The passing of a Chief...

Danus Skene of Skene is gone and will be greatly missed

Danus Skene of Skene, the Chief of the Clan Skene and the SNP candidate for Shetland who narrowly lost against Alistair Carmichael in last year's general election, has passed away.

The 72 year old died in the early hours of Friday morning, August 19, 2016, after undergoing surgery in London, the local party branch has confirmed.

Local party convenor Robbie McGregor paid tribute to Skene saying he was deeply sorry that he and the SNP had lost a good friend and servant.

"Our thoughts at this time are with his family to whom we extend our deepest sympathy."

Despite still recovering from earlier heart surgery Skene also stood against sitting MSP Tavish Scott in this year's Scottish Parliament elections and lost heavily.

First Minister Nicola Sturgeon paid tribute to Skene by calling him one of the SNP's "finest".

She said in a statement: "Sad to hear Danus Skene has passed away. My thoughts with his family and friends."

MP Alistair Carmichael described Skene's passing as "sad news" and a loss "across the political spectrum".

"I know that Danus had not kept good health for some time, but when I spoke to him last month he appeared to be



on the mend and was clearly enjoying time with his family who were then in Shetland," he said.

"He was a very intelligent man who was passionate about his politics but was always reasoned in his argument.

"He will be missed by his many friends across the political spectrum and throughout Scotland and also in Africa where he had a longstanding and very practical commitment."

Shetland MSP Tavish Scott added: "I am sad to hear that Danus Skene has passed away and would express my condolences to his family, friends and party colleagues here in Shetland."

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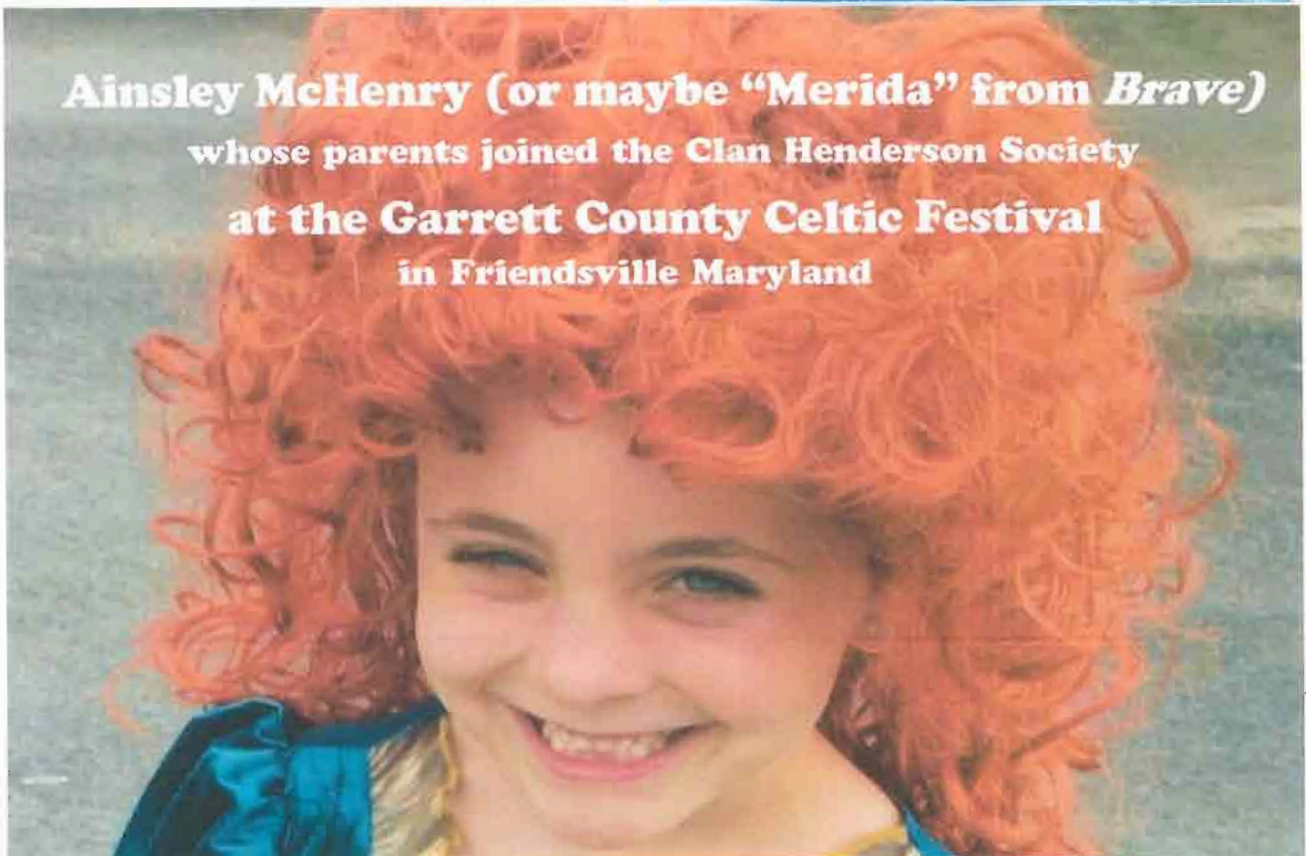

Robina Barton, who contested this year's Scottish election in Shetland for Labour, said she was "devastated" by the news of her friend.

"Although we didn't see eye to eye politically, I had a great respect for him. He was

a good man and a decent human being," she said.

"I feel very sad today because we had meant to get together sometime to discuss the aftermath of the Scottish elections and the EU referendum. I've been busy lately and I never quite found the time, which is something I will always regret. I'd like to send my deepest sympathy to his family."

Gerry McGarvey, who represented Labour in the 2015 general election, said Skene was a "scholar and a gentleman".

His Conservative opponent in that election, Donald Cameron, added that the SNP man was an "intelligent, kind and gentlemanly opponent".

In last year's Westminster election, Skene managed to bring the Liberal Democrats' majority down from 9,928 to 817 votes.

In May this year, Skene came second to Tavish Scott in the Scottish Parliament vote in Shetland with 23.1 per cent of the vote.

He twice fought for a Westminster seat for the

Liberal Democrats - in North Tayside back in 1983, and in Moray four years later.

Skene was born in Dundee and first worked as a history and modern studies teacher. He then became an education official at Tayside regional council.

He has also served on the board of the Scottish Qualification Authority, and also worked in schools abroad in Israel and Kenya.

In 2015 he stood down as chairman of the board of Shetland Arts to focus on his Westminster election campaign.

Former director of the organisation Gwilym Gibbons described Skene as a "gentle, caring man with a passion for life and a huge intellect".

The last time Danus was at the Stone Mountain Highland Games...maybe 5 years ago, afterwards, dear friends, Ralph and Dorna Comp, along with Danus, came home with us.

I was sure to make a chair for Danus' guest room that was covered in Skene tartan.

We had such a good time. Dorna and I were measuring drapery fabric and crawling around on the floor...and Danus was making music with his wonderful fife. Tom and Ralph were laughing.

I made Polish Meatballs...and we just enjoyed the time together.

Danus Skene of Skene was a good friend for a very long time and a dear, dear man.

He will be missed by many.

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Fifty Years between photographs!



When Dave Glover first visited the Royal Military Tattoo, he was a wide-eyed toddler enthralled by a dashing Queen's Guard at Edinburgh Castle.

Now, 50 years later, the Canadian piper has recreated the treasured family snap minutes before he performed with the Vancouver Police Department (VPD) at the world famous Edinburgh Tattoo event.

Dave was just three years old when he visited the Tattoo with his parents in 1966.

His dad sent him the image of Dave with the Queen's Guard before he returned to Scotland last week and told him to do the same again.

And yesterday he was delighted to make his wish come true. Dave, 52, said: "My dad sent me that photograph two weeks prior to us coming to Edinburgh.

"He said I should try to recreate the photo. When we got to the castle on Friday night we saw a guardsman and he was more than happy to do it.

"I stood exactly where we were 50 years ago.

Who would have thought when that picture was taken I would be back here now performing with VPD Pipe Band in the Military Tattoo.

"My dad will be so proud to see that picture. He's 79 years old and still lives with my mother in Trail, British Columbia. He's going to be so thrilled."

Dave, whose grandfather was born in Riccarton, near Kilmarnock, came to Scotland in the summer of 1966.

The VPD Pipe Band is performing at the Tattoo for the third time, having first been invited to the Edinburgh spectacular in 1980 and again in 1999.

This year's event pays a special tribute to the Queen's 90th birthday.

Dave added: "I performed in 1999 but I didn't know about that picture then or much about my visit here. "It's very special for me.

"My grandfather played the drums and my father's a piper."



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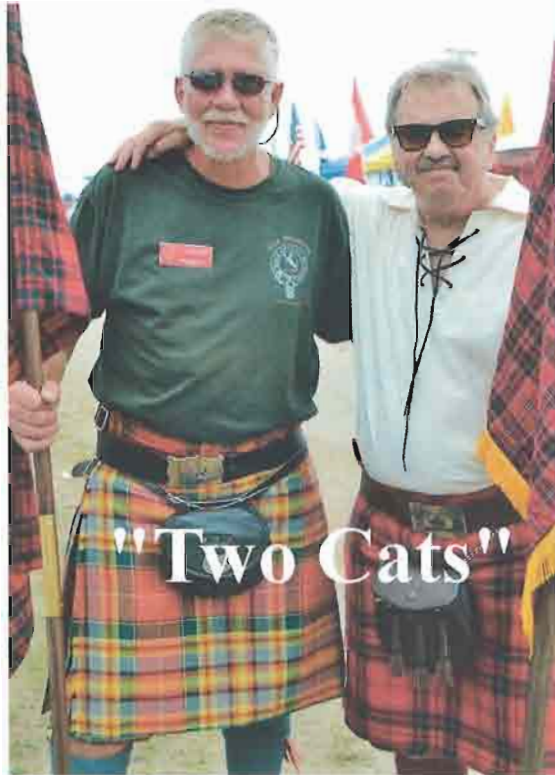

Each Clan has the cat in its own particular pose.



The Clan motto is "Touch not the cat bot a glove" - "bot" meaning without. A stern warning to anyone threatening Clan Chattan or its members.

Clan Chattan Badge: The plant badge worn by clansmen is the Red Whortleberry which is found in abundance in forests, moors and in the slopes of the hills of Clan Chattan Country.

In Gaelic it is known as *Lus nam braoileg*; in Latin, *Vaccinium vitisidaea* and elsewhere the Cowberry.

It flowers from May to August and from then until October produces a berry which gradually turns from green to a deep red.

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Female lone piper makes history at Edinburgh Military tattoo

Scottish Soldier Lance Bombardier Megan Beveridge has made piping history, becoming the first regular army female Lone Piper to perform at the Edinburgh Military Tattoo.

The 21-year-old piper is also the youngest person – and only woman – to pass the Army Pipe Major’s course.

Standing on Edinburgh Castle ramparts, she took her place in the spotlight in front of an 8800-strong audience.

And after the famous massed pipes and drums on the Esplanade fell silent Megan played the lament *Sleep Dearie Sleep* at the end of the finale.

This is cited by many Tattoo-goers as the most moving and uplifting part of the show and is one of the greatest honours that any Army Piper can hope to achieve.

Megan is a member of 19 Regiment Royal Artillery, The Scottish Gunners, who are unusual in the fact that they are not an Infantry or a Royal Armoured



Corps Regiment, but still have a Pipes and Drums on their strength.

Women can serve in Artillery Regiments in the Army, so Megan chose The Scottish Gunners as her Regiment to further improve her prospects as a Piper.

Megan has been playing the pipes since she was nine years old. She joined the Army when she left school at 16 before going on to join the Royal Artillery.

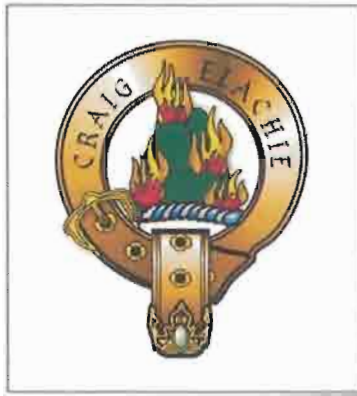
Before each performance of the Tattoo, the Lone Piper has to welcome the Salute Taker for that show.

They perform the Ceremony of the Gaelic Toast, where the Piper and Salute Taker each have a Quaich (Scottish drinking cup) of whisky, the Piper recites the Gaelic Toast (welcoming the Salute Taker to the Castle, wishing them, the Queen and everyone there the best of health) and then they drink together. The Piper then gives a salute and the Salute Taker takes their seat.

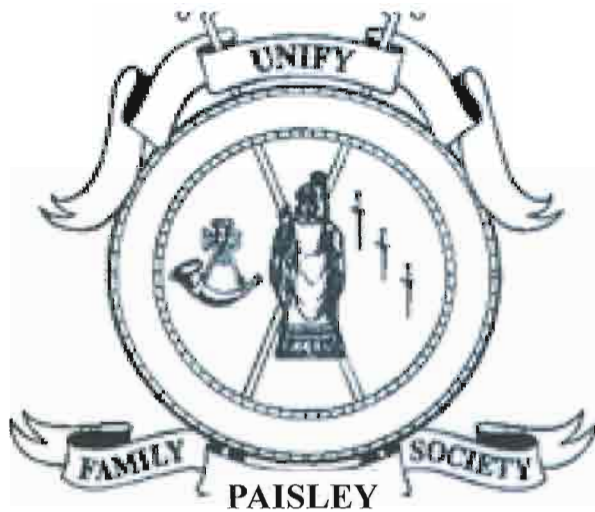

"I'm more nervous about the Gaelic Toast than about the piping," said Megan,

Megan is the first woman from a Regular Army Pipes and Drums to take on the role, which is normally reserved for the infantry and Royal Armoured Corps – parts of the Army that will only start accepting women later this year for the first time.

Being the first woman to have achieved her Pipe Major's qualification, she hopes she won't be the last.

She said: "I hope that I've inspired other female Pipers to join the Army. It's a great job and I'm really pleased to be able to do it."

The Chiefly Arms of Paisley of Westerlea

The Paisleys are a family of considerable antiquity, having been associated with Lochwinnoch and Paisley (parts of what later became Renfrewshire), with Cunningham and Kyle (North Ayrshire), Innerwick (East Lothian) and Roxburghshire, since the time of William I King of Scots 1165 - 1214.

William I Paisley (died ante 28 September 1171) and William II Paisley (killed in battle ante 1218) were prominent in the following of the first three hereditary stewards of Scotland, while William II Paisley is also noticed attending the itinerant court of the King of Scots during 1179 - 95.

Separate and quite distinct branches of the family had already developed at Lochwinnoch and Paisley and in the Roxburghshire barony of Hawick before the end of King David Bruce's reign in 1371 and the beginnings of others are found in records for Edinburgh and the three Lothians from 1389 onwards and at Dunrod near Borgue (Kirkcudbrightshire) in still Gaelic speaking Galloway from 1585.

Sympathies and condolences to the family of **Eleanor Turnbull Sassano.**

Eleanor passed away August 9 at the age of 95. She leaves behind five children, 16 grandchildren and 13 great grand children.

Eleanor, or Ellie, as she was called, was the youngest daughter of Wallace and Therese Turnbull and sister of Kay, Janet and Marge.

She was married to Joseph Matthew Sassano for 59 years before his death in 2006.

Many of her grandchildren carry the middle name of Turnbull. She will be greatly missed.

Anne Walsh, who broke through gender barriers as a reporter covering the home front during World War II and later became a fixture in journalism in Phoenix, has died at the age of 93.

Walsh was a pioneering reporter and part of a family of journalists. Her husband, Mason, served as managing editor, general manager and publisher of the *Phoenix Gazette* and *Arizona Republic*, and two of her children, Kevin and Peggy, worked as bureau chiefs for The Associated Press.

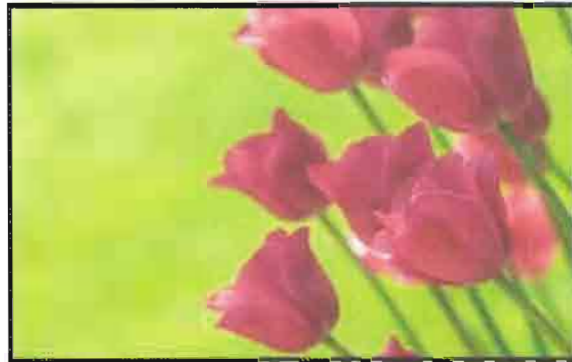
Walsh was hired as a reporter at the *Dallas Times Herald* in 1940s at a time when very few women were working in journalism. She was initially given mundane tasks like weather reports, church notes and obituaries, but took on more coveted assignments as the U.S. was plunged into war, covering government

agencies, housing issues and labor relations.

"They decided to take a chance on satisfying my hunger to report the news on the street," she said in a newspaper profile in 1946.

Her byline soon became a regular presence on the front pages of the Dallas paper as she landed interviews with oil tycoon H.L. Hunt, labor organizer Walter Reuther and actor Victor Mature. *Mademoiselle* magazine profiled her and other women in journalism in 1946, noting the strides they had made but the looming challenges as men returned from the war and reclaimed jobs.

"Women will be able to retain that portion of their gain which they want to retain," she said in the interview. "There may have to be some backtracking, some moving out for returned servicemen. It appears, though, that businesses have expanded enough that any woman who wants to stay in her job, and who has proved herself capable, will have a place."



Walsh moved to Phoenix in 1961 when her husband became managing editor of the *Gazette*, an afternoon paper that closed in 1997.

She wrote a book review column from 1962 to 1976 at the paper and remained active in Arizona journalism as her husband ran the *Republic* and *Gazette*.

She remained a news junkie up until her death last week, regularly watching *CNN* and reading two newspapers a day from her home in the Arcadia neighborhood of Phoenix.

Donald, in their Bluebirds. I even turned one of my Bloodhound kits into a model of Sir Malcolm's Bluebird that was the first car to break 300 mph.



And I recently read "My Speed King," the autobiography of Donald by his wife, Tania Bern-Campbell, who saw him through a 1955 World Water Speed Record in one of the Bluebird boats at Coniston Water in the British Lake District, through a horrendous crash at Bonneville while pursuing the WLSR, through the incredible year of 1964 when he broke both the land and water records in Australia, and back to Coniston for another record attempt in 1967, that resulted in his death.

Donald's Bluebird CN7, the first car to exceed 400 miles per hour, was one of the most technologically advanced vehicles, relative to its era, in history. Adrian Newey, well recognized Formula One designer, has described the CN7, as one of the biggest ever automotive advances, and "arguably, for its time, the most advanced vehicle." Campbell prepared a revolutionary car featuring advanced aluminum honeycomb chassis, fully independent suspension and four wheel drive. It was also the first true ground effects car. It was the last WLSR holder to be wheel driven rather than thrust driven, as all subsequent record holders were jet or rocket powered. The car was designed to exceed 500 mph, but track conditions held Campbell to just a bit over 400. Newey claims that the car was so advanced, that were it to be dusted off and freshened up, that it could still, today, break the world record for a wheel driven car.....50 years after it last ran. Unfortunately, Campbell died before he got to run her a second time.

On my way to collect Wendy on her return to the UK, I made a side trip to visit Coniston Water.



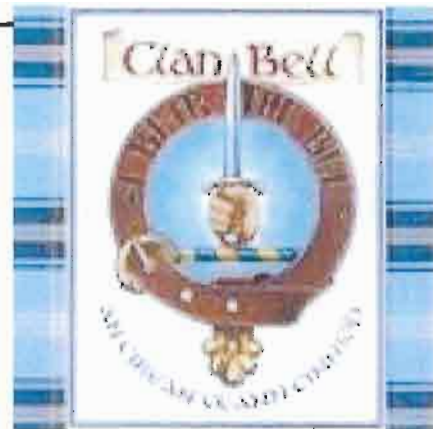
I stayed in the Black Bull Inn, one of the places Donald and Tania stayed during the record attempts. I ate dinner at the Sun Hotel, the other hotel they utilized. It was very strange to be in the places that I had read about, and that one of my heroes had frequented during the height of his career. The locals are very cognizant of the speed history of their town and lake.

This old West Marche Riding Clan, one of the Border Clans from the early 1100s, were retainers of Clan Douglas and also allied with the best Border families through blood and friendship. Their land holdings were extensive. To survive on the often invaded Borders, they engaged in the "rieving" of the period and participated in many battles against the English.



Declared "unruly" by the Scottish Parliament, many of the Clan were "encouraged" to emigrate to the Ulster Plantation in Northern Ireland after 1610.

After William Bell, called "Redcloak" and Chief of the Clan died in 1627, the chiefship became dormant. Without leadership, the Bells ceased to exist as a viable clan.

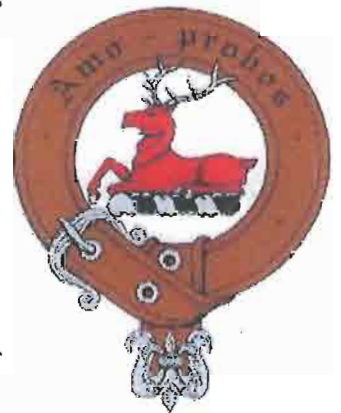

There were two Americans in the contest, one of whom was the defending world heavy champion, and they each won a pair of the events. But the title this year went to (oh horror !) an Englishman.

There were also foot races and bike races for all age groups, sack races for the kids, and naturally a highland dancing competition.

Their 2008 platinum album was recorded in Iraq, making it the first professional album ever recorded in a conflict zone. They have been around quite a while. Note they all wear black Canadian bearskin hats....except the bass drummer, who wears a white Polar Bear one presented to the corps by the Tsar of Russia, when they performed before him.....in 1894.

Another notable event of summer in Caithness is the annual open garden day at Dunbeath Castle. It is a privately owned castle, and closed to the public.....except one weekend a year, when the incredible gardens are open to the public. They have quite a reputation, and it is well deserved.
