President Wilson's Remarks, February 28, 2023

We also need someone to replace Robbin Goodin as the Program and Education Commissioner and also to replace Holley Holland as the Membership Commissioner. These openings will be members appointed by the Board to finish the last year of these 2-year terms, so please let anyone on the Board know if you are interested.

We have had questions about absentee ballots. We have never used them, and our Manual of Operations (MOO) does not address their use. Therefore, no absentee ballots will be allowed. We do have a committee currently updating the MOO, and absentee ballots will be addressed in the new Manual.

Nominations and voting are very important! We need our members to participate in voting and as volunteers.

These are my last newsletter remarks; I am not running for office again. I want all the members of the SSL to know how rewarding this elected position has been for me. It is the only way to really have a chance to understand how the society works, and is worth the time and effort. I want to thank everyone on the Board for their hard work, great ideas, and willingness to put in the time and effort to make this organization what it is today. I have been proud to serve the Society for the last four years, and look forward to continue supporting the SSL as an active member and volunteer.

SSL Elections

Secretary Linda Wilson wants to remind everyone that the election of officers is coming up at the March 2023 membership meeting. Those officers are **president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary**. Their term of office is 2 years. Mr. Wilson will not run for president again. Dianne Holland has agreed to run for president, so we need a candidate for vice president. Cheri Eskridge will run for treasurer and Linda Wilson will run for secretary.

We need to replace our **Membership Commissioner**. Holley Holland has been doing a wonderful job keeping Membership up to date, but as Social Media Commissioner, she already has her hands full.

We also need to replace our **Education and Program Commissioner**. Robbin Goodin has resigned, effective March 2023. She has all the programs for this year scheduled, and will help the new commissioner with contacts and other information. She has served on the Board for eight years, and done a wonderful job. We will sorely miss her.

SSL Elections

CURRENT ELECTED OPEN BOARD MEMBER POSITIONS:

President: Presides at all meetings of the Scottish Society and the Board. He/she will be the primary public representative of The Society.

VICE PRESIDENT: Assists and acts on behalf of the President and chairs the Heritage Fund Committee.

SECRETARY: Shall keep all written records of The Society, including minutes of meetings, and such resolutions as are necessary for the business of The Society. Regular reports shall be made to The Society. A copy of the minutes of all business proceedings will be provided to the President and the Archivist within 30 days of the meeting.

TREASURER: The Treasurer shall keep all financial records, and shall report regularly to The Society regarding its financial status. He/she shall chair the finance committee.

Biographical Information — Alan Hay


Bio for February virtual membership meeting presenter—Alan Hay

Alan Hay was born and bred on a farm on the Aberdeenshire coast, in the rural North East of Scotland, the descendant of many generations of farmers and crofters from that part of the country.

Educated at the universities of Aberdeen and Stirling, he has been writing, speaking and thinking about Scotland's history and topography for the best part of 40 years.

He is Archivist of Clan Hay, a Fellow of both the Royal Society of Arts and of the Society of Antiquaries, and is Chairman of The Royal Celtic Society, an Edinburgh-based organization dedicated to preserving and promoting the languages, literature, music and culture of Scotland, founded more than 200 years ago.

Talk title – **Aberdeenshire Connections of the Future King of England**



SSL Virtual Membership Meeting Minutes, 2-28-2023

Program and Education Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our speaker, Alan Hay, who was presenting from Scotland.

The Aberdeenshire Connections of the Future King of England

Mr. Hay provided us with extensive information related to the backgrounds of Prince William's relatives from Aberdeenshire, his mother, Princess Diana's ancestors.

He went back to the 1600's, giving us interesting background on her relations. They were ordinary folk at that time, working class people. Gradually, and with much effort, her relatives moved into shipping, which helped to make them wealthy. One of her relatives invented emulsion paint and opened a factory to make and sell this kind of paint, which made him wealthy as well. Other relatives entered manufacturing, making soap, running the largest woolen mill in the country, and banking.

Some relatives were in the military, some were scholars, lawyers, and many other professions. In time, they became wealthy and influential in their communities.

Mr. Hay gave us so much information, that I could not keep up with him. However, his presentation was recorded and will be available on the SSL website for those who would like to hear all the interesting details at <http://scotsoflou.com/>.

We thanked Mr. Hay for his excellent presentation. It was very thorough, with lots of interesting information about Princess Diana's family background going back into the 1600's.



April Program — The Case for Prince Madoc and King Arthur in America

We have long heard the story of Prince Madoc (but always with the wrong date and wrong Madoc). Only recently did we learn it wasn't the 12 Century but the 6th, that Prince Madoc was King Arthur's brother, and that Arthur was killed in America and his body returned to Wales and buried there.

Biographical Information, April program — Lee Pennington

LEE PENNINGTON is the author of 23 books including *I Knew a Woman* (1977) *Thigmotropism* (1993) and *Appalachian Newground* (2016)--each nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in poetry. His book, *Daughters of Leda* (2017) was selected as a finalist for "Best Book of Poetry published in 2017" by the American Book Fest. His *Songs of Bloody Harlan* was reprinted and re-released in 2019. His most recent book (2019) is *Segovia's Fingernail*. He has had over 1300 poems published in more than 300 magazines in America and abroad. He has had nine plays produced, wrote the script for *The Moonshine War* (MGM, 1970, starring Alan Alda, Richard Widmark, etc.), and has published thousands of poems, articles and short stories in everything from *Playgirl* to *MountainLife and Work*. His novel, *Moment of the Butterfly*, will be released by Hydra Publications in 2022.

Beginning in 1990, through his video production company, JoLe Productions (joleproductions.com), Lee, along with his late wife, Joy, produced 21 documentaries including *In Search of the Mudmen* (1990), *Wales: History in Bondage* (1995), and *Secret of the Stones* (1998), *Eyes that Look at the Sky: The Mystery of Easter Island* (2001), *The Mound Builders* (2001), *The Serpent Fort: Solving the Mystery of Fort Mountain, Georgia* (2005), *Let Me Not Drown on the Waters: Fred Rydholm, Michigan's "Mr. Copper."* After Joy's death, Lee produced five more documentaries for a total of 26 : *Some Days You Clean, Some Days You Litter: The Amazing Warner Sizemore*, 2012; *Room To Fly: Anne Caudill's Album*, 2013; *Bosnian Pyramids Hidden History*, 2015; *Seafaring Strangers: Vikings in America, Part I*, 2016; and *Gunung Padang: Monument to Atlantis*, 2017.

Lee is a graduate of Berea College in KY and the University of Iowa. He holds two Honorary Doctoral degrees: Doctor of Literature from World University, and Doctor of Philosophy in Arts from The Academy of Southern Arts and Letters. He taught for nearly 40 years, the last 32 as Professor of English and creative writing at University of Kentucky Jefferson Community College until he retired in 1999.

In 1983 the Kentucky State Legislature named him Poet Laureate, a lifetime appointment.

He has traveled extensively (in all the United States, in all the Canadian Provinces except two, and in 93 foreign countries). For the past fifteen years, he has served as president of the Ancient Kentucke Historical Association, a group dedicated to the study and research of pre-Columbian contact in the Americas, especially Kentucky.

In 2013 the University of Louisville opened the *Lee and Joy Pennington Cultural Heritage Gallery*, named after Lee and his late wife. The gallery contains U of L's most valuable works including the likes of first editions of Galileo, Copernicus, and Newton. It will house all of Lee's writings, films, and many artifacts he's collected traveling around the world.

Two films are presently in the works about Lee: one, a documentary on his life, and the second, a movie about his Harlan County, KY teaching experience where he was run out of town and had contracts taken out on him--all because of a book of poetry his students published in 1967!

He presently lives in Kratz House, a designated historic home, in Middletown, KY with his lady, Jill Baker, an artist who has illustrated several of his books.
