb. He said that John settled in North Carolina and that he raised a family in Orange County and that his brother, William McCaleb, settled in South Carolina.²

Tradition in the John McCaleb family is that John came to North Carolina and married a French lady and neither could speak the other's language and that their son married a Dutch (Holland or German) lady and neither spoke the other's language. Tradition in this family says that the McKillops came from Loch-Aber, Scotland.

John McCaleb married and had children.

JOHN McCALEB married CATHERINE ALLISON

JOHN McCALEB, son of John McCalop of Orange County, North Carolina married CATHERINE ALLISON March 7, 1810 in Orange County, North Carolina. After a few years, they moved to a farm near Cooksville, Putnam County, Tennessee.

"Two brothers came over from Scotland and fought in the Revolutionary War-John McCaleb and William McCaleb. John McCaleb was our great grandfather. He settled in North Carolina and married and raised a family in Orange County, North Carolina, and his son, John, was our grandfather.

"He married a lady by the name of Catherine Allison. To this union was born seven children, 5 boys and 2 girls. The oldest son's name was Washington, 2nd son Samuel, 3rd son Joseph, 4th son David Robinson. 1st girl's name was Peggy Jane, and 2nd girl was Catherine, and the 5th son's name was Allison. He was the youngest son.

"Our father moved from North Carolina, Orange County, to Putnam County in middle Tennessee. Grandfather settled near Cooksville in Putnam County, Tennessee.³ There he raised a family.

"Our father was born the 5th of July 1820, and was married to my mother in 1844. He was 24 years old, and my mother was 20 years old. Her maiden name was Sinthey Burgess. To this union was born 9 children--3 girls and 6 boys. The oldest girl's name was Charlotty Catherine, 2nd girl Matilda Frances, the 1st boy, John Washington, the 2nd son Anderson Lorrancia, the 3rd Ira Allison, the 4th Samuel Crawford, the 5th William Robin Robinson, 3rd girl's name was Mary Jane, the 6th boy David Crockett. W. R. and Mary were twins. The four oldest children were born in Putnam County, Tenn., and Ira A. was born in Smith County, Tenn. I was born March 18th and our father moved from Tenn. in 1857 and came to Washington County, Ark. and settled near Cane Hill, Ark., and there

he raised his family.

"Mother passes away January 20, 1885, and my father went to live with brother John McCaleb in Carl County, Arkansas, and he met Miss Margaret Bunch, and they got married and to this union was born one child, Louise. She is the 10th child of our family. She is the 4th girl in the D. R. McCaleb family. 6 boys and 4 girls.

Our father passed away in 1895. I lost the date. I will leave a space _____ (Jan. 1, 1894, buried at Antioch, Ark.) but you and brother and I are all that is living now. The rest of the family have gone to their reward.

"Our grandfather's family went to different states to live in or to make their home. Uncle Washington McCaleb went to Oklahoma to live. Uncle Sam McCaleb lived in Tenn. until he died and raised a large family. Uncle Joe McCaleb went to Mt. Vernon, Illinois and made his home there and raised a large family. I have heard that Uncle Allison got drowned in some river in Tennessee. Aunt Peggy married a man by the name of Lily Ellis. They stayed in Tennessee until he died.

"Aunt Catherine married a man by the name of John Campbell, and they went to Illinois and Uncle John died and she married a man by the name of Boyd. She raised a large family.

"I have told you that your great grandfather settled in North Carolina, and his brother, William McCaleb went to South Carolina and raised a large family there. I have met some of them who belong to this family. They may be mistaken in this writing. Our father has told me several times just what I have wrote in this document, and I have tried my best to give it straight to you as I remember it. I hope it will please you and you will enjoy reading it. So farewell for this time. May the good Lord bless you and your son and his wife is my prayer."

HUGH McALUP¹ received pay for army service in the Revolutionary War 1792. (Book A, p. 268 North Carolina Army Records).

HUGH McCALEB received a land grant of 100 acres in Guilford County, North Carolina. The land was located on the Surrey Line, along his own land. Entered June 1, 1779. (Book 48, p. 90-North Carolina Dept. of State Land Grant Office).

HUGH McKILEP received a land grant of 200 acres in Surrey County on both sides of Belloos Creek on the Guilford Line. Dated Oct. 13, 1783. Entered Nov. 8, 1779. (North Carolina Dept. of State Land Grant Office, N. C. Book 53, p. 100).

HUGH ALUP appears on Census of 1790-Stokes County, North Carolina. Hugh Alup and wife.

HUGH ALUP appears on Census of 1790-Stokes County, North Carolina. 2 sons under 16, 3 females, Self.

HUGH McCALEB (Born 1770-1780) moved from North Carolina, by way of Lauderdale County, Tennessee to Fayette County, Alabama 1825. (See Hugh McCaleb of Fayette^a County, Alabama). He is said by the family to be the son of Archibald McCaleb. It seems more likely that he was the son of Hugh McCaleb, Revolutionary War Soldier.

HUGH McCALEB married ELIZABETH HOWELL

HUGH McCALEB², son of Hugh McCaleb (or Hugh Alup), a Revolutionary soldier, was living in Stokes County, North Carolina about 1790.³ He was born 1770-1775⁴ in North Carolina. He married ELIZABETH HOWELL in North Carolina.⁵ In 1790 Hugh Alup and wife were living next door to Hugh Alup and family in Stokes County, North Carolina. Hugh and Elizabeth (Howell) McCaleb and family moved, by way of Lauderdale County, Tennessee, to Fayette County, Alabama about 1825. He was a farmer and built the first grist mill in Fayette County on the place now (1940) owned by Bill Hollingsworth. Hugh McCaleb died 1840-1850 in Fayette County, Alabama. He and his wife are buried in a cemetery north of Fayette, near Hubberville, Alabama. There are no dates on his tombstone.

3. Hugh Alup appears on the North Carolina Census of 1790, Stokes County. He was married and living next door to his parents-Hugh Alup and family.

4. Dates were arrived at from Census of 1840-Fayette County, N. C.

(Bk. 55, p. 27-Land Grant, Sec. of State Land Grant Office, N. C.)

GILBERT McCALLOP
REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER
DUPLIN COUNTY, N. C.

GILBERT McCALIP (McCALOP) of DUPLIN COUNTY, N. C.

GILBERT McCALLOP, a Revolutionary soldier and patriot, received army pay April 1777. The amount was 46.13.8, and the number of the claim was 222.¹ March 4, 1775 Gilbert McCallip received a land grant of 300 acres in Duplin County, North Carolina.² This land was located on the side of Goshen Swamp on the head of the Horsepen Branch and joined his own land. So Gilbert McCallop owned land in Duplin County prior to the American Revolutionary War. His name does not seem to appear on record after 1777. It is possible that he was killed in the war or died about that time.

"The North Carolina Biennial Marriage Report" gives three McCaleb marriages in Duplin County:³ ARCHIBALD McCALEP married MARGARET GARDNER, September 29, 1791. JOHN McCARLLIP married ELLIS GUY December 25, 1793. ARCHIBALD McCALEB married SUSANNAH McCALEB May 7, 1817. Gilbert McCallop may have had sons-Archibald and John-and a grandson, Archibald, who married 1817.

Anis McCalop, John McCalop, and Gilbert McCallop-all Revolutionary soldiers used the same spelling. Catherine McCalop appears on the Census of Bladen, Wilmington District. McCalebs of Orange County early used the spelling of the name "McCalop".

(New Hanover County former 1729)

ARCHIBALD McCABLE, also spelled "McCalip", and "McCalop", received six land grants in New Hanover County, North Carolina 1778-1814. All of this land was located on the west side of Black River. The grant of Dec. 8, 1778 touched McCalup's line, Marsden's line, and Gays Corner, so Archibald probably owned land in this area before 1778. (Land grants received 1778, 1787, 1779, North Carolina Dept. of the Sec. of State).

Archibald McCalop appears on only one census-1790. In 1790 he appears with two sons over 16, one son under 16, two females, one slave.

(Archibald may have been the son of Archibald McCalop. He died in Wilmington, New Hanover County the latter part of June 1857. He made his will June 2, 1857.¹ (It was probated June 1857). At his death he left a wife MARY SUSAN McCABLE and five minor children. According to his will, he left at least twenty-five or thirty slaves. He owned his home in Wilmington and a store. His home in Wilmington was on land purchased from Mrs. Ann Sellers and was known on the plan of Wilmington as the west end of lot No. 1, Block 207. In his will he mentioned "all of my stock of goods, wares, and merchandise, notes accounts, now in the store, and all warehouses, used by me as such, on the corner of Chestnut and North Water Street". His children were: FLORA JANE McCABLE, BARBARY ARMSTRONG McCABLE,² who married BENJAMIN R. MONK May 2, 1861, THOMAS DAVIS McCABLE, CAROLINE S. McCABLE, who married JAMES F. MUNN April 9, 1867, and MARY GENIA McCABLE.³

He left a home, a mercantile business, warehouses, and slaves. (New Hanover County, N. C. Will Book C, p. 643).

JOHN McCALEB may have been a son of Archibald McCaleb. He was of Wilmington when he married ELIZABETH BURCH of Smithville December 13, 1811. (North Carolina Biennial Report of Marriages). He was mentioned in the personal estate of William S. Nichols, deceased, November 5, 1812.

DUNCAN McCALEB may have been a son of Archibald McCaleb. He appears on the New Hanover County census of 1820-1 m. 16-18, 2 m. 18-26, 1 m. over 45, 1 f. 18-26.

ARCHIBALD McCALEP appears on 1790 census of Craven County, N. C. as living alone.

ANIS McCALOP-Drew pay for army service in Revolutionary War 1784-1785 at Wilmington. (See Enos McCaleb of Rockbridge County, Virginia).

JAMES McCaleb married ELIZABETH CORBETT

JAMES McCALEBB¹ may have been the son of Archibald McCaleb of New Hanover County, North Carolina. He was born 1800 in North Carolina. He married ELIZABETH MARY CORBETT January 8, 1824 in North Carolina. James McCaleb appears on the census of 1830 in New Hanover County, but only the name is legible. October 31, 1832 James McCaleb of New Hanover County testified to the character of James Devand, who was trying to prove that he was a Captain in the Revolutionary War for the purpose of securing a pension. (John Devane owned land adjoining that of Archibald McCaleb in 1787 and 1811 Deed Records).

Elizabeth (Corbett) McCaleb was born in North Carolina 1805. She and James McCaleb and their small children moved to Kemper County, Mississippi 1832. (Tradition says they came by way of Green County, Alabama). He died in Kemper County, Mississippi November 11, 1848. She died in Kemper County about 1878.

James McCaleb and his family lived near Scooba, Mississippi. He owned a farm and owned about a hundred slaves. He was an Odd Fellow, a member of the Presbyterian Church, and he voted the Democratic ticket.²

A. SARAH ELIZABETH McCALEBB, daughter of James and Elizabeth McCaleb, was born November 30, 1824 in North Carolina and died November 17, 1863 in Kemper County, Mississippi. She married ABNER McGEHEE JACK October 18, 1846 at Wahalak, Mississippi. He was born January 14, 1814 in Elbert County, Georgia and died January 27, 1866 in Kemper County, Mississippi.

Abner Megehee Jack was a member of the famous Jack family of North Carolina. He served as Captain in Company B, 35th Mississippi Regiment in the War between the States. His ancestors came from Ireland to Mecklinburg County, North Carolina in 1730. Another ancestor, James Jack was a Captain in the Revolutionary War and loaned \$20,000 to North Carolina. He was bearer of the Mecklinburg Declaration of Independence. Abner Jack's father, Patrick Jack was a Col. in the War of 1812 and a member of the North Carolina Senate.

1. MAY JACK, daughter of Abner McGehee and Sara E. (McCaleb) Jack, was born January 23, 1849 in Kemper County, Mississippi. She married A. M. RENCHER 1868. She died March 20, 1878.

a. MAY JACK RENCHER, daughter of A. M. and May (Jack) Rencher, married J. E. LIPSCOMB.

b. HENRY WARREN RENCHER, son of A. M. and May (Jack) Rencher never married. He died in Texas.

c. GUY JACK RENCHER, son of A. M. and May (Jack) Rencher, married ROSA FLAKE. He died at Columbus, Mississippi and was buried at Dekalb, Mississippi.

2. GUY JACK, son of Abner McGehee and Sara E. (McCaleb)

Jack, was born October 11, 1853. He married LYDIA AUGUSTA EDWARDS October 1, 1884 in Kemper County, Mississippi. She was born March 7, 1861. Guy Jack died May 12, 1931.

- g. JAMES PATRICK JACK, son of Guy and Lydia A. (Edwards) Jack, was born May 5, 1898 in Scooba, Mississippi. He was injured while in the U. S. military service in World War I. He served in the Medical Department, Company C at Camp Benjamin Harrison. He never married and died September 22, 1924.
- B. DR. ARCHIBALD JOHN TOOMER McCALLEBB, son of James and Elizabeth (Corbett) McCalebb, was born December 3, 1826. He attended the University of Virginia about 1852 for three years, but did not graduate there. He did become a surgeon. He married SALLIE HILL of North Carolina. Some of the family think they lived in Choctay County, Pushmataha, Alabama. Dr. McCalebb died March 25, 1891. His widow gave his medical books to her cousin Dr. William Hill of Brandon, Mississippi. Sallie (Hill) McCalebb was the daughter of Wooten Hill, who came to Mississippi from North Carolina. Senator Hill was a great nephew of Sallie (Hill) McCalebb.

1. MARY LINNIE McCALEBB, daughter of Dr. Archibald John Toomer and Sallie (Hill) McCaleb, was born January 25, 1868. She married (?) ROYALE, and they live in Fannin, Rankin County, Mississippi.
 - a. GUY ROYALE, son of (?) and Mary Linnie (McCalebb) Royale, was born October 2, 1892. He married GRACE (?), and they live in Hattiesburg, Mississippi.
 - 1) FRANCES LYNN ROYALE, daughter of Guy and Grace (?) Royale, was born May 17, 1932.
 - b. TOMMER ROYALE, daughter of (?) and Mary Linnie (McCalebb) Royale, was born June 1895.

- C. JAMES ALEXANDER PATRICK McCALEBB, son of James and Elizabeth (Corbett) McCalebb, was born December 17, 1828 in North Carolina. (See Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Mississippi.) Patrick McCalebb passed his boyhood and school days in Kemper County, Mississippi. At the age of 20 years he engaged in mercantile business, which he continued for most of his life. He also was the proprietor of the McCalebb Hotel, Scooba, Mississippi. He married Miss ISABELLE ADAMS, daughter of Archibald and Winifred (Avery) Adams. Isabelle (Adams) McCalebb's parents came from North Carolina to Kemper County, Mississippi at an early date. James Alexander Patrick McCalebb was known as "Patrick". He was a Democrat in politics and was a Justice of the Peace for four years. He was interested in all things having a tendency to the general improvement of his country, especially in churches and schools. In 1862 he enlisted in the Company commanded by Captain Jack and served in the army of the Confederacy until his discharge in 1865. Both he and his wife were members of the Presbyterian Church.
 1. ANNA BELLE (or Bard) McCALEBB, daughter of James A. Patrick and Isabelle (Adams) McCaleb, was born August 9, 1861. She married Reverend J. C. COROTHERS, a Presbyterian minister, when she was only seventeen years of age. February 1879 they moved to Grenada, Mississippi, where they lived the rest of their lives.

A. JAMES HAYWOOD McCALEB,¹ was born 1827 in Tennessee. He married FRANCES ANN (?) about 1856 probably in Tennessee. He served in the Confederate Army as Colonel, Company F & S 1st Arkansas Volunteers.

1. JOHN BELL McCALEB, son of James Haywood and Frances Ann McCaleb, was born October 24, 1856 in Evening Shade, Arkansas (Census 1870). He was educated at the Evening Shade Academy. He married ALLIE ABERNATHY of Rhea Springs, Tennessee January 10, 1883. He was admitted to the Bar of Arkansas 1881. He practiced his profession at Evening Shade seven years as a partner to Hon. M. ALSON McCALEB married KATHERINE TRAVIS

A. ALSON (Alison) McCALEB was born about 1830-1840. He was a Tennessee planter and owned a plantation near Memphis, Tennessee. He saw the War between the States coming on and about 1858 went to Texas and bought a large plantation near the town of Washington, Texas. He had married KATHERINE TRAVIS in Tennessee, and they had two sons born in Tennessee. After establishing his family in Texas, Alson McCaleb returned to Tennessee to sell his property there and to bring his slaves and other properties to Texas. He started his return trip by boat to New Orleans and was there caught in that great cholera epidemic and died, his slaves being appropriated by others and his money lost. The widow remarried, and the family moved to Bastrop and later to Benton, near San Antonio. This Alson McCaleb appears on Washington County, Texas records as "M. A. McCaleb".

Tradition in this family says that the paternal McCaleb ancestor was an officer in the Revolutionary War, and that he came over from Scotland about 1746 or 1747 to North Carolina.

Dr. Walter Flavius McCaleb (Ph. D), a descendant, says that he recalls his uncle and father speak of an uncle Ephraim as "Eph". Dr. McCaleb says that Alison or Alson McCaleb had a number of brothers, and that he understands that one went to Oklahoma, one to Alabama, and one possibly to Louisiana. Dr. Walter McCaleb says that tradition in his family was that his Revolutionary ancestor was a brother to Captain William McCaleb who emigrated from South Carolina to Claiborne County, Mississippi in 1799.

The County Clerk of Brenham, Texas checked the Deed Books 1840-1865 for Mrs. Katy McC. Headley and said that M. A. McCaleb had ten records in the deed books for that period, but none of the deeds showed where this M. A. McCaleb (also McCalip) lived before he came to Texas. The earliest deed was in Book 6, p. 109.

Graves Lafayette McCaleb of San Antonio, Texas thinks that his ancestor was named Samuel instead of Alson. This is probably a mistake. It would seem logical to suppose that Alson or Allison was of the Hickman County, Tennessee family, since he came from Western Tennessee to Texas, and because of the name association-Alson and Ephraim, etc. It seems also probable that his Revolutionary ancestor could have been John McCaleb of North Carolina. The Hickman, Tennessee family are the only ones with the name Ephraim. Alton also is common to this family. Alson and Allison appears as a given name in the John McCaleb family

of Orange County, Tennessee. Zill McCaleb, son of James McCaleb of Hickman County went to Texas, and his descendants say he came from "near Memphis". Zill, of Hickman, settled in Robertson County, Texas, and Alson settled in the county of Washington.

DESCENDANTS OF ALISON (ALSON) AND KATHERINE TRAVIS

1. JOHN LAFAYETTE McCALEB, son of Alson and Katherine (Travis) McCaleb, was born in Washington County, Texas March 4, 1852 in either Bastrop or Benton, Texas. He married ELIZABETH SWEETEN, daughter of Noah Sweeten of Tennessee and Texas.
- a. WALTER FLAVIUS McCALEB, son of John L. and Elizabeth (Sweeten) McCaleb, was born at Benton, Texas in 1872. He married Marie Idealie McCaleb, a descendant of Captain William McCaleb, in New Orleans, Louisiana June 29, 1899. She was born September 20, 1877, daughter of Edwin Harrod McCaleb of New Orleans. Walter Flavius McCaleb, Phd., was for some years a banker. He retired from banking and became an author of some note, having published several books. Idealie McCaleb died in the 1950's, and Walter Flavius McCaleb married the second time. (In 1964 he and his wife are living in Austin, Texas.)
It is said that Franklin Roosevelt was at one time undecided whether to appoint Cordell Hull or Walter Flavius McCaleb as Secretary of State.¹

- b. NOAH ALSON "NOTIE" McCALEB, son of John L. and Elizabeth (Sweeten) McCaleb, was born at Benton, Texas. He married and had one daughter.
 - 1). RUTH McCALEB², daughter of Noah Alson McCaleb, married (?) RHODES. She lives in Midland, Texas.
 2. FLAVIUS MELVILLE McCALEB, son of Alson and Katherine (Travis) McCaleb, was born October 17, 1854 and died 1944. He married MARY LAVINA MARTIN, and they had seven children.
 - a. FLAVIUS McCALEB was the son of F. Melville and Mary L. (Martin) McCaleb.
 - b. NINA McCALEB was the son of F. Melville and Mary L. (Martin) McCaleb.
 - c. GRAVES LAFAYETTE McCALEB, son of F. Melville and Mary L. (Martin) McCaleb, was born at Pleasanton, Texas. He married OLLIE ADAMS. There was no issue. In later life he resided in San Antonio, Texas.

There seems to be a close kinship between this family and the McKelips of York County, Pennsylvania and McKalebs of Maryland.

JAMES McCaleb⁷, Militia of the Company of Cumberland, Pennsylvania, Class Roll of Captain Jack's Company of the Eighth Battalion, 1779. James McCaleb, Fifer Class.

ALEXANDER McCaleb-Muster Roll of Captain John Robert's Company of the Fifth Detachment, Pennsylvania Militia now in service of the United States at Buffalo-Alexander McCaleb, Private. August 24, 1814.

ALEXANDER McKILLIP of Centre County served in Captain Records Company and also under Perry on the "Trip", and was decorated for bravery by the State of Pennsylvania.

Original Rolls from the Pennsylvania Militia belonging to the Regiment commanded by Colonel Rees Hill from May 5th to November 8th when discharged October 1813.

JOHN McKELIP OF YORK COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

(Adams was taken from York)

JOHN McKELLIP OF YORK COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

JOHN McKELIP (name also spelled McKellip, McKelip, and McCalip) was a member of the Fourth Class of the inhabitants of Mount Joy Township, York County (Now Adams), Pennsylvania classified under an Act of Assembly in 1780, entitled "An Act to complete the Quota of the Federal Army". Each class required to provide in fifteen days from this date Jan. 30, 1781, one able bodied Recruit for the Continental Army, to serve during the war, under penalty of a fine of 15 pounds. There are no records as to whether this class furnished a recruit or not. (Class Lists, M. S. S., the Historical Society; H. J. Young, York County, Pa., in the American Revolution; a Source Book. M. S. Black Series 160).

JOHN McKELLIP of Mount Joy Township, York County, Pennsylvania was fined 3.10.0 pounds by warrant dated May 10, 1777, for failure to "meet and exercise in order to learn the art Military" as was required in an Act of Assembly of February 14, 1777. (This fine was later deleted.) (Warrant Book, M. S. The Historical Society of York County, Young, ap. cit. Black Series, p. 212.)

JOHN McKELIP was a private in the Seventh (Captain Thomas Orbison) Company, Fifth Battalion, York County Militia-Mount Joy Township. (Historical Society of York County, Pennsylvania.)

JOHN McCaleb was assessed 1.0.0 pounds in taxes in Mount Joy Township, York County, 1782. In 1783 John McKellip's assessment records are: Inhabitants 8, Land 10 acres, Houses 1, Horned cattle 2, Horses 1, value 35.10.0 pounds. Tax .0.14.0 pounds. (See records at Historical Society of York County, York, Pennsylvania.)

JOHN McKELIP died 1808. Letters of Administration are dated October 20, 1808. Papers refer to John McKelip, "late of Straban Township, Adams County". ARCHIBALD McKELIP and ALEXANDER McKELIP were named as executors of the estate which consisted mostly of personal belongings, such as clothes and eight bonds, one due of each payable April 1, 1809. Children of John McKelip were named in the settlement: ARCHIBALD McCALIP, MRS. MARY REPP, JOHN McCALIP, ALEXANDER McCALIP, GEORGE McCALIP, THOMAS McCALIP, ROBERT McCALIP, JOSEPH McCALIP, and HUGH McCALIP. (There is also mentioned in this settlement one, Samuel Hays).

ARCHIBALD McCALEB of YORK COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

ARCHIBALD McCALEB, son of John McKelip of York County, Pennsylvania, was administrator of his father's estate, 1808. He appears on the census of 1800 and 1810 was living in Adams County (Adams County was taken from York County), Pennsylvania. He had a wife and family at that time. He does not appear on any later census.

ALEXANDER McKELIP (McCaleb and McCalip) married SARAH SLETZ

ALEXANDER McKELIP¹ (also McCalip and McKelip), son of John McKelip of Adams (York) County, Pennsylvania, was one of the administrators of his father's estate in 1808. He married SARAH SLETZ (also spelled "Slentz") March 29, 1808 in Cumberland County. Alexander Dobbins, a Presbyterian minister, officiated at the wedding. Sarah (Sletzt) McCaleb was born 1788. The couple lived in Mount Joy Township, Adams County, where he was a farmer. Probably some of his younger sisters and brothers lived with them, and some probably lived with Archibald McCaleb. Soon after 1810 Alexander and Sarah (Sletzt) McCaleb moved to Springfield, Cumberland County (near Newville). Alexander McKaleb served in the War of 1812 from Cumberland County under Captain John Creigh. (Vol. 7, p. 469). Alexander McCaleb and his family were Presbyterians. Alexander McCaleb and his wife were buried in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Newville, Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. (A search in 1950 did not show the graves or stones). (See Addenda for Census of York and Cumberland Counties, Pennsylvania.) Alexander McCaleb and family appear on Census 1800 and 1810 York County. They appear on 1820, 1830, 1840 of Cumberland County. His widow appears as head of the house 1850.

He married MARTHA KOCHENOUR[?] January 21, 1834. She was a German and spoke the language, which she taught her son William H. McCaleb, who, when he was grown, taught it. She was born January 21, 1815.

1841 John and Martha (Kochenour) McCaleb sold the land which they had purchased in Cumberland County, 1836. They moved to Clinton County, Pennsylvania in 1849. (See Deed Records, Clinton County). They later sold their land in Clinton County and moved to Santa Barbara, California. He died in Santa Barbara December 6, 1888. She died February 23, 1896. Both are buried in Santa Barbara.

A. JOSEPH McCALEB, son of John and Martha (Kochenour) McCaleb, was born November 13, 1834. He married Ellen (?). He was a farmer and lived in Walker Township, Centre County, Pennsylvania. In 1877 Joseph and Ellen (?) McCaleb were left land in trust for their children. Joseph McCaleb did not move west when his parents did. He remained in Pennsylvania where he died. He became blind.

1. JOANNAH McCALEB, daughter of Joseph and Ellen (?) McCaleb, was born 1860. (See Census 1860-1870, Centre County.)

2. JOHN KOCHENOUR McCALEB[?], son of Joseph and Ellen (?) McCaleb, was born April 19, 1861. He went West with his Uncle John McCaleb. They went to San Francisco by train and then to Portland, Oregon. He married ETTA McDOWELL, daughter of Col. John McDowell and Mary

(Barnes) McDowell, in Oregon February 2, 1883. John Kochenour McCaleb and his wife owned a farm at Burnt Woods, Oregon.

Joseph McCaleb and his descendants seem to have been cursed with tragedy.

John Kochenour went to the home of his father-in-law and there found that the father-in-law had placed a stick in a horse's mouth, thereby very cruelly holding the mouth of the horse open. John K. remonstrated, and when the father-in-law refused to remove the stick, John K. removed it, whereupon the father-in-law shot and killed John K. A court determined it an accident, but the neighbors did not and strung the in-law up to a tree. Etta (McDowell) McCaleb was living in 1950.

JOHN McCALEB, son of John McCaleb, a patriot soldier in the Revolutionary War, appears on the census of 1800, York County. He appears to be the same person who served under Colonel James Fenton in the War of 1812. (See Addenda for War Record.) He seems to have been a minor when his father died 1808.

MARY REPP McCALEB (or she may have been Mrs. Mary McCaleb Repp) appears in the settlement of the estate of her father, John McCaleb, of York County, Pennsylvania, 1808.

GEORGE McCALEB, son of John McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier of York County, Pennsylvania, was mentioned in the settlement of his father's estate 1808. He appears on the

Census of 1820 in York County, Pennsylvania, with a wife and family.

THOMAS McCaleb, son of John McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier of York County, Pennsylvania, is named in the settlement of his father's estate 1808. He died in Cumberland County 1845. James Eliot administered the estate. No will or orphan Court Records or deed of this estate appear on record in Cumberland County. In 1840 Thomas McKelip was 50-60 and living alone in Adams County, Pennsylvania. (See Census Records.)

ROBERT McCaleb, son of John McCaleb, a Revolutionary soldier of York County, Pennsylvania, was named in the settlement of his father's estate, 1808.

HUGH McCaleb (also McCalip), son of John McCaleb, who was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, was named in the settlement of his father's estate, 1808. He served in the War of 1812 and appears on the payroll of Captain McMullens (McMillan) Militia Company in the bounds of the Second Brigade, Fifth Division, Pennsylvania Militia, and belonging to the Fifth Detachment under command of Col. James Fenton for six dollars per man in part of additional pay allowed by an act of the Legislature passed on March 29, 1813 and agreeable to an act passed February 22, 1814. Signed, John McMillan, Capt. (Original Rolls from the Pennsylvania Militia.)

MARGARET McCaleb, daughter of James and Margaret (?) McCaleb, was mentioned in her father's will, 1797.

YORK AND ADAMS COUNTY, PA. CENSUS AND OTHER RECORDS

1777-John McKellip of Mount Joy Township, Adams County, Pennsylvania was "fined for not meeting exercises to learn art military".

John McCaleb appears on a record as a Revolutionary War Soldier. Vol. 6, page 308 of the Fifth Series of Revolutionary soldiers from Pennsylvania. (Index shows "McCale". Same reference as James McCaleb, who served as Fifer in Captain John Jack's Company. James McCaleb was from Cumberland County.

John McKelip was a private in the Seventh Company. Thomas Orbison, Capt., Fifth Battalion, York County Militia, Mount Joy Township.

1776-Archibald McCaleb (spelled "McKellip") served in the Revolutionary War under Captain Murry and Col. Brodhead, Second Battalion of Pennsylvania. Played the fife. Stationed at Headquarters camp near Ft. Washington (New York Harbor) and later at camp near Carrell'. (See Vol. III, pages 323 and 329 Revolutionary Records of Pennsylvania). ARCHIBALD McCALEB of PENNSYLVANIA⁸

WILL OF JAMES McCaleb³

Know all men by those present that I James McCaleb of Salem Township, Westmoreland County, State of Pennsylvania, weak in body but perfectly sound in mind, do dispose of my real and personal estate in the following manner, Viz.- It is my will & pleasure that after all existing debts & funeral expenses are discharged, that all the remainder of my estate, real & personal shall remain unsold for the space of 12 years from this date for the joint use and support of my wife and family, and for the schooling and raising of those that are not yet grown up at the expiration of which time it is my will and pleasure that all my estate real and personal shall be sold (except my wife's bed and one cow which I bequeath to her) and the whole amount of money arising from the sale, I bequeath in the following manner. I bequeath to my beloved wife Margaret the sum of one hundred pounds to be disposed of by her, in her life, at her death in whatever manner she may think proper. I bequeath to my daughters, Margaret, Mary, Jean, and Elizabeth the sum of fifty pounds each, and the remainder of the money I bequeath to my sons Archibald, John, James, and Matthew to be equally divided between them. It is also my will that as some part of my property may be sold on credit, that those of my children who may soonest leave the family or do the least to the support and raising of the young ones, shall be last in receiving their part of the legacy, but if any of my sons or daughters shall die without issue and before they are of age, then his, her, or their part of the estate shall be equally divided among the surviving Legatees. I ordain and appoint John Woods, Archibald McCaleb, and John McCaleb to be the executors of this my last will and Testament. Given under my hand and seal this fifth day of April, One thousand seven hundred and ninety seven.

LETTER FROM MRS. HERMIE HAUGER TO WILLIAM REED McCaleb

"Last Sunday Joe Atlinson and wife and Ardis Birk took me to Cleveland to see Earl McCaleb a first cousin of Earl is the uncle of Wilton's youngest son.⁴ Uncle W was my mother's eldest brother. Joe Atlinson and Ard Birk are the grandchildren of mother's brother Joan. I had a copy of the Hosack history and a copy of Uncle John's record which I gave to Earl and in return he gave me a letter of Aunt Mary Dirlan's to copy. Since I

Earl last his wife Mammie has passed away, last December. Earl has a son Willis not married and they live together; Earl does the housework. He is 74 and the house is spotless.

I received a letter from Mrs. Shirk**** I want to get a copy of the letter I have written by David McCaleb M. D. who gave me information about James McCaleb eloping with a daughter of the Chief of the McAlpin Clan and coming to America landing on the Carolina coast and later to Mississippi to live.

He said there were four brothers-one coming on to Connells-ville Basin in Pennsylvania, one went West and married an Indian Squaw, two remaining in the South. I have forgotten their names."

COPY OF A LETTER WRITTEN BY EARL McCALEB BY AUNT MARY DURLAM

"My great grandfather McCaleb was one of three brothers who came from Scotland to America about 1760. They were lost on the ocean for three months, a child was born while on the water. Two of these brothers settled in Adams County, Pennsylvania and ran a saw mill there. The third brother settled in the South.

My grandfather was born September 2, 1779, John McCaleb. Archibald McCaleb was the other brother's name. John McCaleb married Sally Hosack who was born December 28, 1790. To them were born 9 children.

EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER WRITTEN TO MRS. SHIRK (GENEALOGIST) BY MRS. HERMIE H. HAUGER, 177 E. MAIN ST., NEW LONDON, OHIO. LETTER DATED OCT. 24, 1951.

"Some years before Cousin Will's death he sent me a copy of a letter written to Cousin Ella while she was still at Vassar, by a Dr. David McCaleb^o from some plantation in Mississippi, asking her what family of McCaleb's she belonged to. Now if William McCaleb didn't destroy all of Cousin Will's letters and papers after his death he should have the original letter written to Cousin Ella. "My things are still in storage in Dayton, O. I have been able so far to have a place to keep them with me am unable to send you my copy of this letter, so will tell you what I can remember of it. In some ways the early account given by this Dr. McCaleb does not correspond exactly with the account given by Uncle Dickey McCaleb

"Dr. David McCaleb says, if I remember correctly, there were 4 brothers left Scotland. One eloped with the daughter of the Clan McAlpin.⁷ They landed along the Carolina Coast. One brother went North, locating in Connellsville Basin, Pa. (Connellsville, Fayette County, Pa. is on the Youghioheny River and was settled in 1770.) One went West and married an Indian squaw. The other two remained in the South. He did not mention the names of these brothers that I can remember.

"If you will read the book Bride of Fortune, life of Jefferson Davis' wife, you will learn the one sister of Jefferson Davis, sister Florida, was married to a David McCaleb and visited in Pennsylvania.⁸ Mother told me there was a cousin David used to visit at John's when she lived with them. She said this David was the son of Archibald and was a second cousin.*****

"Just before I left Pennsylvania to come to Ohio this summer, I spent a most enjoyable day with two elderly cousins in Blainsville, Pennsylvania. They gave me the Hosack History. I hope William gave it to you to read. Their home is a gold mine of antiques. Some of the furniture and silver was brought to America by their great grandparents."

McCALEBS (McKALEB and McKILLUP) MARYLAND

PATRICK McCALEB¹ was a patriot soldier in the Revolutionary War. Patrick McCaleb, No. 346, Fifer, 6th Maryland Regiment, a private, card number 37439843, and on the second line was No. 42729. He appears on a return of men reinlisted in the Second Maryland Brigade commanded by Othio H. Williams Esq. Colonel commanded from the 7th until the 23rd of February 1779. Return dated Camp Middlebrook, February 24, 1779. Bounty paid \$100. Another card shows Patrick McCaleb, Maryland 6th, Maryland Regiment of foot commanded by Colonel Otho H. Williams of Captain Andrew Hynes Company, Revolutionary War. Roll dated 9/8/1778 for one year.

Patrick McCaleb evidently was from Frederick County (Carroll)² and would seem to be a brother to Joseph McKillup (McKaleb) of Frederick County.³ 1810 Patrick McCaleb appears on the census of Cabarrus County, North Carolina as over 45 and with a family. (See North Carolina Records.)

JOSEPH AND MARY McKALEB (McKILLUP) OF MARYLAND

JOSEPH McKILLUP served in the patriot army during the American Revolutionary War.⁴ January 3, 1776 he was Quartermaster in the 35th Battalion under Colonel Joseph Good, Frederick County, Maryland.

May 5th 1779 Joseph McKillup of Frederick County, Maryland purchased a lot of land in Tawney Town, Frederick County, Maryland from William Harris⁵ of Chester County, Pennsylvania. For this lot, which was located in Tawney Town on the road to York County, Pennsylvania (Lot 4) he paid William Harris⁶ Five hundred Pounds current money. Names appearing on the deed or indenture were: William Harris and Sarah Harris (wife), Jacob Good, Jacob Young, JAMES Calhoun, Abraham Nan Bibber, and William Gibson.

Joseph McCaleb appeared on the census of 1790 and again in 1800, Frederick County. In 1796 Joseph McKaleb and his son, David, voted for President.

Joseph McKaleb married MARY ?. In 1802 they had three living children-David McKaleb, Margaret Cropster and John McKaleb.

Joseph McKaleb made a will December 22, 1807. The will was probated February 16, 1808. (Will Book, Frederick County, Maryland). He named as his heirs: Wife, Mary McKaleb, daughter, Margaret Cropster, son, John McKaleb. "To my dear friend, John McKillip, Sr.", nieces, Sarah Harris and Sarah Harris, Jane Klemhoof, "whom I consider my niece".⁷

In his will Joseph McKaleb⁸ requested to be buried in the Church Yard of Piney Creek Meeting House.⁹

DAVID McKALEB, son of Joseph and Mary McKaleb of Taney Town, Maryland was a property owner in Frederick County and voted in the Presidential election of 1796. He died without marrying or without issue in 1802. His will was made July 26, 1800 and probated February 3, 1802. In his will he stated that he was a resident of Taney Town and named as his heirs: Father, Joseph McKaleb; Mother, Mary McKaleb; sister, Margaret Cropster; cousin, Jane Klemihoff; cousin, John McKellup; ¹⁰ brother, John McKaleb.

JOHN McKALEB, son of Joseph and Mary McKaleb, seems to be the same person as John McCaleb who appeared on the census of Frederick County in 1820. Perhaps he is the same person as John McCaleb who married MARY G. CLIMGAN in Frederick County March 21, 1801.

MARGARET McCALEB, daughter of Joseph and Mary McCaleb, married ? CROPSTER.

ADDENDA-McCalebs and like spelling of MARYLAND.

1790-KATHERINE McKILLIP married WILLIAM RICE April 2, 1790. The presiding minister was Alexander Balmain. (Old marriage Book, p. 143-18, Frederick County, Maryland.)

1854--MARY ANN, wife of JAMES McKILLOP, born October 1811 and died January 25, 1854, aged 42 years, 3 months and 14 days. (Lutheran Cemetery Tawney Town, Carroll County.)

Robert F. Hayes, Jr., genealogist and Editor of the "Maryland Historical Bulletin", made a search for McCalebs and like spelling in the early records of Maryland. This search was very thorough, and the ones appearing in this manuscript are the only ones he found.

JOHN McCALEB, son of John and Martha (Kochenour) McCaleb, and his wife, Mary Elizabeth Miller of Adams County, Pennsylvania, lived in Frederick County, Maryland from about 1840 to 1878 when they moved by ship to Portland, Oregon.

HENRY McCALEB appears on the 1790 Census of Washington County, Maryland. No McCaleb appeared on the census of this county in 1800. He probably was of the Washington County, Pennsylvania family or from Huntington County, Pennsylvania.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court for Frederick County, Maryland states the Deed Records there disclose 21 different transactions of Joseph, John and David McCaleb, prior to 1810. Frederick County was taken from Prince George County in 1748, and Carroll, where the McKalebs lived, was taken from Frederick in 1836.

Research in Maryland was done by Robert F. Hayes, Jr., (Genealogist and Editor of Maryland Historical and Genealogical Bulletin) 1949. He was searching for William McCaleb but found only those included here.

FOOTNOTES

1. Revolutionary War service for Patrick McCaleb may be found in the office of the Adjutant General, Washington, D. C.; also Vol. 18, p. 229 and 304, Maryland Archives, Muster Roll of the Revolutionary War. He enlisted 1/13/1777 and was discharged 8/17/1780. Captain Hynes was from Frederick County, Maryland.

2. Frederick County originally was a part of Prince George County. Carroll was taken from Frederick County 1836.

3. It would seem that the McCalebs, and like spelling, came from York County, Pennsylvania to Carroll County, Maryland at an early date. There seems to be two McCaleb families in Frederick County-McKalebs (also McKillups) of Tawney Town and McKillips from Piney Creek.

4. Service of Joseph McKillip is verified in Maryland Revolutionary War Commissions, p. 140, in Maryland Historical Society. The History of Frederick County, Vol. I, p. 25 states: "Joseph McKillub Esq. to be the Quartermaster of the 35th Battalion of Militia of the Province.....In the 2nd Battalion of Frederick County where Joseph Good is Colonel. Given in Convention at Annapolis January 3, 1776."

5. The Deed is of record in Frederick County, Maryland, Vol. ?, pp.73-74. A search by Robert F. Hayes, Jr., genealogist and editor of the Maryland Historical Society found no church record or land record, deed or grant, no marriage record or record of any kind of McCaleb, McKillops or like spelling in Maryland before 1776.

6. It would appear that William Harris was a brother-in-law to Joseph McCaleb, since Joseph purchased land of him and since Joseph had nieces-Jane and Sarah Harris. William Harris was from Chester County, Pennsylvania. Harris and Gibsons appear in deed records in North Carolina as neighbors of McCalebs. Also Jas. Calhoun's name appears on the indenture or deed. On the same page on another deed appears the name of Jacob Young, William Gibson. (See Tennessee McCaleb's).

7. It would appear that Jane and Sarah Harris were neices of Joseph McKaleb, and Jane Klemihoff was the niece of Mary McKaleb, Joseph's wife.

8. The will of Joseph McKaleb (Book G. M., R B-1, p. 356) and the will of David McKaleb (Book G. M. 3, p. 491) are on record in Frederick County, Maryland-Marriage books.

9. Piney Creek is a town on the road between Tawney Town, Maryland and York, Pennsylvania.

10. There seems to be two families of related McCalebs living in Frederick County, Maryland. One family seems to have lived at Tawney Town and the other at Piney Creek.

Will was proven in Court by Joseph Tucker January Session 1820. Penenah McKillop qualified as executrix.

He was a private of Captain Gates Camp, 7 Corps of Artillery and transferred from thence to Ordinance.

"April 20, 1797-Called Court on Enos McCaleb". (Vol. 1, p. 257, Chalkley's Abstracts of Augusta County. Augusta was the parent of Rockbridge, it being cut off Augusta 1778. This is the only reference to a McCaleb.)

JOHN W. McCALEB⁷ and wife BETSY and Caleb Parker and his wife, Nancy, entered into a Deed of Partition, both men having married daughters of Jno. Anderson. This land lies on Whistle Creek, a few miles west of Lexington. Dated Sept. 20, 1869 (Deed Book KK, p. 351). John W. McCaleb purchased a small orchard on Whistle Creek from W. L. Kerr (Deed Book 00, p. 408) August 7, 1874.

2. Anis or Enos McCaleb did not appear in N. C. Records after 1785. Oren F. Norton says that he died in Rockbridge County about 1803.

SAMUEL D. McCALEB¹, son of Enos McCaleb² of Rockbridge County, Virginia, (a Patriot soldier from North Carolina in the Revolutionary War), was born February 17, 1790. He moved westward from Virginia to Piketon, Pike County, Ohio. There he married CATHERINE WOOD April 3, 1820.³ (Marriage Record, Pike County, Ohio). Samuel and Catherine (Wood) McCaleb moved from Pike County, Ohio to Ox Bow Pararie, Putnam County, Illinois August 1832, about the time of the Black Hawk War. He died September 16, 1839 at the age of 50 years. He and his wife are buried at Caledonia, Illinois. After Samuel's death his family moved to Hope, Illinois. Samuel McCaleb's family and descendants are noted for being exceptionally tall and large, but not fat, men. Family names run to "Berts".

At the end of the war he held the rank of Colonel of the famous Black Horse Cavalry. He is mentioned in the records as Colonel of the 6th U. S. Cavalry, Lieut. Col. of the Second Mississippi Heavy Artillery, 17th Army Corps under Major General James B. McPherson, 4th Division under Brig. General M. M. Crocker (Colored Troops), 1st Brigade under Brig. General John P. Hawkens at Vicksburg. (Official Records-"War of the Rebellion"-Series 1, Vol. 32, part 2, p. 305).

Hubert Anvil McCaleb married SARAH ELIZABETH BUSHNELL March 17, 1864 at Peru, Illinois. After the war, he

became Sheriff and Clerk of LaSalle County, Illinois. (1866-1868 he was Sheriff. 1873-1877 he was Clerk.) He died March 27, 1878. His wife died December 1933 at Huntington Park, California. (At one time he lived in Ottawa.)

"Lieut. Col. Hubert A. McCaleb, Second Miss. Heavy Artillery-February 7, 1864 in skirmish at Vidalia, Louisiana and with 300 colored troops he put to flight after firing at the enemy at 200 yards distance of vast superior forces." (Official Records-"War of the Rebellion" Series 1, Vol. 34, part 1, p. 129.)

"Lieut. Col. Hubert A. McCaleb, in a skirmish at Gillespies Plantation, Louisiana August 4-6, 1864 with 400 Infantry in his command and he joined 100 Cavalry, repulsed the enemy driving them back over four miles, they then broke and scattered in all directions." (Official Records-"War of the Rebellion"-Series 1, Vol. 39, Part 1, p. 459.)

"Hubert A. McCaleb, Lieut. Col. Report of Brig. General Mason Brayman Commanding at Natchez, Miss. Dated September 30, 1864 to headquarters. Sir: I have the honor to report that the forces which I sent out on Monday to Silicy Island, La. and Waterproof under Lieut. Col. H. A. McCaleb returned this morning without accident or loss with the following results: 1 rebel flag, 1 rebel Col., 3 rebel Captains, 4 rebel Privates, 2 rebel guerillas, 25 serviceable horses, 100 serviceable mules, 400 fat cattle. If fresh beef is wanted above or below, I can spare 200 animals."¹³ (Official Records-"War of the Rebellion"-Series 1, Vol. 39, part 1, p. 572.)

THOMAS McCALEB of WESTERN VIRGINIA

THOMAS McCALEB of VIRGINIA¹

THOMAS McCALEB lived either in West Virginia or the Western part of what is now Virginia. He is said by his descendants to have had four sons, Joseph and Thomas, both who stayed in Virginia, and two others who migrated to other parts of the country. Thomas McCaleb had one or more daughters.

I. JOSEPH McCALEB, son of Thomas McCaleb, married CATHERINE SIDNEY HARDGROVE November 9, 1818 at the Hardgrave Plantation in Chesterfield County, Virginia. Joseph and his wife resided in Richmond, Virginia. He died at a young age, leaving his widow, a four year old son and a two year old daughter. The widow took her two year old daughter and went to live with her mother on her mother's plantation beyond Richmond. Catherine Sidney (Hardgraves) McCaleb's brother, Samuel Hardgraves, took Thomas Joseph McCaleb, age 4 years, to live with him at his residence in Manchester, Virginia, across the James River from Richmond.

A. THOMAS McCALEB², son of Joseph and Catherine Sidney (Hardgrave) McCaleb, was born April 27, 1821 in Virginia and died 1898 at Petersburg, Virginia. His father died when he was four years old, and he went to live at Manchester, Virginia with his uncle Samuel Hardgrave³. His uncle gave him a fine education, and he learned the cabinet-making trade. He was quite gifted. He made his own designs and carved the furniture by hand. As a young man he moved to Petersburg, Virginia where he practiced his trade. In the 1870's he held a government office in the Customs House, but he later went back to his trade. He married (1) LUCY JANE HARDY. After her death he married ELIZABETH HARDY, sister of his first wife. He died 1898 at Petersburg, Virginia.

3. CHARLES NORMAN McCALEB, son of Thomas Joseph and Lucy Jane (Hardy) McCaleb, was born October 2, 1852. He became a cabinet maker and after his father's death took over the business. He died January 15, 1915.

25, 1860. She never married.

7. JOSEPH BENJAMIN McCALEB, son of Thomas Joseph and Lucy Jane (Hardy) McCaleb, was born April 7, 1864. He was drowned off the coast of Maine February 25, 1927. He married VIRGINIA JOHNSTON of Pattison, New Jersey.
 - a. THOMAS JOSEPH McCALEB, son of Joseph Benjamin and Virginia (Johnston) McCaleb, is an artist, a painter. He married, and the family lives at Alexander, Virginia.

 - 2). ALVIN FRANKLYN McCALEB is the son of Thomas Joseph and Virginia (Johnston) McCaleb.

1. Most of the information concerning this family came from Miss Nellie McCaleb of Petersburg in a correspondence with K. McC. H. in 1948. She had this to say about her forefathers: "Father said the McCalebs came to Pennsylvania because of trouble with King Charles. Some of the family migrated from Pennsylvania to West Virginia or western Virginia. There are probably still descendants of Thomas McCaleb (Brother of Joseph) in W. Va. The two sons of Thomas, who remained in Virginia were Joseph and Thomas-Thomas had two sons, Joseph and Bruce (the latter named

for the King of Scotland). The brothers moved west-
Father had a letter from a cousin in Tennessee or Alabama.
Thomas, besides having 4 sons had one or two daughters.
Joseph died young leaving his widow with Thomas Joseph,
4 years old and Harriet Sidney, 2 years old. They had
lived in Richmond until the death of Joseph. She with her
baby returned to her mother's plantation beyond Richmond
while her brother, Samuel Hardgrave, took father to raise
and educate. He gave father a fine education." Last
address of Miss Nellie McCaleb was: Miss H. E. McCaleb,
703 Halifax St., Petersburg, Va.

WILLIAM McCaleb was born 1780¹ and died, probably in Virginia, September 2, 1820 in the 40th year of his life. He is thought, by his descendants, to have settled near Richmond, Virginia near the Chesterfield border of Henrico County.² He married RHODA GORDON WOOD³ December 27, 1803. They were married by Reverend William Irvine. Rhoda Gordon (Wood) McCaleb was born May 25, 1786 and died September 8, 1823. (See Bible Records in the Addenda).

- I. THOMAS LEWIS McCaleb, son of William and Rhoda Gordon (Wood) McCaleb, was born April 30, 1804 in Virginia.
- II. HARRIET SYDNEY McCaleb, daughter of William and Rhoda Gordon (Wood) McCaleb, was born January 4, 1806 in Virginia. Evidently she came with her brother, William McCaleb, to Madison County, Alabama. She married ELIJAH MAYS in Madison County, Alabama February 25, 1825. He was born in Virginia in 1798. (Census of Monroe County, Mississippi, 1850). Elijah and his family are thought to have lived on a plantation near Muldon, Mississippi.⁵

DESCENDANTS OF HARRIET SYDNEY (McCaleb) and ELIJAH MAYS

They later moved their base of operations to Philips County Arkansas. Joseph and Robert reared the three orphan children of their brother, William Charles (Chuck) Mays and his wife, Mary Catherine Deavours. Rosa Mays was one of the orphans, and she states: "Our two

bachelor uncles and three spinster aunts not only were happy to have three bouncing children in the home... they were most loving and indulgent...we had a lovely life with them."

Joseph Mays was buried in the Maple Hill Cemetery, Helena, Arkansas.

- B. WILLIAM CHARLES "CHUCK" MAYS, son of Elijah and Harriet Sydney (McCaleb) Mays, was born 1827 and died November 5, 1886 in Artesia, Mississippi. He was married two, possibly three, times. His last marriage was to MARY CATHERINE DEAVOURS at Muldon, Mississippi on December 21, 1873. (Marriage Book 4, p. 226, Monroe County, Mississippi). She was born August 24, 1848 near Okolona, Mississippi and was the youngest child of Christopher Columbus Deavours, Sr. and his wife, Mary Spradling. Mary Catherine McCaleb was 21 years younger than her husband and was teaching school at Muldon when they met. She spoke French fluently, having an excellent education at Iuka, Mississippi and later in Georgia. She died December 13, 1892 at Artesia, Mississippi and is buried beside her husband in the Methodist Church Cemetery there. During the years when she was a widow, she, with the help of the surrounding community, established a private school in which she taught. She was also in charge of the post-office. When she became ill with tuberculosis and was unable to work, "Uncle Sam" turned his head when her 14 year old son, Jamie, continued to operate the post office in his mother's stead. After her death, the three children went to live with Joseph and Robert Mays, her husband's brothers. (William C. Mays had a daughter of a previous marriage.

Jamie Horner received his education at the University of Mississippi and is credited by his sister, Rosa (Mays) Horner, with having corrupted their mother's name "Deavours" into "Deavourx" or "Decereaux" as a boyish prank while in college. (This prank and its effects is still reflected in some of the present day spelling of the name in this branch of the family. An old family Bible owned by Jack Deavours, Old Bay Springs Road, Laurel, Mississippi supports the claim to the "Deavours" spelling.)
Jamie Deavours Mays died September 18, 1956, and Harriet (Hornor) died January 17, 1956. Both are buried in Maple Hill Cemetery, Helena, Arkansas.

1. William McCaleb was born 1780 and died 1820. This can not be the same person as William Neil McCaleb, son of Captain William and Ann (MacKey) McCaleb, who was born August 8, 1770 and died 1790-1813 in South Carolina. (Compare Bible Records of both families).
2. It is possible that William McCaleb was the son of Eneas McCaleb, Revolutionary soldier and patriot of North Carolina, who settled in Rockbridge County, Virginia. Eneas McCaleb, or like spelling, only appears twice in this research anywhere. He appears in N. C. and Rockbridge County, Va. The name "Eli" appears only twice-Rockbridge County, Va. and Madison County, Alabama.
3. The Wood family came from Albermarle County, Va., from which Rockbridge County was formed. Eneas McCaleb lived

there. Eneas had a son, Eli. He had a son, Samuel, who married a "Wood". For Wood history see History of Albermarle County by Wood and Mrs. John Russell Sampson's Wood History.

4. See Census of 1810, Nelson County, Virginia, and Campbell County, Va. Also, see descendants of Thomas McCaleb of Virginia. Note similarity of names-Joseph, Thomas, Harriet Sydney, Eli.

5. Marriage of Harriet Syndey McCaleb to Elijah Mays can be found in Marriage Book 3, p. 350, Madison County, Alabama. Research on the descendants was done by Mrs. Duncan B. Brown, Jr. 7819 Harmon Drive, Little Rock, Arkansas. She has this to say: "The basis for this research was provided by a McCaleb descendant, Mrs. Rosa (Mays) Hornor. It is due to her love of family research and excellent memory. (The Mays-McCaleb Bible having disappeared when she was a young girl living with her bachelor uncles and Aunt on their plantation in Coahoma County, Mississippi; thought to have been taken by a colored preacher who lived on the place) that this foundation has been provided. Since many sources remain to be checked, research on the McCaleb-Mays line is still considered in process.

6. The name Enos McCaleb only appears twice (as above) in any of my research. Enos, Eneas, Anis McCaleb only appears twice-Rockbridge County, Virginia and the Wilmington District North Carolina.

ARCHIBALD McKILLIP married MARGARET KELLY in Ireland. They had three children, all born in Ireland. (Descendants said that the Kelly family lived in Ireland within sight of the Giant's Causeway). Archibald, his wife and three sons emigrated from Ireland to Cherry Valley, New York in 1763 and settled just east of the Springfield line. Sons of Archibald and Margaret (Kelly) McKillip were: Archibald McKillip, John McKillip, and Daniel McKillip. (See Addenda-"Jane Ferguson's Revolutionary Recollections".)

ARCHIBALD McCaleb, Revolutionary War soldier, appears on the Pension Roll from Otsego County, Cherry Valley 1840.

ARCHIBALD McKILLIP, spoken of as "the Younger Archibald McKillip", died in 1847 in Cherry Valley, age 99 years.

JOHN McKELLIP, War of 1812 (55-120-warrant 72011) was a private under Capt. Peter Magher, New York Militia. MARY McKILLIP age 57 applied in Otsego County, New York, resident of the town of Cherry Valley, said county, states that she is the widow of John McKellip deceased, who was a private in company of Capt. Peter Magher in the 16th regiment of New York State Militia commanded by Co. Farrand Strannahan in the War with Great Britain, declared 18 June 1812, states her husband volunteered at Cherry Valley about the 8th Sept. 1812, for 3 months and served 3 months and was discharged at Lewiston, 12-1812, and said company was transferred to the 18th regiment under Col. Daubin, states she married John McKellip in town of Cherry Valley, 2-1-1821 by John Tener a clergyman, and her name before marrying was MARY DUTCHER (or Dutchen), that her husband died at Cherry Valley 24 Dec. 1846. She made this application 1850 Sept. 28. Affidavits-Kezia Davis and Wm. Burch, and Benj. Davis. DANIEL B. McKELLIP witnessed her signature.

JAMES McKELLIP, private in War 1812, New York Militia under Capt. Peter Magher. (Bounty Land File 55-120-Warrant 71655). One DANIEL McKELLIP age 54 in Otsego County, New York, 1855 personally appeared a resident of Middlefield, in Otsego County, New York, states he is the brother of James McKellip, who was a private in Company of Capt. Peter Magher in 16th regiment, New York State Militia commanded by Col. Farran Strunnahan in the War with Great Britain (War of 1812), that James entered service as a volunteer at Cherry Valley, that his brother made application 9/28/1850 and a land warrant for 40 acres, the number of which he does not now recollect was issued to James McKellip, that the said brother has been and now is for

many years incompetent to transact business of any kind, and Daniel was appointed to take charge of his business.

THOMAS McCALLUP (No. 317 at top of file), Webster's Regiment of New York Militia (Revolutionary War.) Card No. 37257815-Certificate delivered out to Col. Webster's Regt. of Militia, County of Charlotte (Now Washington). Received two pay certificates signed by Edward Long.

JOHN McCALLOP, served in the Revolutionary War, Webster's Regt. of New York Militia. (At top of file No. 316 or 376-not legible). Card No. 37258230, Washington County, New York. Andrew Simson collected 1.6.8 (nos. 8627) for John McCallop.

The Adjutant General's Office, Washington, D. C. clerk stated the three above named Revolutionary soldiers and one other, Partick McCaleb, of Maryland, are the only four records of McCaleb, McCallup and similar surnames in the Revolutionary Index in that office.

WILLIAM McKILLIP-War 1812. Land Bounty File 55-160, Warrant 48667. He was a private under Capt. Hiram Pratt, 7th Regt., New York Militia. William McKillip was drafted at Washington County, New York June 17, 1812, for 6 months, detached and discharged with the thanks of Colonel at Headquarters, Champlain 12/7/1812. He died January 18, 1850. MONROE McKILLIP was guardian for William McKillip's daughter, FRANCES McKILLIP, who was 19 years of age October 18, 1855. William also left an only son, WILLIAM T. McKILLIP age 21 July 14, 1855. MONROE McKILLIP was a resident of Monroe County, New York. ELIZA McKELLIP of Monroe County, signed a sworn statement.

David McKillips, age 64, personally applied, a resident of Ausable Clinton County, New York, states he was a private in Company of Capt. Henry Perine, in regiment of Militia of Col. Clark Rice, in War 1812, that he was drafted or called out at Cambridge in Washington County, N. Y. 9/1814.

SIMPSON McKILLIP, War of 1812, 55-160-3873 Musician under Capt. H. Prine New York Militia-He applied in Monroe County, New York 1855-He was age 59 and resided at Rochester, Monroe County, New York. States he was called out at Cambridge, New York Oct. 10, 1814 and was discharged at Burlington, Vermont 10/29/1814.

It seems fairly safe to assume that John, Thomas, and Simpson McKillip were brothers and sons of John McKillip, the Revolutionary soldier. William and Monroe McCaleb probably were brothers. K. McC. H.

ALEXANDER McCaleb, REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE
FROM NEW YORK OR PENNSYLVANIA AND MAINE

ALEXANDER McCaleb married HANNAH STEWART YOUNG

ALEXANDER McCaleb was born February 21, 1761, and he died May 13, 1845 in Maine. It is not known where he was born. Some of his descendants think that he was born in Scotland.¹ He volunteered for military service in New York when he was fifteen years of age 1776. When he applied for a pension in 1842 he gave the following account of his military service in the Revolutionary War. (See Addenda). "Alexander McKillip (McCaleb) 18, 969 New York Service. Applied in Washington County, Maine age 82 in 1842... States he first enlisted for six months as drummer boy at New York, Spring of 1776 under Captain Mott of Col. McDougal's Regiment, N. Y. troops and marched to Fort Edward, etc., thence to Lake George; thence to St. Johns Chamlee and driven by superior forces, (Burgoyne's army) and retreated back to Stillwater. I then enlisted for 3 years or during the war, under Capt. Coop's Company of Col. Goose, Van Schoick's 14th New York Regiment, called Van Shoik, 1st Lt. Salisbury and 2nd Lt. Snow, ensign Benjamin Gilbert, Major Swines, Col. Van Dyke and during last term of service, we marched through the Jerseys and took up quarters at Valley Forge, was in battle of Monmouth and taking of Burgoine and Balstown and a number of other skirmishes. In Fall of 1780 at a place above Albany called New City, Now Troy, myself and five others were surprised and taken by the British and carried to Ticonderoga; thence to St. Johns in Canada, where I remained one year and one half or more, thence made my escape, got on board a Dutch Schooner, in disguise, master's name was Merritt-Schooner name Sapsy ?, in which Schooner I proceeded to Halifax. From thence by land to a place called Copycatt-from thence went on board a vessel bound to Passamiguad, now Eastport, thence by land to this town, in which town and the adjoining town of Goldsborough I have resided since."

So it seems that Alexander McCaleb, after escaping from the British, obtained rides by ship to East Port and thence by land to Steuben, Maine. He must have then settled in Goldsborough where he was a tailor by trade. In Goldsborough he married HANNAH STEWART YOUNG, daughter of Noah² and Eleanor (Stewart) Young, 1795. It would seem that Alexander McCaleb lived in Goldsborough for 20 years. Then he seems to have moved to the Pigeon Hill Section of Steuben, Maine, the next town, where he died in 1845. There is a large tombstone and a Revolutionary War marker marking his grave. The dates of his death and birth are engraved on the tombstone with the following melancholy lines:

"He has gone from this world
And invites you to come

Go read the inscription
Engraved on his tomb.
Go down to the grave yard
Go reath there with care
The important lesson
Thou too must lie there."

LAVISA P. YOUNG McCALEB, daughter of Alexander and Hannah (Young) McCaleb. (She was probably married to a Young).

SARAH H. McCALEB, daughter of Alexander and Hannah (Young) McCaleb, probably married a YOUNG. She was living in 1845.

ALEXANDER McCALEB, JR., son of Alexander and Hannah (Young) McCaleb, appears on the Census of 1840-1 male under 5, 1 male 30-40, one male 70-80. It would seem that Alexander McCaleb's wife was deceased and that he, his father, and small son lived together.

ABIGAIL McCALEB, daughter of Alexander and Hannah (Young) McCaleb, probably married a WILSON.

PENSION RECORD OF ALEXANDER McCALEB OR McKILLIP

Alexander McCaleb or McKillip S 18, 969 New York service.

He applied in Washington County, Maine age 82 in 1842,

2nd August, state: he first enlisted for six months as drummer boy at N. Y. in Spring of 1776 under Capt. Mott of Col. McDougal's Regiment, N. Y. troops and marched to Fort Edward; etc. thence to Lake George; thence to St. Johns Chamblee and Montreal in Canada, to Quebec by Sledge on Ice, from thence we were driven by superior force (Burgoin's army), and retreated back to Stillwater. I then enlisted for 3 years or during the war under Capt. Coops of Col. Goose, Van Schoick's 14th N.Y. Regiment, called Van Shoik, 1st Lt. Salsbury and 2nd Lt. Snow, ensign Benj. Gilbert, Major Swines, Col. Van Dyke and during last term of service, we marched through the Jersey's and took up quarters at Valley Forge. Was in the battle of Monmouth and the taking of Burgoin and Balstown and a number of other skirmishes. In the Fall of 1780 at a place above Albany called New City, now Troy, myself and five others were surprised and taken by the British and carried to Ticonderoga; thence to St. Johns in Canada, where I remained one year and a half or more; thence made my escape, got aboard of a Dutch Schooner, in disguise. Master's name was Merritt-Schooner's name was Saspy ?, in which schooner I proceeded to Halifax. From thence by land to a place called Copycatt-from thence went on board a vessel bound to Passamiguad, now Eastport; thence by land to this town, in which town and the adjoining town of Gouldsborough I have resided ever since.

Affidavit of Nathan Shaw: of Gouldsborough, Hancock County, Maine, 1842 states that sometime between 1792-1794 Alexander McCaleb came into said town, Gouldsborough, where he soon afterward married HANNAH YOUNG, daughter of Noah Young, and that the said McCaleb lived in said town for at least 20 years and I was all acquainted with him and have frequently heard him relate his service in the Revolutionary War, and said McCaleb moved from Gouldsborough to the adjoining town of Stueben, Washington---Soldier stated he was 80 on the 21st February last (Letter written Eden, 12-6-1841. I enlisted summer 1775 in N. Y. state.

Affidavits of Louisa P. Young and Sarah H. Young, daughters and heirs at law of Alexander McCaleb. They stated that their father, Alexander McCaleb, served about 7 years in Col. Van Schaick's 1st regiment, raised in state of N. Y. for Revolutionary service. They said their father did not get his pension because the records burned when the capital of the U. S. was burned. Dated 1851.

Affadavits named the children of Alexander McCaleb: Abigail Wilson, Louisa P. Young, Sarah H. Young, Alexander McCaleb were the living children of Alexander McCaleb at the time of his death. Moses McCaleb and Mary Libby

McCaleb had died prior to thier father's death. Moses had left 3 children and Mary Libby had left 6.

A pension certificate was granted to Alexander McCaleb's children from 3-4-1831 to the 16th May 1845, when he died, at eighty dollars per annum, under date 10-27-1851.

TOMBSTONE INSCRIPTION-Pigeon Hill Section, Bangor, Maine.

"Alexander McCaleb.
Born Feb. 21, 1761 and died May 16, 1845.
He has gone from this world
And invites you to come.
Go read the inscription
Engraved on his tomb.
Go down to the graveyard
Go read there with care
The important lesson
Thou too must lie there."

Alexander McCaleb's (McKillop) descendants think he was born in Scotland.

Clerk of County of Washington searched early records:
1824 Moses McCaleb purchased 46½ acres on the Pigeon Bay, Steuben Maine. Moses McCaleb's wife was a Achsah McCaleb.

FOOTNOTES

1. Archibald McKillip married Margaret Kelly in Ireland. She is said to have lived within sight of the Giant's Causeway. Archibald and his wife had three children born in Ireland-Archibald, John, and Daniel. The family came to Cherry Valley, New York in 1763 and settled on a farm which lay a little East of Springfield line. (See New York and New Hampshire McCalebs). The Cherry Valley settlers came originally from Londonderry and places in that vicinity, such as Port Rush and Greencastle. The early comers landed in Boston and spent some years there and about Londonderry, New Hampshire before coming to Cherry Valley. Later migrations of this stock were in part from that region, while others, who were their connections, came directly from Ireland.) See D. A. R. Magazine, Vol. XX, April 1902. Alexander McCaleb may have been of this family, or he may have been of the Pennsylvania family of McCalebs.

(Not identified to any family group)

McCALEBS WHO LIVED IN MISSISSIPPI AND WHO MAY HAVE BEEN
RELATED TO THE CAPTAIN WILLIAM McCALEB FAMILY OF MISS.

DANIEL McCALEB (Name also spelled McCalip) owned land at an early date in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He married MRS. RACHAEL ADKINSON November 10, 1805 in Jefferson County, Mississippi (Marriage Book A, p. 14). She was a widow with two children-Rachael and John Adkinson, and she married (3) Jesse Cook.

Daniel McCaleb (Also McCalep) is listed as a lieutenant of the 2nd Regiment from Wilkinson County, Mississippi in 1807. He appears on the census of 1808 as head of a family and over 21, one male under 21, 1 female over 21, and 1 female under 21, and 4 slaves. (The children were probably those of his wife's by her first marriage.) In 1806 Daniel McCaleb (also McCalep) was granted 157 acres on Cole's Creek, Mississippi, original settler Daniel McCaleb, claim No. 285.

Daniel McCaleb was a private in Lieut. Col. Nixton's Regiment, Mississippi Militia, in the War of 1812. (Mississippi Archives and History.)

James McCalep appears on the census of 1820 as living in Wilkinson County.

Daniel McCaleb does not appear on this 1820 census as living in Wilkinson or Adams Counties, Mississippi.

James McCalep may or may not have been a son.

Daniel McCaleb appears on census 1808-Wilkerson County, Mississippi-1 m. over 21, 1 m. under 21, one f. under 21, 1 f. over 21, 4 slaves.

James McCalep appears on Wilkerson County Census 1820-1 m. 26-45, 2 f. 16-26.

CAROLINE McCALEB: From the Natchez paper-"Married on Tuesday, Evening last, at the residence of Thomas Ford Esq. by Rev. M. Carson, Mr. Nannon (Hannon) Balance to Caroline McCaleb, all of this county. M. S. and M. G. June 7, 1827.

ALEXANDER McCALEB served in the War of 1812 from Mississippi as a private in the First Mississippi Volunteers (Mississippi Archives and History). Alexander McCaleb received a public land claim grant, Western District of Louisiana on Bayou Boiuf, Opelousa County. (American State Papers, Vol. 3, p. 234.) (He may be the same person as Alexander McCaleb who married ANNA BOYD October 8, 1814 in Knox County, Tennessee and who is said to have lived at one time in Mississippi.

Alexander McCaleb-Public Land Claim-Western District of Louisiana on Bayou Boeuf County of Opelousa (American

State Papers, Vol. 3, p. 234.)

EPHRAIM McCALEB¹, 46 years of age, was Justice of the Peace of Lawrence County, Mississippi June 10, 1822. (Mississippi State Archives). (A search by the Chancery Clerk of Lawrence County, Mississippi showed no McCaleb records in his office. He did not appear on the record (census) of 1820 or 1830 in Lawrence County. He is probably the same person as Ephraim McCaleb, son of James and Polly (Mary) McCaleb of Hickman County, Tennessee.)

MILITARY SERVICE OF McCALLEBS

REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE OF McCALEBS OR LIKE SPELLING

ALEXANDER McCALEB (or McKillip) S 18, 869 New York Service applied for a pension in Washington County, Maine, age 82 in 1842, 2nd of August. He said that he enlisted for 6 months at New York in the Spring of 1776 and served under Capt. Mott of Col. McDougal's Regt. of New York troops. He marched to Fort Edward to Lake George to St. John's Chamblee and thence to Montreal and then to Quebec on sleds on ice and then were driven back to Still Water by Burgoine's Army. During all of his service he served as a drummer boy. He was 14 years of age when he enlisted. At Still Water he re-enlisted for three years or the duration of the War. He served under Capt. Coop's Company of Colonel Goose. He was in the march through the Jerseys, wintered at Valley Forge, was in the battle of Monmouth and the taking of Burgoine and at Balstown. He was taken prisoner at New City (Troy) and was taken first to Ticonderoga and thence to St. John's where he was held prisoner about one and one half years. He escaped on a Dutch Ship and settled in Gouldsborough, Maine. Affidavits give the names of Alexander McCaleb's children and the children of his deceased son Moses. The minister who buried Alexander McCaleb testified that he died about May 18, 1845. His children got his pension certificate. Alexander McCaleb was a tailor by trade. Pension Records.

ABRAHAM McKILLOP, a private in the line of New York, served in the Revolutionary War-Warrant No. 7537 issued 2/14/1791 to Edward Savage, assignee. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives, Vol. 2-4 of Land Warrants issued prior to 1800, warrants issued to non-commissioned officers and privates).

ARCHIBALD McCALEB (also spelled McKellip) served in the Revolutionary War as Fifer under Captain John Murray and Colonel Brodhead, Second Battalion of Pennsylvania. Played the Fife. Stationed at Headquarters Camp near Ft. Washington (New York Harbor) and later at camp near Carrell'd. See Vol. II, pages 323 and 329, Pennsylvania Archives Series. Also see 2nd Series, Vol. 10, p. 227. Archibald McCaleb appears on a muster roll 1776. Archibald McCaleb, a fifer 1776 September was in a muster roll of Capt. Murray's Company of 2nd Battalion of Pennsylvania riflemen commanded by Col. Samuel Miles Esq. stationed at King's bridge, mustered al-spelled McKillep. They were non commissioned officers who appeared on parade in Camp near Harlem, N. Y. under command of Lt. James Hamilton, raised for defense of Pennsylvania on continental service. Mustered in camp near Harlen, N. Y. -Capt. Murray Company 9/1/1776. Signed Lod'k Sprogill, M M G & P. (John Murray was of Daughin County, Pennsylvania).

ARCHIBALD McKILLOP, born 1755 and 85 years old in 1840, served in the Revolutionary War. In 1840 he was living in Otsego County, Cherry Valley, New York. (See Pension Records)

ANIS McCALOP, No. 3852 received 15 pounds for "allowances made by the Board of Auditors of Wilmington District from No. 3349 to 3918-from March 1784 to April 1785. (North Carolina Revolutionary Army Accounts, Vol. V, p. 27, folio 4).

GILBERT McCALLOP in April 1777 received 46.13.8 Pounds, claim 222, allowed by Committee of Claims from April 1776 to May 1779. (North Carolina Revolutionary Army Accounts, Vol. V, p. 9, folio 4).

HUGH McCALEB (Also McAlep) (North Carolina Revolutionary War Accounts)

JAMES McCALEB, Fifer Class in Captain John Jack's Company of 8th Battalion in 1779, Militia of the County of Cumberland Pennsylvania, Private class. Vol. 6 of the fifth Series, Pennsylvania Archives, p. 540.

JAMES McCALEB (Also McCalib) served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Brown's Company and in Captain Read's Company, first North Carolina Regiment commanded by Col. Thomas. Clark. He enlisted November ?, 1777 for the war, and his name is last borne on a roll dated September 8, 1778, with the remark: "Sick Valley Forge." (War Dept.-Adjutant General's Office).

James McCaleb (McCalib) received due bills and certificates at Warren May 5, 1786 from Macon McCulloch & Montford and receipted by F. Dixon, Major. "A list of Soldiers Accounts settled since the first day of April 1786. (North Carolina Line in the War of Revolution, Book of Settlements, No. 28, p. 69.)

James McCaleb was paid for 31 days army pay 1775-"Capt. John Walker (of the 1st Regt.) by cash advanced for Commissary Accounts" paid James McCaleb "from time of enlistment to 1st October 1775. (Public Accounts of the State of North Carolina Commencing 22nd August 1775-Revolutionary Army Accounts Public Accounts 1-6, p. 192).

JOHN McCALEB, Revolutionary Service. (Vol. 6, p. 308 Pennsylvania Archives Series.)

JOHN McCALLOP served in Webster's Regiment of New York Militia, Revolutionary War. No. 37258230 appears as shown on an abstract of Certificates out to Col. Webster's Regiment of Militia, County of Charlotte (now Washington). Abstract is not dated. Andrew Simson signed for John

McCallop. War Dept., Adjutant General's Office.

JOHN McCALOP, account No. 1270, recieved due bills and certificates to the amount of 186.12.8. Not dated. "An account of the Due Bills and certificates drawn by Thomas Butcher out of the office of the Commissioners to liquidate the accounts of the Officers and soldiers of the Continental Line of the State of North Carolina. (North Carolina Revolutionary Army Accounts, Vol. III, p. 104, folio 1). Settled at Halifax 1784.

PATRICK McCALEB, No. 346 served in the Revolutionary War in the 6th Maryland Regiment, a private, card number 37439843 and 42729. He appears on a return of reinlisted men in the Second Maryland Brigade commanded by Othio Williams Esq., Colonel commander from the 7th until the 23rd of February 1779, Return dated Camp Middlebrook, February 24, 1779. Bounty paid \$100.

On another card: Patrick McCaleb, Maryland 6th-Maryland Regiment of foot commanded by Col. Otho H. Williams of Capt. Andrew Hynes Co. Roll dated 9/8/1778 for one year. (War Dept. Adjutant General's Office).

ROBERT McKILLUP, private in the Pennsylvania Line in the Revolutionary War. His widow Ann McKullup, administratrix, was issued a land warrant No. 10126 November 28, 179? (Paper torn). Alexander Power, assignee. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

THOMAS McCALLUP, No. 317, served in Webster's Regiment of New York Militia in the Revolutionary War. Card Numbers 37257815. Appears on an abstract of Certificates delivered out to Col Webster's Regiment of Militia, county of Charlotte, now Washington. Abstract not dated-Name Thos. McCallup-Nos. 8124 and 8629-Sums 1.3. and 3.2.2. Signed by Edward Long. (War Dept., Adjutant General's Office).

WILLIAM McCALLEP served as a Carpenter in the Revolutionary War. At the top of the file appears No. 191, Independent Cos. of Artificers, Carpenters and Bakers-Continental Troops, Revolutionary War-On line one appears No. 35971372. On line two appears No. 1619-Date discharged 4/24/17, amount L25.

Inside the file is the following card: Wm. Callep; served under Capt. Nicholes Veeder's Company of Carpenters in the service of the United States of America, employed at (roll torn) and Fort George in building barracks, bateaux & c. (Revolutionary War). Appears on pay roll of the organization named above commencing 1-7 & ending 31st of -1779. Entered service 3-31-17??. Place of abode, Stillwater, 14 miles from home. Due 25 days. (War Department, Adjutant General's Office).

JOSEPH McKILLUP (McKALEB and McCALEB) served as Quartermaster in the Revolutionary War. (See Joseph McKaleb of Tawney Town, Maryland).

CAPTAIN WILLIAM McCALEB commanded a Company of Horse or Hussars in the American Revolutionary War. He served under Generals Marian and Pickens in South Carolina. (See Captain McCaleb of South Carolina and Mississippi. Vol. I of McCaleb History.)

CATHERINE McCALEB received one payment No. 8201 and one number 8386 of L 6.4.4 and L 4.0.0. For Sundries furnished the Militia of North Carolina Virginia and South Carolina as allowed by Bruce & Bagge Auditors of the Upper Board of Salisbury District as P. Report No. 45. (Report 45 is undated but report 46 is dated 1783). (Accounts of the United States with North Carolina War of Revolution, Book A, pages 259, 264).

NANCY McCALLUP received a military land Warrant, No. 3628, from North Carolina-640 acres-Colonel Armstrong. Dated 1788.

JOSEPH McKILLUP-Quartermaster. Jan. 3, 1776 in the 35th Battalion under Col. Joseph Good, Frederick County, Maryland. (Maryland War Commissions, p. 140 in Maryland Historical Society.) Also, The History of Frederick County, Vol. I, p. 25 gives "Joseph McKillub" private in 2nd Battalion of Frederick County under Col. Joseph Good-"Given in convention at Annapolis Jan. 3, 1776."

ALEXANDER McCALIP-Buffalo, New York August 25, 1814, War of 1812-"We whose names are signed served in Captain Robert's Company of Volunteers record of Robert Lamberton paymaster of 5th detachment, Militia of Pennsylvania, called into service under James Fenton, \$6 per man". Alexander signed as one of the Men. (Pennsylvania Archives Series, Vol. 8, p. 34).

DAVID McKILLIP, 55-160 Land Bounty Warrant 29536, said he served in War of 1812 as a private under Capt. H. Perine, Col. C. Rice New York Militia. March 15, 1855 he was of Essex County, New York. David McKillips age 64 personally applied, a resident of Ausable, Clinton County, New York states he was a private in the company of Capt. Perine, in regiment of Militia of Col. Clark Rice, in War of 1812, that he was drafted or called out at Cambridge in Washington County, New York about 9-1814. John Dobbin age 80, Thomas K. McLean age 72, and George Wright 66 served with this soldier. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

ALEXANDER McKILLIP marched from Bellefonte, Spring Township, Centre County, Pennsylvania in Capt. Record's Company and served as a private on board the "Trip". (Pennsylvania Archives, 6th Series, Vol. 9, p. 308).

"I, Alexander McKellip of Spring Township, Centre County, being one of the volunteers on board of Perry's fleet, at the taking of the British Squadron on Lake Erie, to whom a medal was voted by the Legislature of Pennsylvania, being about to go to the Western Country, Request and authorize Henry Petrikin of the bourough of Bellefonte for to receive the same for me of whomever the same is to be had. ARCHIBALD McCALEB served as Drummer Boy in War of 1812 in Uriah Allison's Company which was organized at Kingston, Tennessee. (Goodspeed)

ARCHIBALD McCALEB of Knox County, Tennessee was killed while fighting Indians on Turkey Creek, Tenn. 1813. (Goodspeed)

ARCHIBALD McCaleb appears on the muster roll of Capt. William D. Neilson's Company, Colonel John Brown. Enlisted September 30, 1813 to January 31, 1814. Archibald McCaleb, Fifer.

ALEXANDER McCaleb served as a private in the War 1812, from Mississippi in Green's Company of Mississippi Militia of which Thomas F. McCaleb was a 3rd Lieutenant.

ISAAC McKillop served in the War of 1812. He applied for a land warrant 12-160, warrant 13973. He was a private under Capt. Talcott, artillery ordinance detachment, U. S. army. He said in his application that he was born in the town of Martinsburgh, Berkley County, Virginia and that he was about age 33 years when he was discharged. When he enlisted he was a saddler. He was discharged 7/10/1817. Signed at headquarters 2nd military Department, Boston. Served 5 years and was a private of Capt. Gates Camp, 7 Corps of Artillery and was transferred from thence to ordinance. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

JAMES McKellip, bounty land file 55--120-Warrant 71655, private in the War of 1812, New York Militia under Capt. Peter Magher. One Daniel McKellip age 54 in Otsego County, New York, 1855 personally appeared a resident of Middlefield, in Otsego County, New York, states he is the brother of James McKellip who was a private in the company of Capt. Peter Magher in the 16th Regiment of New York State Militia commanded by Col. Farran Strunnahan in the War with Great Britain (War of 1812) and that James entered service as a volunteer at Cherry Valley and that his brother made application 9/28/50 and a land warrant for 40 acres the number of which he does not now recollect was issued to James McKellip and that his said brother has been and now is for many years incompetent to transact business of any kind. Daniel McKellip was appointed to take charge of his business.

JOHN McCaleb served in the War of 1812 as a Private under General Johnston, Captain Oban's 36th Infantry. He enlisted 6/23/1812. (Research in the Tennessee State Archives at Nashville, Tenn.)

HIRAM McCaleb served in the War of 1812 as a Corporal under Lt. Col. Philips Infantry. He enlisted May 13, 1812. (Research in Tennessee State Archives)

HIRAM McCaleb served as a private under General Johnston, Capt. Oban's 36th Infantry. (Research in Tennessee State Archives)

JOHN McKELLIP, War of 1812, Act 55-120-Warrant 72011-He was a private under Capt. Peter Magher, New York Militia. Mary McKellip age 57 applied in Otsego County, New York. She was a resident of the town of Cherry Valley, said County. She states she is the widow of John McKellip deceased, who was a private in company of Capt. Peter Magher in the 16th regiment of New York State Militia commanded by Col. Farrand Strannahan in the War with Great Britain, declared 18 June 1812. She states her husband volunteered at Cherry Valley about the 8th Sept. 1812, for three months and served 3 months and was discharged at Lewiston 12/1812. The said company was transferred to the 18th regiment under Col. Daubin. She states she married John McKellip in the town of Cherry Valley 2/1/1821 by John Truer a clergyman, and her name before marriage was Mary Dutcher (or Duutschen) and that her husband died at Cherry Valley 24 Dec. 1846. She made the application 1850 Sept. 28. Affidavit made same time and place by Kezia Davis who states that she was present at marriage of soldier and widow, that the ceremony was by Rev. John Tener at the house of her father on 2/1/1821, that Mary McKellip and John McKellip continued to live together up until his death 24 Dec. 1846. This minister who married them was a Presbyterian minister. 2 affidavits by William Burch and Daniel B. McKellip witness the widow's signature. An affidavit of Benj. Davis, J. P. states he was acquainted with soldier and wife. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives)

MOSES McKILLIPS applied for a land bounty 1855, No. 179711 and was rejected. He claims to have served as a teamster in War of 1812 in the Vermont Militia under McDonald. Moses McKillips applied in Cuyahoga County, Ohio June 19, 1855. He states he is the same person who served as a teamster in employ of Commodore McDonald and was employed by said Commodore to transport military stores from Burlington to (not legible) in the state of Vermont in the War of 1812. He says that he entered service at Vergennes, Vermont winter of 1813 and 1814. He makes application to obtain bounty land. Two affiants were acquainted with the soldier-Jasper and Hiram Kellogg of Lorane County, Ohio. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives)

SAMUEL McKILLIPS-Bounty Land Files, 55-80 Warrant 32960-War of 1812. Samuel McKillips said he served as a private in Capt. M. Rogers, Col. Reese Hill Pennsylvania Militia. Mrs. Elizabeth McKillips of Juniata County, Pennsylvania 1855 April 25 appeared and states she is the widow of Samuel McKillips deceased, who was a private in Capt. Matthew Rogers Company of Col. Rice Hill Regiment Militia and that her husband was drafted at Juniata County 4/12/1813.

She states that they were married in Mifflin County, Pennsylvania 27 October 1814 by John Coulter a clergyman and that her name before her marriage was Elizabeth Endslow and that her husband died at McCoysville, Juniata County, Pennsylvania 27 November 1852 and that her husband obtained 40 acres of land for his service under Act 1850. Samuel McKillip age 59 applied 11 March in Juniata County, Pennsylvania. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives)

SAMUEL McCaleb served in the War of 1812 under Major Chiles, Capt. Conway. He enlisted 9/20/1814. (Tennessee State Archives, Nashville, Tennessee.)

SIMPSON McKILLIP, War of 1812, Land Bounty 55-160-3873, Musician under Capt. H. Prine, New York Militia. He applied in Monroe County, New York 1855. He was age 59 and living at Rochester. He states he was called out at Cambridge, New York October 10, 1814 and was discharged at Burlington, Vermont 10/29/1814. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

THOMAS McKILLIPS, veteran of War 1812, No. 550160, Warrant 112022. He said that he served under Capt. Perry, New York Militia. Eunice McKillips age 81 applied in Sandusky County, Ohio Dec. 10, 1860. She states that she is the widow of Thomas McKillips, deceased, who was a private in the Company of David Danforth, who assembled at French Mills and marched to Chataqua four corners, where Capt. Danforth's company was consolidated with Capt. Perry's company and was marched to Plattsburg in the company commanded by Capt. Perry in regiment of New York Militia commanded by General Marr in the War with Great Britain, declared by the U. S. on June 18, 1812, that her husband volunteered or was drafted at French Mills on or about 9/1813 or 1814 for a term of ? and continued in actual service in said war for 14 days. She said that she was married to Thomas McKillips in Chittenden County, Vermont 2/5/1806 by David Jones, a J. P., and that her name before her marriage was Eunice Stevens, that her said husband died in Erie County, Ohio 1/6/1848. Affidavit of Allen McKillips and James Parks residents of Sandusky County, Ohio witness the signature of the widow and state she is still a widow.

WILLIAM McKILLIP-Land Bounty File, 55-160, Warrant 48667. William McKillip, War 1812, private under Capt. Hiram Pratt, 7th Regiment, New York Militia. Monroe McKillip of the city of Rochester, Monroe County, New York-Whereas Frances McKillip of Rochester, New York, a minor over 14, hath lately made application unto D. G.

Shuart Esquire of Surrogate of our County of Monroe, City of Rochester, N. Y. and prayed that Monroe McKillip, of Rochester New York, might be appointed guardian of in behalf of said Monroe McKillip, and whereas, Monroe McKillip has on Oct. 22, 1855 executed in due form of law, sufficient security, that said Frances McKillip is a minor over age 14, resides in Monroe County- Original discharge filed showing Wm. McKillip a private in Capt. Hiram Pratt's Company in the 7th regiment of N. Y. detached militia in service of the U. S. is hereby honorably discharged till further orders with the thanks of the Colonel and will receive pay until Dec. 14, 1812. Headquarters Champlain, 12/7/1812, signed James Green, Co. Commdng.

Another paper dated Monroe County, N. Y., 1855, 10-22. Monroe McKillip age 29, a resident of Rochester, N. Y. states he is the general guardian of Frances McKillip the only infant child of identical William McKillip, deceased who was a private in the company of Capt. Hiram Pratt, in the 7th regiment of New York detached Militia of the War of 1812, that Wm. McKillip was drafted at Washington County, N. Y. June 1812 for the term of six months, that Wm. died in Rochester, County of Monroe, N. Y. 1850 on January 18th leaving no widow but leaving only 2 minor children, to wit: William T. McKillip age 21 on the 14th July 1855 and Frances McKillip 19 on the 18th Oct. Also appeared Simpson McKillip 1855 in Monroe County, N. Y. and Eliza McKillip McKillip, resident of the same. They state that Wm. T. McKillip and Frances McKillip were the only minor children of Wm. McKillip deceased, who served as stated above, that Wm. died 1/18/1850 leaving no widow but 2 minor children Wm. T. age 21 and Frances age 19, that these affiants were present at the funeral of said soldier. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

WILLIAM McCALEB served as Fifer in the War of 1812 and was in the Muster Roll of Capt. Uriah Allison's Co. (Tennessee Archives Nashville, Tennessee.)

PATRIOT WAR SERVICE OF McCALEBS OR LIKE SPELLING

JAMES McKELLIP applied for a land bounty under Act 55-1600 Wt 95357, year of 1838. He said that he served as Captain in Col. H. B. Ranson's New York Militia. He applied from the state of Pennsylvania, county of Philadelphia. The original application for bounty land 1860. Charles Welding a Justice of Peace of said county said that one James McKellip age 57 appeared before him and stated that he was the same person who served as Captain in the company commanded by himself in a New York Regiment of Militia

under Col. Harry B. Ransom in the Niagra Frontier disturbance in the winter of 1828, that he entered the service at Clarence Erie County, N. Y. about Jan. 1, 1838 and served until Feb. 1, 1838 when he was discharged, and was continued for 14 days in service, and never received pay for one month-Makes this application to receive bounty land to which he may be entitled-Ruben Hancock and Amos W. Thompson signed affidavits. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives).

JAMES McKELLIP appears on the land bounty files under Act of 1853, Ryerlia, No. 331286. He said that he served as a private under Capt. Seaton New York volunteers, 1837. He applied in Winnebago County, Wisconsin, Wankan. He applied 7/16/1863. He was a resident of Wankan in said county. He was a soldier in the Patriot War of 1838-1839. He said that he enlisted at Newstead, Erie County, N. Y. about 10/1/1838 and that he was discharged at Buffalo, N. Y. about 11/17/1838. He gave his address as Wankan, Wisconsin. (Division of Veteran's Administration Archives.)

MEXICAN WAR SERVICE OF McCaleb OR LIKE SPELLING

GEORGE W. McKILLIP served in the War with Mexico-He applied for Pension. His name appears in the bounty land files, 47-160-Warrant 16955. He said that he was a corporal of Capt. Taylor's Company L, 2nd Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteers, who enlisted May 20, 1847 to serve for the war, is hereby honorably discharged from the army of the U. S. this 6th March 1848 at New Orleans, La., by reason of surgeon's certificate of disability incurred in the course of his service. George W. McKillip was born in Mifflin, Pennsylvania, is age 21, 5 ft 10 inches high, light complexion, blue eyes, red hair, and by occupation when enlisted a cabinetmaker. Signed at New Orleans, La. 3/6/1848. He made application 1848 in Bedford County, Pennsylvania. (Division of Veterans Administration Files).
