tablished by the Scottish Tartans Society of Scotland to be a center for reliable information on Scottish Highland Dress traditions within


the United States and to serve the large Scottish-American heritage community.

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

Tuesday, September 2, 2014 * Fly overnight to Glasgow, Scotland.

Wednesday, September 3, 2014 * We arrive early this morning in Glasgow where Hope-Vere will be waiting to meet us with our private coach for transport to Dumcrieff House Estate near Moffat. We'll unpack and refresh ourselves before lunch. *We'll visit Abbotsford, the historic home of Sir Walter Scott, near Kelso, which is less than an hour's drive from Dumcrieff. * We return to Dumcrieff House Estate for our Welcome Dinner.

Thursday, September 4, 2014 * Drive to Rosslyn Chapel for a private guided tour by a leading professor who has written the history of Rosslyn Chapel. We will arrive as the Gathering opens for the day ahead of the Royal Party who attend in the afternoon at about 2 PM. After the games close at 5 PM, we will leave about that time, but not before the Royal Party depart the field for the short drive back to Balmoral. We will then drive back south to Dumcrieff and stop for dinner enroute.

Sunday, September 7, 2014 * Today, we will visit the City of Glasgow's Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum and then the Glasgow Botanic Gardens. *As we leave Glasgow, we will drive to Helensburgh to tour the Hill House and the private home of Charles Rennie MacIntosh. *This afternoon's drive via the hills of Argyle will lead us to Loch Lomond's Bonnie Banks. * We will dine this evening at the historic Drover's Inn at the far end of Loch Lomond.

and then drive to New Abbey to visit Sweet Heart Abbey, New Abbey Corn Mill and drive through this historic village with the majestic Criffel and Knockendoch Hills on the Barbeth Estate as a wonderful backdrop. * We will have Afternoon Tea at Barbeth, which is Hope-Vere's home at New Abbey, where he and his wife, Erika, live with their two children, Catherine Eve and Adrian Hope Vere.

Tuesday, September 9, 2014 * This morning we will drive to Stirlingshire to visit the newly refurbished Wallace Memorial and the new Bannockburn Visitor's Center and the Bannockburn Battlefield itself. If there is time, we can spend some time in the city of Stirling. * This evening, we'll drive to the Ancient Kingdom of Fife where we will visit Balgonie Castle as the guests of the Laird of Balgonie who will be happy to renew your wedding vows for a small fee. Scottish pecans? Yep! A delicious variety called "Elliott" grown in Georgia

Elliotts are a variety of pecan named after the man who first discovered them in Florida's panhandle during the 1920s. Elliotts are one of the more unusual varieties of the five hundred known types of pecans in existence.

Delicious, nutritious Elliott pecan halves are prized

by seasoned chiefs and fanatic foodies for their robust and sweet flavor, high oil content and delectable crunch. Because of their stocky little size, Elliotts don't require chopping when adding to many flavorful pecan recipes. Elliott pecans have a natural buttery flavor without the aftertaste of many pecan varieties. The small, oval shaped nut is a rare specialty pecan due to its sporadic yield and the fact that only select growers choose to harvest them.

The Tree - The Elliott is best suited for planting in warmer climates with mild winters. Despite the small nut size, market acceptance for this cultivar continues to grow due to its beautiful kernel color and uniquely outstanding taste. The leaf is relatively small, very dark green, and glossy. The veins are raised to an unusual degree which is one of Elliott's most distinguishing characteristics.

The Elliott has proven again and again its resistance to pecan scab fungus and other leaf diseases. It is very drought resistant and holds its leaves late into fall. Elliott is harvested in the first or second week of Octo-

ber in most locations in the Southeast.

In early October, the pecans mature and the teardrop shaped nuts will easily shell out to reveal plump, light golden kernels. Yielding about 77 nuts per pound and 50% kernel, Elliott is a moderate producer of excel-

lent quality pecans. Cross pollinate with a Type I variety such as the Caddo or Pawnee.

The History - The original Elliott pecan tree was a seedling in the lawn of a house in Milton, Florida purchased by Henry Elliot in 1912 (Although the Elliot family spells their name with one "t," the pecan industry usually spells the cultivar name with two "t's".)

This tree, with a trunk diameter of 0.76 m, was resistant to scab and produced up to 114 kg of high quality nuts

in good years. Mr. Elliot gave some of the nuts to Harlan Farms Nursery, Paxton, Florida. Mr. Harlan was impressed and established a 15-acre grove in 1919. Mr. Harlan sold the grove to Lee and Otis Mathis and the original Elliot planting remained in the Mathis family. Elliott's resistance to scab and the excellent quality nuts were responsible for the Georgia Extension Service recommending it for grove planting in that state in the early 1960s. Elliott is widely planted in small acreages in Georgia, with the greatest concentration in the Fort Valley - Perry area.

How disputes can benefit genealogical research

Family and neighbor disputes are always unpleasant to deal with. However, from a genealogical research perspective, these issues may provide significant research benefits because they usually leave a paper trail. This is especially true if the issue turned into a legal matter that had to be settled in court. If the dispute became heated enough, a law enforcement agency such as the local po-

lice or sheriff may have been called to break up the altercation. Even if no arrest was made, a police report would have been generated.

Family disputes can be especially emotional. Many researchers who find old correspondence often discover intimate details of relationships that caused splits within the family itself or feuds with neighbors. In some cases, the splits or feuds may have turned violent or led to permanent estrangement.

Besides family and neighbors, disputes may have involved a local business or business associates, employers, churches, schools, hospitals, or governmental entity whether it be on the local, state, or federal level. Disputes fitting these examples would definitely lead to hiring of attorneys and generating court records. The most common records where evidence would appear include land records, civil and criminal court proceedings, probate records, and correspondence from attorneys and governmental entities.

Land records may document long, drawn out arguments between neighbors or others over boundaries and/ or ownership. Additional problems such as the perceived quality of the land, lack of, or poorly done surveys, or difficulty in determining proper documentation would

also generate legal problems. Sometimes these records include detailed testimonials from neighbors, relatives, business associates, etc., supporting the claims of disputants, and detailed accounts of relationships between the various parties.

Civil court records may shed light on lawsuits filed against individuals for a variety of claims. For example,

> if they were a business owner or merchant, there may be litiga-

tion over unpaid accounts, defective work, or related issues. Probate records can reveal many beneficial clues. If an ancestor died intestate (without a will), or if they had a will that the heirs contested, the probate court will have documentation of the process of settling the estate, lists of creditors, heirs, and statements from anyone applying to

administer the estate based on their relationship to the deceased. Criminal court proceedings may provide detailed information on offenses and testimony from witnesses, which may include family members.

Correspondence from attorneys and governmental agencies may provide a variety of clues. Examples may include the nature or summations of accusations, questions pertaining to specifics in the case or dispute, name the court where the proceedings took place, case and docket numbers, and

names of people directly or indirectly involved in the mat-

USA 1914?

In April 1914 in Colorado National Guardsmen and security forces employed by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company set fire to the tents occupied by striking miners.



When the tents went up in flames and the survivors fled, they were shot down by the Guardsmen and security guards. Known as the Ludlow Massacre, it was the culmination of a bloody widespread strike against Colorado coal mines.

Casualties resulting from the blaze and subsequent shootout at the camp were 3 men, 2 women and 13 children. Labor officials said the killings of the striking workers and their families was an act of cold blooded murder. Company officials and the National Guard

ter at hand.

Governmental correspondence may include information on complaints against the entity over damages to crops, lack of support for settlements, roads, unpaid wages, or incompetent civil servants and how their conduct impacted the person or family which led to the dispute or legal action.

Scots Wha Ha'e

The highest recorded temperature in Scotland was 32.9°C / 89.6°F at Greycrook (Scottish Borders) on 9 August, 2003. Prior to that, the record was 32.8°C / 89.6°F at Dumfries on 2 July 1908.

The coldest daytime temperature in Scotland (and the UK) was -27.2°C / -17.0°F at Brae-mar on 11 February 1985.

January and February are the coldest months averaging 5-7° C / 41-45°.

July and August are the warmest months averaging 19°C / 66.2°F.

Dumfries and Galloway in the south west of Scotland has the highest mean annual temperature of 9°C / 48.2°F.

The summit of Ben Nevis has the lowest mean average temperature - -0.3°C / 31.5°F.

In the sunniest parts of Scotland (Angus, Fife, Lothians, Ayrshire, Dumfries & Galloway) there is an average of 1,400 hours of sunshine each year. Even in the mountain regions of the Highlands there are over 1,000 hours of sunshine a year.

May and June are the best months for sunlight averaging 19 hours with approximately 5 hours of "almost darkness" (the gloaming).

June 30 sunrise occurs at 3:35 a.m. and sets at 9:05 p.m. but never truly gets dark.

spokesmen replied that they were simply trying to restore law and order in a situation which bordered upon anarchy. They insisted that if they had not acted even more lives would have been lost.

Residents at the time said that this atmosphere of violence showed no signs of abating in the near future.

Started by Tony Janus on 1 January 1914, the St. Petersburg-Tampa Airboat Line was the first regularly

scheduled airboat line between cities in America.

Janus was a pilot who got the idea of ferrying passengers on the 46 mile round trip on a pair of flying boats.

The pilot's idea quickly caught on with the tourist crowd and the Janus business thrived. Soon he was winging his way over Tampa Bay with his plane full of wealthy thrill seekers. However, when the season finished three months later, the line closed down.

Fifteen hundred women, some dressed in white with black arm bands, others in deepest mourning, marched down Fifth Avenue on 29 August as part of an appeal for peace in Europe.

Large crowds watched solemnly and respectfully their progress from 59th Street to Union Station.

Some of the marchers carried white flags, embroidered in gold with the word "Peace" and the image of a dove.

In a move that stunned rival automobile makers, in January, Henry Ford doubled the minimum wage of his workers to an unprecedented \$5 per day. The pay rise was announced by Ford's treasurer, James Couzens, along with a plan to share \$10,000,000 from the previous year's profits and, in addition, an extra work shift. Instead of its two nine-hour shifts, the company's Highland Park factory was to operate around the clock with

three eight--hour shifts,

Referring to profits of over \$37 million in 1913, Couzens said, "We want those who have helped us to produce this great institution to share our prosperity."

Ford also believed that by pioneering higher wages for his work force he would help to create a vast new market for his own product, the Model T car.

The Ford factory was besieged with job applicants

when the announcement was made, to the extent that the police had to disperse the crowds with firehoses.

Was President Wilson thinking of his mother on 9 May? He probably was because he then signed a joint resolution of Congress recommending that the executive departments of government recognize Mother's Day as an annual holiday.

Congress proposed that the day be celebrated on the second Sunday in the month of May. This came at the request of Miss Anna Jarvis, who wished the honour the memory of her own mother, Mrs. Ana Reeves Jarvis, who died on 10 May 1905.

Miss Jarvis got the ball rolling when she petitioned Congress to create the holiday after marking her mother's passing each year by wearing a white carnation and

organizing special prayer sessions at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in her home town of Grafton, West Virginia.

A court decided litigation over aeroplane balancing patent in favour of the Wright brothers against Glenn Curtiss.

On 19 August, in response to the growing European war, President Wilson reiterated his statement of 4 August that the United States was taking a neutral stance.

Citing the Declaration of London of 1901, the Presi-

dent said that the open seas were neutral territory and that, as a maritime nation, the United States would maintain its position and would not take sides in the European dispute.

In a memorandum he called on the American people "to be neutral in fact as well as in name, impartial in thought as well as in deed."

Since the assassination of the Austrian Archduke Ferdinand on 28 July pressure had been put on Wilson to support either the Central Powers - Germany and Austria - or the Allies, England, France and Russia.

Many influential newspapers, including the New York Times had branded the Germans the aggressor and had demanded an American Declaration of War against them. Other media giants had put the blame on the Allied Powers.

When 8 year old Marcella Grunelle sadly approached her father with a faceless rag doll, he put his creativity to work.

John Grunelle, a po-

litical cartoonist wanted to please his terminally ill daughter, so, he drew a face on the doll.

Then, his wife restuffed it and made a heart shaped piece of candy with the words, "I love You," on its chest.

The result was a cheery, soft, warm rag doll with a mop of red hair. The family named the shabby, but lovable doll, "Raggedy Ann."

Following problems in Copperfield, Oregon, Governor Oswald West sent his secretary to administer the railroad boom town. She declared martial law and shut all the saloons within 80 minutes.

A Circuit Court declared Wisconsin's marriage law, based on eugenic principles, unconstitutional.

Mrs. Margaret Sanger, advocate of birth control, was said to be on a train bound for Montreal, fleeing trial for violating the Comstock Law.

The 35 year-old Mrs. Sanger had written and distributed a newspaper called *The Woman Rebel* which

made assertions such as a woman's body belongs to herself alone.

While this paper was confiscated by the Post Office, Mrs. Sanger was not indicted until she tried to distribute *Family Limitation*, a pamphlet outlining the use of sponges, diaphragms and other birth control devices.

If she had come to trial, she could

have been sentenced for up to 45 years imprisonment.

In Detroit, Cadillac developed the V8 automobile engine.

The Boston Red Sox swept the World Series against Philadelphia Athletics, 4 - 1.

Jacob Riis, photographer and reformer died in Barre, Massachusetts on 26 July.







The Chiefly Arms of Paisley of Westerlea


Duncan W. Paisley of Westerlea, Chieftain of the Paisley Family

The Paisleys are a family of considerable antiquity, having been associated with Lochwinnoch and Paisley (parts of what later became Renfrewshire), with Cunningham and Kyle (North Ayrshire), Innerwick (East Lothian) and Roxburghshire, since the time of William I King of Scots 1165 - 1214.

William I Paisley (died ante 28 September

William I Paisley (died ante 28 September 1171) and William II Paisley (killed in battle ante 1218) were prominent in the following of the first three hereditary stewards of Scotland, while William II Paisley is also noticed attending the itinerant court of the King of Scots during 1179 - 95.

Separate and quite distinct branches of the family had already developed at Lochwinnoch and Paisley and in the Roxburgshire barony of Hawick before the end of King David Bruce's reign in 1371 and the beginnings of others are found in records for Edinburgh and the three Lothians from 1389 onwards and at Dunrod near Borgue (Kirkcudbrightshire) in still Gaelic speaking Galloway from 1585.



New Lord Lyon King of Arms appointed

A priest of the Scottish Episcopal Church, the Rev. Canon Joseph Morrow, has been appointed by the Queen as the Lord Lyon King of Arms to replace the retiring David Sellar. (David Sellar was appointed a Member of the Royal Victorian Order, 5th Class (MVO) in the 2014 New Year Honours in anticipation of his retirement from the office of Lord Lyon.)

An office created in the 14th century, the Lord Lyon King of Arms is the most junior of the Great Officers of State in Scotland and is the Scottish official with responsibility for regulating heraldry. He is also responsible for Scottish state ceremonies, akin to the Earl Marshal in England, and his duties include the granting of armorial bearings and judicial rulings on who has the right to bear an existing coat of arms

The appointment was made by the Queen on the recommendation of the First Minister. Under section 3 of the Lyon King of Arms (Scotland) Act 1867, the parttime appointment is based at Edinburgh's New Register House.

Dr. Morrow serves as Chancellor of the Diocese of Brechin, is an Honorary Canon of St Paul's Cathedral, Dundee and Chaplain, Glamis Castle. At present, he is



the President of the Mental Health Tribunal for Scotland, and President of the Additional Support Needs Tribunals and a First-Tier Tribunal Judge dealing with asylum and immigration issues.

Dr Morrow has a special interest in ecclesiastical history and 35 years' experience of the practical application of ceremonial within a variety of settings including State, Civil, Military and Ecclesiastical areas of Scottish life.
