SSL Membership Minutes

President Wilson started the meeting at 7:06pm and asked Program and Education Commissioner Robbin Goodin to introduce our speaker. She read a short biography for The Right Honorable Lord Lyon of Arms . Robbin told us to put questions in the chat, and she would ask The Lord Lyon during the question-and-answer session.

The Lord Lyon told us about the court, and showed us a picture of his coat of arms. He said he initially had complaints about the saltire being used in his coat of arms, but he tabled the complaints until they stopped coming in. I missed getting a picture of his coat of arms.

Heraldry

Heraldry is part of the Law of Scotland, and has rights enforceable under law. The Lord Lyon can confiscate any items bearing someone else's coat of arms. He said this happens more often than you might think. Besides being part of the law, heraldry is an art and a science that tells the history of Scotland, but also the present-day origins of places, institutions, families and individuals.

The Lord Lyon told us that when he is in court to settle legal matters, he wears a horsehair wig which he dislikes as it is hot and scratchy. He said he has had to go far back in genealogy to determine who will inherit when a titled person dies. Sometimes relationships are tricky.



He recounted an instance in which a titled widow died after having remarried. She had a son from each marriage, and it turned out that the first son was fathered by her second husband, and the second son was fathered by her first husband. The Lord Lyon had to use DNA information to determine who was the father of each child. What a mess that was!

The Public Register

There are centuries of heraldic documents which include Grants of Arms, Registers, Seals and other documents. These all express the historic progress of different aspects of Scotland. He pointed out that heraldry is all around you in Scotland, in palaces, private homes, churchyards, and other public places.

The rules of heraldry are taken from the need to be recognized in battle. The blazon describes the Arms. Only one person at a time can bear a coat of arms. There is no such thing as a family coat of arms, though there are civic arms for community councils, universities, states and societies. Arms must be granted in Scotland by the Lord Lyon. There are penalties for Arms not granted by the Lord Lyon.

The Lord Lyon showed us several pictures of various coats of arms. Here are a few.









Letters Patent

Patent letters prove that you have a coat of arms, and are provided when an individual applies to the Lord Lyon for a coat of arms.

He showed us a patent letter from his best customer; the man gets a separate coat of arms for each of his children. He has 11 so far. The Lord Lyon told the man's wife he would give her a free coat of arms for herself if she had another child!



This was followed by a question-and-answer session.

-*Are you over all the UK heraldry?* No, just Scotland. He doesn't have to deal with the English.

-*What would a person need to do to get a coat of arms?* Contact his office, his staff will explain what needs to be done. He suggested reading his website to get more information as well. He tells applicants to keep their arms simple, follow the family name, and approach one of the Officers of Arms.

-*Who does the research for a coat of arms?* The Lord Lyon does this himself.

-*How long is his term of office?* His title is for life, or until he retires.

-*What qualifications did he need to become Lord Lyon?* The applicant must be a lawyer and have served as a judge, as some cases are quite serious. The Lord Lyon is chosen by open selection (vote) not appointed. He said there is a good bit of competition for the title.

-Jack Bowling commented that he is fascinated by heraldry. He knows that in early times shields were painted in black and white, with cross-hatching of different styles to designate colors. They had a short discussion about this. The Lord Lyon has an extensive knowledge of heraldry, as you can imagine.

The Lord Lyon asked what clans we represented, and we responded via chat; Hay, Gunn, Wilson, Leslie, McAllister, Drummond, McDonald, Rose, Keith, Murray, Guthrie, Dunlap, Campbell, Baird, Home, MacLaurin, Kentucky, MacKay, Cameron, Grant, McFritz, Hamilton, MacKintosh, Ogilvie, Davidson, Stewart and McKay.

The Lord Lyon thanked us for having him speak to us, and we let him know how much we enjoyed his presentation.

The Scottish Society of Louisville and “*The Living Scotland*”

During the 26 July 2022 general meeting we had the rare honor of hosting **The Right Honourable the Lord Lyon, King of Arms**. He spoke to us about his background, his job, his council, and of course heraldry. As he wrapped up his presentation, he shared a few words with us about what it means to be Scots outside of Scotland, or part of “*The Living Scotland*”, and the principles and values on which Scottish heritage functions. He further explained that within Scottish heritage there is an emphasis on kindness, hospitality and generosity, and that we as the members of *The Living Scotland* live our lives through these principles and values, or more specifically, support, equality, hospitality and generosity.

I thought his words were very poignant, especially considering what The Scottish Society of Louisville (SSL) is all about. With that said, I wanted to share a brief refresher on SSL’s mission and how Lord Lyon’s words apply to us. First of all, SSL’s mission is to provide educational, cultural, and recreational programs and activities that increase public awareness of Scottish, Scots-Irish and Celtic traditions, culture and history.

We achieve this in a variety of ways including: Monthly educational meetings (open to the public); Various social events throughout the year such as Burns Night; Scholarships for Scottish related activities such as genealogical studies; Awarding excellence in Scottish dance, athletic and musical studies; and Participating in public events such as Highlands Games, festivals, etc. All of these activities are accomplished through the combined efforts of volunteers. As to the values Lord Lyon pointed out, I can unequivocally vouch for the generosity, support, and hospitality of our volunteers. It takes lots of time to put monthly meetings together, maintain websites and social media pages, publish newsletters, maintain membership data and collect annual dues, and be a presence at Scots and Celtic events, amongst all the other tasks and activities we complete each year.

August Presentation

Join us during the August general meeting for a presentation from Dr. Glen Taul on Ephraim McDowell in Scotland.

In case you don't know, Dr. Ephraim McDowell (1771 – 1830) was an American physician who grew up and practiced in Danville, KY. He is credited as the "father of modern abdominal surgery" after performing the first successful abdominal surgery (without the benefit of anesthesia). Dr. McDowell was educated in both Virginia and Scotland. This presentation will focus specifically on his time at the University of Edinburgh including his life while in Edinburgh, and the lectures he attended that prepared him to perform the ground breaking operation.

Dr. Glen Taul is retired from the academic world. He earned a Ph.D. in American History from the University of Kentucky, and a master's degree in American Studies from Baylor University. He has published articles in the areas of family, Kentucky, western American, Appalachian, and British history. Dr Taul has deep family roots in Kentucky. His research interests at present are writing a biography of Dr. McDowell, editing the memoirs of Micah Taul, a contemporary of Henry Clay, writing a triple biography that will include his six-times great grandmother, his grandmother, and his mother (all Tauls and all named Mary).
