Cheri Daniels, MSLS, serves as Director of Library & Archives for the National SAR (Sons of the American Revolution) Genealogical Research Library located at the national SAR headquarters in downtown Louisville, Kentucky. Spanning a career of over 30 years, Ms. Daniels has worked in various types of libraries and archives, while managing several genealogy programs and projects along the way. When she is not writing, researching, and speaking on the national stage, she is producing and hosting her own podcast, "BloodRoot," to share stories from her own genealogy journey. Ms. Daniels is also a contributing author to the book, "Genealogy and the Librarian," published in 2018. Ms. Daniels' presentation was quite impressive, and her colorful PowerPoint slides were outstanding. She began with a short discussion about the Boston Harbor Tea event, and then included how tea became an important beverage and social event in America. Origins of the protocol of tea parties, including the type of clay from Asia used to make china, to the evolution in Britain of elegant tea cups with fine designs, were explained in detail. She brought with her a lovely assortment of tea and biscuits/cookies, some of which were from Scottish merchants. She entertained many questions and comments near the end of her presentation.



The Rev. Allan Wallace came to St. Paul's as our Rector in June of 2022 after completing a two-year curacy at St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church in Zionsville, Indiana. Prior to serving in ordained ministry, Rev. Allan was a paramedic working in Emergency Medical Services for over 20 years. Rev. Allan attained his Master of Divinity at Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis and his Anglican Studies diploma from Bexley Seabury Seminary in Chicago, all while serving congregations and working full-time as a paramedic. Rev. Allan graduated in May 2020 amid the Covid pandemic and was ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church on June 20, 2020, by The Rt. Rev. Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows, Bishop in The Episcopal Diocese of Indianapolis.

Rev. Wallace will present information about Samuel Seabury, the Scottish Episcopal Church and the American Episcopal Church. He will be familiar to our members who have participated in the Kirkings at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in New Albany, Indiana.
