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

The United States Mod would like to extend a warm greeting to those clans who will be joining us in Ligonier, Pennsylvania on September 21, 2013.

An Comunn Gàidhealach Ameireaganach, the Gaelic Society of America, visits the games at Ligonier each year, to participate in the celebration of our shared Scottish heritage, by holding its annual Mòd at the games.

A Mòd, meaning "meeting", or "court" in the old Scottish Gaelic, has developed in Scotland to be an event in which fluent speakers, as well as learners, sing, dance, recite prose and poetry, and put on plays, all in Scottish Gaelic, and are assessed and adjudicated in order to find the best of the best. For those who attend, it is a yearly celebration in the language of Scotland preserved and fostered for hundreds of years.

We here in the States who have the Gaelic, and are learning it, have held our own Mod for 25 years, and this year we are keeping the tradition alive! For anyone who attends, it's a great time to listen to native Gaelic speakers, fluent learners, and adventurous newcomers tackling Gaelic songs, stories and poems in competition and at ceilidhs.

In addition, both Gold Medalists from Scotland's Royal National Mod will be attending our event. This year, we will have the honor to welcome the female and male medalists, Eilidh Davies and Calum MacLeòid, brought to us courtesy of An Comunn Gaidhealach, Scotland's Gaelic Society.

We have arranged for rooms at the Antiochian Vil-

lage (http://antiochianvillage.org/) nearby to Ligonier for anyone who would like to stay with us and experience the Mòd from behind the scenes as well. We have a language competition on Friday night, as well as a song workshop on Sunday morning. This is wonderful opportunity to see what Gaelic is about, to experience it first hand, in a warm, welcoming environment. If attending the games and you already have arrangements, we would like to invite you all to stop by and see what we are all about!



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

Orange and Sticky & Yummy

Dundee, Scotland is celebrated in many books and journals as being the place where marmalade was invented. Janet Keiller, the wife of a retired merchant, is alleged to have created the popular breakfast preserve in her shop, inadvertently laying the foundations for a successful family dynasty.

However, conflicting accounts of the rise of the Keillers surfaced in recent years, so in this article we shall look at the alternative story of the Keiller family and possibly modify the popular myth.

The Keiller operation grew from humble beginings, and the truth behind how the family actually started making their famous produce has been somewhat romanticized over the years.

Popular folklore decrees that John Keiller, a retired merchant, was one day walking through the harbor area in Dundee and came across a Spanish ship which had arrived in the port to seek shelter from a storm. From this ship he is said to have bought a quantity of Seville oranges and taken them home to his wife, who used these unfamiliar ingredients to make an orange preserve — but somewhere in the process something went amiss and she ended up with what we know today as Dundee marmalade.

It is generally accepted that the Keillers went from the discovery of marmalade to a factory operation in a remarkably short time; such was the desire and profitability of this new, exotic — but still familiar — product. However, recent research has unearthed the more humble beginnings and arduous rise to profitability of the Keillers — and also discovered a story beset by jealousy and commercial fratricide.

In his book, *The Keiller Dynasty 1800-1879*, academic WM Matthew dispels the romantics' theory and charts how the Keillers rose from a small sweet shop in the Seagate area of Dundee to exporting their product to places as far afield as Shanghai and Sydney.

Janet Keiller specialized in selling jam and pot 'boilings,' with fruit picked from local farms — namely the berry fields of Blairgowrie and the Carse of Gowrie, a 26-mile stretch of rich farmland that separates Dundee from the city of Perth.

The notion that Keiller invented marmalade from scratch is rather suspect, especially as recipes for simi-



lar 'pots' have been traced back to the 1500s; what is more probable is that she, an experienced maker of sweets and jam, used her existing knowledge and new raw materials to put her own particular twist on an existing recipe and came up with the 'orange chip' marmalade we know today.

Janet Keiller eventually handed over the shop to her son, James Keiller, but he still relied heavily on his mother's expertise.

James married a local girl named Barbara Robertson – unfortunately she died in 1817, but he married again within a year, this time to a Margaret Spence, who would eventually have a major impact on the family business.

Margaret Keiller would take control, along with her eldest son Alex, upon her husband's death in 1839 until her own eventual demise in 1850 — by which time the Keiller brand had finally started growing.

In 1845, under the leadership of Alex Keiller, the firm moved from the Seagate, their premises for over 40 years, to Castle Street, where they occupied two buildings — a shop and a factory. This is the first major sign that the enterprise was growing at a decent rate.

Alex was an extremely hard-nosed businessman and, in an attempt to maximize profits and take advantage of the favorable tax conditions, he authorized the purchase of a small property in Guernsey, Channel Islands, which capitalized on the lack of sugar duties and, while managed by his brother William, accounted for one third of the Keiller's net output, although the Guernsey stock always carried the Dundee logo.

Alex Keiller fitted the stereotype of a business tycoon, although to call him a tycoon possibly overstates his importance in the city of Dundee. In a city built around the jute and flax spinning industry, a sector that employed thousands, the Keiller's small operation

The Keillers did much for putting the city of Dundee on the national and international map, but within the city itself they were not recognized as the global brand that they were.

Alex's paranoia about rival businesses and his brother's performance in the Channel Islands would undermine their own relationship and provide a sad end to what should be a success story. William, the appointed proprietor of the Channel Islands operation, was Alex's younger sibling and lacked the business acumen of his older brother. Alex, often dismayed with the lack of profitability recorded in Guernsey, constantly reprimanded his brother for, on occasions, the poor quality of produce, slip-ups in packing which resulted in destroyed goods and, his biggest source of fear, the comparative lack of profitability when placed alongside his own Dundee-based operation. The Guernsey operation, with all its foibles, lasted until 1879 before being



transferred to North Woolwich and brought back under the control of the Dundee plant.

The Keiller name continued to grow, and attracted outside investment well into the 20th Century. They built on their humble beginnings and traded off the notion — which still exists to this day — that Janet Keiller invented marmalade. She may not have invented marmalade but her version of it is one of the best tasting around!



Metes and Bounds by Bryan Mulcahy

"Metes and bounds" is a method of describing land as real property in contrast to personal property. The system has been used in England for many centuries. This practice also was prevalent in the original thirteen colonies that eventually became the United States of America, and throughout the British Empire based on English common law. Metes and bounds was a system commonly used in this era to measure distances and note landmarks.

Up to the time of the Revolutionary War through the beginning of the nineteenth century, land, when parceled out, and sold or granted, was described by metes and bounds and that system is still in existence in the following states, or in those portions which had been sold or granted when the present plan of surveys was adopted: New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Texas and the six New England States. This system also was used throughout the British Empire.

The system of metes and bounds was used in connection with the Rectangular Survey System to describe a tract of land beginning with a specific starting point. The metes and bounds system uses physical features of the local topography, along with directions and distances, to define and describe the boundaries of a parcel of land. The boundaries are described working around the parcel in sequence, from a point of beginning, returning back to the same point.

Legal descriptions may include references to other adjoining parcels and their owners, and may also be referenced in later surveys. At the time the description was written, the boundaries may have been marked on the ground with permanent markings placed where there were no suitable natural landmarks.

The term "metes" refers to a boundary defined by the measurement of each straight run, specified by a distance between the terminal points, and an orientation or direction. A direction may be a simple compass bearing, or a precise orientation determined by accurate survey methods.

The term "bounds" refers to a more general boundary description, such as along a certain watercourse, a stone wall, an adjoining public roadway, or an existing building. The system is often used to define larger pieces of property (e.g. farms), and political subdivisions (e.g. town boundaries) where precise definition is not required or would be far too expensive, or previously designated boundaries can be incorporated into the description.

The ability to understand these types of land records can be very beneficial to genealogy researchers having the time and patience to understand the process. A number of books and websites are available to assist researchers in learning how to use the metes and bounds system. The most difficult issue for many is deciphering the handwriting on the older documents. Several books have been written to assist with this process.



A BRIEF HISTORY OF CLAN DONALD USA John F. McDonald, Jr.

Clan Donald has always been first in the minds of Donald descendents throughout the world. Clan Societies date to the late 1800s with the establishment of the Clan Donald Society of Glasgow in 1889 and the Clan Donald Society of Edinburgh in 1891. While many Donald's immigrated to North America, there was no formal Clan Donald organization until the mid 1950s.

In the 1930s, Major Reginald Henry Macdonald of Kingsburgh, O.B.E. (Retired), a senior cadet of Sleat and personal friend of Lord Alexander Macdonald, relocated with his wife from their home in New Zealand to Pittsburgh, PA. He became a United States citizen in 1940. In 1954, he returned to South Uist for the unveiling of a memorial to his Great-Great-Grandmother, Flora McDonald. During this visit, the Right Honorable Alexander Godfrey Macdonald of Macdonald, Lord Macdonald, High Chief of Clan Donald, asked his friend Reginald to establish a Clan Donald Society in the United States. On August 31, 1954, Lord Macdonald commissioned Reginald as his High Commissioner in the United States.

Upon his return he enlisted the aid of many Mac Donald's in Pittsburgh and with their help, they formed the Clan Donald Educational and Charitable Trust on December 15, 1955. This Trust sponsored the Clan Donald Games in Ligonier PA, later to be known as the Ligonier Highland Games.

On November 8, 1956, The Clan Donald Society of America was incorporated in Pennsylvania. Together with many MacDonald's from throughout the eastern US, he appointed regional commissioners. Together with Nestor (Mac) McDonald, Agnes MacRae Morton and Donald MacDonald, he helped establish the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games.

In the succeeding years with the assistance of Bill (Crusty Bill) McDonald of New York together with James A. McDonald our Genealogist and many others, Clan Donald grew throughout the United States.

Reginald died in 1964 and was succeeded by his deputy, Robert E. MacDonald of St. Louis. Robert was president of a large construction company and traveled extensively throughout the world. His company constructed the St. Louis Arch. In 1971 while traveling overseas he died leaving the office of High Commis-



sioner vacant.

In 1970, Lord Alexander Macdonald died and his son Lord Godfrey James Macdonald, our present High Chief matriculated to the Arms of High Chief of Clan Donald. Lord and Lady Macdonald first visited the US in 1971 and were greeted by Bill and Ruth Mc-Donald. Nestor McDonald invited them to be guests of Honor at the Grandfather games and while there were introduced to Ellice and Rosa McDonald. Ellice and Rose invited them back to their home "Invergarry" in Delaware. While there "Crusty" Bill spoke of the vacancy of a High Commissioner. Upon Bill's advice, Lord Macdonald appointed Robertson McDonald of Nashville TN, Bill's cousin, as High Commissioner. Nestor McDonald remained as Deputy High Commissioner. Nestor had been offered the position as High Commissioner but declined due to business responsibilities.

Robertson was an enthusiastic High Commissioner and Clan Donald flourished. Robertson however due to reasons of health, was forced to resign in 1976. Once again we were left without a High Commissioner, Nestor again declining the HC position.

It was a period of great concern until Lord Macdonald convinced Ellice to be High Commissioner. The morning after Ellice accepted, he awoke to say "What have I done?"

Ellice "jumped into" the responsibilities of the Office immediately. He solicited and received the tremendous support of Clan men and women through the United States. He initially divided the US into 12 Regions later to become 13. He reincorporated Clan Donald in Delaware and wrote the Bi-Laws under which we presently operate. These have been revised many times since that initial filing. An important Article in the By-Laws is that the High Chief appoints the High Commissioner and Deputy High Commissioner. This had been the practice to that time but this formalized the practice. Thus CDUSA is not a Society with elected officials but an extension of the Clan in Scotland. This makes Clan Donald USA unique of all clan societies in the US where their officials are elected.

Ellice established and published By Sea By Land which we still enjoy today. He named Robertson High Commissioner Emeritus and Nestor Deputy High Emer-Douglas Murdock of California was appointed Deputy High Commissioner. Ellice formalized CDUSA's representation at Highland Games with the tents which have become the focus of welcome and refreshment for visiting Clan members.

Ellice stepped down on January 1, 1983 and Doug was appointed HC with John F. McDonald Jr. as **Deputy HC.**

1979 saw the first AGM outside of the Grandfather Games which was held at the Ligonier Highland Games. This AGM established the structure of workshops and meetings which is the format today. Following the 1980 AGM, it has been the practice to hold AGM's throughout the US, including Alaska, hosted by the various regions.

Through the succeeding years financial stability has been obtained with life and annual dues accountability. A Scholarship recognizing excellence in Piping, Drumming, Celtic Fiddle is awarded annually as well as the Clan Donald Cultural Scholarship. These together with the Clan Donald Academic Scholarship, sponsored by the Clan Donald Foundation are available to members of CDUSA, their children and family members.

The Clan Donald Archives and Genealogy records reside at the Odem Library in Moultrie, GA with our three branches through the US. There are many other additions to CDUSA which have occurred since it's humble beginning in 1956 and we continue to grow.

We were the first Clan organization in the US and we remain the largest and most successful to this

Tartans to the Arctic

Travelling 150 miles north of the Arctic Circle to talk for 40 minutes on tartans seems

a little excessive but that's just what Crieffbased Brian Wilton of the Scottish Tartans Authority did very recently.

It took one car, three coaches and two aircraft to reach the northern town of Harstad on the country's largest island just off the north-west coast of Norway.

"The Northern Norwegian Artists Centre organise an annual seminar" explained Brian, "and this year decided to hold a Scottish evening during which they could learn more of the history of Scotland through that of tartan.

There is a great cultural affinity between Norway and Scotland - their isolated fjords tend to equate to our remote Highland glens and they speak of Viking Chieftains just as we talk of Clan Chieftains.

During the 16th and 17th centuries there was also much trade between Caithness and Norway.

Friendly relations seemed to break down in 1612 however when a Scottish mercenary expedition of some 300 men landed in southern Norway en route to fight for the king of Sweden. They were ambushed by about 400 Norwegian farmers and at the end of the slaughter that marked the Battle of Kringen, only about 15 Scots remained. One of them was apparently a weaver and is said to have taught the art and the craft of tartan to the local inhabitants which has resulted in many tartans and tartan-like designs being incorporated into many of Norway's bunads - regional costumes.


