# A lady after my own heart! Mavis Turnbull Lockwood!

Mavis Turnbull Lockwood is still up to her old tricks. Mavis, an avid horsewoman, has just completed her third time of participating in Riley's Ride, a reenactment of Jack Riley's last trip (*The Man From Snowy River*). The ride is a several day journey (120 km) on horseback that includes meter wide paths and 100 meter drop offs. There are steep climbs and descents to reach the 6000 ft peak, as well as a river crossing. After completing the ride, Mavis said "The scenery is beautiful, but hard on the horses." But evidently not too hard on 82 year old Mavis! She's already signed up for next year's ride.

Mavis is a pioneer in Australian horse racing. She started riding when she was just 4 years old. Her father made her ride bareback and when she could do that he gave her a saddle with no stirrups. When she proved herself on the saddle, he added the stirrups.

History making is old hat for Mavis and includes being the first woman trainer to first woman rider. It seems in one Oakbank race her jockey didn't show up, so she rode the horse herself. The old days also included entertaining the crowds which led to jumping a horse over a motor vehicle. She has kept almost every trophy won and has an extensive trophy and memorabilia room.

Today, Mavis lives with her son, Robert, in Mil-Lel, near Mount Gambier, South Australia. They live on a farm that has been in her family for over 100 years. She continues to train and take care of 14 horses.

Despite cancer in 2008, Mavis hasn't given up. She fast tracked her recovery so she could compete at her local Mil-Lel show, which celebrated 70 years. Mavis has ridden in 69 of the 70 years. She missed a year because she was giving birth to her son.

Mavis has no intention of stopping riding. She says she told her pony, "Mum lived to 105...sure is I'll be riding you when I'm 100."

And if three days on horseback wasn't enough,

A Piper has long since held a position of significant honour within a Scottish family or Regiment, so honouring the game's piper was seen as entirely appropriate. Also, the Chief of the games this year was none other then the Rt. Hon. The Earl of Glasgow, and R. G. Hardie are based in Glasgow.

A beautiful custom made set of pipes was created, all by hand, including Blackwood with imitation ivory & nickel slides & caps, African Blackwood solo chanter, Flexistick blowstick, Sheepskin bag and Cane reeds. A set of pipes that any piper would be proud of. Next, a special presentation was organized to take place during the opening ceremonies where The Earl of Glasgow, who was delighted to make the presentation, would call Mr Williams from the field to receive his gift.

The day of the games could not have been better. The temperature was a lovely 83 degrees, far better than previous years which saw temperatures soar to 100+. Opening ceremonies began with the traditional procession of various dignitaries across the field to the reviewing stand. The National anthems of Scotland, Canada and the United States were sung followed by The Earl of Glasgow addressing the public and officially opening the games.

Next, and directly after Lord Glasgow's address, a startled Mr Williams was summoned by the MC to the reviewing stand. An explanation of the gift was then made by Romilly Squire of Rubislaw to the crowd followed by the presentation of the pipes by Lord Glasgow. Mr Williams, despite being overwhelmed by the gift, proceeded to play a verse of "Scotland the Brave" on the new pipes, much to the delight of the crowd.

## Angus Crabbie appointed to British Council's Challenge Europe Team



Angus Crabbie, Director of the Trees4Scotland project, has been appointed onto the British Council's Challenge Europe Team to represent Scotland.

In 2008, the British Council launched the European element of its global climate programme; Challenge Europe. The Challenge Europe project is a three-year project that aspires to make a definite and lasting impact on the climate change debate and is amtitious in its aim to accelerate change to a low carbon future. This summer, they are starting the second year of the project with activity in 15 countries across Europe.

In each of the participating countries they select 15 young people from all walks of life to become "Climate Advocates.". In exchange for the chance to participate in the project, Climate Advocates are asked to commit approximately 150 hours of their time. Over the period of one year, each country team will work collaboratively to identify key areas where they think they can make a real difference and to develop three concrete ideas to reduce carbon use through changes in policy, business or human behaviour.

The groups will then pitch their ideas to broader publics, specifically reaching out to decision-makers and organizations, campaigning for implementation and support in an effort to make the ideas become reality.

Throughout the programme, The British Council actively partner with a number of organizations across Europe spanning all sectors; including the corporate, non-governmental, environmental and academic worlds. Through these partnerships, they will support Angus and the other Climate Advocates in their quest, offering them access to some of the best minds in Europe through established networks of expert environmental groups and centres of excellence.

The philosophy of the campaign is simple: to create momentum through collaboration, innovation, energy, drive, passion, understanding and knowledge-sharing.

#### St. Albans Records useful in Canadian genealogy

Anyone tracing ancestors who may have entered the United States through Canada should take the time to become familiar with the St. Albans records.

Unfortunately, prior to January 1895, no official documentation exists for people who came across the United States/Canadian border. If you are searching for someone who came prior to January 1895, many professionals recommend checking church records, vital records, land/tax records, occupational licenses, and other types of civil records, and passenger

lists generated at ports of entry in the Canadian Maritime Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Quebec.

Some other possible areas that may generate success are cities such as Boston, Portland (Maine), and various Pacific ports that had consistent traffic and commerce with Canada. One may find clues that could allow the researcher to make some educated guesses or lead to additional records.

St. Albans border crossing records are lists of immigrants who crossed the border from Canada to the United States between 1895 through 1954. The title can be misleading in terms of the geographical scope of information. Some beginners assume that the records only contain information for the immediate area surrounding St. Albans, Vermont. In reality, they contain records of immigrants crossing over from Canada to the United States in all states located along the border with Canada from the Pacific to the Atlantic Oceans. This encompasses the states of Washington, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Vermont, and Maine.

St. Albans records contain much of the same information as would be found on ship passenger lists. Some are actual passenger lists. However, St Albans

records contain more specific information and details pertaining to individuals than would be found in standard passenger lists. Our companion study guides <u>Canadian Research</u> and <u>Immigration Across the United States/Canadian Border</u> provide more detailed information on this subject in terms of specific questions and procedures.

As of January 1, 1895, United States border inspectors stationed along the vari-

ous entry points along the Canadian border required that those entering Canada through sea ports obtain a <u>Certificate of Admission</u>, after passing a health inspection and quarantine. Railroads required a <u>Certificate of Admission</u> if the passenger arrived in Canada within the previous 30 days. At land border "ports", inspectors prepared the <u>List (or) Manifest of Alien Passengers Applying for Admission to the United States from Foreign Contiguous Territory</u> form, which is also called the <u>Form 1-Canada</u>.

This list refers to two sets of people:

- 1. Immigrants who may have lived in Canada for months/years prior to entering the U.S., and who came from a nation other than Canada, up to October 1, 1906
- 2. After October 1, 1906 the list then refers to the second set, which included Canadians in addition to those from another nation.






## The Story of the Lamont Harp

The original instrument of Highland music wasn't the pipes but the harp or clarsach, which is known to have existed in almost prehistoric times. One of the earliest surviving examples is the famous clarsach *Laomannach*. Brought to the Robertson's of Lude in Perthshire by a Lamont bride from Cowal in 1460.

The extreme length of the Lamont harp is 38 inches and the extreme width from front to back is 18 ½ inches. The box which is hollowed out of one piece of wood is 30 inches long by 4 inches wide at top and 17 inches at the bottom, the depth of the side throughout is 4 inches wide with a swell of the front from sides and ends to the center of 1 inch under the projecting band through which the 32 string holes are pierced. The string holes each have an ornamental mounting of brass of peculiar form, all of the same pattern, except the 3 upper and 2 lower holes, which are of the horseshoe shaped, terminating in quatrefoils.

There are 4 sound holes of 1 1/3 inches in diameter in front and the original back is gone, having been replaced by a new one.

It's currently housed in the National Museum of Antiquities in Edinburgh, Scotland.



J (John) Howard Standing passed away May 25, 2009 after a short battle with cancer. J Howard was born to R Howard and Anne Austin Standing on January 8, 1929 in Shoal Lake, Manitoba, Canada. His grandmother was Isabella Graham of Woodbridge, Ontario, Canada. He and his family immigrated to Los Angeles in 1945 where J enrolled at UCLA, graduat-

ing with a master's degree in Physiology. He spent the next several years working in the Department of Corrections as a parole officer. J Howard then entered Southwestern University School of Law graduating in 1965 and opened a law practice in 1966. He enjoyed all aspects of his legal career, specializing most recently in probate law.

He was very proud of his Scottish heritage and was a long time member of the St Andrew's

Society of Los Angeles where he served as President for most of the years 1997 to 2007. He designed the California State District Tartan and shepherded a bill through the California State Legislature to final passage as the official California State Tartan. J. Howard's legal ability was brought into play as a prime mover behind passage of bills creating both a National and California State Tartan Day on April 6 of each year. J was honored at a Tartan Day Dinner sponsored by the Society and the Seaside Highland Games, an organization which he had served as Board member and legal counsel, on April 6 of this year.

J Howard is survived by his wife Joan (Cousins) Standing, his twin daughters, Juliann Watson and Caren Standing and four grandchildren. His sons Christopher Howard and Mark Hanley predeceased him.

A memorial service was held on June 18 at 2 pm at the Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church, 505 N. Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills. 



2. When providing the surname, are there other spellings that may have been used? Example: Calkins/Caulkins 3. Approximate dates, if available, are helpful in narrowing the search - birth, death, marriage, also, last known to be living in or near. Example: born 1848 NY, married Sarah Webster 1869. Lived in Grant co. 1880. Not listed as a survivor in daughter's obit in 1892. 4. Occupation - religion, if known. 5. If you are using the regular mail, always include a Self-Addressed-Stamped-Envelope - don't expect a reply without one. An e-mail address is most helpful. The Flower Flag near Vandenberg AFB



Between the fields where the flag is planted, there are 9+ miles of flower fields that go all the way to the ocean. The flowers are grown by seed companies.

It's a beautiful place, close to Vandenberg AFB. Check out the dimensions of the flag. The Floral Flag is 740 feet long and 390 feet wide and maintains the proper Flag dimensions, as described in Executive Order #10834. This Flag is 6.65 acres and is the first Floral Flag to be planted with 5 pointed Stars, comprised of White Larkspur. Each Star is 24 feet in diameter; each Stripe is 30 feet wide.

This Flag is estimated to contain more than 400,000 Larkspur plants, with 4-5 flower stems each, for a total of more than 2 million flowers.
