We have lost a treasure: Royce McNeill





A new bursary for Sabhal Mor Ostaig students to study the history and literature of Clan Currie

Bob Currie, President of the Clan Currie Society visited Sabhal Mòr Ostaig this week (Tuesday 17 April) to launch the Clan Currie Bursary (Duais Clann MhicMhuirich), a new annual award which will be given to students of the Gaelic col-

lege who undertake research on the literature, poetry and history of Clan Currie.

Mr Currie, who travelled from the United States to launch the award, said: "The Clan Currie Society is delighted to be establishing Duais Clann MhicMhuirich with

Sabhal Mòr Ostaig, to support students who are specialising in the study of the MacMhuirichs and Gaelic poetry, literature and history. While much has been written of this great bardic dynasty, it is now recognised that much more remains to be revealed and interpreted through modern scholarship. As an example, there has been little study on the MacMhuirichs in the islands of Mull, Raasay and Colonsay. The Clan Currie Society takes great

pride in supporting this research."

Professor Hugh Cheape, Course Leader for the MSc Material Culture and Gàidhealtachd History, commented: "We are exceptionally pleased to welcome Bob Currie, President of the Ameri-

can-based Clan Currie Society, to Sabhal Mòr Ostaig to announce the creation of a bursary – the 'Duais Clann MhicMhuirich' – to be awarded by the Society annually to a student in Gaelic history and literature for a research project on the bardic dynasty of



Clan Currie became hereditary poets to the powerful MacDonald Lords of the Isles who reigned over a semi-autonomous Gaelic kingdom which at its height covered a large swathe of Scotland's western seaboard. The MacMhuirich poets were among the preeminent tradition bearers of Scotland's Gaelic culture during this time, and produced many famed works in the bardic tradition. Despite the demise of the Lordship, the MacMhuirichs continued in their poetic tradition, and Niall MacMhuirich in the 15th Century was the first of several notable bards to Clan Ranald.



The Importance of Cemeteries to Genealogical Research

Newcomers to genealogical research often voice amazement with the "obsession" many genealogists have when visiting cemeteries. The notion of taking a "cemetery vacation" is beyond their comprehension. There are numerous reasons why visiting cemeteries is beneficial to genealogical research. The seven most important reasons are: Tombstone inscriptions can be goldmines of genealogical information.

Many old tombstones contain minibiographies of the deceased. Cemetery records may contain significant amounts of information that may or may not appear in the more common record types. Some genealogists, provided they obtain proper permission, have left messages on tomb-

stones in hopes of contacting surviving family members, and, have been successful.


Plot placement, tombstone inscriptions, and cemetery records may fill in missing blanks in your research, lead you in new directions, or add insight to your knowledge of your ancestors as people.

Researchers often find out about children who died in infancy that they never knew about or discover a grave marker containing a symbol that suggests other records which may contain additional information.

Children who died in infancy may suggest clues to unknown family relationships.

Cemeteries fall into a variety of categories. Each type has its own unique characteristics. The main types are listed below.

- 1. <u>City and County</u>: These are of fairly recent origin, some of them beginning about 1850, but most of them around 1900 or the time of state registration.
- 2. **Federal**: Usually associated with war veterans. You will have to depend upon Sexton's records to find the plots here because they are too large to attempt searching without help.
 - 3. **Private**: These usually begin in the 1900s. You **must** obtain permission from the land owner to gain access.
 - 4. <u>Church</u>: These are the most common in America, British Isles, and Europe. The Sexton's records would be the burial registers, if they exist. Re-



5. **Family**: These are quite popular in the Eastern and Southern parts of the U.S., Canada as well as parts of the British Isles and Europe. Researchers **must** obtain permission from the land owner for access. Often the only record, other than the tombstones, would be the record in a family Bible.

6. <u>Fraternal Organizations</u>: Organizations in this category will either have their own private cemeteries or a special section within a larger cemetery. The burial records may or may not be accessible to the public. In some cases, researchers can get the standard death certificate from the locality, but an official burial record must be obtained from the organization.





Culloden & the Last Clansman

not want to miss his latest book, Culloden and the Last Clansman.

If you missed the first dance, do yourself a favor and not miss this one. A wonderful tune it is!

James Hunter writes about the murder of Colin Campbell, a government agent and staunch Hanoverian. We are led to believe the accused murderer may be James Stewart, a supporter of Bonnie Prince Charlie and a staunch Jacobite.

The author has lived his entire life in the same community where the murder took place 250 years ago.

In this book, Hunter rivals Sir Walter Scott, the greatest writer of his time and father of the historical novel.

The tale that the author weaves in this case with his use of historical facts is nothing short of brilliant. You cannot compare Hunter to Robert Burns because he does not write poetry and Burns did not write stories like Hunter.

Scott did both, and although Scott has not been in vogue for many years, there are signs that is he "starting to come back into fashion again after long neglect," according to Stewart Lamont in his book, *When Scotland Ruled the World*.

the man in the street to the man on the throne, George II. Someone had

to pay for the murder of Colin Campbell.

The most likely suspect, Alan Breck Stewart, had quietly slipped out of the country, leaving James Stewart guilty by association. The Duke of Cumberland (yes, the "Butcher" himself) thought the Scottish authorities were treating this matter too lightly. Thus, both the policies and loyalties of the Scottish authorities were called into question, and the King's younger son, the British hero of the '45 (he of the flower named after him, "Sweet William" in England but forever known as "Stinking Willie" in Scotland) "thought it prudent to ensure that James Stewart was hanged."

Scotland's Lord Justice General and Lord Advocate both tired the case, one as judge and the other as prosecutor. History records that the former was a Campbell and the latter was a Grant.

Both were on the hot seat almost as much as the man fighting for his life. Even though a panel of three judges was used, no one wanted London to feel anything but their loyalty and obedience. To make sure the verdict was a "guilty" one (a ver-

dict authorities wanted and had to have to maintain good relations with the Hanoverian government), a jury of fifteen men was selected, eleven of them Campbells. How about them numbers!

A better jury could not have been found, bribed or paid for on behalf of the Scottish authorities.

The trial began at five o'clock in the morning and did not break until fifty hours later.

Why so long?

During those days, Scottish criminal courts required evidence to be heard in a single sitting, and sixty

witnesses, a mockery if there ever was one, were heard during that time.

No wonder it took three judges! Adding to the government's case was the fact that a recently fired gun that belonged to James had been dug up along with some broadswords. James helped set the noose around his own neck with his loose whisky talk and threats about and toward Colin Campbell.

Some testified that James had planned the ambush of Colin Campbell that was carried out by Alan Breck, and James did not refute that testimony.

The handwriting was on the wall, and it was as if James was reconciled to meeting his fate. The only question left for us to ask since it was proven that James sent Alan money after the assassination, is why it took five hours of deliberation to come up with the "guilty as charged" verdict.

He was sentenced to hang...in chains. Months later, while on the scaffold, he said, "I die a worthy member of the Episcopal Church of Scotland...may the same God pardon and forgive all that ever did or wished me evil, as I do from my heart forgive them...Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly."

As he climbed the steps to meet his executioner, it is said he quoted verses from Psalm 35 ending with "Lord, rescue my soul from their destructions.

"Cnap a' Chaolais, the location where Stewart was hanged, was well traveled by Highlanders and chosen by the government to send a message of intimidation to all who passed by.

The Hanoverians wanted all to see the "gruesome spectacle of James Stewart's chained-up and slowly rotting corpse." A detachment of officers, including seventeen soldiers, watched over his body day and night. More than two years after the hanging, portions of his still remaining skeleton fell to the ground.

Edinburgh immediately smelled a conspiracy by Highlanders and launched an investigation, only to find that a winter gale had caused the bones to

fall. In an effort to keep James hanging around a little longer, soldiers from Fort William came to put the bones back on the gibbet since local people would have no part of such a gruesome chore. Even the soldiers had to be induced by whisky to replace Stewart's bones on the gibbet!


More years passed and down came James again, a bone at a time. This time, however, a Culloden veteran, John Stewart, gathered up each one. This Stewart eventually pieced together enough of the skeletal re-

mains of James to arrange for a burial inside the crumbling walls of the auld Keil church at Duror.

I believe James Hunter proves his point "that, when they hanged James Stewart on the afternoon of Wednesday, 8 November 1752, the Hanoverian authorities also hanged the last clansman" since by this time the Clan system (as a lot of us want to believe was still possible) was no more. All that was left of the old Clan system was memories.

Or, should I say, the romance of the old Clan system is all that was left, then and today. Hunter's style of writing makes you want to stay up all night to finish the book.

His reputation is such that you want him to hurry and get his next book to the marketplace. If I was to score this book like I did my students at Roseboro High School in North Carolina too many years ago to tell, James Hunter would get an A+. I think Sir Walter Scott might give him the same!





old West Marche Clan, one of Border clans since the early 1100s, were retainers of the Great House of Douglas and also allied with the best border families through blood and friendship. Their land holdings were extensive, and to survive, they engaged in the "rieving" of the period and participated in many battles against the English.

grated to the Ulster Plantation after 1610.

After William Bell, called *Redcloak* and Chief of the Clan died in 1628, the chiefship became dormant, and without leadership, the Bells ceased to exist as a viable clan.

Many of you may be following current events in Scotland. With the unexpected majority win on May 2011 in the Holyrood Parliament, the SNP government have been given a clear mandate by the people of Scotland. Scotland in the World, the Health service, Security and Defence, Scotland's National Borders, etc. Others, like education, agriculture and forestry are awaiting their turn in the queue. You can read all of our proposals at: www.scottishdemocraticalliance.org.(

(For a variety of reasons many Scots are essentially internationalists and within the SDA are Scots who well understand the interdependency of global trade and defence.

Currently the SDA is assisting in the process of setting up a Scottish Institute for International Affairs (SIIA) and a founding member of the Insti-

tute has accepted an invitation from the USA "Friends of Scotland" Caucus to attend the Capitol Hill National Tartan Day Symposium on March 28, 2012.

The SDA's stringent examination of Scotland's financial situation has already revealed the enormous scale of the hidden overall revenue transfer from Scotland to London, and the scale by which Scotland is subsidising the rest of the UK – even without counting the oil.
