Welsh lovespoons...

Rich and Rita Shader and their publication, Celtic Seasons have printed a wonderful article about the lovely Welsh Lovespoons. I have a wee little two inch pin in the shape of a lovespoon which I really - no pun intended - love.

A hand-carved lovespoon, sometimes written as "love spoon" or, in Welsh: LLwyau caru is a perfect romantic gift for any occasion. Originally they were given upon the occasion of a marriage prorposal, today they are also given as gifts for children, to parents or your own loved one as a simple expression of friendship, but they are also perfect for an important life occasion.

Probably the three most popular symbols of Wales are daffodils, leeks and lovespoons...and their wonderful red dragon.

The lovespoons have become particularly associated with Wales. The oldest known example dates from 1667. It is displayed with others at the National History Museum, St. Fagans, near Cardiff.

They have also been made all around Europe, particularly in the Celtic countries such as Brittahy where the Breton name for them translates as "marriage spoons."

Originally, a lovespoon was a token of love carved out of wood by a young man for the girl he wanted to be his wife. The suitor would spend hours making the very best carving that he could and then present it to his beloved.

If she accepted the spoon, this showed she accepted entering into a relationship with him.

It is thought that this tradition is the origin of the word "spooning."

Farm workers carved their love spoons during the long winter evenings, or while they pastured animals, while sailors worked on them during lonely times on long sea voyages.

A single piece of wood was used for carving the spoon. Sycamore was the most popular, but *Continued on page 7*

wood from apple, cherry, yew, boxwood and oak were also used. The earliest examples were fairly simple, but with time they became more and more elaborate, which not only demonstrated the extent of the young man's love, but also showed him to have skills that sould be useful in their home.

These spoons were not meant to be used as practical utensils for cooking or eating. You can see many examples of dougle or triple spoons which are totally impractical as utensils. They were usually hung on the wall as a visual reminder of the love between a couple.

A lovespoon could be as large as three feet...and as small as three inches.

Each carver would use symbols representing the meaning of his love relationship, what he had to brint to it and what expectations he had from it. Some of these derive from the agricultural or nautical background of the carver while some are personal and unique.

Every lovespoon is different and could hold items such as a heart, bell (in hopes of wedding bells), a padlock or keys or birds of even an expert carvers could carve ball or balls in a cage - signifying how many children he wished), a link of chains - signifying the couple being together for all time. You might see a diamond shape which would be a wish for wealth or good fortune.

If the couple had a particularly deep love their spoon might signify a man and woman who considered themselves to be "soul mates" or in Gaelic, Anam cara.

A spade signified a willingness to work and the horse shoe meant then as now, good luck.

A cross meant faith and if you see an anchor it would mean steadfastness or coming home to stay.

A tree would mean strength and fertility and a harp would signify music and harmony and was also a symbol of Wales.

If the girl found a ship on her lovespoon, it meant a smooth passage through life while a dragon meant protection but also Wales itself.

A twisted rope carved upon a lovespoon meant oneness and union.

Vines and leaves meant growth of love or evergreen love. If the vines had fruit, it meant a fruitfull marriage.

I'll bet that you can look on the Internet and find lovespoons carved and for sale if you wish a really lovely and meaningful gift for your special loved one.



The above information will be changed on the Clan Bell advertisement in Section A this issue. It will be corrected for the July issue.


Mr. Bell's retirement speech is on page 29. We do send sympathy to William Bell and his family at this very sad time.



Suzanne Shanahan Bell, 76. Born September 24, 1936 in Rochester, New York; Passed away on March 19, 2013 in Riverside, California.

Suzanne and William H. Bell (President of CIan Bell Organizations 1983-2012) were married in October 1956. She traveled with Bill to Germany, where he was assigned for duty in the USAF, and where their three children were born. When Bill retired from the Air Force in 1975, the family settled in Riverside. During the family's last tour of duty in Germany, Suzanne accompanied Bill throughout Europe while he coordinated with Intelligence personnel of various friendly countries.

She served as a Goodwill Ambassador to the wives of foreign dignitaries, military counterparts and other allied officers. Her skill, tact and diplomacy as hostess were unsurpassed and contributed greatly to the friendly cooperation between countries.



Dr. Bernard David Kaiman, 94, of Jonesborough, Tennessee, died on Saturday, April 27, at the Johnson City Medical Center.

He was born to Abraham and Bertha Kaiman on March 30, 1919, in Omaha, Nebraska. When he was a young child, the family moved to Wisconsin.

Bernard pursued a Ph.D. in clinical psychology at the University of Tennessee. He then spent his career as a psychologist at the Mountain Home VA Medical Center.

On May 4th, Bernard and Audrey Loa Kaiman would have celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary.

He had a special passion for dance — especially International Folk Dancing and Scottish Country Dancing — that earned him the nickname, "Dr. Dance." Every kind of music and dance interested him — Greek, Israeli, Mexican, Scottish, Bulgarian, Macedonian, Polish, Norwegian, the list goes on and on — just as Bernard did!

A personal note on Bernard's Scottish country dance mastery/passion—Bernard taught Scottish country dance in the Johnson City and Knoxville areas for years-from my personal experience, at least 10 years.

Trooper that he was, Bernard taught within weeks of both a hip and knee replacement.

Bernard was a fixture in the Scottish country dance community of the Southeast; what Scottish country dancer in the Southeast doesn't remember the infamous camel bell?!

If there was a dance in the Southeast, Audrey manning the steering wheel of their faithful Camry, they were there. Bernard headed up the dance platform at Grandfather Mountain for years aided by so many of his friends and students as well as organizing the



dance evenings for the Gatlinburg Scottish Festival and Games.

For those of you who knew Bernard, you couldn't say anything more true than that he had a passion for Scottish country dance and he wanted you to share in the camaraderie of dance as well. You would know before seeing a dance program designed by Bernard that there would be a few token strathspeys on the program. You would know that he thought of dance as a great form of both physical and mental exercise and challenge. The Atlanta branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society nominated Bernard for the RSCDS Scroll in 1999, and were so proud to present it to him that year at the Stone Mountain Gala. Catherine Shaw devised the dance Well Done Bernard!! for the occasion. And for all his efforts, I must say, I will never learn 'the knot'.

Around the time of his 80th birthday, Bernard and Audrey were part of a krewe at a Trindadian Carnival/Mardi Gras and came to a Sweetwater (TN) dance dressed in their krewe costumes-what there was of the costumes!

He also had a special love for the town of Jonesborough. He was one of the early leaders of the town's historic preservation movement. Bernard was one of the survey team that identified Jonesborough's most significant structures which should be restored, which led to Jonesborough being put on the National Register of Historic Places in 1969.

He wrote a regular column in the Jonesborough's *Herald & Tribune* called "Restoration News and Views" and was the first president of the Jonesborough Civic Trust. Under his leadership both Jonesborough Days and the National Storytelling Festival were created and the Christopher Taylor Cabin was saved from demolition.

He was an active member of the Jonesborough Kiwanis and for many years was the very persistent champion ticket salesperson for the annual Kiwanis spaghetti dinner, for which he will long be remembered.

Bernard and Audrey traveled extensively, enjoying the dance, music, costumes and foods of many countries around the world. Often these excursions would also find Bernard scuba diving (including on the Great Barrier Reef and in an underwater Israeli archaeological dig).

Bernard lived a full and fascinating life. He was truly one of a kind, and we'll be telling Bernard stories for a long, long time. Audrey wrote a sweet note to him following his death — "'As they say, there is a time to live and a time to die.' Have a pleasant journey." He has truly had a grand journey thus far.

Memorials may be donated to the Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy or to the Heritage Alliance of Northeast Tennessee and Southwest Virginia in Jonesborough.



Independence coming closer for Scotland

EDINBURGH, Scotland (AP) — Oct. 15, 2012, Scotland had moved a step closer Monday to a vote on Independence after Scottish and British leaders signed a deal laying the groundwork for a popular referendum that could radically alter the shape of the United Kingdom.

Officials from London and Edinburgh have been meeting for weeks to hammer out the details. Sticking points included the date and the wording of the question. On Monday, British Prime Minister David Cameron met with Scottish First Minister Alex Salmond in Edinburgh to approve the deal. No date was set, but the vote is likely to be held in October 2014 as Salmond's nationalists had wished.

The "Edinburgh Agreement" means the Scottish Government can now propose legislation on the precise wording of the question, the exact date, extending the vote for 16 year olds, finance rules and conduct.

If Scotland does greak away it will end more than 300 years of political union with England.

An ebullient Salmond said he is confident the independence can triumph.

"Do I believe we can win this? Yes, I do," he told reporters. "It is a vision of a prosperous and passonate Scotland and that will carry the day."

He said the advantages of separation from Britain would become clear and that his government envisioned "a Scotland with a new place in the world - an independent nation."

Commonly, a long wide board was folded down from the wall, and was used for dining. The 'head of the household' always sat in the chair while everyone else ate sitting on the floor.

Occasionally a guest, who was usually a man, would be invited to sit in this chair during a meal.. To sit in the chair meant you were important and in charge. They called the one sitting in the chair the 'chair man.'

Today in business, we use the expression or title 'Chairman' or 'Chairman of the Board.'


William Bell's retirement speech


