Pvt. James Scott, one of the last Gordon Highlanders to survive the the construction of the Thailand-Burma Death Railway has died

Private James 'Jimmy' Scott was posted to Singapore with the Gordon Highlanders' 2nd Battalion and defended the city against Japanese invaders.

But he was captured in 1942 and sent to the Changi prison camp building where he spent three-and-a-half years working on the railway where more than 100,000 men died.

Only four of the Gordon Highlanders sent to work on the railway line remain alive.

Pvt. Scott, who was born in Cuminestown in November

1920, recently recalled his time there when interviewed by writer Stewart Mitchell, author of *Scattered Under the Rising Sun*.

He said it was a "much worse fate" being captured by the Japanese than being taken by the Germans.

He said at the time: "Many lives were lost, either by falling from the bridge into the river and being swept away or through weakness and tropical diseases such as cholera, beriberi, dysentery or malaria.

"If your skin was cut by bamboo or a chip from a rock, the sore would turn into a tropical ulcer.

"These ulcers grew very big and sometimes a whole hip or calf was eaten away. "Limbs had to be amputated with a joiner's saw.
"The blue flies liked the ulcers and we waited until
the maggets were working around the outside of the

ulcer.

"Several men would hold you down and the pus was scraped out to where the maggots were, often to the bone.

"We were getting weaker all the time and it got too time consuming to bury the bodies and as the Japanese were in such a hurry we had to build bonfires and cremate the dead."

Pvt. Scott was an apprentice joiner before he accidentally joined the Gordon Highlanders.

He had signed his name at the door of a hall in Dufftown where he had taken some friends to show them his work. He did not realise what he had done until he was called up and deployed to Le Havre in France.

When Mr. Scott was liberated from the Japanese prison, he returned home and settled down in Turriff, in Aberdeenshire, where he married his wife, Lizzie, and had six children.

He died last Saturday at the age of 94 and his funeral was held on Wednesday.





The Shield and Crest

I often notice how Coats of Arms are used and misused, such as the common misuse of heraldic terms.

Take for example the Cadillac Crest. While General Motors recently redesigned the logo, they've always called it a "Crest." In heraldic terms the brandmark is not a Crest. It is a Shield.




The misnamed "Cadillac Crest" is based on the Shield of French explorer Antoine de La Mothe Cadillac, who founded Detroit in 1701 and was governor of Louisiana from 1710-1716.

The Crest is a particular element in a full Achievement of Arms, which comprises, most generally, a Shield, a Helm, a Torse, a Mantling, a Crest and an Escrol. Based on nobility, sometimes there are other elements, such as Supporters - figures that hold the Shield on either side.

The Shield is the primary part of the Arms. It derives from the shields knights would carry in battle and tournaments. The designs on shields soon expanded to surcoats worn over armor and on horses. It also became common to attach "crests" to the tops

of helmets as a way to deflect weapons' blows. Knights would attach the crest using a twisted cloth wreath, or torse, of "livery" colors, with a small cape, or mantling, hanging down behind to protect the helmet from the sun. These elements remain in Coats of Arms today.

While the Shield is the main element, in Scottish heraldry the Crest is often prominently displayed, with clansmen and clanswomen wearing their Chief's Crest within a belt and buckle image, like the Clan Donald

USA "logo," and an Armiger, someone with personal Arms granted by Lord Lyon displaying his Crest within a circlet with feathers showing rank. Rank also determines what kind of helmet, or crown, sits atop the Shield and under the Crest.

So when you hear someone call a Shield or Coat of Arms a Crest, you might consider giving them a heraldry lesson.


The time capsule recently opened in often as employees of the Hudson's Bay

Boston was buried in 1795 by the three men who laid the corner stone of the State House. The first two are well remembered: Samuel Adams, the then Governor of Massachusetts and Paul Revere, then Grand Master of the Massachusetts Grand

Lodge of Freemasons. Only the surname of the third man went down in history, in Boston's Scollay Square.

The Scollay family were early arrivals in Boston, sometime before 1667, which seems surprising, as they came from Stronsay, one of the tiny Orkney islands in the north of Scotland but Orcadians have always looked outwards. Some were driven by economic necessity, as a

small farming community can't support all of its sons and daughters but many, like the Scollays, were eager for adventure and opportunity. The largest number went to Canada,




Company but many headed for Colonial America.

David Dobson has compiled lists of early Scots colonists and one of his main sources is the records of the Scots Charitable Society. Founded in Boston in 1657, it describes itself as the oldest charitable organisation in the Western

Hemisphere. The Society was probably founded at least partly to help destitute Scots who had been captured at the Battles of Dunbar and Worcester, during the English Civil War. They had been sent to the Iron Works at Lynn, now Saugus, in Massachu-

setts, and had to complete seven years of labour for the company. It seems that the indentures began to expire between 1655 and 1657.

Thirty-eight Orcadians joined the Society between 1739 and 1770. Some of them with distinctively Orcadian surnames, such as James Clouston, Andrew Velzian and Henry Omand, though the spelling sometimes varied.

Other Orcadians in the list had surnames not unique to Orkney but very likely to belong to Orcadians: Traill, Mowatt, Cromarty and Scollay, for instance.

Herman Melville

The Scollay who helped lay the cornerstone was William. He was the Deputy Grandmaster of the Massachusetts Grand Lodge and a prominent citizen of Boston: a Colonel in the Boston Militia and at various times Clerk of the Market, a Fire Ward and a Selectman. His father John had chaired the Selectmen for sixteen years until his death five years earlier so the family were deeply involved in the civic life of Boston for many years, right through the Revolution.

Had things turned out differently, the family could have been even more prominent. William's sister Mercy was engaged to Dr Joseph Warren, President of the Massachusetts Provincial Congress, when he was killed at the Battle of Bunker Hill in 1775.

John Scollay was a prominent figure in the public meetings leading up to the Boston Tea Party and another of his daughters, Priscilla, married one of the Indians, Thomas

> Melville, a year later. This is where Moby Dick comes in, because their son Allan was Herman Melville's father.


> After the war, William became a very successful property developer. In the same year that the time capsule was buried William bought a building on the intersection of Court Street and Tremont Street and called it Scollay's Building. The name

gradually transferred to the whole area and Scollay Square became famous.



Louis Baxter McCaslin, Jr., October 29, 1925 - November 28, 2014. He was a Life Member of Clan Buchanan Society, International. He was immensely proud of his Scottish heritage and worked tirelessly for many years to form the Society as we recognize it today. In 1975, he created, edited and published The Buchanan Banner for the first time and continued this work for a number of years. He was President of Clan

Buchanan Society, Int., from 1976 to 1983.

During his time in office and because of his encouragement, CBSI joined the Council of Scottish Clans. We joined the James Buchanan Foundation for the Preservation of Wheatland (Our 15th President's mansion in Lancaster, Pennsylvania). Lou was the driving force that expanded our society westward beyond the Appalachian Mountains and created the concept of regions to be led by Commissioners and Regents. Among other efforts, he gave of his time and talents to the St. Andrews Society of Baltimore, Maryland and the Robert Burns Society of Annapolis, Maryland. Without question, Lou "set the bar" for future leaders of our Society to measure success by. The Clan Buchanan Society owes him a great debt of gratitude.

Lou was a United States Navy Veteran of World War II. For over 30 years, he worked for ARINC Research Corporation, Annapolis, Maryland and concluded his career as Director of Administrative and Personnel

he learned and his father for his inventiveness and creativity. He learned responsible work habits and discipline at an early age, delivering twelve different newspapers to various parts of town at the age of thirteen.

At the beginning of World War II, when he was 16, he worked part time on war munitions for two years. In October 1944, he left Lima for Alabama to help his aunt and uncle bring in their pecan harvest after they had been in a car accident.

He was drafted into the US Army on March 20, 1945 and went to Fort McClellan, Alabama for basic training and then on to six weeks of parachute school training at Fort Banning, Georgia. He was assigned to the 82nd Airborne and finished his training at Fort Bragg.

NC. He received an honorable discharge at the end of 1946 and went on inactive reserve status.

He became intrigued with horses and bought a horse, teaching himself to ride. He applied for a job at the polo field in San Mateo as a groomsman. His interest in and affection for horses grew as he got to know them and at one point he expressed interest in enrolling into veterinary school. He came to

Davis in 1949 and enrolled at UC Davis as a pre-vet major.

He was called to active duty from inactive reserve status and on December 7, 1950, he shipped out from Seattle Harbor to Korea for a year, postponing his education. In 1956, he received his master's degree in nutrition with his research paper titled *The Thiamine Requirements of Young Turkey Poults*. He received several requests worldwide for reprints of his paper, the basis for his membership in the Sigma Xi Society, a scientific research society for which he was an associate secretary for several years.

After three unsuccessful attempts to get into vet school, he went to work for the UC Davis Veterinary School as a Staff Research Associate in 1956 and was a teaching assistant to freshman veterinary students. Richard was proud of his work at the university and considered it a privilege to work with vet students. He retired from UC Davis in 1990 with 33 1/2 years of service.

Richard was a lifelong learner and enjoyed crossword puzzles. He held many interests and varying jobs that kept him active and busy. He belonged to an auto racing club in which he raced his MGA. At the university, he worked at the garage part time as a student and sometimes drove busloads of students to games.

Richard was proud of his one-quarter Scottish heritage (Buchanan) and decided to join the Clan Buchanan Society in 1999. Since then, he has been a frequent participant at the Scottish Games in Woodland, California and after, when he

> joined the Dixon Scottish Cultural Association and enjoyed the games at the Dixon Fairgrounds.

> He was known for his wit and charm, his quirky and gentle sense of humor and wisdom, his kind disposition, generosity to causes in which he believed, loyalty and commitment to family and friends and endless patience. He was also known for his beautiful and expressive blue eyes. Some of his favorite quotes and

sayings were: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."; "Don't sweat the small stuff," and a paraphrase of "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." Dick's version, "You can lead a person to logic, but you can't make them think."

He is survived by his wife of nearly 42 years, Linda; daughters, Leona Berge of Stratton, Colorado, Susie Hedrick (Ben) of Winters, California and Laurie Brocksen (Stan) of Payson, Arizona; son Steve Robenalt (Monique) of Cameron Park, California. He is also survived by nine grandchildren and one great grandchild; his brother, Stanley Robenalt of Belmont, California; two nephews and several nieces, cousins; numerous friends. He was predeceased by his son, William, and two brothers, Donald and Karl.



"Breacan Clann" Scottish Tartans Museum's **Living History Group**

or several years at the Scottish Tartans Mu seum, my museum tour has been a living his tory themed experience. I normally would dress in either a early 1600s, late 1600s, or a 1740s

Jacobite era clothing. Basically, wearing the early kilt outfits, feilidhmhor (great wrap) or the feilidh-beg (little wrap).

This summer I decided it was time to expand that and create a group of volunteers who would be

dressed in specific era Scottish Highland garb.

This would be a challenge to recruit and even more challenging to have persons recreate accurate outfits for historical eras. Despite any difficulties that were involved, I believed it was something that was highly needed for the Scottish Tartans Museum and something even more needed for those interested in their Scottish heritage.

In creating this group, I named it Breacan Clann (pr. Brekhan-Klahn), which means tartan clan.

Within two months, enough persons had been recruited to get the group started with some local publicity photos and some of the members making their outfits. By the third month we had several presentations, we started making the local papers, and interest in the group was growing. It has been five months since we started and our group has grown to eight members. We have performed for elementary school students, public street festival, donors for the museum, and most recently Burns Supper. We have museum tour presentation and we have a stage style presentation that can be done virtually anywhere.



Our clothes represent 12th century medieval through 1740s Jacobite. Our main purpose is a highland dress history show that demonstrates that the kilt

is not some ancient garment that goes back to the dark ages or early.

The actual truth is that earliest known reference of the a feilidh-mhor is from 1592, recorded in the book The Life of Hugh O'Donnell the Red. Beyond that era, we demonstrate how the accurate Scottish Highland article of clothing is the Leine (gaelic for shirt). The leine is a large shirt worn in the medieval and renaissance eras, where the medieval era one is refered to as the Rogart shirt and the renaissance era version has long bell shaped sleeves.

The other notable clothing item we show is the brat, a roughly 2 yard mantle/cloak that was commonly worn for warmth. We use these examples to show how one piece evolved into the next and eventualy you end up with the feilidh-beg (little wrap), which is very close to



Excavations at Vindolanda The evidence for a frontier constantly
in transition...

In ancient times, just as today, frontiers were often the places where the most rapid and dramatic changes took place, melting pots for societies and ideas as well as points of conflict and violence.

The site of Vindolanda which is a mile south of Hadrian's Wall had at least nine Roman forts and settlements superimposed one above the other before its eventual abandonment.

The place, its communities and landscape constantly evolving.

The result is a rich and varied history that covers almost 800 years of occupation, leaving behind the evidence from a cast of characters which could grace a modern soap opera and over seven metres of archaeology.

Some of these archaeological deposits are preserved in anaerobic or oxygen free conditions, providing an incredible level of preservation for everyday artefacts which often do not have a




