New group for all armigers invites you!

The American College of Heraldry has created a new group on deviantArt - http://heraldry.deviantart.com/. The purpose of the group

is to display personal armorial bearings for individuals worldwide.

Submissions of armorial bearings should adhere to the "standards and practices" of internationally-recognized heraldic entities, including (in no particular order) The College of Arms (UK), The Court of Lord Lyon, the Canadian Heraldic Authority, The Chief Herald of Ireland, as well as organizations such as The American College of Heraldry, The American Heraldry Society, the New England Historic Genealogical Society and others. Such submissions should not violate copyright

laws, and no artwork submitted herein may be used without the expressed written permission of the armiger represented.

The purpose of this group, without geographic borders, is to allow for the display of personal armorial achievements.

Any submissions should be the property of the individual armiger, and not simply the upload of random coats of arms. All submissions must be approved before being visible.

Ideally, all submissions will include the

armiger's full name, original granting/registering entity, full blazon, date of grant/registration, and name of artist who created the specific achievement.

All achievements remain the sole property of the individual armiger, and may not be published or reprinted without the individual armiger's written permission.

If you are not already a member of deviantArt, it is an especially good resource for artists or those interested in graphic design. Mem-





Lifetime Achievement Award Recipient: Capt. John R. Wallace

The President and Board of Directors are pleased to announce that the high honor of Life Achievement Award has been pre-


sented to Council Member and Past President Capt. John R. Wallace (USCG Ret.).

John has served twelve years on the Clan Wallace Society - Worldwide Board of Directors; three years in the late 1980s; and nine years from 2001 through 2010. He served as Executive Vice President for two years, and President of the Society from 2004 through 2006. Significant contributions during John's

presidency include: "Established and designed a pewter President's Medallion to be worn by all who have served as President of the Society." Established and implemented the Rewards Program to encourage members to make voluntary donations to strengthen the Society's financial position, and provide funding to achieve the missions and goals prescribed in the CWSW Charter. He has served as Chairman of this program since its approval, which has received over \$25,000 in contributions to date. John was the first contributor and first to attain

the highest reward, "The Circle of Sir William Wallace."

He Established and implemented the





and Awards Programs.

John continues to serve as the Recognition Chairperson for these programs.

Wallace Served as Chair of the Major International Projects Committee from 2005 through 2010. With the assistance of other Board Members and Society Advisors, John identified, researched, documented, coordinated, and championed several Wallace- and Scottishsignificant projects in Scotland, Canada, and the United States.

One highlight of his efforts was his work with the Rejuvenation of the Wallace Yew Tree in Elderslie, Scotland in 2005. He has traveled several times to Scotland at his own expense to investigate possible projects for the Society.

He championed and coordinated a major By-Laws change that created an Annual Membership category, discount for seniors, and implemented an increase in the Life and Council Membership donations

that were realistic and consistent with other clan societies.

The se changes were made to stabilize the finances of the Society and prevent the annual erosion of its financial base.

John Wallas has traveled extensively at his own expense throughout the United States, Canada, and Scotland representing Clan Wallace and "Waving the Flag" for the Society. In his three years as President, he visited over 36 locations in 13 states to attend Scottish games, festivals, funerals, gatherings, dinners, speeches, Sir William Wallace commemorations, and other special events.

He assisted the Special Projects Director in writing a series of Handbooks to guide the Board Members in their responsibilities, and ensure the workload would

be evenly shared with all 11 members of the Board.

In addition to his strong leadership and many contributions to the Society, John has been a leader and contributing member of the Scottish community wherever he resided. He is a Past President of the Virginia-Carolina Scottish Society of Danville, VA; the Scottish Society of Richmond, VA; and the Saint Andrews Society of Tidewater, VA.

In January 2005, John was honored at

Saint Andrews dinner as Tidewater's "Scot of the Year 2004" for his many contributions to the Scottish community worldwide. He has also been a Fel-

low of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland since 2003. At the Burns Dinner held in Charleston in January 2010, John was installed onto the Board of the Scottish Society of Charleston as a Director.

John has served as a heritage convener/co-convener for CWSW for most of his 23 member years at many venues in Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Louisiana, and Florida.

He continues to convene at many Scottish festivals across the southeastern United

Scots-Irish in the United States & Ganada

The Scots-Irish, Ulster-Irish, or Ulster-Scots, are an Irish ethnic group that originated in Scotland, and to a lesser extent, England. Settlers usually came from the Scottish Lowlands, Galloway, and the Scottish Borders. Descendants are primarily found in the six counties of Northern Ire-

land where they are known as the Ulster-Scots. In the United States and Canada, they are known as the Scotch-Irish. Most Scots in the Republic of Ireland are part of the Ulster-Scots group and live mainly in and around Donegal.

The Ulster-Scots are strongly identified with Protestantism and, in Ireland, Unionism. Unionists supported the concept of a unified Ireland and Northern Ireland as part of the United Kingdom versus being part of the Republic of Ireland. The Ulster-Scots were predominantly Presbyterian but also included Anglicans, Congregationalists, and Quakers. In the United States and Canada, Scotch-Irish people tended to gravitate towards the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Baptist denominations.

Upon arrival in Canada and America, they often formed distinctive communities with extremely unique social characteristics and practices that often set them apart from other ethnic groups. Around 500,000 settlers arrived between 1717 and 1776. They encountered the same harassment by British authorities as had occurred in Ulster and motivated many to leave for the frontier and rural isolated communities.

They disdained the British mandated state church, the Anglican Church in Ulster and all Roman Catholics. Roman Catholics offended them due to "papist traits" and religious wars in Europe which they viewed as an attempt to destroy all forms of non-Catholic worship. These

early Scots-Irish settlers usually referred to themselves simply as Irish, without the qualifier "Scotch" or "Scots". It was not until the mass immigration of Catholic Irish in the 1840s due to the Irish Potato Famine that they began to call themselves Scotch-Irish to distinguish themselves from these new arrivals.

Scotch-Irish Presbyterian settlers in New England often found themselves on the front line of the French and Indian Wars having moved out into the frontier areas as a result of friction with the Anglicans who dominated the urban areas. They supported

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A Highlander And His Books.... Rebel King, Hammer of the Scots

For those of you who enjoy Scottish novels, particularly historical ones, this is a great book to settle down with in front of a fire on a cold, rainy, winter's night. Get yourself a glass of wine, a wee dram, or a cup of cappuccino to warm your soul. The book will, too! Other than Sir Walter Scott and Nigel Tranter, I normally do not make a habit of reading historical novels, and already you have a heads-up as to what I think about this book. I must confess that I was a little slow getting around to reading it. After all, it is a 407-page book! I take

my reading time very personally. I do not casually read a book; I devour it like a leg of lamb or a beer-can chicken from my oft used

backyard grill. *Rebel King, Hammer of the Scots* was no exception. I actually found myself eagerly returning to the book until the last page was read. When I had finished

the book, I wished there had been more than the 407 pages. We'll get back to this aspect later in the review.

I was introduced to an interesting man at our Clan Chattan tent last October during the Stone Mountain Highland Games. Charles Randolph Bruce wanted to chat about his book. He spoke passionately and eloquently about what he and his wife, Carolyn, had written concerning "the chronicles of Robert de Brus, King of Scots". In a letter from Mr. Bruce, he described the book as "a fast-paced telling of

the Scottish Wars of Independence, beginning only months after the unjustly and horribly meted out

death of Sir William Wallace, subject of the Mel Gibson movie *Braveheart*." While this is a story informed Scots are familiar with, there are many others who have carelessly

passed it by over the years. Both groups would do well to spend time with this book - the former to

refresh their memories and stirtheir hearts once again, with the latter learning what they have put off far too long. Randolph and Carolyn Bruce have written a wonderful book worthy of the Scottish communities' attention.

Mr. Bruce informed me that the book "started out to be a 'family' story

that grew into a 'Scotland' story". From my perspective, this is a book for anyone who enjoys an exciting and jam-packed book of suspense and intrigue. Simply put, it is an exciting, well-written novel. I'm glad I read the book, and I firmly believe if you read the first chapter, you will read the entire book like I did. It ends with the death of "the Hammer of the Scots", Edward I. We learn the story will continue with a sequel

or two. Knowing this action filled account of the heroic Robert de Brus will continue

is, to me, the best part.

Professionally, Randolph and Carolyn Bruce are both commercial artists, an added bonus for all readers. Their book is graced with artistic talent at the beginning of each chapter where you will find pencil drawings of the main characters - a very nice

touch. Personally, the authors are parents and grandparents like so many of us. But, unlike so many of us, they have portrayed the beautiful story of Scotland's quest for freedom in words and drawings. The good news for this modern man is that the ancient story will continue as this talented husband and wife team weaves their magic formula again.


you with all the skill and color you can imagine.



the colonists in the American Revolution and formed a large part of the ranger companies, notably Rogers Rangers. By 1763, the number of immigrants to Canada began to rise. The first significant groups of Canadian settlers arriving from Ireland were Protestants from predominantly Ulster and largely of Scottish descent who settled in the mainly central Nova Scotia in the 1760s. Some came directly from Ulster, others from New England.

After the American Revolution, many Untied Empire Loyalists joined the established Ulster-Irish who came from Ulster. The United Empire Loyalists were those American Loyalists who fled to Canada and other British colonies after the British defeat. Settlement areas included Quebec, Ontario, New Brunswick, and in Nova Scotia. Scots-Irish migration to Western Canada has two distinct components, those who came via eastern Canada or the United States, and those who came directly from Ireland.



All these titles are available in three formats: 1) an instantly downloadable pdf; 2) a pdf file on a CD; or 3) an on-paper print-out with a spiral binding.

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

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The Other 70%

In one of my earlier articles I mentioned the fact that the Lowlanders were merchants, farmers, fishermen, writers, teachers, etc. Another occupation was weaving, and a place known for its weaving was the town of Paisley.

When you think of Paisley you think

immediately of a type of cloth with a 'tear-drop' design. Additionally many of us associate it with the calico (which is thought to have originally come from Calcutta, India) so popular in the U.S. in the 1700s and 1800's. The Paisley teardrop

pattern also originated in the Indo-European areas, but it was modified by European weavers, since the Indian material and items were so expensive. This modified cloth became associated with the weavers of Paisley, Scotland. Hence the name Paisley soon became the name of the pattern. In the 1800s it was very popular.

The town of Paisley is approximately 7 miles west of Glasgow and you can visit the Sma' Shot Cottages, situated appropriately on Shuttle Street, to see weaving cottages built in the 1700s to the specifications found in the history of Paisley. These cottages are open and free to the public.

They consist of two rooms that were used for living area plus a loom or weaving room. One of the original looms has been restored and weaving demonstrations are given on it. The weavers originally wove muslin, silk, and cotton.

Additionally anyone who sews even a

little is familiar with Coats and Clark threads. These started in mills set up by the Coats and the Clark families on the River. It was James Clark who invented the wooden spool for winding and selling thread. Their rivals




were the J&P Coats firm, which was also a textile and thread manufacturer. The Coats family expanded their company to the U.S. and Europe, and eventually merged with their Clark rivals to form Coats and Clark.

In addition to its weaving and thread industries, it was near Paisley where pregnant, Marjory (Bruce) Stewart, daughter of Robert the Bruce and wife of Walter Stewart, fell from her horse, delivered her son, Robert II, in Paisley Abbey, and died there. Robert was the first of the Stewart line of kings. Paisley Abbey had been built in 1145 and though once suffered a fire, it has been restored and is still there today.


