Glasgow Cathedral needs our help - and it is not \$\$\$

My old and very dear friend, Fraser Gordon, Scottish Blue Badge Guide, has written me of the hulloaloo concerning Glasgow Cathedral.

Fraser wrote that Historic Scotland, the government department which owns Glasgow Cathedral, plans to charge an entrance fee into Glasgow Cathedral as from April 2015. The fee will be UK £4.50 per person.

The Minister of the Cathedral as well as the congregation are against it, as are a lot of Scots and Glaswegians.

Fraser said, "It will also harm tourism as people will no longer go in if there is a fee to pay. The travel companies I work for will not wish to pay that amount per head for entire coach groups."

The cathedral has played a pivotal role in the history of Glasgow, standing as it does at the place where St Mungo, the founder and patron saint of the city, built the first church in the 6th century. It thereafter played a great role in the Reformation of the Church of Scotland in the 16th century. It is also the only cathedral on the mainland of Scotland which stands as it

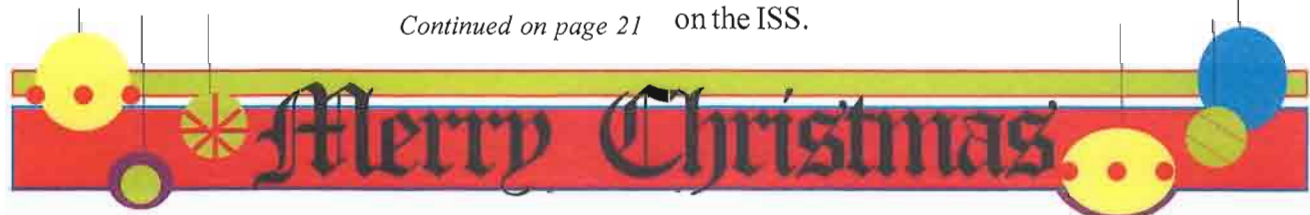

A letter from your editor...

How to submit an article, story or anything else to be published in a newsletter...or, really, any publication



A clan publication - or any "group" publication is only as good as the information submitted.

If there were only six members who lived in the same neighborhood, the editor could do everything her/himself...but, when members are scattered all over the country and the world...you can easily see how the volunteer editor cannot possibly know everything that needs to be included.

Each member, officer or not, is a "reporter" for the group publication. Officers, including conveners, have specific responsibilities each issue.

Deadlines are always announced in advance with notification coming from both your clan officials and your editor.

Deadlines are most important. Just think about deadlines this way; no matter what wonderful things your group does or plans - they will come to nothing if they are not known by all the members in a timely manner.

You may submit information early as most every editor has special folders where information may be safely saved.

If it should work out date-wise, that something is happening right at deadline time, please contact your editor and make arrangements for your information to come in as soon as you can...and that means within a day of the deadline. Any later, and it will have to wait until the next issue.

Most folks don't know it now, but your editor (This one! ME!) was in radio for many years, achieving the Certified Radio Marketing Consultant designation issued by the Radio Advertising Bureau in New York City.

There is only one surety in radio - which translates to everything else. The surety: What happens if

you do not advertise? **Nothing.**

Advertising is sort of what we do when we publish a newsletter. We are letting our members know - advertising to them - what is happening with our group.

What happens if you do not publish a newsletter that is timely and filled with activities? **Nothing.**

See?

The suggestions, hints and rules included here are just as true for an article for *Life* magazine or for your organizational publication.

Some publications are a bit more formal, but most are about as comfortable as sweatshirt and jeans.

In any journalism class, the first thing you learn is to be sure and include WHAT, WHERE, WHO, WHEN and WHY (Known as the five W's).

I always think if I were reading the article I am working on...could I make a contact with someone for more information?

So, please be sure you include these basic facts when you send something for publication.

If you are reporting on a games where your clan was represented: Please try to include some details about the games which are unique...for example, at Estes Park, Colorado, they have a floating Nessie...and all day long, you hear the booms of a real cannon being fired. It's NOT cannon balls, but old bowling balls which you see flying through the air trying to "bag" Nessie. Now, that's unique.

Every single game has SOMETHING that is unique! **Think!**

Try to look over your games guest book and report on those who have signed the book and where they are

from and anything else you wish.

If you go to more than one game in a newsletter time period, just write how ever many articles as games you attended.

Please concentrate on what happened at a particular game in each article.

If you've heard that Suzie's mother is ill, please report that and how she may receive cards. Ditto for weddings, engagements and graduations - plus the myriad things that happen in our lives.

Be sure and send information on Flowers of the Forest. If you don't have the obituary information, at least give enough information so that your editor CAN find the obituary.

There is one thing that makes our Flowers of the Forest even more important than ever - that is the absolutely ridiculous prices newspapers now charge for obits.

Many people do not publish obituaries in newspapers nowadays for this reason. Obituaries in your clan publication are free.

How are you going to know about an accident, an illness, an important milestone in our scattered-all-over-everywhere members' lives, if it is not written in your newsletter?

You don't want to find out that friends have been through crisis without you knowing or even had happy things happen and you didn't know...your newsletter is the answer to keeping in close touch with your friends who belong to the same organization.

If you have to do some research to find a PO Box, email address, website, physical address...you just do the research and double check what you have typed.

Most editors, including me, will look over your submissions and make sure spellings are correct and basic rules of English are observed.

If you don't think you are a writer..just write as if

you were speaking to a friend.

In particular, for any publication, if you send photographs from your phone for publication, first be sure the setting is set for jpeg. If you send photos from your camera, please also send those in jpeg.

When you send information to your editor, secondly, be sure to identify the five W's...of the photos...and also identify the people included in the pictures.

It is very helpful to your editor if you be sure and include the date and at which game the photos were taken.

If you run across articles in other publications or hear/see something interesting on television...jot down the basic information and send it in. Note where/when you found it originally - your editor will try to track it down...and copyright notwithstanding, we can pass on the interesting information to everyone.

Speaking of copyright, that's an entirely seperate and complicated subject. In our situation in the Scottish community, if there's something in a clan newsletter and it says "copyright" please contact their editor and get permission. You can NEVER, EVER use anything from Disney, Coca Cola or others of their ilk.

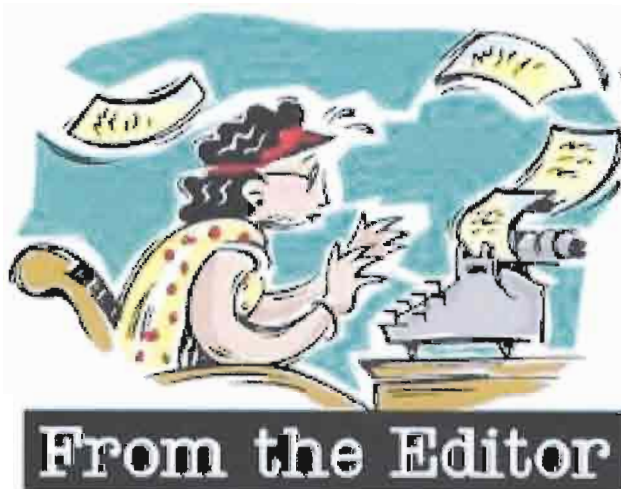
I'm sure there's more to this...and I will pass it on as it comes to my head.

When we do work together, we can produce something wonderful!

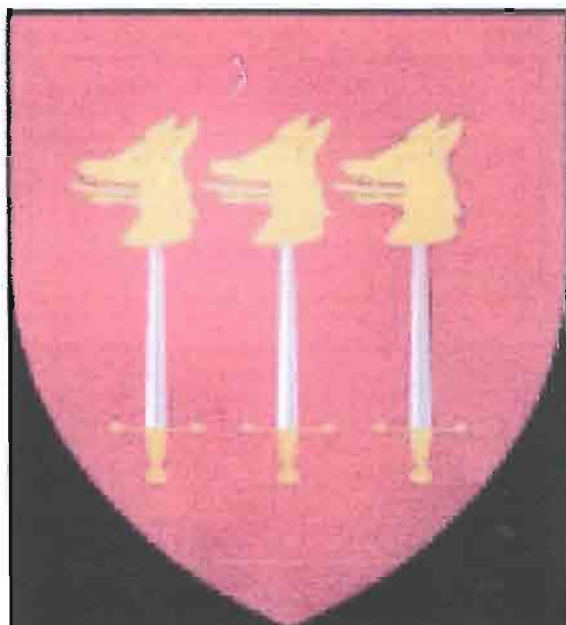
I used to do seminars about things like this...If you'd like one at your games...where all of the editors and other interested folks may come...just call me and we'll see what we can do.

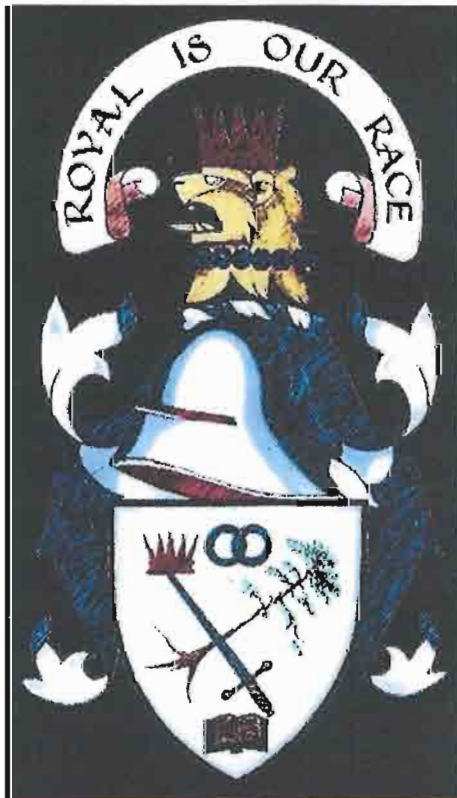

Family Stories

Bryan Mulcahy, MLS



Family stories can be the most interesting component and a foundation for all genealogical research. While some stories prove to be accurate, many either stretch the truth or turn out to be pure fabrication, as in the following example from one of our recent researchers. Her great-grandfather supposedly was the captain of a sailing vessel which crossed the Atlantic in dangerous storms multiple times in the early 1800s from England to Boston, Massachusetts. Many present-day members of the family liked boating and sailing, and assumed this love of the sea was handed down from their great-grandfather.

The truth turned out to be less dramatic. The great-grandfather had been a captain of a barge which went up and down the Ouse River, outside the port of Boston, located in Lincolnshire, England. Like many family stories there was a kernel of truth, but most of the details were exaggerated. In some cases, the inaccuracies may be deliberate. In most it is simply that over time, we remember past events through “rose colored glasses”. Distant memories are also influenced by subjective opinions that over time become “facts.”

Use caution about stories that touch on the social standing of a family, especially those claiming noble descent. This is where the greatest discrepancies usually occur. The farm laborer becomes a land owner, the sergeant or lieutenant in the army becomes a colonel, or a small house becomes a thirty-room mansion. Someone moves to a new place, job, or church, makes

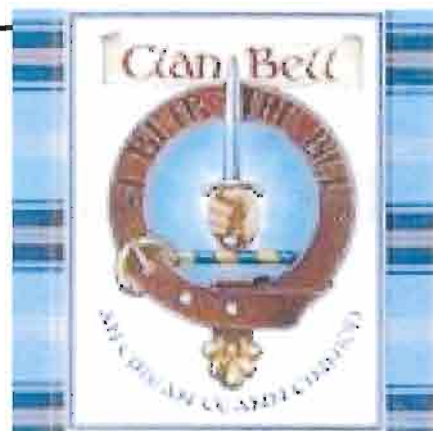
new friends and tries to impress them a little with some slightly exaggerated stories about his or her background. Even the most honest people have been known to enhance their resumes for employment or educational purposes.

Stories can be deliberately fabricated. In some cases, this happens because someone was trying to hide their social status, criminal activities, failed marriages, or hide acts that occurred during controversial time periods in history. Social norms have changed over time. Historical customs such as slavery were once considered appropriate. Many immigrants grew up in poverty and came from repressive areas of Europe and the British Isles. Upon arrival in America, they made every effort to “bury” that past and create a new reality that fit a new country.

Depending on the individual circumstances of your family you should also discover what you can about name changes, naturalization, military service, apprenticeship to a craft, and ethnic background. When discussing a place of birth or origin be sure you get the name right. Double check with one more person at least, and don’t assume the name you have been given is the name of a city or a village. It may be the name of a farm or a district or a county, or the nearest big city rather than that of their small and unknown village. If you are lucky enough to have elderly family members still alive, consider taking the time to interview them. When they die, the stories are buried with them.



Clan Bell North America, Inc.



This old West Marche Riding Clan, one of the Border Clans from the early 1100s, were retainers of Clan Douglas and also allied with the best Border families through blood and friendship. Their land holdings were extensive. To survive on the often invaded Borders, they engaged in the "rieving" of the period and participated in many battles against the English.



Declared "unruly" by the Scottish Parliament, many of the Clan were "encouraged" to emigrate to the Ulster Plantation in Northern Ireland after 1610.

After William Bell, called "Redcloak" and Chief of the Clan died in 1627, the chiefship became dormant. Without leadership, the Bells ceased to exist as a viable clan.

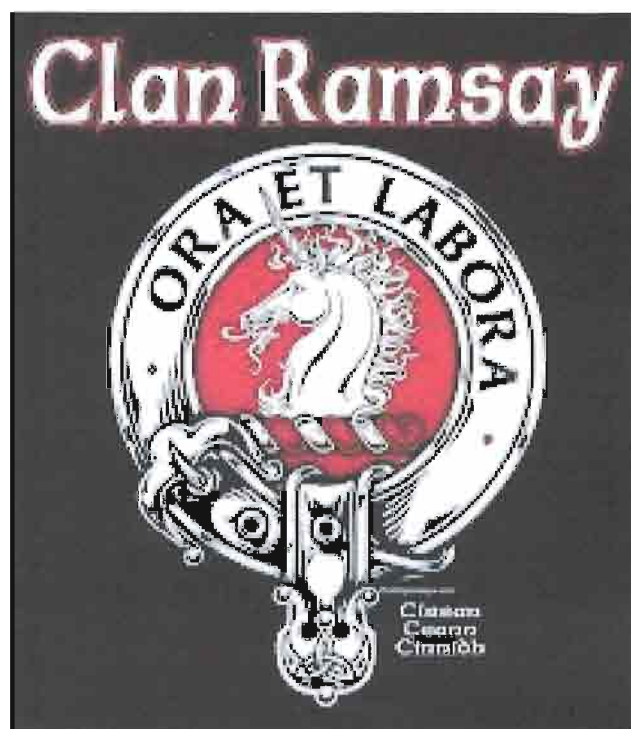

An award ceremony is planned during the Burns Night activities.

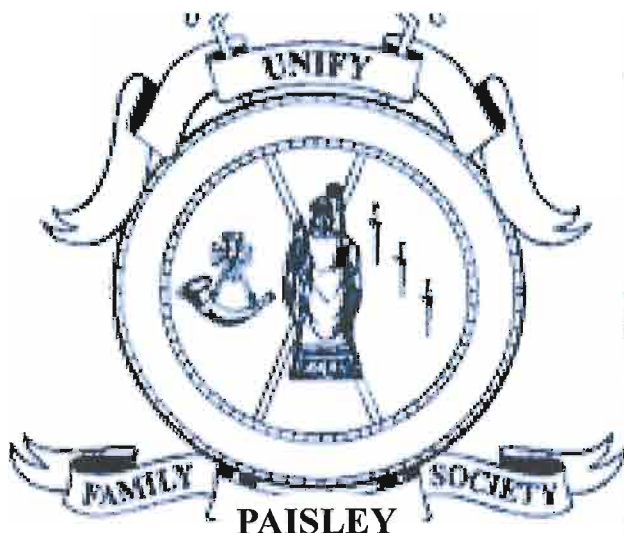
This fine activity will be held on Saturday evening January 17th, 2015 at the Civic Center in Statesville, NC at 6:30 PM.

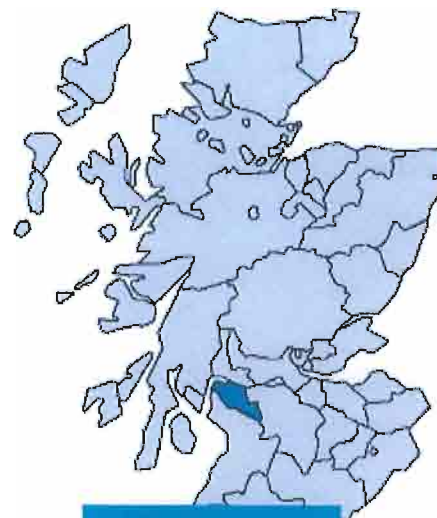
The Paisleys are a family of considerable antiquity, having been associated with Lochwinnoch and Paisley (parts of what later became Renfrewshire), with Cunningham and Kyle (North Ayrshire), Innerwick (East Lothian) and Roxburghshire, since the time of William I King of Scots 1165 - 1214.



The Chiefly Arms of Paisley of Westerlea

William I Paisley (died ante 28 September 1171) and William II Paisley (killed in battle ante 1218) were prominent in the following of the first three hereditary stewards of Scotland, while William II Paisley is also noticed attending the itinerant court of the King of Scots during 1179 - 95.

Separate and quite distinct branches of the family had already developed at Lochwinnoch and Paisley and in the Roxburghshire barony of Hawick before the end of King David Bruce's reign in 1371 and the beginnings of others are found in records for Edinburgh and the three Lothians from 1389 onwards and at Dunrod near Borgue (Kirkcudbrightshire) in still Gaelic speaking Galloway from 1585.

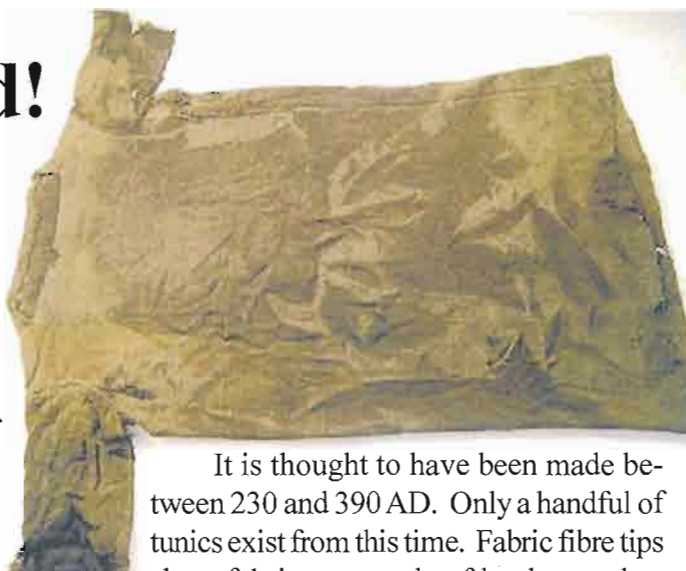

Ice Age tunic found!

An Ice Age tunic was discovered recently under snow melt in the Norwegian mountains. Also found were Neolithic arrows and bow fragments - thought to be about 6,000 years old.

"The new find is of great significance for dress and textile products and how these reflect the interplay between Northern Europe and the Roman World," said Marianne Vedeler from the University of Oslo, Norway - who analyzed the garment.

The tunic, found on the Norwegian Landbreen Glacier was partly bleached from the sun, wind and environment. It shows hard wear and tear and had been repaired with two patches.



It is thought to have been made between 230 and 390 AD. Only a handful of tunics exist from this time. Fabric fibre tips show fabric was made of lambs wool or wool from adult sheep.

Wild turkeys are truly amazingly interesting



Christmas is just around the corner, and as households across the country prepare to serve up mouthwatering feasts, the famed bird at the center of these festivities deserves its time in the spotlight. From their ability to fly to their strange use of stones to break down food, here are six fun facts about turkeys.

*Wild turkeys **can** fly*

Because turkeys look so big and awkward, it may seem unlikely that these birds can take to the skies — especially considering how fast they can fly. Over short flights, a wild turkey can top out at about 55 miles per hour (89 km/h), according to the National Wildlife Federation. Domestic turkeys (*Meleagris gallopavo*), however, can't fly because they are too heavy. These birds have been fattened up over generations for the holiday dinner table.



Poop tells the genders apart

Examining a turkey's droppings can tell you if a male or a female bird passed through the area. The feces of male turkeys are J-shaped, and also straighter and larger than a female's, according to the state of Georgia's wildlife resources division. Hen droppings, on the other hand, look more like a spiral.

Wild turkeys can get up trees

Usually turkeys are spotted eating acorns and other foods close to the ground, which makes it hard to picture them all the way up a tree. But, that's where they prefer to sleep, because their eyesight is so poor, according to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources. Turkeys typically begin their roost at dusk

and return to the ground at first light.

Male turkey heads change color

The tops of male turkeys are not only colorful, but highly variable. While males normally have almost no feathers on their heads, when it comes time to breed, the colors on their noggins can change between red, white and blue — sometimes within seconds, according to the National Wild Turkey Federation. Generally, the rest of a gobbler's body is green, bronze, gold and red (good for attracting mates), while hens are typically brown or grey (good for hiding, especially while on the nest).

Turkeys use stones for digestion

This part of the turkey may not be so digestible at Thanksgiving: When eating, turkeys ingest small stones that go into a part of their stomachs called the gizzard, which helps the turkey break down food. This process is necessary because turkeys, like all birds, don't have teeth.

In fact, turkeys have two stomachs: the glandular stomach that softens the food with gastric juices, and the gizzard that grinds it up for the intestines or the first stomach, if needed.

Only males gobble

There's a reason that male turkeys are called "gobblers" — they're the only ones that make that noise! Each gobbler has a unique call that he uses to attract females during breeding season. Female turkeys also make distinct noises, but they sound more like chirps and clucks.

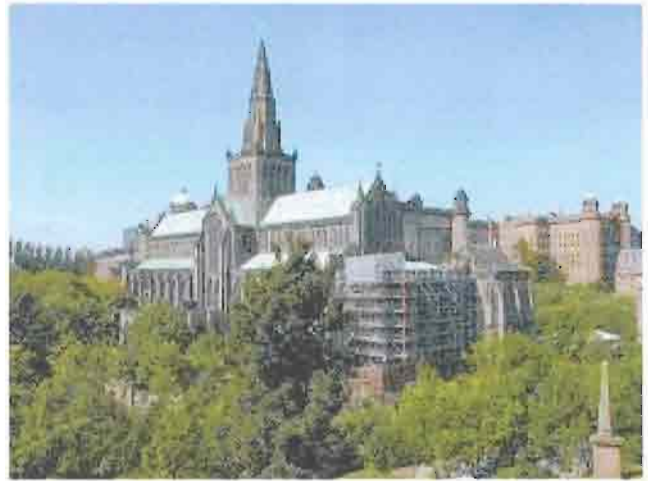

was built in the Middle Ages, all others having been either totally destroyed or partly destroyed at the time of the Reformation. The building is essential for an understanding of the origin and development of the city.

Fraser says, "I personally feel that a middle way could be found whereby a sum could be given voluntarily for those visitors who wished to do so. My colleagues, the Blue Badge Guides of Scotland, the country's official guides, would encourage that option."

"It's not possible for non-Brits to sign up on the cathedral petition, but...after some research," Fraser writes, "I have found out that everyone may write the Visit Scotland Chief Executive who is Ian Walford."

Gilbert Keith St. Clair, age 79, passed away Saturday, August 16, 2014 at the Wesleyan on Scenic in Georgetown, Texas, with his wife, Carolyn, and staff by his side. For over three years he had fought a courageous battle with ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease).

Gil joined the Clan Sinclair USA family in 2003.

Gilbert was born February 4, 1935 in Macomb, Illinois to the late Gordon Keith St. Clair and Dorothy Fern Points St. Clair.

There were frequent moves around Illinois during his early childhood and in 1945 the family moved to Fayette, Ohio. As a high school student he managed livestock and crops on the family farm, and participated in FFA and 4-H.

He attended Oberlin College in 1953 for one year and then transferred to the University of New Mexico. He participated in Air Force ROTC and The Young Republicans. He graduated with honors and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force Reserves. He reported for active duty on December 10, 1957 at Lackland AFB after being selected for navigator training. He received his navigator wings in 1958. 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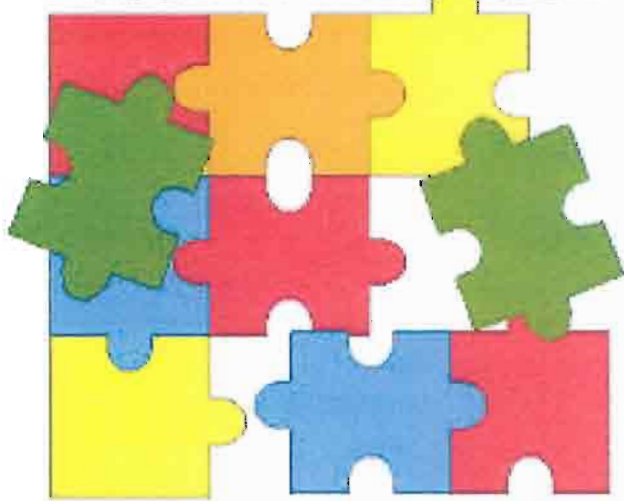

and expert and in 2013 he produced a CD of traditional songs from his native South Uist.

One reviewer described MacMillan as having “a voice that wine writers would love to set their vocabularies loose on – mahogany richness with hints of sea salt, perhaps – and he has a way of singing in Gaelic that conveys the gist and tone of a song by subtle inflection.”

Another reviewer commented that his CD, “*Air Fòrladh* is full of excellent songs sung by one of Gaeldom’s best singers.”

MacMillan has performed widely for BBC music shows.

MacMillan also was part of the Clan Currie Society’s 2014 MacMhuirich Symposium last June where he sang a selection of MacMhuirich/ Currie poetry accompanied by harper Simon Chadwick.

These performances can be viewed on Clan Currie’s YouTube Channel.

This is his first visit to *Pipes of Christmas*.
