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

Here's tae th' Lowly Kilt Pin!

I love a man in a kilt - and the perfect decoration for any kilt is the kilt pin. Unlike other accouterments to Highland wear, such as a sgian dubh, sporran, or plaid brooch, a kilt pin is a relatively recent addition, dating from the Victorian Era.

The popular story of how the kilt pin was added as a traditional Highland accessory is that on a particularly windy day Queen Victoria was inspecting her soldiers at Balmoral Castle. The story goes that one of the soldiers was having a difficult time assuring that the gusts of wind did not reveal more of his anatomy to his sovereign than modesty would dictate. Seeing his difficulty, the Queen supposedly removed a brooch she was wearing and pinned it to the soldier's kilt to weigh the kilt down in the wind and to prevent any further embarrassment.

Shortly afterward, according to author J. Charles Thompson, Queen Victoria mandated rules stating that all military kilts must have a fastening, and although the soldiers then wore kilt pins, they didn't fasten the layers of cloth with them as that would change the way the kilt hung. Thus, the kilt pin has become integral to any kilt outfit. According to the "Scotland Shop", "Traditionally, a kilt pin is wom on the right-hand side, pinned through the front apron 4 inches from the bottom of the kilt and 2 inches in from the fringing on the side. Make sure the pin is only through the front apron and not the layers underneath as this could result in damaging your kilt".

The addition of a kilt pin to Highland dress provided an additional opportunity to display


wealth, much as the plaid brooches and other accessories do.

Men at all levels of the socio-economic scale spent lavishly on ornate accessories set with precious and semi-precious stones. Money spent this way had the added benefit that if a clansman died, the silver accessories on their dress would cover the cost of a decent burial.

Kilt pins come in different styles and are appropriate for different occasions from the simplest blanket pin to a more omate pin for formal daywear, or a gold or silver pin with a stone set in it for evening wear, matching the formality of the dress and occasion.

To minimize the damage a kilt pin could cause a kilt, some people apply buttonhole stitching around the hole where the kilt pin goes into the cloth to strengthen the cloth and make it less likely to tear. Others place a piece of leather behind the front apron and attaching the kilt pin through the cloth and the leather to reduce the likelihood of tearing.

Scottish Tea—The New National Drink?

How to Make the Cuppa



- 1. Water affects the taste of the tea. Always us fresh water, never water that has been previously boiled. Fill the kettle with fresh water from the tap (or if you feel particularly flush, use spring water or even Scottish water, if you have any).
- 2. Always warm the teapot. While you bring the water to a boil, warm the teapot by rinsing it out with a little of the boiling water or even hot water from the tap.
- 3. Use a rounded teaspoon of tea leaves for each person and add one extra spoonful "for the pot". If the result is a little strong for you, use less.
- 4. Let the tea infuse in the hot water for three to five minutes depending on how strong you want to make it. The longer the tea steeps, the stronger the tea, but after five minutes it can get too bitter.
- 5. Serve the tea using a tea strainer (I use a pretty antique sterling silver one) to pour the tea into your chosen vessel.

If you are making tea with a tea bag or in a cup with a tea infuser, follow the same rules. For an infuser, put one teaspoon of tea into the infuser then pour boiling water into the warmed cup and infuse for 3-5 minutes. 



HISTORY RESEARCH

DOCUMENT EVERYTHING YOU DO!

The value of your family history research relies in large part on the thoroughness and clarity of your documentation. The documentation process includes how genealogists describe and cite their sources—including sources for which no model citation exists with artistry, clarity, conciseness, completeness, and competence. If complete accuracy is your ultimate research goal, everything in your family tree comes down to the documentation that you have to back up a claim. Errors are errors whether accidental or intentional. Facts without proper documentation cannot be trusted. No source should be considered unquestionable or deserving of absolute trust.

Many professionals view documenting relatives as genealogical shorthand for the process of finding evidence for names; birth, marriage and death dates, and relationships. Many years ago, the television program - Myth Busters - was popular. One of the frequent comments made during telecasts fits the topic we are discussing. "The only difference between science and playing around is to write it down!" This concept fits the field of genealogy perfectly. The only difference between fact and family folklore is writing down the evidence and the citing the source. This includes describing how and where the information was obtained from and any additional relevant details.

The twelve steps listed below are critical for long-term research success.

- 1. Document as you go along.
- 2. Enter notes in a consistent format.
- 3. List all sources found.
- 4. Use confidential information with discretion and sensitivity.
- 5. Identify conflicting or missing information.
- 6. Avoid using unusual abbreviations.
- 7. Indicate additional research where needed.
- 8. Strive to obtain primary sources for each event.
- 9. Indicate the location of lengthy documents rather than restating.
- 10. Welcome input and constructive review of your documentation.
- 11. Identify all researchers' contributions, including your own.
- 12. Recognize that good documenting requires a process of continuous refinement.

What are the proper steps for citing sources? In simplified terms, gather as

its first whisky later this year.

Planning started on Lochlea Distillery in 2014, but liquid production did not begin until August 2018, with the first casks filled and laid down in an on-site warehouse.

The site remains a working farm where the barley is grown nearly 250 years after Scotland's national poet was tending the same land.

Burns was 18 when he moved to Lochlea Farm in 1777, and worked there until 1784.

David Ferguson, Lochlea Whisky's commercial manager and an Ayrshire native, said: "Lochlea Whisky will carve out its own unique place in the industry.

"The new-make spirit is bursting with orchard fruit and has a beautiful elegance way beyond its years.

"Lochlea Farm is deeply rooted in Scottish history and is known for being the home and workplace of Robert Burns from 1777 to 1784.

"Burns is known for his honest, passionate and progressive nature and this has inspired some of Lochlea Distillery's core values."

Distillery manager Malcolm Rennie has been involved at Lochlea since 2018, having previously worked on whiskies including Kilchoman, Bruichladdich and Ardbeg.

He said: "Ensuring full traceability from field to cask is vital for us.


"We grow and harvest our own barley on Lochlea farm, with the resulting draff used to feed local cattle and the water is sourced on site.

"We've been able to take advantage of Ayrshire's natural resources and in doing so it keeps our carbon footprint to a minimum."

This has resulted in the delightful Macaroni Pie which has to be tried at least once.



much information about the source as possible so that it is easy to locate again if needed to clarify facts or analyze contradictions.

- 1. For a book, you'll want to write down the title, the author or database, the publisher (and publisher's location), and the name of the library or archives where you located the item, the year it was published, the pages where your information was found and the book call number or website URL.
- 2. For digital resources found on websites such as Ancestry and Family Search, the good news is that they provide the citations for each individual record for you. If you are on a website that does not have the citation capability, you should gather as much information as possible anyway. There are different ways to cite different types of sources, but the goal is to find it again even if the URL address were to change. An easy reference tool for any citation is https://www.easybib.com/ where you can type in the information you have gathered from books, articles, websites, etc. and the site will generate a citation for you in whichever style you prefer.
- 3. The final step is organizing your citations. Three handy forms that many researchers use are Research Logs, Research Checklists, or Source Summaries. Which one is best is a matter of personal preference.

Taking the time to document all sources serves multiple purposes.

- 1. Record the location of each source.
- 2. Provide the historical context that might justify or explain the analysis and interpretation, use of the information.
- 3. Allow you to locate the information again if you must go back to check facts
- 4. Assist others in understanding and evaluating your research. Being able to backtrack and review old sources of information in a timely manner is critical for evidence analysis.
- 5. If you pass away, in order for someone else to continue your projects, they must be able to understand your methodology.







As an established heraldic artist both in the UK and abroad, **John Ferguson**, who has died aged 96, produced exquisitely fine heraldic artwork for private clients, corporate bodies, civic authorities and international companies for more than 60 years.

John was born in Wimbledon, south London, to

Norman, a clerk at the Admiralty research laboratory in Teddington, and his wife, Betty (nee Barrett), and went to Raynes Park boys' school.

When at an early age he was told by a teacher that he would never make an artist, since he made such a

mess of his exercise books, it only increased his desire to be one.

Despite the teacher's foreboding, John later attended Wimbledon School of Art, where he studied graphic design.

Here he came under the influence of an inspiring lecturer who introduced him to the world of heraldry. The seed was sown, and a lifelong love affair with this fascinating subject began.

At a little over 17, John took the entrance examination for the Royal College of Art. He waited impatiently for the result which arrived a few weeks later – in the same post as his call-up papers for military service. He served in Burma until the end of the war.

On demobilisation, studies were resumed at the RCA and John graduated in 1950. There followed

nine years of graft at a West End advertising agency designing trademarks, corporate identity schemes, posters and exhibition stands.

However, John's heraldic interests were still latent: whenever a request came into the studio that required a shield or a lion rampant the cry would go up,

"Give it to Fergie – he's good at that sort of thing!"

In 1959 John left the agency to establish his own freelance practice as a heraldic artist and in 1961 he was invited to join the staff of the Guildford School of Art as a lecturer in graphic design.

Shortly after his appointment, the Guildford

and Farnham art schools amalgamated in the newly established West Surrey College of Art and Design, where John became a senior lecturer and joined his old friends Anthony Wood and Dan Escott to work on the prestigious heraldry and calligraphy course they had established at Reigate.


For John, heraldry opened many doors, demanding of him all his imagination and undoubted ability as a draughtsman and graphic designer. It required him to experiment with giving two-dimensional colour a deeper dimension, enabling it to glow like enamel. Above all, it instilled in him a love of and respect for fine craftsmanship; he relished the day-to-day challenge of heraldic design and was constantly inspired

The subject of Scottish charms and amulets, although one of great interest, has scarcely as yet been touched upon by antiquaries. With the exception of two or three brief notices of individual charms, the only special article of any importance is the paper of the late Sir James Young

Simpson, published in the fourth volume of our *Proceedings*. In the present paper it is purposed to describe in detail all the known specimens of Scottish amulets and charms, accompanied by such extracts

The earliest known writer who uses the word amulet is Pliny, and it is employed by him with the same meaning that we attach to it, namely, as a preservative against poison, witchcraft, and sorcery ("venoficiorum amulets," Historia Naturalis, lib. nix, cap. xix).

The derivation of the word is not known, but by some a Latin origin is assigned to it as being that "quod malum amolitur." By others, the word is derived from amula, "vas lustrale." The etymology from the Arabic himälah (= "that which is carried") usually assigned to the word in modern dictionaries is wrong, the resemblance between the two words being purely fortuitous.

The word charm, from the Latin carmen, a song, was in later times understood to mean a form of words possessing some occult power for good or evil, more often the former.



Charms were of two kinds, written and recited. Of the former, the toothache charms described below are typical examples, and of the latter, the Shetlandic incantation for the cure of a sprained joint or sinew is an instance:-

"The Lord rade, and the foal slade;

He lighted, and he righted,

Set joint to joint, bone to bone,

And sinew to sinew, heal in the Holy Ghost's name."

Curing-Stones

That certain stones possessed curative properties of an occult nature was formerly the common belief of the people throughout Scotland, and even to this day is not quite extinct among us.

With the exception of the crystal balls already described, the greater number of these curing stones are merely naturally-formed pebbles, such as may be found in the bed of any stream or picked up on the seashore.

Some of these curing-stones are known by name

and have acquired a more than local celebrity from their association with particular individuals.

Of these, the chief is the Curing-Stone of St Columba, the virtues of which have been recorded by Adamnan as follows:-

Curing-Stone of St Columba.—" About the same time the venerable man, from motives of humanity, besought Broichan the Druid to liberate a certain Scotic female slave, and when he very cruelly and obstinately refused to part with her, the saint then spoke to him to the following effect:—' Know, O Broichan, and be assured, that if thou refuse to set this captive free, as I desire thee, that thou shalt die suddenly before I take my departure again from this prov-

ince.'

Having said this in presence of Brude, the king, he departed from the royal palace and proceeded to the river Nesa (the Ness); from this stream, he took a

white pebble, and showing it to his companions said to them: "'Behold this white pebble, by which God will effect the cure of many diseases among this heathen nation.'

"Having thus spoken, he instantly added, 'Broichan is chastised grievously at this moment, for an angel being sent from heaven, and striking him severely, hath broken into many pieces the glass cup in his hand from which he was drinking, and hath left him gasping deeply for breath, and half dead. Let us await here a short time, for two of the king's messengers, who have been sent after us in haste, to request us to return quickly and help the dying Broichan, who, now that he is thus terribly punished, consenteth to set the girl free.'

"Whilst the saint was yet speaking, behold there arrived, as he had predicted, two horsemen, who were sent by the king, and who related all that had occurred to Broichan in the royal fortress, according to the pre-





diction of the saint—both the breaking of the drinking goblet, the punishment of the Druid, and his willingness to set his captive at liberty; they then added, 'The king and his friends have sent us to thee to request that thou wouldst cure his foster-father Broichan, who lieth in a dying state.'

"Having heard these words of the messengers, St Columba sent two of his companions to the king with the pebble which he had blessed, and said to them, 'If Broichan shall first promise to set the maiden

free, then at once immerse this little stone in water, and let him drink from it, and he shall be instantly cured; but if he break his vow, and refuse to liberate her he shall die that instant.'

"The two persons, in obedience to the saint's instructions, proceeded to the palace, and announced to the king the words of the venerable man. When they were made known to the king and his tutor Broichan, they were so dismayed that they immediately liberated the captive, and

delivered her to the saint's messengers.

The pebble was then immersed in water, and in a wonderful manner, contrary to the laws of nature, the stone floated on the water, like a nut or an apple, nor, as it had been blessed by the holy man, could it he submerged.

Broichan drank from the stone as it floated on the water, and instantly returning from the verge of death, recovered his perfect health and soundness of body.

"This remarkable pebble, which was afterwards preserved among the treasures of the king, through the mercy of God effected the cure of sundry diseases among the people, while it in the same manner floated when dipped in water.

And what is very wonderful, when this same stone was sought for by those sick persons whose term of life had arrived, it could not be found. Thus on the very day on which King Brude died, though it was sought for, yet it could not be found in the place where it had been previously laid."

Curing-Stones of St Fillan.—In a niche in the wall of the mill at Killin, Perthshire, there are preserved a number of stones, which are locally known as the healing or curing stones of St Fillan, and considered to

be efficacious in cases of insanity and rheumatism.

The stones are merely small boulders of quartzite taken from the bed of the river, but are marked by small, shallow, rounded cavities on their faces. They are now known to be nothing more than the "socket stones in which the spindle of the upper millstone used to work before the introduction of the improved machinery." It is stated that a niche has always been made in the wall of the new mill which succeeded the old one down to the present

day, as a resting-place for the stones; and that on the saint's day in 1879, the villagers assembled and put clean straw under them.

The precise manner in which the stones were used in effecting a cure is not clear, but it is stated that water poured over them was used by the patient—whether outwardly or inwardly is not known.

A correspondent of the late Dr John Stuart, in a letter dated March 1865, also refers to the stones, and adds that each one "was supposed to have the power of healing a particular disease.

The tradition of the country points them out as the identical stones blessed by the saint, and used for healing disease through so many centuries, almost to

One was called the 'heart stone,' another the 'thumb stone.' "

In a paper communicated to the Society some years ago by the Rev. Dr Hugh Macmillan, the writer describes two curing-stones of white quartz which lie on a tombstone in an old burying-ground known as *Cladh Davi*, on the shore of Loch Tay.

These curing-stones, like those at Killin already described, were also originally socket stones.

Dr Macmillan says:—"These stones are said to cure pectoral inflammation when the water is applied to the nipples; and not long since a woman, who was thus afflicted, came a considerable distance, from the head of Glen Lochay, to make use of this remedy.

In all likelihood the stones belong to the series which is carefully preserved in the modern mill at Killin, as relics of St Fillan.

It is said that some of the stones in the collection at the mill were lost. In all likelihood the stones in *Cladh Davi* are the missing ones, though how or why or when they were brought to the latter spot there is no record to tell."

Curing-Stone of St Molio. Martin is the only writer who describes this stone, which appears to have been held in great repute in Arran in his day for removing stitches from the sides of sick people, and for securing victory in the battle to Macdonald of the Isles.

The stone has now disappeared.

Martin's description is as follows: "I had like to have forgot a valuable Curiosity in this Isle, which they call Baul Muluy,' i.e. Molingus his Stone Globe: this Saint was Chaplain to Mack-Donald of the Isles; his Name is celebrated here on the account of this Globe, so much esteemed by the Inhabitants.

This Stone for its intrinsic value has been carefully transmitted to Posterity for several Ages.

It is a green Stone much like a Globe in Figure, about the bigness of a Goose-Egg.

The Vertue of it is to remove Stitches from the sides of sick Persons, by laying it close to the Place affected; and if the Patient does not out-live the Dis-



temper, they say the Stone removes out of the Bed of its own accord, and è contra.

The Natives use this Stone for swearing decisive Oaths upon it.

They ascribe another extraordinary Vertue to it, and 'tis this: The credulous Vulgar firmly believe that if this Stone is cast among the Front of an Enemy, they will all run away; and that as often as the Enemy rallies if this Stone is east among them, they still lose Courage, and retire.

They say that Mack-Donald of the Isles carried this Stone about him and that Victory was always on his side when he threw it among the Enemy.

The Custody of this Globe is the peculiar Privilege of a little Family called Clan-Chattons, alias MackIntosh; they were ancient Followers of Mack-Donald of the Isles.

This Stone is now in the Custody of Margaret Miller, alias Mack-Intosh: she lives in Baellmianich, and preserves the Globe with an abundance of care; it is wrapped up in fair Linen Cloth, and about that there is a piece of Woollen Cloth, and she keeps it still looked up in her Chest when it is not given out to exert its qualities."




