THE BRUS movie is coming soon! King of Scots subject of major motion picture trilogy from Athair Entertainment

"A noble heart may have no rest if freedom fails." Athair Entertainment is using this modern translation of a quote from John Barbour's epic 1375 poem, *The Brus*, as the theme for their new project, a series of three sequential movies chronicling the early years of the reign of Robert I.

Spokesman for and founder of the newly formed movie company, Ian Alexander Bruce, today announced the start of preproduction on the trilogy, also titled *The Brus*.

Its sole purpose is to bring to the screen the heroic story of Robert the Bruce and the small band of Scots warriors who fought against the English king Edward I ("Longshanks") and his son, Edward II, for the independence of Scotland. Longshanks had coveted the smaller country's throne ever since the death of King Alexander

III in 1286.

A brilliant and courageous warrior and politician, Edward used his cunning to place John de Balliol on the Scots throne in 1292, and within four short years to force his abdication.

Scotland was in Edward's pocket. It was then that the Scots began to suffer the heel of Edward's boot on their necks, and in May of 1297 arose William Wallace, a younger son of a minor Scots knight, who led a grassroots rebellion against English dominion over Scotland in the south, and at about the same time, Andrew Murray, a young nobleman, did the same or more in the north.

Joining forces, they trounced the English troops sent against them at Stirling Bridge in September, but the Continued on page 22

A letter from your editor.... Oh, yes, God is laughing!

Nancy Hanson called me yesterday. I was absolutely delighted to hear from her...until I realized that something was very wrong. Nancy had called to tell me that her beloved Ludlow had gone to be with the Lord.

Her beloved Ludlow is and will always be "beloved Ludlow" to untold thousands around the southeastern United States and far beyond, including me.

The obituary I found on the Internet this morning began, "God is laughing today. Ludlow Porch passed

from this mortal plane this morning."

Ludlow Porch, whose real name was Bobby Hanson, had broadcast all over the Southeast from his Funseekers Network for many years and had been such

a wonder to listeners all over the Atlanta, Georgia for so many years before that - that he was inducted into the Georgia Radio Hall of Fame just a few years ago.

Ludlow and Nancy have been my dear, dear friends for longer than I can remember.

For years, Ludlow broadcast his 3-hour-a-day program from Suwanee, Georgia. Whenever I was

driving through there on my way to a Highland Games, I'd stop and appear on his program talking about family names and genealogy and all kinds of related things. It was wonderful to see Nancy and Ludlow and his sidekick, Denny Ainsworth.

We all became friends.

Ludlow and Nancy came to Moultrie, Georgia and did a fundraiser for my old publication, *The Family Tree*. Ludlow and Nancy were with me and fighting shoulder to shoulder during "the late unpleasantness" with the United States Postal Service (We won!). Ludlow and Nancy held me in their loving arms when

my life blew up. They shared my amazed and awed elation when my life became wonderful because of my darling Tom.

They arranged for me to be able to fly out to Flagstaff, Arizona to do speeches for the Arizona Highland Games.

Ludlow and Nancy and Ludlow's very personable son, Charlie McGarvey, went on the cruise to Nova Scotia with us. Ludlow was our Heritage Award

Winner at Scottish Weekend one year.

I was on the program when it was broadcast from Suwanee and then in downtown Dawsonville and later when it originated in Ludlow's basement. I was invited to spend the night at their beautiful mountain home - which has "Ludlow's Porch" across the back.

I am an honored and proud Whacko as are so many of his loyal listeners.


We used to have the best time because I spent a lot of years in radio too. During Ludlow's program, when the commercials came on we'd swap "radio stories" which are often hilarious.

I have a "Ludlow Story" to share with you now. First, you must know that if you work in radio-anywhere - your first priority beyond any work you might do is to "breakup" your fellow broadcasters...that is, make them LAUGH, giggle, squeal, etc., on the air, live with bazillions of folks listening..

Secondly, you must know that should you attain that goal, the "joke-ee" will surely retaliate. Surely.

Ludlow told me of his days in Atlanta radio. It seems there was in the crew a very urbane and sophisticated newsman who was always serious, always





Using Probate Records in your genealogical search. It's a smart idea!

Probate records are important to genealogists because they provide evidence about family relationships. Most Americans have made out wills in some form. For those without wills, or in cases where wills have been contested, the courts have been the final jurisdiction for settlement of the estates. Historically, the term *probate* referred to the process of proving the authenticity of the decedent's last will and testament. Today, it covers the entire process of settling an estate.

The legal names of courts handling probate matters will vary from state to state. In some cases, jurisdictions will also vary by time periods as well. Examples include the following:

- 1. Probate Court
- 2. Superior Court
- 3. District Court
- 4. Orphans Court
- 5. Surrogates Court
- 6. Register of Wills
- 7. Estate Court.

In most states, each county will have its own court handling the process. There are some that have *probate districts* that cover a wide regional area. To locate probate records, you must determine the county or other jurisdiction where your ancestor lived at the time of death. Some possible sources for this information include:

bible or family records, an obituary from a newspaper, death record from a county health department, a mortality schedule, pension record, or a census record. If you know the state where an ancestor died, but not the county, you could also try an index or calendar of wills for the given state.

The individual making out a will is known as a *testator*. If a person dies and leaves a valid will, they are said to have died *testate*. Those

choosing not to make a will are said to have died *intestate*. A person named in the will itself usually carries out the provisions of a will. This person is known as an *executor*. Some wills name multiple people as *alternate executors* in case the executor cannot or



will not perform this function. By law, any intestate estate must go through an administration process. A court-appointed administrator settles this process. Some states use the term *personal administrator* to refer to the person responsible for settling an estate, regardless of whether it is testate or intestate.


JGS invites you to their meeting



Clan Currie Society to Present "A Celebration of Tartan"

Tartan Week in New York opens on Friday, April 1 at the Ellis Island Immigration Museum with "A Celebration of Tartan," Clan Currie's latest exhibition featuring the history and heritage of Scotland's endur-

ing icon. The program runs through Sunday, April 3.

In addition to the new exhibition, Ellis Island will come alive with the sights and sounds of pipers, drummers, singers and dancers who represent Scotland's "portable culture" that were brought to this country by Scottish immigrants.

The Ellis Island event will officially open NY <u>Tartan Week</u>—a ten day festival of all things Scottish, including Sir Sean Connery's Dressed to Kilt Fashion show, Whisky Live! and the NY Tartan Day Parade.

A Celebration of Tartan

From the kilted clans of the Highlands to the run-

ways of Milan, tartan is the definitive symbol of Scotland. Yet tartan, thanks to Scotland's gift of it, is beloved throughout the world. No other fabric is so steeped in tradition or paradoxically, so consistently

at the forefront of fashion. Historians study it while designers design in it. Rockers and royals alike agree – tartan rules. This new exhibition explores the fact and fiction of tartan, and how this national fabric has managed to capture the world.

The exhibition will be displayed adjacent to the Registry Room, the Great

Hall on Ellis Island on the museum's second floor.

About Tartan Day on Ellis Island

Tartan Day on Ellis Island is one of the principal Scottish heritage events in the United States. The program is produced annually by the Clan Currie Society – one of the largest clan societies in the world – formed in 1959 to preserve and promote Scottish heritage and culture.

Describing the Tartan Week program, noted Scottish journalist and author Roddy Martine reported that of all the Tartan Day events held in the United States, the Ellis Island observance has, "stood out as a beacon of what USA Tartan Day is all about: the emigrant ancestors of ordinary Americans who over three centuries crossed the Atlantic Ocean to create the world's greatest democracy."

America's Golden Door

Ellis Island is a most fitting place to observe Tartan Day. The island and its historic buildings represent America's "Golden Door." From 1892 to 1954, more than 12 million immigrants passed through Ellis Island. Although many Scots arrived during the colonial period of our history – helping to build the new nation - an additional half-million Scots came through Ellis Island. It has been estimated that 40% of Americans today can trace at least one ancestor's entry into the United States through Ellis Island.

Bobby C. Hanson, better known as "Ludlow Porch", 76, of Dawsonville passed away peacefully Friday February 11, 2011.

Born October 11, 1934 in Atlanta to the late Philip and Betty Hanson, he moved to Dawson

County from Roswell in 1994.

In 1971, Sports Illustrated magazine was looking for trivia experts. The magazine dispatched a writer to visit Ludlow and he came away convinced that Ludlow's head was

full of worthless information, and wrote about it.

The article got the attention of WSB radio and he was ask to come on the air. Officials at WRNG "Ring Radio" invited Ludlow to visit for a week.

Ludlow stated, "I came for a week and never left."

Ludlow has been a radio talk show host for over 30 years having spent a decade as a "Ringmaster" at WRNG, over a decade at WSB where he helped transform their format into a talkradio giant, and beginning in 1994 on the Funseekers Radio Network which still broadcasts daily.

Ludlow's listeners developed over the years into a legion of "Whackos" who became an integral element in the two-way conversational approach which Ludlow mastered. He always ended his show with his saying, "Whatever else you do today, you find somebody to be nice to."

Ludlow lived to make people laugh, mostly at themselves, and authored books including "Fat White Guys Cookbook" and "Who Cares About Apathy".

He was a veteran of the U. S. Marine Corps where he served during the Korean Conflict.

He was preceded in death by a daughter, Leigh Ann Hanson.

Surviving are his wife, Nancy Hanson, Dawsonville; children, Barbara Davison, Asheville, NC; Philip Hanson, Marietta, GA; Charles McGarvey, Washington, DC; Kyle Harvey, Alpharetta and grandchildren, Liz and

> Will Lewis, Michael and Jennifer Franklin, Kathryn Hanson, Helen Hanson; and great grandchildren, Hayley Franklin, Nathan Franklin.

> His stepbrother and cousin, the late Atlanta Jour-

nal Constitution columnist and author, Lewis Grizzard, would often reference him in columns.

Porch had suffered strokes recently, according to Denny Ainsworth, his longtime producer and sidekick who took over his radio network last year.

Memorial services were held Saturday, February 19 a Big Canoe Chapel, Rev. Dr. Jimmy R. Allen, officiating. A reception followed in the Broyles Community Center with catering by The Varsity of Atlanta.

The Perfect Pairing: Artisanal Cheese and Single Malt Whisky

fine cheeses and single malts is fun and easy, whether for an intimate get together with a few friends, or for a larger guest list. The combination of food and drink pair to create singular taste sensations, surrounded by distinctive aromas, colors, and flavors.

> A Little Bit About Single Malts and Cheese

Why do we say single malt Scotch, rather than just Scotch? As the name implies, the product in a bottle of single malt is from a single distillery, and each distillery produces a unique product, primarily reflecting the region within Scotland in which it was made and aged. For instance, robust smokiness is reflected in whiskies from Islay; floral and fruity

expressions come from the Speyside region; and nutty, oaky characteristics come from The Highlands. If a Scotch is not a single malt, it is a blend. Blended Scotches are just that – made from many single malts, from all around Scotland, then blended together. They are terrific spirits, but, in general, exhibit less of the distinct characteristics of single malts.

Why cheese? Few foods so deliciously comple-

so few elemental ingredients, but also, just as with single malts, and the malt master, the cheesemaker is important in creating uniqueness. The flavor ranges of cheeses are as varied as those of single malts, so combining the two makes for a wonderful sensory experience.

Suggestions on Portions, Plating, and Pouring

Three different cheeses make a nice diversity. You'll need about 1/4 pound of each cheese for every four guests (each person gets about an ounce). Accoutrements include a sliced French baguette, unsalted nuts, and a few dried figs on each plate. Remember, it's about the pairing of the cheeses and whiskies - no need to get sidetracked by too much to eat. It's important to arrange the cheeses on each plate in the same order, so guests

can share their pairing experiences for each cheese/ whisky combination at the same time. Three glasses containing "a wee dram" (1/2 – 1 ounce) of different single malts are pre-poured ahead of time – the aroma in the room will be heavenly!

Suggestions on Serving

Remove the cheeses from the refrigerator about Continued on page 17

an hour before serving. Cut them just before plating. The aromas will meld with the whisky's aromas, signaling guests that they are in store for a huge treat.

<u>Suggestions for maximum Sensory Enjoyment of</u> the Whiskies

Remove scented candles from the room, and forego wearing perfume or cologne so the aromas of the cheeses and whiskies may be enjoyed to their fullest. "Nosing" is a fancy word for smelling the whiskies. Most people nose with their mouth closed. Try

it. Now, try it again, but this time, in addition to smelling with your nose, keep your mouth open. Wow, what just happened? With your mouth closed, you get a lot of the alcohol smell; with your mouth open, you get the aroma of the liquid. Now, take a sip of the whisky, then another. This is called enjoying your whisky "neat" (right from the bottle). Next, add just a few drops really, just a few - of spring water. Re-nose (mouth open), and taste again. Another "Wow Moment"? Adding just a bit of water usually tends to open up the aroma and taste of the whisky makes each "bigger". The trick is to NOT dilute the whisky.

Suggestions for maximum Sensory Enjoyment of the Pairing of the Cheese and Whisky

Now, nose your cheese. Notice if it is earthy, fruity or pungent. With a bite of cheese on "The Cheese Highway" (your curled tongue), sip and roll the whisky all around your mouth, mixing with the cheese, to get as much of the complex flavors as possible.

Following are three artisanal cheese and single malt combinations you might try. The cheeses can be found locally or on-line by the name of the cheese company.

<u>Parmesan and Glenmorangie Nectar d'Or</u> (A **Highland whisky**)

Recommended: Sweet Constantine, a

Parmesan-like cheese made by Hook's Cheese Company by Wisconsin Cheesemakers, Julie and Tony Hook.

The sweetness and nuttiness of the cheese sings with the complex flavors of the whisky. The Nectar d'Or has been "finished" for about two additional years in casks that once held Sauternes, the sweet dessert wine from France.

<u>Double Gloucester and Glenfiddich 12 year old</u> (A Speyside whisky)



Look for fruitiness in the cheese and the Scotch. Pear flavors could come forward. The woody flavor of the Scotch brings out the sweetness and meatiness of this cheese.

Asiago and Laphroaig
10 year old (An Islay
whisky)

Recommended: Sartori's SarVecchio Asiago with Rosemary and Olive Oil, made by Wisconsin Master Cheesemaker, Mike Matacheski

This cheese is a powerhouse of flavor and creami-

ness! The richness of cow's milk is punctuated by the kick of rosemary and olive oil. It stands its ground in combination with one of the most well-known robust and smoky whiskies from Islay.

fight may have cost Andrew Murray his life, as he died before the year was out.

Braveheart, a fanciful version of the years remaining to William Wallace, roused the hearts of most of the world and got a lot of guys out in public in kilts. Scots the world over were especially moved by the epic 1995 movie, which, for all its historical lapses, was an exciting tribute to the Scottish hero.

Athair intends to extol the virtues and detail the adventures of Robert de Brus, King of Scots, who took a symbolic Scots crown and set it upon his own head at Scone in March, 1306. He put his wife, daughter, siblings, friends, supporters, lands and titles, and even his soul in the balance in order to free Scotland from enslavement by King Edward. The regal raiments and other symbols of Scotland's royalty, and even the Stone of Destiny on which Scots kings had been crowned for centuries, had already been carted south to England to deny the Scots their heritage. It would not be a chivalric war. Losses would be great.

Ian Alexander Bruce wrote the scripts for the series based on the Rebel King novels authored by Charles Randolph Bruce and Carolyn Hale Bruce, who published their trilogy between 2002 and 2006.

Charles was originally inspired to make a movie of the life of Robert de Brus, from whom he descended, he was told as a child, when as an adult he began reading about his forebear's history. He was stricken with the heroic saga and its primary character, and began writing it as an epic movie in 1992.

Taking his script to Hollywood, he found no open doors there, and returned home to try again at some future time.

As they say, everything has its time, and his inspiration must not have been far off, for *Braveheart* was released three years later.

Years passed, and the story of *The Brus* would not let him rest; it needed to be told.

Since a movie was out of reach for the present, he began researching and writing again in 1999, this time in novel form. By 2002, he and his co-author published *Rebel King, Book One, Hammer of the Scots*, the story of Robert's stand against Edward I; two years later, *Rebel King, Book Two, The Har'ships* told the horrors of the Scots' turning on each other to determine whether or not Robert I would remain their king; and in 2006, *Rebel King, Book Three, Bannok Burn* carried the story forward through the day of the greatest battle in Scottish history.

The story that began as an idea for a single movie, then a novel series, is now nearing full circle, and Scots in the United States and in the United Kingdom are joining forces to complete the final arc. Talented people are joining together to fill necessary positions both in front of and behind the camera, and to convince others to join the effort.

Excellent scripting of this compelling story, a universal theme that is as true today as it was in King Robert's time, is but the foundation on which this project is being built.

Donovan Murray has been an event producer and agent over the past decade working with some of the most famous artists on the Celtic music scene and has brought his professional and artistic connections to the company.

With contacts on both sides of the Atlantic, the talent we will need is usually separated by just one or two very friendly degrees.

Latest on board with the project is Charlie Allan, CEO of ClanRanald Trust for Scotland. He and the ClanRanald Trust not only work to promote Scottish history and heritage, but Charlie has invaluable experience and contacts within the movie industry, having worked on many feature films, including *Gladiator*, *Robin Hood*, and most recently, *The Eagle*.

As there is no place else in the world quite like Scotland, it is our intention to do our principle photography in some of the most majestic and historic vistas the land has to offer.

Scotland's government has been putting incentives in place to attract moviemakers, not only to increase the number of available jobs in a depressed economy, but also to draw attention to the fact that quality movies can be made outside Hollywood.

Remembering that Braveheart struck such a chord with people around the world, Athair expects a similar response to The Brus, their more accurate interpretation of the time. "Many of us within the company can claim some sort of kinship with Robert the Bruce and he has yet to be treated fairly in movies," said Bruce. "After being called a traitor in Braveheart, and having such a poor showing in The Bruce," he adds as an aside, "...don't bother looking it up, it's awful, there is a reason you haven't heard of it...," he pauses before confessing, "...there is a sense of wanting to put it right in many of us. But that isn't our main motivation." "It is simply a great story that needs to be told. We want to tell it. Ordinary people can overcome hardship and tyranny," he asserted. "And we hope that our movies not only make us and our investors money, but we want to reignite interest in all things Scottish.

There is far more to lure people to Scotland with their dollars than kilts and whiskey." "Okay, we're not going about it in the usual way. Some people think we're crazy. But Robert's great advantage was that he went about freeing his countrymen in ways the English didn't expect. He was a great innovator, and that's why he succeeded," Bruce concluded.




