

This old West Marche Riding Clan, one of the Border Clans from the early 1100s, were retainers of Clan Douglas and also allied with the best Border families through blood and friendship. Their land holdings were extensive. To survive on the often invaded Borders, they engaged in the "rieving" of the period and participated in many battles against the English.

Declared "unruly" by the Scottish Parliament, many of the Clan were "encouraged" to emigrate to the Ulster Plantation in Northern Ireland after 1610.

After William Bell, called "Redcloak" and Chief of the Clandied in 1627, the chiefship became dormant. Without leadership, the Bells ceased to exist as a viable clan.

Clan Bell North America is a charitable organization of Scottish descendants and friends of Family/Clan Bell dedicated to the study of Bell Genealogy and Scottish history and the perpetuation of family tradition.

Eurasian Beaver making a come-back in Scotland

The Scottish Beaver Trail has resulted in the conviction that the Eurasian beaver can indeed thrive in Scottish ecosystems. The experimental reintroduction of Eurasian beavers by the Scottish Wildlife Trust and the Royal Zoological Society into Knapdale Forest in Argyll has been deemed a success, and the Scottish Government will decide on further reintroductions by May of 2015. The Eurasian beaver, a smaller cousin of the American beaver, has been extinct in Britain since the 1500s.

The group also visited Mordington, and planted a beech tree near the grave of Agnes Dunbar, also known as "Black Agnes," for her hair and dark features She is known for holding off English forces that had besieged the castle while her husband and the main force of the castle army was away.

Other highlights included staying overnight in the castle at Ackergill Tower near Wick. This is a picturesque castle and grounds that brings to mind the age of chivalry, knights and fair damsels.

The annual dinner and general meeting of Clan Dunbar was held there in the great hall and adjoining rooms.





That evening was the beginning of our very eventful and delightful tour of Crawford sites in Southern Scotland.

The next day we began with a visit to Crawford and Crawfordjohn, where we discovered our origins. Crawford Castle, also known as "Lindsey Castle", because we have to recognize that Crawfords actually never lived in that castle, though they built the one beneath it, which instead of the stone of the visible ruins, was actually a motte and bailey (wood and mud) fortification introduced around the 10th century.

It consisted of a motte (a mound on which the castle was built) surrounded by a fortified enclosure next to the motte. It often contained a "keep" or fortified tower made of wood or stone.

Crawford Castle was actually destroyed by William Wallace who raised quite a few castles in Southern Scotland in his attempt to deprive the English invaders of refuges in the border areas of Scotland.

Crawfordjohn remained with the Crawford family when a divided Barony of Crawford was obtained by the Lindsays through marriage to a Crawford Heiress. At least that is the Crawford version of the story.

The town of Crawford and the site of the castle next to it were part of the barony, thus passed to the Lindsay's. But the town of Crawford is associated quite accurately



Crawfordjohn was inherited by John son of Reginald who had inherited the land from his father. It passed to the Barclay's when a Barclay married the Crawford heiress, then was re-acquired by Crawfords with a remarriage to a Barclay, from whom the Crawfords obtained Kilbirnie.

Crawfordjohn was later exchanged with a Hamilton for a property nearer to Kilbirnie, thus consolidating the Crawford property within Ayrshire.

We would visit Kilbirnie (both town and castle later in the tour.

By the way, you will be interested to know that John Muir's father grew up in Crawfordjohn.

A story of Clan Donald

In this issue, we are going to pass on an article that was written for *Scotland Now* about Clan Donald.

THE Macdonalds are one of the oldest and biggest of all Scottish clans. More than 40 tartans are associated with their name and the histories of the various branches are intricately connected. Yet across the world their name is forever associated with the Glencoe Massacre, when 38 unarmed Macdonalds were killed by two detachments of the Earl of Argyll's Regiment of Foot led by Robert Campbell of Glen Lyon. Another forty women and children died of exposure after their homes were burned.

The truly horrific aspect of the Macdonald slaughter by their Campbell guests is that a king and his government backed the genocide of their own people. This single fact has guaranteed its infamy.

For almost 400 years Clan Donald ruled the western seaboards of Scotland, controlling an empire big and powerful enough to challenge the Scottish kings.

Their story starts with Somerled. Born, it's thought, in Morvern around 1113, this half Norse, half Celtic

Sept 2, 1945 marks the official end of WWII.

warrior rose to such power that he and his descendants were known as the Lords of the Isles.

The Vikings had been the dominant force on Scotland's west coast and controlled the local population from their strongholds and settlements.



With fewer men and almost no equipment, Somerled captured Viking ships and equipment, eventually establishing a fleet of smaller craft that could out manoeuvre the Viking longboats.

He is credited with inventing the rudder, which he put in the middle of his galleys, instead of using the Viking 'steer board' on the right, which later became known the starboard side of the boat.

His island empire stretched the length of the west coast of Scotland.

King Malcolm IV recognised the threat and tried to expand into Somerled's territory. In 1164 Somerled brought a force of more than 160 galleys and 15,000 men to the Firth of Clyde to stop Malcolm's advance.

His army disembarked near where Erskine Bridge stands today. The sea warrior was forced to fight on land. The two sides eventually met in an area that has since been heavily developed and it was here that Somerled was killed.

After the Battle of Renfrew the Kingdom of the Isles was divided between three of his sons. His grandson Donald gave his name to the clan and it was his grandson, Angus Og – who rekindled the fortunes of the Macdonalds.

In 1314 he stood with 5,000 Macdonalds with King Robert Bruce at Bannockburn.

His loyalty was well rewarded and by the 15th cen-Continued on page 17

tury the Macdonalds were riding high. With royal backing they consolidated their position and were able to build and maintain an alternative Celtic model parliament at their stronghold at Loch Finlaggan on Islay where they held their court.

Macdonald power was fur-

ther diminished at the Battles of Harlaw and Bloody Bay, which pitted father against son and caused irrevocable divisions.

The Lordships of the Isles tore themselves apart and the only victor was the Stewart monarchy.

Three Macdonald divisions, included the surviving Glencoe Macdonalds, stood on the left wing of the Jacobite army at Culloden. Government grapeshot and musket fire tore the Highlanders to pieces.


In the 150 years after Culloden, it's estimated that upwards of two million people left Scotland. As part of this great Scottish diaspora the children of Clan Donald have settled across the globe.

A recent scientific survey suggests that one in four Macdonalds can trace their origins back to Somerled. Only one man has more living descendants, and that man is Genghis Khan.

Westford Knight to be featured by Scott Wolter on H2 TV

People come from near and far to look at the Westford Knight, a historic carving in a rock along the side of Depot Street in Westford, MA that has brought international fame to the town.

One of those people was geologist Scott Wolter from the History 2 Channel's "America Unearthed," who made an appearance recently in Westford to observe a previously undiscovered etching on the rock.

The known marks in the rock are considered by some to represent the head and torso of a knight holding a sword and shield. Others conjecture it to be a man-

Tuesday 28 July - Castle Sinclair Girnigoe and Noss Head. Farewell dinner in Wick



made etching of a medieval sword. Still others speculate that it is a natural carving.

Greenslade were cleaning the rock in June when they came across a strange, small marking.

Christiana wondered if the new marking could be what is known as the "hooked X," a cross-shaped etching with a line jutting out the top left-hand side.

Westford resident and author David Brody, who wrote a novel about the legend called *Cabal of the Westford Knight*, said the marking is often used on other carvings as a type of signature. He said he believes the carving dates back to the late 1300s.

The legend of the Westford Knight is that the rock dates back to a traveling party of Henry Sinclair in the 1300s, and acts as a commemoration to a fallen member of the party.

Wolter looked at the rock to determine if the markings were manmade or simply weathered by nature, and also the date of the marking.

Brody said he met Wolter in 2006 at the library, as both were doing research on the Westford Knight. It was through that connection that he called Wolter after the discovery of the "hooked x."

Wolter's determination will be revealed at the show's airing, which will occur in the late fall.



Flowers of the Forest



We are saddened to learn about the passing of **Dr. Elsie Quarterman**, a life time member of Clan Sinclair USA, on June 9, 2014. She was born on November 28, 1910 in Valdosta, Georgia.

Her grandmother on her father's side of the family was Susan Evalyn "Susie" Sinclair whose father, Benjamin Waters

Sinclair, immigrated from Thurso, Scotland to Georgia in 1837.

Elsie moved with her family to the family farm in 1921 where she developed from her mother an abiding interest in wild plants which eventually led to her receiving a masters degree in Botany and doctorate in plant ecology from Duke University.

At Vanderbilt University, she was one of the first women to gain a full professorship and the first female to be appointed department chair (in Botany).

Elsie is credited with rediscovering in 1969 the native Tennessee coneflower, Echinacea tennesseensis, a plant only found in Middle Tennessee cedar glades that was previously thought to be extinct. It became the first plant endemic to Tennessee to be protected by the Endangered Species Act, and thanks to her efforts to establish more populations within the cedar glades, was removed from the endangered species list in August 2011. Today, Echinacea tennesseensis can be found in Tennessee's Davidson, Wilson and Rutherford counties.

In 1998, the 185-acre forest near LaVergne, Tennessee, where she conducted much of her research was

named the Elsie Quarterman Cedar Glade State Natural Area in her honor.

Former students and Tennessee State Parks honored her pioneering work in 2008 by renaming an annual spring wildflower event at Cedars of Lebanon State Park, celebrated annually for more than 30 years, the Elsie Quarterman Wildflower Weekend.

Elsie was proud of her Scottish heritage, including her Sinclair ancestry which has taken her back to Scotland to Caithness on numerous visits. Steve Snoddy, Tennessee Commissioner, remembers "On the Bouschorled tour of Caithness in 1991, I followed Elsie down the rock slope at old Kiess Castle so that we could track down something growing near the water's edge; this is when she was in her eighties."

In 2006, she visited Noss Head, Castle Sinclair Girnigoe as well as Rosslyn Chapel.

Norman "Norm" C. Knight, born September 1, 1930, the loving husband of the Clan Wallace Society Worldwide Advisory Director for Canada, Dorothy (Wallace) Knight, passed away on Thursday, June 12, 2014 surrounded by his family. Norm and Dorothy were best friends and married for almost 63 years.

Norm was a retiree of Chrysler Corporation with 36 years of service, where he was a spray painter and worked in the "re-work" department refinishing imperfections resulting from the manufacturing process.

He was a member of Woodslee (Canada) IOOF Lodge and past director of the Woodslee Credit Union and Federation of Agriculture. He had many interests but wood working was his passion. He and Dorothy enjoyed their many travels to Scotland, United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand and especially Italy, where he visited his brother's grave in Ortona.

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A French connection: The Sipprelles and the Shaws

"It's a perfect night to get the old photos out and check on the welfare of the ancestors - the French ones, that is," my Aunt Rowena remarked on a summer evening during a driving rain that drenched the St. John River Valley.

In her hands were two small cardboard boxes.

"I'll make tea and then let's sit down and look at these gems," she said.

While my aunt tended to the tea, I rummaged around on the closet shelves putting aside the boxes marked with French names: Elise, Adele, Marthe, Annette, Robert, Uncle E.M. Sipprelle.

Here were the photos of the descendants of the old Hu-

guenot family who traveled from the seacoasts of Normandy, in France, to the Wyoming Valley of Pennsylvania in the mid eighteenth century. By 1783, William Siprell, Sr., a Loyalist from Pennsylvania, had landed at the mouth of the St. John River in New Brunswick, Canada.

Aunt Rowena arrived with the tea as well as a photo of a dour-looking couple dressed in the black garments so common in the mid 19th century.

"These are your great-great grandparents,: she remarked. "Ezekiel Sipprelle, known as Zeke, and Letitia Shaw Sipprelle. Letitia was the daughter of Nathaniel and Phoebe Shaw. They were young Zeke's neighbors."

My aunt jumped out of her seat and brought me an old tintype of a farmhouse with a crowd of people, dogs and horses in front of the structure. "This is where they lived," she explained. "During the week, Zeke and his brother, Seth, farmed their land. On Sunday, Zeke was a

circuit preacher. After he was ordained in 1840, he brought the Word of the Lord to his far-flung congregation. His reputation as a golden-tongued sermonizer grew each year."

The sweetest part of our French connection is the story of how young Zeke and his future wife, some 18

years his junior, came to know each other.

While visiting at his neighbor, Nathaniel Shaw's house one Sunday, a young boy there teased Zeke about when he planned to marry. Rocking the baby, Letitia Shaw's cradle, Zeke exclaimed, "I'm not in a hurry, I'll just wait for Tishia to grow up."




And, thus it happened that on August 3, 1833, at the age of 17, Letita Shaw became the bride of the future Reverend Ezekiel Sipprelle. Following the service, the bridegroom assisted his new wife into the saddle behind him and off they rode. Together they flew over fields and pastures of Sommerville, New Brunswick, with Letitia's coppery hair streaming behind her.

In their home, on the banks of the St. John River, they raised 14 children.

I, their, fortunate great-great granddaughter, have been given their lovely old "yard-long" picture of sweet peas that once hung in their parlor.

Clan Wallace goes to Scotland for 2014 International Gathering






Duncan W. Paisley of Westerlea, Chieftain of the Paisley Family

The Paisleys are a family of considerable antiquity, having been associated with Lochwinnoch and Paisley (parts of what later became Renfrewshire), with Cunningham and Kyle (North Ayrshire), Innerwick (East Lothian) and Roxburghshire, since the time of William I King of Scots 1165 - 1214.

William I Paisley (died ante 28 September 1171) and William II Paisley (killed in battle ante 1218) were prominent in the following of the first three hereditary stewards of Scotland, while William II Paisley is also noticed attending the itinerant court of the King of Scots during 1179 - 95.

Separate and quite distinct branches of the family had already developed at Lochwinnoch and Paisley and in the Roxburgshire barony of Hawick before the end of King David Bruce's reign in 1371 and the beginnings of others are found in records for Edinburgh and the three Lothians from 1389 onwards and at Dunrod near Borgue (Kirkcudbrightshire) in still Gaelic speaking Galloway from 1585.


