

Thieves steal Tudor treasures from Arundel Castle

Thieves have broken into Arundel Castle in southern England, and have stolen gold and silver items worth more than £1 million.

Sussex Police released information about the bur-

glary, which took place on Friday, May 21st. An alarm was sounded at 10.30pm that evening, and within minutes the police arrived on the scene, but the culprit or culprits had gotten away after smashing into a display cabinet and stealing several items.

Some of the stolen goods have great historical significance. These include the Gold Rosary Beads carried by Mary Queen of Scots at her execution in 1587, several coronation cups given by the Sovereign to the Earl Marshal of the day, and other gold and silver treasures. The rosary is of little intrinsic value as metal, but as piece of the Howard family history and English heritage it is irreplaceable.

"The stolen items have significant monetary value, but as unique artefacts of the Duke of Norfolk's collection have immeasurably greater and priceless historical importance," said spokesman for Arundel Castle Trustees. "We therefore urge anyone with information to come forward

to the police to assist them in returning these treasures back where they belong."

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If you do genealogy - no matter the ethnicity - here are a couple of things you really do need to know!

TAKE CARE OF YOUR GENEALOGY WHEN YOU ARE GONE

During the years I worked for a library in South Georgia, there was not a month that went by that I did

not get a phone call from a realtor or someone involved in the dispursement of someone's property. The calls were always about the genealogical materials, papers, books, notebooks, etc., of the person who had passed away.

Most of the time the person calling would say something like, "Mrs./Mr. Jones did not leave anything in their Will about their genealogical materials and their children say to "just throw it away." They are not interested.

I would say, "Our library will take everything. What you have is precious and needs to be saved for other researchers."

Most of the time, the person who called the library would load their car or truck with those genealogical materials and drive them to our library at their own expense.

Whether you are new to genealogy or have worked on your own family history for many years, here is something for you to think about right now. It is important that you discuss what happens to all of your books and materials and your family tree charts when you are no longer here with your attorney.

This is something that you may have to make changes to fit your particular needs, but, this is a very good beginning.

Here is an example you may wish to use: A Genealogical Codicil to my Last Will & Testament: To my spouse, children or guardian: Upon my demise it is requested that you DO NOT dispose of any or all of my genealogical records, books, files, noteooks or

computer programs for a period of two years.

During this time period, please attempt to iden-

tify one or more persons who would be willing to take custody of the said materials and the responsibility of maintaining and continuing the family histories.

In the event you do not find anyone to accept these materials, please contact the various genealogical organizations that I have been a member of and determine if they will accept some parts or all of my genealogical materials.

There are several libraries in the United States who you may

contact to see if they would like my books and materials and my research work.

The Allen County Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana is a very good place to start.

Please remember that my genealogical endeavors consumed a great deal of money, time, travel and work.

HOW TO SUBMIT A GENEALOGICAL QUERY

A query is a little ad you place everywhere you can think of where genealogists will read it.

How you write the query determines what results you will get from it.

- 1. Who and what information are you looking for? Are you looking for burial information, where they lived or were born, the names of children or name/s of spouses, etc. Be specific.
 - 2. Approximate dates, if available, are helpful in



Next year's festival has already been confirmed and will be May 6th-8th, 2022. We will hope to see you there! Matthew Douglas – Texas Regent



Not wanting to leave home and family, he declined both and was drafted into the Army months later, where he served with distinction in both Germany and Korea.




narrowing the search - birth, death, marriage, also, last known to be living in or near? Example: Born 1848 in NY, married Sarah Webster 1869. He lived in Grant County 1880. He was not listed as a survivor in his daughter's obituary in 1892.

- 4. Occupation and religion, if known.
- 5. ALWAYS include a SASE (Self Addressed Stamped envelope) if you are mailing your query. Don't expect a reply without one if you are sending to another individual.
- 6. Always include information in your query on how you may be located. Include email and phone numbers if you wish. The more information you include, the more likely you are to be successful in learning information on your own lost relative.




Randy spent most of his young life in Apopka and will be remembered as a great man, brother, husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, uncle and great-uncle.



Traditionally, Father's Day usually plays a secondary role to the celebration of Mother's day. For a

variety of reasons, fathers have not had the same sentimental appeal that mothers normally have.

The first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910 in the state of Washington. The official celebration took place in Spokane, Washington at the YMCA and was hosted by Sonora Smart Dodd.


Mrs. Dodd was motivated by the memories of her father William Jackson Smart, a Civil War veteran from Arkansas, who was a single parent and raised his six children there.

The initial reaction to the celebration was marginal at best but support began to manifest itself over the next 58 years. Finally, in June of 1972, Father's Day was designated as a nationwide holiday on the third Sunday in June throughout the United States.

Over the years I have heard many people, both male and female, say in retrospect that it was their father that often built the framework for family life. Fathers often served

the role of disciplinarian, the voice of reason, or the problem solver. Their influence often provided a complimentary balance to their mothers. In many cases, the father/child bond was often not recognized or appreciated as they were growing up, but it most certainly has become important now that they have

reached adulthood and reminisce

to swim or to the bay where you went fishing and he told you stories about the big one that got away.


5. How about as you got older? Think back to your dad walking you down the aisle at your wed-Continued on page 17

The Stewart dynasty descended from King Robert I's daughter and her husband, Walter the Steward. Despite early unrest and weak government caused by several Stewart kings succeeding as minors, the dynasty flourished for over three centuries.

During this time, Scotland moved forward to become a modern and prosperous nation. Stewart monarchs such as King James IV and VI were Renaissance patrons of artistic, scientific, commercial, religious and political endeavour, sponsoring figures including the poet, Robert Henryson, and humanist, George Buchanan.

Also of significance was the arrival in the mid-sixteenth century of the Reformation movement, bringing about the replacement of Catholic Mary Queen of Scots by her son King James VI.

It was through the Stewart dynasty that the two thrones of England and Scotland - and later the governments - came to be united.

The 'Marriage of the Thistle and the Rose' took place at Stirling Castle in 1503 between King James IV and Princess Margaret Tudor, daughter of King Henry VII of England.

This union of the Scottish and English Royal families eventually led in 1603 to the succession of a Stewart (now with a change of spelling) to the throne of England.

Bryan L. Mulcahy, continued from page 15—ding, helping you buy your first car, or supporting you financially and/or emotionally when purchasing your first house or holding their grandchildren.

I hope all of you will try to take some time and honor your father in some way this year. Even if he is deceased, there are ways you can help celebrate his memory. I have listed some brief ideas below.

- 1. Send them a card and call them if you are unable to visit them in person.
- 2. Order a nice framed picture of your father. This picture could feature any of the following themes:
- a. As a youngster or graduating from high school or college or both
 - b. With his children and grandchildren
 - c. Accepting a prestigious award
- 3. If he was a home movie buff, have those old films digitized and present them as a gift.
- If you father is proud of his military service and/or has an interest in history, consider purchasing a coffee table book or well-illustrated historical book on a topic of interest.
- 5. If you are involved in genealogical research, consider putting together some of the items you have found in a nice album or have the items digitized onto a CD, DVD, or Blue Ray disc. Items of this nature could include:
 - a. Copies of official documents or certificates
 - b. Pictures of family members
 - c. Timelines of major events in family history
 - d Wedding or school photographs

If you father is deceased, here are some proven activities that will provide comfort and honor his memory. If some tears occur on your part, that is nothing to be ashamed about.

- 1. Write a letter. Talk about your emotions, memories of your father, things you would like to say to him if you were given one final chance for a few minutes or an hour.
- 2. Visit his grave. Plan a visit and bring something to commemorate the occasion. Examples would include, flowers, copy of a memorable photograph, stuffed animal, written letter, etc.
- 3. Ceremonial tribute. Was there anything your father loved to do? This might include volunteering, fishing, golfing, running marathons or other events for charity, or joining and/or contributing to an organization that was near and dear to his heart. If any of these suggestions are applicable, consider them as a form of tribute.
- 4. Visit other dads. Just as you are mourning the loss of your father, there are many others going through the same emotional sadness of losing a child or spouse. Plan a visit to a neighbor or facility and spend time with fathers that might otherwise celebrate the day by themselves in isolation.
- 5. Offer support to children that have lost their fathers. While we as adults may have a better understanding of the inevitable process, children may not have the ability to cope with this trauma. Help them talk through their memories, help them with photograph albums, and listen to their stories and grief. Listening can often make a big difference in their lives.

The man in the picture was my father Lawrence Robert Mulcahy. He was a very underappreciated man. Feel free to contact me with any comments or questions.



Reliving how his search for "the ghosts of the past" began, Kelso-born Moffat said: "The first discovery was the stone, about the size of a square football. I hadn't noticed it before. I picked it up and I immediately knew what it was; it was a million-to-one chance that it would be somebody who would recognise it."

The stone was the top of a pillar on part of which the historian recognised two letters in the Old Irish language of Ogham. He contacted an academic at Glasgow University who immediately drove to the farm to validate his find which now sits in the National Museum of Scotland.

Moffat, the former chairman of STV who as director of the Fringe helped make it one of the most successful arts festivals in the world, revealed: "The Ogham stone is 5th or 6th Century, about 1,500 years old. You find them in Galloway, the Hebrides, in Ireland and some in Wales, but one had never been found as far east as this. At that moment, I thought 'this place is old'."

Despite the significance of his discovery, he went back to his busy routine of fixing fences, fertilising fields and chopping wood. However, everything was to change with the arrival in 2016 of his West Highland Terrier Maidie at the farmstead Moffat

shares with his horse-breeder wife Lindsay, son Adam, daughter-in-law Kim, and their daughter Grace, five, sister to baby Hannah whom the family tragically lost to stillbirth in 2015.

Moffat, who also has two grown-up daughters, Helen and Beth, said: "It wasn't until I got my little Maidie that I started walking and looking around properly."

His interest was further piqued when he joined forces with detectorist Rory. Moffat said: "He began finding things that amazed me. In the introduction to the book I write about Edward I's army marching up the track, which is a fact because he paid his men at Selkirk Castle in July 1301."

Into the writing Moffat weaved an imaginary Crusader knight. He said: "Rory found a sword pommel, which was attached to the butt end of a crusader's sword."

Evidence suggests the owner of the sword was Edward's companion De Grandison from Savoy in northern Italy.

"It was almost certainly this man whose sword broke and he lost the pommel and 700 years later Rory found it," said Moffat. Further finds included silver coins from the same period which, he says, "shows

the men had been paid. Soldiers played gambling games, probably in the darkness around campfires and they lost them".

Moffat began to trace a "chronological pattern". He explained: "By the time we get to the 1500s people start to come on record." Walter, his friend, was executor and heir to long-deceased Selkirk bakers Walter and Bruce Mason. They had been self-taught historians and archaeologists who had made their own finds on local farms, including the Moffats', as well as collecting documents.

These were passed to the author who revealed: "Gibbie Hatly was a nearby farmer who left a detailed will in 1547 found by the Mason brothers. In it he leaves a pair of shoes and his best horn-handled stick to somebody called Andrew Fisher because Andrew helped

him out of a burn he had fallen into when he was drunk. Stuff like that is just gold."

And the discoveries just keep on coming. Of the most recent finds, Moffat revealed: "A big part of the farm is the deer park, which was a medieval deer park. The remains of Selkirk Castle are at one end but not on our land although the farm reaches almost right up to the ditch around the castle.

"Rory has been metal detecting for the past few weeks and has found some quite remarkable things. He found a metal tube made out of steel with hand-made pins for pinning up ladies' dresses inside. On the bottom of the tube is a seal – the woman who owned it would have used it to plunge into wax to seal things.

"One of his best finds was an American Zippo-Continued on page 21

Police are examining a few leads that might be connected to the burglary. Detective Constable Molly O'Malley of Chichester CID said; "If you were in Arundel on Friday evening and saw any suspicious activity around the area of the Castle, please contact us either online or by calling 101, quoting Operation Deuce.

"In addition, the castle only re-opened to visitors on Tuesday 18 May so if you were visiting during the past few days do you on reflection recall anyone behaving at all suspiciously? If you are offered or hear of anyone offering for sale any of the items stolen, we would also like to hear from you."

Arundel Castle was first built in the eleventh century and has been upgraded and changed several times in the Middle Ages and later periods. It is now a major tourist site.

type cigarette lighter. It was lost in one of the fields and it has the inscription on it 'To Rita from Edek'. On the other side is the Polish army insignia. So this Polish soldier. Edek, gave the lighter to a local

girl, Rita, and she lost it. The Polish Armoured Brigade were stationed in the Borders but went off when Europe was invaded, so did Edek leave Rita forever? We think he did because we tried to find Rita and him and we couldn't."

The author, who has been approached for the film and television rights to his book, muses: "What I discovered fired my imagination and made the small world I inhabit enormous, a place from where I could reach back through time, across millennia, so that I could take the hand of those who lived where we live 8,000 years ago. They saw the same skies I see. They were once me and I am them."





Ingredients:

- One bottle of Scotch whisky (A decent blend will do)
- (Optional) 1/2 Pint of double cream
- 450g of clear Scottish honey
- One handful of fine ground oatmeal

Pick whichever whisky takes your fancy but a decent blend will work just as well as a good malt. We recommend that you perhaps don't use a peaty whisky as this can detract from the sweet flavour.

- Step 1: Combine the oatmeal and whisky in a shallow container. Cover with linen and leave in a cool place for several hours or overnight.
- Step 2: Remove the liquids from your oatmeal and whisky mixture. Use linen or a spoon and strainer to squeeze every last drop of whisky out of the oatmeal solids. Discard the oats.
- Step 3: This step is optional, some more traditional recipes don't use cream, while others even recommend mixing the cream with egg whites. This step can be used or left out as per your preference. Add cream and stir. Step 4: Gently whisk in honey, until dissolved.
- Step 5: Stir the final mixture well (according to tradition, this should be done with a silver spoon). Pour the brose into a bottle for storage.
- Step 6: Store bottle in the fridge for up to a week, Atholl Brose is at its best when given a few days to mature, howe, ver it tastes great freshly made too.
 - Step 7: Serve chilled from the fridge or over ice. Enjoy!

We are so excited to show this wonderful find. It is a huge wildcat found in Aberdeenshire.

This cat has beautiful body stripes, blunt ringed tail and just look at his/her bulk and body length.

This cat was not found by our team, but instead was caught on camera by a local family, Dave Smith and his daughter, Erin Smith.

They both have a very keen interest in the wildcat and have been camera trapping on their local patch.

We of course won't reveal where this is for obvious reasons. Dave tells us that he positions the camera and his daughter Erin, lays the mackerel filet bait, so it's a real team effort.

What an incredible result? Dave and Erin now have more cameras and are going to try and get a glimpse of any other wildcats in the area.

That is hugely important work.

This why we have so much hope that we can save the wildcat in the wild where it belongs, because we can work closely with local people like Dave and Erin and build up a picture of wildcat distribution.

We can only protect them when we know where they are, so this is an incredibly important find in a new area for us.

Remember, according to the Scottish Government, the best way forward would be to capture and cage this cat, rather than protect it in the wild. They are currently spending 5 million pounds on a captive



breeding programme and the really sad thing is, that the captive population by their own admission, is heavily hybridised. They have nothing in their programmes that looks anything like as impressive as the cat here. Finds like this prove that the Scottish wildcat is still out there in the wild and we will continue our work with the help of people like Dave and Erin, to make sure that they remain so.





Dr Gregory Baldi is Associate Professor of Political Science at Western Illinois University.


Greg's research focuses on the development of political and social institutions in Western Europe especially the United Kingdom and Ger-



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
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translating some "Glaswegian words!"





Whether you're from Glasgow or grew up with a Glaswegian relative, you'll know that the city has its very own language.

From the overarching use of words like 'Pure' and 'Dead' to unique words and expressions like 'Gallus', 'Breenge' and 'Bahookie', there are thousands of words and phrases that are distinctly Glaswegian.

Many of these expressions and words aren't used elsewhere but if outsiders know their Billy Connolly, *Still Game* or Stanley Baxter then they'll be sure to recognise some of them.

1. You'll get a swift kick up the Bahookie

A favourite saying of Glaswegian dads and granddads across the city, this usually means you're getting on their nerves, with bahookie being a Glasgwegian word for your behind.

2. Shut your geggie

Geggie is another word for mouth, so if you hear this you're being told to shut it.

3. Bawheid

The Glaswegian for 'Ball head', this usually refers to someone with a big head.

Not to be confused with 'Heid the Baw' which is a (usually affectionate) name for an irritating or annoying person, as in "Hawl Heid the Baw, get over here."

4. Hauners (handers)

If someone goes in team handed then they've usually brought along their hauners, and this refers to a person who might jump into a fight or rammy to help out.

5. Bowfing/Bogging

These two roughly mean the same thing, with both referring to something that either tastes, looks, or smells unpleasant.

6. I got Hee-haw

This means you got nothing and is a rhyming slang term replacing a slightly stronger version, F*** All, where all becomes aw.

7. Heid Bummer

This slightly confusing term refers to someone's boss or the people who run something.

"See him? Aye well, he's the Heid Bummer of that plumbing firm."

8. Peely wally

Could refer to most Scots during summertime, but is usually reserved for someone who is looking a bit pale or sickly.

9. Gallus

A wide-ranging word that covers everything from flashy and cocky to bold

and overconfident, it can either be used affectionately - "Aw, he looks gallus in that uniform" - or in a more derisory manner.

10. Away with the fairies/like a fart in a trance

This refers to someone who is a bit spaced out or who has a tendency to daydream.


11. Plook

A brilliant sounding word for a spot or a boil. "He's got a big plook on his nose."

A plural form of you, this is often used in Glasgow when speaking to more than one person and is used in place of 'You lot'. "Yous coming over to mine the mora?"

15. Thingmy(jig)

Usually used when someone is struggling to remember the name of a person or thing. "Did I tell you who I saw this morning? Big Thingmy, aw what's his name again."

16. Scratcher

Another name for your bed.

17. Out on the Randan

Usually refers to a big night out, with lots of drinking involved.

18. A poke

This is a Glaswegian word for a paper bag. "You want a wee poke for your chips?"

19. Wee nyaff

A small person or thing that is overly annoying.

20. nae-user



Someone who is no good at any given task.

"I hope I'm no working wae that nae user the night."

21. I was Knotting myself

This means to laugh uproariously at something or someone.

"We were knotting ourselves watching Still Game last night."
