Scottish fire service issues wildfire risk warning as temps rise

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service has warned there is a risk of high intensity surface fires in the east of the country over the weekend.

A forecast of warm weather and increasing wind speeds could lead to fires burning and spreading with moderate to high intensity over Saturday and Sunday, the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) said.

In a joint warning with the Scottish Wildfire Forum, it said Easter Ross, Inverness-



shire and Morayshire are most at risk, with wind speeds highest on Saturday.

Area commander Bruce Farquharson, the SFRS wildfire lead, said: "We are in the height of summer and with the warm forecast for the weekend it could bring with it the potential for wildfires, which can devastate vast areas of land and wildlife.

"As always, we would urge people who live within the high-risk regions to be extremely careful.

Representing Clan Moncreiffe was William Tew, Past President, Kelsey Tew, Clan Treasurer and their son Johnathan.







Billy Connolly Does... will see the Scottish comedian reflect on his views on life since he began his career in the 1960s.


Each of the episodes will focus on a different aspect of Billy's life, ranging from work, love, marriage and his childhood.

The Reminiscences of Charlotte, Lady Wake

"Removing Birthmarks"

"Having been born with marks of fruit on my face, the medical men considered that they were caused by aneurism, and required an operation which must have left me scarred for life. . . .

Our old nurse, Effie, had arrived at a different conclusion. She was convinced of the truth of the popular belief that a dead man's hand laid upon my cheek and brow would effectually remove the marks....

An old man at last did die in one of the nearest cottages. I must have been taken there asleep, as no child would have forgotten it, had she been carried awake to the bed of the dead man and seen and felt his cold hand placed on her face; and I was old enough to have remembered it, for I have the most distinct recollection of being constantly stopped in our walks by the widow, who always examined my cheek in order to ascertain the state of her husband's body in the grave,—as the marks, as she



told my nurse, would certainly fade away as he turned into dust. . . . Whatever the cause of the cure, the red marks faded away as I grew older, and in time disappeared."

—The Reminiscences of Lady Wake. 1909.

This reminds your editor of the old saying, "Go to the doctor and your cold takes 7 to 10 days to get well. Don't go to the doctor and your cold takes from a week to a week and a half to disappear."

The Scottish Clootie Wells operated on the same principle. "If you sprain your ankle, a doctor can make it better in about six weeks. Do nothing and it will be better in a month and a half!"

Family Reunions and Genealogical Research

Family reunions can be beneficial for genealogists and historians.

Some families hold annual reunions on the same date and at the same location. Those who follow this

pattern often choose a location that has some symbolic connection to the family or an important event that impacted the family.

Others vary their dates and locations to attract the widest possible number of participants.

While many reunions are held during the summer months, these events can occur at any time during the year.

Reunions can have a variety of themes. From a historical perspective, a typical reunion invitation list may include grandparents and great-grandparents, as well as parents, siblings, and cousins.

Many family reunions are sponsored by family organizations or associations. The primary goal under these circumstances is to encourage discussion and pride in the history and achievements of family members, both past and present.

Members of the older generations share their memories and stories. These memories and stories often answer many questions concerning deceased family members and the events that impacted their lives. Successful reunions of this nature not only encourage interaction among all age groups, but educating the younger generation about family history.

Pre-reunion planning for activities is of utmost importance. The most successful reunions, from a historical and/or genealogical perspective, are those that allow family members to spend as much time as pos-

sible with each other while they are together.


In the 21st century, it is a rare occasion when all members of a family gather in the same venue for any length of time. The event planner should design activi-

> ties that necessitate having family members do things together, but give participants opportunities to talk quietly among themselves, rather than over planning the activities.

> There are numerous books and Internet sites devoted to family reunions. They cover every aspect of the planning process and most include a listing of ac-

tivities that are specifically designed to ensure maximum levels of personal interaction.

Both book and Internet sources will provide greater detail for each of the options, and usually feature illustrations, instructions, and other information.



The Stewart dynasty descended from King Robert I's daughter and her husband, Walter the Steward. Despite early unrest and weak government caused by several Stewart kings succeeding as minors, the dynasty flourished for over three centuries.

During this time, Scotland moved forward to become a modern and prosperous nation. Stewart monarchs such as King James IV and VI were Renaissance patrons of artistic, scientific, commercial, religious and political endeavour, sponsoring figures including the poet, Robert Henryson, and humanist, George Buchanan.

Also of significance was the arrival in the mid-sixteenth century of the Reformation movement, bringing about the replacement of Catholic Mary Queen of Scots by her son King James VI.

It was through the Stewart dynasty that the two thrones of England and Scotland - and later the governments - came to be united.

The 'Marriage of the Thistle and the Rose' took place at Stirling Castle in 1503 between King James IV and Princess Margaret Tudor, daughter of King Henry VII of England.

This union of the Scottish and English Royal families eventually led in 1603 to the succession of a Stewart (now with a change of spelling) to the throne of England.

CSSA is represented at approximately 40 Scottish/Celtic events around the country each year. We are always looking for folks with our passion to volunteer to start more.

We also have a presence on the Internet with a website, <clansstewart.org> (official) and a Facebook page listed as Clan Stewart Society in America (unofficial).

Though we have maintained our low annual \$25 membership, we are still able to sponsor trophies for dance, drums and pipes and establish scholarships for institutions providing cultural Scottish curriculums and we also sponsor the competition of a record-holding female athlete.

If I may interject an idea or two for your next genealogical family reunion, it was my great joy and pleasure to work for many years with The Descendants of Simon Gay Familly Reunion down in Moultrie, Georgia.

That is a huge family. Sometimes we would have over 1000 people show up over the weekend.

There were 10 sons of "our" Simon Gay. In the invitation we sent out every year, we would would include a family group sheet and a pedigree chart.

We would list the 10 children and ask that the recipient mark to whom his or her family belonged.

We would also ask for everyone to fill out at least one pedigree chart and family group sheet and even more (They could make copies of the forms.) if they wished.

We would ask that everyone bring their charts to the reunion.

We had many folks
working together on their genealogy over that
weekend.

We had a handwritten chart of the information we had on the family - and this chart was VERY long and wide. Each person could find where they belonged on the family tree.

One moneymaker we did each year was for the family reunion committee to make an originally designed quilt to be auctioned off.

Our reunion committee had such fun and made lifelong friends - even those of us who were not related by blood became real family.

Of all the things I miss from Moultrie, the family reunion is the one I miss most.

The Gay Family came from Scotland (Clan Gayre) so we would have Highland Dancers, a Pipe Band or other Scottish entertainment on Sunday!



Hidden doorway revealed at Culzean caves



Archaeologists working for the National Trust for Scotland have uncovered the remains of a medieval doorway leading into the caves underneath Culzean Castle on the Ayrshire coast.

The team of volunteer archaeologists spent last week helping investigate the caves as part of one of the conservation charity's Thistle Camp working holidays. In addition to finding the doorway, results have been obtained that indicate the caves were occupied

Derek Alexander, Head of Archaeological Services for the Trust, said: 'We're really excited about this discovery and the results of the excavation so far.

We knew there was a wall and door-




way at the mouth of the Castle Cave but there was nothing at the entrance of the Stables Cave. A couple of stones on the surface suggested there might have been a wall.


'Imagine our surprise when we found two sides of a doorway surviving up to 8 courses high buried to a depth of about 1 metre. The doorway is quite wide, measuring 1.1m across, and could have been secured with a draw bar.

'We've also just received a radiocarbon date from a sample taken last year which shows that the caves were occupied in the Iron Age. The sample of charcoal from the lowest midden deposit in the upper chamber in Castle Cave was submitted to the SUERC laboratory and produced a date of AD135–325. This is similar to a date from the Gazebo Court on top of the cliff above the cave but it's the earliest dated evidence from the caves.'

'We found lots of modern pottery, glass and some 18th-century wine bottles. An iron strip may have been part of the door hinge or fittings.'

Lucas Merz, a volunteer from Berlin, said: 'I've never done archaeology before. It has been a great experience. Working in the caves is very special.'


Every year hundreds of Thistle Camp volunteers get involved in carrying out vital conservation work that protects Scotland's national and natural treasures.

Culzean Castle & Country Park, on the coast near Ayr, is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Scotland, yet few visitors realise that this famous castle was built over a warren of caves. There are two sets: one is below the stables, which is open to the public; the other is below the castle and has a stone frontage and barred entrances.


Following recent archaeological investigations into the caves, the Trust is keen to improve access as part of the visitor experience at Culzean.

Ian Cornforth, Culzean Head Ranger, said: 'These results will help inform our interpretation of Culzean and the human activity in the caves. There are so many stories to tell here and share with our visitors.'


Derek Alexander, Head of Archaeology, continued: 'The stone walling that defends both sets of caves belongs to the medieval castle, probably dating to the 15th or 16th century. They were used as cellars for storage before Robert Adam converted the castle to the picturesque mansion in the late 18th century. There are many tales associated with the caves, which include ghosts, smugglers and hiding fugitives.'

Fried Beer? Yep! You can't get any...but, you can read about it!



You receive a plate of fried, ravioli-shaped dough with a dark filling. You take a bite expecting meat and are met with the flavor of warm, rich stout. Welcome to the world of fried beer.

Fried beer is the brainchild of Mark Zable, who debuted his creation at the Texas State Fair in 2010 and won that year's Most Creative award (an honor also bestowed to fried Coke in 2006).

Even for those who might be skeptical of the culinary appeal, one has to admire the logistics of deepfrying a liquid. It would be easy to simply fry a beerbased batter, but fried beer keeps the brew—Guinness, to be specific—intact while frying the pretzel dough around it. This is no easy task. It took Zable three years to figure it out.

Although he won't reveal the exact recipe, speed is key. Each nugget of beer-filled dough should be deep-fried for no more than 20 seconds.

And just how does it taste? Zable says, "It tastes like you took a bite of hot pretzel dough and then took a drink of beer."

Have your ID handy. You must be 21 or older to enjoy fried beer.

The pair are now looking ahead to their next adventure, with *Ben Vorlich* in the Highlands on the list.




Membership

British authorities have been urged to abandon their claim to the remote rocky outcrop of Rockall after an awkward incident on Monday in which a Scottish patrol boat boarded an Irish fishing vessel.

A Marine Scotland boat sought to stop the Donegalbased *Northern Celt* from entering the waters. According to Irish broadcaster RTE, the vessel was boarded and told to stop fishing within 12 miles of the skerry.

It is thought the incident may have been intended to bolster support for Britain's deal with the EU amid public dismay over new trading rules, shortages and price increases. Last month, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson jingoistically threatened to use gunboats to defend British fishing grounds in the event of a hard Brexit.

In 1955, the uninhabitable rock was infamously claimed by the British Navy, who waved a Union Jack over the outcrop and drilled a plaque into the granite. In 1972, Westminster claimed it to be part of the shire of Inverness in Scotland, hundreds of miles away.

A member of the Scottish parliament, Andy Wightman, has lodged a motion urging Scottish ministers to formally reject Britain's spurious claim to the area. Mr Wightman has previously described the British claim of sovereignty over the area as "the last act of colonialism" of the British Empire.

He has now called on Scottish ministers to dis-

claim the rock in a bid to distance Scotland from complicity in the "land grab" and "the last annexation of territory in the British Empire".

Mr Wightman wrote that "colonial annexation by the British Crown is not an internationally recognised means of establishing sovereignty over any territory", and urged the Scottish Government "to formally disclaim sovereignty over Rockall".

He further urged the London government to "initiate international dialogue" to establish the status of Rockall in international law".

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Fisheries and the Marine Pádraig Mac Lochlainn TD called on Fine Gael and the Minister for Foreign Affairs Simon Coveney to urgently defend traditional Irish fishing rights to the area.

He described a document agreed in 2013 establishing a boundary between the Economic Zones of Britain and Ireland as "shameful" and noted it had never been ratified by the 26 County parliament.

"They have created this mess and now Fine Gael, the Minister for Foreign Affairs and this government needs to sort it out. They must defend the historical Irish fishing rights at Rockall and they need to undo the 2013 Agreement that was never ratified by the Dáil as required by the Constitution."
