Mr. Shetter was dressed in appropriate historical attire, which included painting his face. His presentation was historically informative, well-done, and held everyone's attention. He was whole-heartedly thanked by the membership.

Steve's bio states: "Steve Shetter, Jr., from Indiana, is a Film maker/Videographer, and Certified Chef." He writes: "After watching a few episodes of Outlander with Mindy, I became interested in the battles and bravery in the 1700's. Mindy bought my first kilt and I soon acquired my first bits of arms. The hand to hand combat intrigued me as well as close quarter skirmishes. Looking into weapons and strategies of battles has led me to gaining an interest into blacksmithing. That is my next personal adventure, creating my own weapons."

Mr. Shetter introduced member Mr. Jack Bowling, former Regional Celtic Commissioner, announcing that he would be presenting on The Battle of Culloden. Mr. Bowling shared about his involvement with "reenactments." He was fully dressed in dazzling Scottish attire showing the best of Highlander military dress. Mr. Bowling announced that the Highlander's type of military dress included several different tartans, colors, a clan flower in his cap, weapons and bags, and an elaborate scarf to indicate stunningly beautiful military attire. We were also told that the Highlander men entered into battle very confident, proud, wanting to be noticed, and were dressed as flamboyantly as a "Peacock!" Mr. Bowling's presentation received much applause and thanks!



Some weapons, a targe (shield), and several books our presenters brought for their presentation. Included were a basket-hilt sword and a dagger.





Steve Shetter, Jr. with a beautifully decorated sword. His clothing illustrates what a Highlander might have worn to battle; a kilt, leather arm braces, a padded vest over his shirt, a wide belt to hold weapons, and knee high stockings. Face and body paint was often worn, as well as decorative silver bands in his beard. Jack Bowling, showing how to hold a targe, basket hilt sword, and dagger. He wore a kilt, sporran, soft wool cap, and knee high stockings. He also discussed the several long and short knives worn by Highlanders. It was common for men to wear 4 or 5 knives.


Women wore a neck knife both for defense and for use in household chores.

Steve Shetter, Jr. also brought a chain mail shirt, and explained how it was worn. He told us about other items worn in battle, such as a chain mail head covering that protected the throat and shoulders, as well. These were usually worn by cavalry, as they are very heavy.

Happy Genealogy Day, all ye researchers!

For those interested in tracing Scottish heritage, there is a wide variety of resources that can help trace Scottish ancestors. Scotland has some of the best kept, and oldest parish records in the most legible handwriting! Here are some:

- Scotland's People: The official Scottish genealogy resource, offering access to the national records of Scotland. It includes birth, marriage, and death records, census records, and wills and testaments, among other documents.
- 2. FamilySearch: Sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, this free website offers a vast collection of records, including Scottish church records, civil registration, and census records.
- 3. Ancestry.com: While it requires a subscription for full access, this popular site has extensive Scottish records, including parish records, censuses, and emigration and immigration records.
- 4. The National Archives of Scotland (NAS): Offers access to historical records of Scotland. While not all records are available online, the website provides valuable information about the collections and how to access them.
- 5. ScotlandsPlaces: A resource for those interested in the geography of Scotland, offering historical tax rolls, Ordnance Survey Name Books, and maps that can help place ancestors in specific locations at certain times.
- 6. The Scottish Genealogy Society: Based in Edinburgh, this society has an extensive library and offers advice for genealogical research. Their website includes resources and information for those tracing their Scottish ancestry.
- 7. Electric Scotland: A comprehensive site with information on Scottish history, clans, tartans, and genealogy. It includes biographies, historical accounts, and links to other relevant resources.
- 8. GENUKI Scotland: Provides a virtual reference library of genealogical information of particular relevance to the UK and Ireland. It is a non-commercial service, maintained by a charitable trust and a group of volunteers.
- 9. The Clan DNA Project: Various Scottish clans have DNA projects aimed at exploring genetic heritage and connecting modern-day descendants with their ancient lineage. Websites like Family Tree DNA also host suck projects.

November 14, 1935 – May 18, 2024


Obituary

Rev. Stuart was an Honorably Retired member of the Presbytery of Ohio Valley (Indiana) having served the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in various capacities beginning in New York City in 1956 and extending to her retirement from the Grammer, Indiana Presbyterian Church in 1997.

Irene may be remembered for her years of community service in New Jersey as an EMT, leader of Cubs, Girl Scouts, and 4-Hers, Christian Education, Synod of New Jersey/New England Music Camp Director, choral and orchestral participant and Pastor and Supply Minister in New York, New Jersey, and Indiana. Irene and her husband, Jack were members of The Scottish Society of Louisville; she served as secretary and he served as treasurer. She and her family raised several rescue dogs and puppies for The Seeing Eye.

Irene attended First Presbyterian Church in Scottsburg and was a longtime friend of Henryville United Methodist Church. She married John D. "Jack" Stuart in 1960. He passed in 2015. She is survived by daughter Deanna J., son John L. (Jyll), brother John (Lynda) Moser and William (Ellen) Moser, granddaughters Gabrielle and Ana Stuart, nieces Holly (Frank) Congiusta and Katherine (John) Hughes, and grandnieces and grandnephews Elizabeth, Frank, and Robert Congiusta.
