
"Pipes of Christmas" concerts return for 16th joyous season

Concert to feature world premiere of new music

The Pipes of Christmas will celebrate its sixteenth season with performances in New York and New Jersey this December. The holiday favorite, produced by the Clan Currie Society, opens on Saturday, December 20 at the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church, located at 921 Madison Avenue (at 73rd Street) with performances at 2 and 7PM. The concert moves across the Hudson River on Sunday, December 21 to Central Presbyterian Church located at 70 Maple Street in Summit, NJ for a 2PM performance.

For those weary of the ceaseless stream of secular seasonal music from department stores to TV, the Pipes of Christmas offers a spiritual and traditional take on the season that connects concertgoers to the holiday in a fresh, meaningful way. The show features tunes such as O Come, O Come Emmanuel, Joy to the World, and Amazing Grace, all performed live on pipes and drums, harp and fiddle, and organ and brass. Not only does the performance define Christmas cheer, but also it inspires those of Celtic descent to retrace and reconnect to their ancestry.


The concert presents the music of Christmas accompanied by readings taken from



We have a dear friend who was president of his clan and when he left office, there were almost a thousand members. Now, there are less than 300.


His clan gives scholarships, but you have to really search and be "in the know" before you know how to apply as scholarships are not mentioned anywhere. When a scholarship is awarded, it is, unbelievable to me, not mentioned in their newsletter.

In the past few months, I've made it a part of my routine to check on the websites of Scottish Clans. I'm doing it in alphabetical order. So far, if I were giving grades, there would not be anything above a failing grade for any clan website that I have seen.

What's wrong, you say?

Some of the websites have not been updated in YEARS. Information is sadly lacking on how in the world you can join the clan. There are no emails nor phone numbers nor addresses so that you can write to someone in the clan. I realize folks are sometimes afraid to publish this kind of thing - but it can be done without danger to your personal security.

How can that be done? You may easily have a free email for this purpose specifically. There are many providers who are glad to have you have a free account with them. You may have a clan post office box so that people Ideas

If you list a phone number (and a clansperson told me this very thing) people might call you.

I feel about this exactly as I felt when a board member once said about me, "Why should we help Beth? All she does is bring strangers to town."

Once in my long radio career, I was told when I had produced a Rollin' Radio Road Show (remote broadcast) from a shopping center, "Beth, I don't know why these business people do this. All it does is fill up our parking lots and stores so that my old customers do not get to shop as leisurely as they like." Huh?

Don't you want people telephoning and emailing and writing to you about your clan? Don't you want people to come to your tent at games?

On many websites, if the officers are listed and you can contact them it turns out that the listed folks have not been in positions of responsibility for months and sometimes years.

It's frustrating for me to deal with these websites and I'm just mining for news of what a clan is doing.

Folks, I am a member of several clans to whom I pay dues...and about twenty clans of which I am an Honorary Member. I don't need to join a clan.

I would like to be able to see a newsletter which is on the Internet. My reading your newsletter and using some of your wonderful activities and honors bestowed on your members and Flowers of the Forest, etc., in this publication costs you nothing and helps you immensely.

If a clan has a newsletter, it is their most wonderful recruiting tool. I have NEVER understood clans who do not freely share their newsletters. Nobody who is not

It is just tragic to me to see this happening in our beloved Scottish community.





"Romanticizing the Frontier: Anglo-European Encounters with Indigenous Peoples"



This exhibit explores Native American indigenous cultures through the lens of European global expansion and exploration from the late fourteenth century through the late nineteenth century.

As early as 1588, European illustrators like Theodore De Bry were portraying North America and its inhabitants for an eager public. Illustrations, like the one represented here, created a sensation in Europe. Also on display are illustrations from Captain Cook's voyages and his ill-fated return to the Hawaiian Islands. While many of the Anglo European illustrators represented Native Americans with European physical features, some, like George Catlin, attempted to capture indigenous culture and peoples with verisimilitude. Batesville, Arkansas. Proceeds also support the Society's sponsorship of the US National Scottish Harp Championship, the Gaelic Literature Competition at the Royal National Mod and an annual academic research prize at Sabhal Mòr Ostaig, Scotland's Gaelic college on the Isle of Skye.

The Clan Currie Society also hosts an annual academic symposium which brings together top scholars and historians to explore the history and contributions of Scotland's Gaelic culture. In addition, the Society hosts the annual Tartan Day on Ellis Island observances (estimated to be the largest Tartan Day event in the world) and the Harp Glen – a festival of the Scottish harp – at the Seaside Highland Games in Ventura, CA.

Commenting on the Society's music scholarship program, stage and screen star and former Honorary Chairman of the concerts, Alan Cumming said, "I am delighted that proceeds from the Pipes of Christmas will result in these important gifts which ensure that the future of Scottish culture is safer with these generous scholarships."

structed to introduce gem after gem and still have a finale which raised the roof. In short, it was like a well constructed fireworks show on the Glorious Fourth. The Westfield Leader described the concert as "a unique sound of power and glory nowhere else to be found."

About the Clan Currie Society

The Clan Currie Society, based in Summit, NJ and



Edinburgh, Scotland is an international, non-profit cultural and educational organization. It is the preeminent Scottish-American cultural society in preserving and promoting Highland heritage at Scottish Games, ethnic festivals, as well as community groups and classrooms. The Society has over 2,000 members worldwide that gather via the Society's website and

at special events and clan gatherings.

The Society was originally formed in Glasgow, Scotland in 1959 to further the knowledge and appreciation of the MacMhuirich (pronounced MacVurich) Bardic dynasty. The MacMhuirichs served for over 700 years as professional poets to the Lords of the Isles and later to the MacDonalds of Clanranald among other prominent Highland clans and families. The Red Book of Clanranald, one of Gaelic Scotland's literary treasures, was penned by successive generations of the MacMhuirich family.

Today, the Society is a respected producer of programs and events to honor Scotland's rich culture and heritage. The Society's signature events include The Pipes of Christmas, the annual observance of Tartan Day on Ellis Island – the largest attended Tartan Day event in the world, and the annual MacMhuirich Academic Symposium. The Society is also a founding member of the NY Tartan Week Alliance with oversight for many of the anchor events of Tartan Week including, Whisky Live, From Scotland With Love, and Tartan Day on Ellis Island.

To commemorate the $10^{\rm th}$ annual observance of Tartan Day on Ellis Island, the Society commissioned

and launched the Ellis Island Tartan in April 2011. The tartan is designed primarily for all Americans whose ancestors came to the United States through Ellis Island. The Society's growing scholarship program provides financial support for students wishing to further their studies in music, poetry, and Gaelic history.

The Society has spearheaded the construction of two permanent clan monuments in Scotland. A MacMhuirich Memorial Cairn has been built adjacent to the 15th century ruins of Bale nam Bàrd, the Chief Bard's home at Stilligarry on the Island of South Uist. A carved stone, commemorating the bard Lachlan Mòr MacMhuirich, has been installed at Makars Court alongside the Scottish Writers Museum in Edinburgh.

Clan Currie is an outstanding producer of exhibitions and documentary films. Past exhibitions have included "The Life and Legacy of John Muir," "Tartan – Scotland's Enduring Icon," and "Loyalty and Rebellion: The Jacobites and America." The Society received one of its many awards for video production excellence for "The Crafter's Song", a documentary film narrated by Cliff Robertson

The Arms of the Society were granted by the Court of the Lord Lyon, Edinburgh, Scotland on June 30, 2006. The star, or mullet, is a heraldic symbol frequently found on individual Currie family coats of arms in Scotland. The thistle wreath, or chaplet, represents the international community the Society has created in "promoting Scottish heritage in general and Clan Currie heritage in particular, involving domestic and international matters."



"Battle of Rosslyn:" Unearthing our past

Scotland's independence was now falling away, after being defeated by the English at the Battle of Dunbar in 1296 and the subsequent occupation of the Lothians. John Balliol is stripped of his kingship and the nobles had to humiliatingly swear an Oath of Fealty to Edward I, their overlord.

Rather than ending resistance to Edward I, the first Battle of Dunbar saw the start of a war that would result in the shaping of Scottish identity and forced nobles on both sides of the border to decide which kingdom they owed allegiance.


Opposition to the English takeover was not slow in gathering pace, and the earl of Surrey began to suffer setbacks such as the crushing defeat at Stirling Bridge on 11th September 1297, where he severely underestimated the strategic command of Andrew Moray and William Wallace. However, when Wallace takes on King Edward himself in 1298 at Falkirk, the outcome ends in Scottish defeat.

In the Lothians, a famous battle is said to take place on the 24th of February, 1303, The Battle of Rosslyn. Archaeologists and historians have searched for the site of this alleged battle where supposedly 8,000 Scots defeated 30,000 English in a fight of truly epic proportions, and all to protect the honour of a lovely maiden, Lady Margaret Ramsey of Dalhousie. However, the conclusions reached were at odds with the "account" given by Walter Bower, Abbot of Inchcolm, some 100 years later.

During work in advance of building in and around Rosslyn, archeologists and metal detectorists scoured the fields for any sign of the conflict, but nothing turned up. Some historians then examined the story more closely and found that the battle - as described - did not actually take place. However, a historically significant event did happen, but not the one that people imagine.

John of Fordun was a chronicler much closer to the real event and the following description provides the reason why there is no archeological evidence for a large battle.

Fordun writes, "The commander and leader in this struggle was John Comyn, the son...John Comyn, then Guardian of Scotland, and Simon Fraser with their fol-

lowers, day and night, did their best to harass and to annoy by their general prowess, the aforesaid kings officers and bailiffs..."

The description appears to represent something akin to guerrilla warfare - with smaller groups of men, perhaps a hundred or so, harassing and ambushing men-at-arms, causing a constant erosion of English forces.

The area around Rosslyn is perfect for these sorts of tactics, with deep glens in a forested landscape that gives way to dangerous and boggy mosses to the west.

The place names are then added later by over enthusiastic antiquarians or are simply misunderstood - Shinbanes field and Stinking Rig. Even Killburn has nothing to do with killing, bur rather "kill" or "gill" is Gaelic for a chapel as in Kilmarnock or Kilmartin.

These constant raids and ambushes effectively sapped the will of the English, who were now fighting on two fronts (France and Scotland). It should have only been a matter of time before important skirmishes like Rosslyn would win back Scotland, but before that could happen, there were more twists to the tale.

Flower of the Forest

George Hege Hamilton, IV July 19, 1937 - Sept. 17, 2014 George Hege Hamilton, IV, 77, died Wednesday, September 17, at a Nashville, Tennessee hospital with his family by his side.

He had suffered complications from a heart attack. George had been a member of the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, TN, for more than 50 years. He was a world-renowned recording artist known as the "International Ambassador of Country Music".

He was the son of George Hege Hamilton III and Mary Lillian Hamilton of Winston-Salem, NC.

He was born July 19, 1937 in Winston-Salem and graduated from Reynolds High School. He attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and American University.

George is survived by his wife, Adelaide "Tink" Peyton Hamilton, of Franklin, Tennessee, their son,

The "Yes side" was its own worst enemy

The closest I ever got to Scotland's first minister – though he was only a humble MP at the time – was when the two of us had adjoining billets in a newspaper. It led to an interesting inter-columnar exchange which Alex Salmond, judging by his recent actions, seems not to have remembered. If only he had, he might be looking forward to a happier future.

One week, on the back of some fresh SNP (Scottish Nationalist Party) advance, I recalled what Andrew Cruickshank, the venerable Scottish actor, had once told me about nationalism. Auld Cruickshank said that what he would like to see in Scotland was 'a gentle and civilised nationalism'. I wrote that I liked the sound of a

gentle and civilised nationalism, but that it too often felt like a contradiction in terms.

The chap in the adjacent column was stung into a response the following week. Mr Salmond said that he too believed in the idea of a gentle and civilised nationalism and that, in his opinion, the Scot-



tish National Party exemplified this ideal. We let it go at that, though it would have been an intriguing subject for *Continued on page 23*



In the last 10 days of the campaign, the phrase 'a gentle and civilised nationalism' kept entering my head. What, I wondered, was gentle and civilised about the intimidation of journalists outside the BBC in Glasgow? Or Mr Sillars' 'day of reckoning', a phrase with deeply unpleasant connotations? Or the oppressive atmosphere in which the last stage of the campaign was conducted, making it impossible for supporters of the union to wear badges or put stickers in the windows of their homes without fear of retribution? What was gentle or civilised about any of this?

Of course the first minister was not directly respon-

sible for these excesses. But he had a duty to try to put a stop to them. Instead, confronted by the press about the disagraceful scenes at the BBC, he claimed they were part of a 'joyous' exercise of democracy. Mr Salmond has a peculiar idea of what constitutes joy. The organiser of the Yes campaign, Blair Jenkins, also defended what happened at the BBC: more reprehensibly in his case because Mr Jenkins used to be a broadcaster himself.

When Jim Sillars made his disastrous intervention, hogging valuable airtime for the best part of a critical

weekend, no doubt he was enjoying his last moment in the sun. Perhaps he little knew that he was basically closing down Scotland as a place in which to do business; his judgement has never been particularly sound.

But Mr Jenkins then had a responsibility to disassociate the Yes campaign from the rantings of this 'nationalist leader' (as the media inconveniently labelled the man of many parties). Instead, he issued a statement full of weasel words, which began by saying what a wonderful job Mr Sillars was doing – the precise opposite of the truth. It was 24 hours before Mr Salmond feebly distanced the cause from the sinister 'day of reckoning', but by then a great deal of damage had been done.

It seems no time at all - it is no time at all - since an opinion poll gave the Yes side a 2% lead. One columnist in the Scottish Review called it a 'historic' poll, while another - Alex Bell, former policy adviser to Alex

Salmond – predicted in its wake that the winning side would poll 55% of the vote. He was more or less right. The only problem is that the winning side has turned out to be the opposite one.

Maybe the poll wasn't really historic after all. Maybe it was just a poll. All the same, it is a pretty terrible commentary on the Yes campaign, and Mr Salmond's leadership of it, that it managed to convert a 2% lead into a near-11% deficit in 10 short days.

It is true that the poll belatedly galvanised the leaders of the UK unionist parties. We then had the infamous rush over the border by Cameron and Co, and a series of powerful speeches by Gordon Brown which, in

the opinion of polling analysts, brought some wavering Labour voters back into the fold. But this doesn't fully explain the dramatic late shift from the widely predicted 'knife-edge' result to such a clear and decisive one.

There is no doubt in my mind – although it can never be proved – that the bully-boy tactics of a significant minority of Yes supporters alienated many decent people in Scotland, including some who would otherwise have voted for independence.

A gentle and civilised nationalism? It didn't feel like it – and Alex

Salmond has paid a heavy price. 'All political careers end in failure'. His just did. (4.30pm, Friday: resignation announced).

П

And what about that saintly man, Kenyon Wright? Where stands the canon this fine morning?

In July, he submitted for publication in SR a short (300 word) piece headed: 'It's about Power, stupid'. I must admit to having been surprised by its angry tone, the capital P, and its clarion call for independence: this from the guiding light of the Scottish Constitutional Convention, Mr Deevolushun, the 'architect of the parliament'. Though not literally the architect; I wouldn't blame him for that.

I replied: 'Many thanks for sending your latest piece. It is very short – too long for the Cafe, too short for a

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main article; and it inevitably poses the question of whether the Constitutional Convention was always a staging post to independence. If you would be interested in answering this question, I would be interested in publishing it'.

He got back to me promptly: 'Yes, I do feel given the total absence of any sign that the UK's constitutional mess is ready for reform, that independence is the unfinished business of the convention, which had to be content with devolution. I will send you something on this as soon as I can'.

That was 18 July, two months to the day before the

referendum. I waited for Kenyon Wright's article, which would have been a fascinating contribution to the debate, but article came there none. No doubt it slipped his mind or he had better things to do, yet I'm disappointed. I would have welcomed his explanation of why the Scottish Constitutional Convention, in which he and my old friend Joyce McMillan laboured so long, did not divulge to the public at the time that devolution was far from being the ultimate destination of its ambitions: that it was merely the first watering hole on the journey.

Did we not deserve to be told this before we dutifully signed up to the devolution project? To put it bluntly: were we not misled? If Kenyon Wright would care to address this question from his elevated position in the wreckage, I repeat my offer to publish it.

Ah, the writers and journalists. Where does one start? The fanatical support of most of the leading luminaries in the Scottish literary 'community' was always ominous news for the Yes campaign, though it would be easy to over-state their influence.

Writers are not trusted as political thinkers and have a poor track record in the cause of Scottish home rule — ever since that old goat MacDiarmid proved such a liability to John MacCormick and his national covenant. The covenant movement nobly collected two million signatures for a parliament in Edinburgh as long ago as

the early 1950s, beside which the 1.6 million votes for independence last night looks rather unimpressive. But MacCormick's prodigious achievement – subsequently dismissed by Gorgeous George Pottinger's Royal Commission on Scottish Affairs – was no thanks to MacDiarmid.

His successors have been among the more unforgiving devotees of the Salmond crusade. The few dissidents in that community – the handful who were brave enough to declare for No – were treated with contempt by their fellow writers. So much for intellectual openness – though such behaviour has been unhappily symp-

tomatic of a more general intolerance.

What was true of the writers of fiction was true with semi-colons attached to the Scottish commentariat, most of whom abandoned any pretence of objectivity. The performance of the *Herald* group of journalists was astonishing: one of its commentators addressed a Scottish republican rally while another became such a cheerleader for Yes that, as recently as last week, he was advising his twitter followers how to behave during the party leaders' visit to Scotland. ('No eggthrowing'). How can such people ever expect to be taken seriously again?

They have reduced themselves to the abject level of fans with laptops.

In the end, the people of Scotland came out in glorious and unprecedented numbers, two million of them casting their vote for the preservation of the United Kingdom. The turnout and the majority have left opponents of that union nowhere to go – well, at least for a generation. The people have spoken, the bastards.

Dr. Edward J. Green MT. PLEASANT - Dr. Edward J. Green, devoted husband, father, grandfather, author and scholar, of Mount Pleasant, SC, died September 18th after a lengthy illness.

He was born in 1924 in Frankfort, IN, to Edward and Murley Green.

After graduating as Valedictorian of Frankfort High School, he served during WWII in the United States Army Officer Training Corps.

Following his honorable discharge from the Army, Ed pursued his education at Indiana University studying Psychology.

After completing his undergraduate degree, he was accepted to graduate school at Harvard University where he was a student of E.G. Boring and B.F. Skinner. Upon receiving his PhD, Dr. Green embarked on a lifelong teaching career.

Ed was especially interested in all things Scottish and played the bagpipes in several pipe bands including the 78th Frasier Highlanders.

He was also a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Fort Sumter Camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Charleston, SC.

Ed was known as a distinguished,

elegant gentleman; a true Renaissance Man who will be greatly missed by his family and many friends.

Dr. Green was also a longtime member of The Kingdome of Raknar. He was known to the Kingdome

as Sir Hotspur. He played the pipes in the 78th Frasers pipe band and was active as a participant in the 78th Frasers.

Dr. Green was preceded in death by his parents and his first wife, Ramona Thornton Green.


Warnings Out, by Russ Shaw, writing in the Lyons Tale, publication of the Lyons Family of America

Have any of your forebears ever been "warned out of town"? The warning was a part of our colonial welfare system. Towns from Maine to the deep south were committed to providing poor relief to their inhabitants, but the indigent family had to be a bona fide citizen of that particular town (i.e. born there, tax paying property owner). If the town council determined that a new resident family would be unable to support themselves, the family would be "warned out of town."

The process was formal. First, a summons would be issued calling the family to appear before the council; an interrogation followed. If probable cause was found, a warrant would be issued followed by a formal declaration ordering

thefamily to be removed to their official town of settlement. Warnings out were not always enforced by the local constable. However, if a person or family became destitute after having received a warning out, the town was not obliged to lend assistance to those in need.

This formal process of expulsion generated documents with genealogical information. Often this information was unique and not available anywhere else. If one of your peripatetic ancestors seemed to be aimlessly wandering from town to town, it could be the result of having been warned out of towns. Some towns have kept records of warnings out but not all have, and the practice seems to have ended in most areas by the end of the first quarter of the 19th century.
