Using Facebook for Genealogy Research

Facebook has increasingly become one of the most effective tools for research. This track record for proven success has resulted in the consistent growth of Facebook groups dedicated to genealogy. These groups cover a wide spectrum of purposes. There are Facebook groups for genealogy-related technology, genealogy software, genealogy scrapbooking, geographical areas, and groups for genealogy resource and information sharing. The most beneficial benefit is the large community of genealogists willing to share their knowledge, experience, tips, and encouragement. More potentially important than the information, however, are the very real relationships that can be cultivated with the people you meet there.

Here are some examples of situations where Facebook can directly impact research. Using a Facebook group to help solve your most frustrating brick wall question is like posting the problem on a platform that potentially thousands of people searching the same issue could respond and offer assistance. Maybe you found or inherited some old family letters in a different language or photographs or pictures without any identification. There are groups devoted to translations and photograph identification where it's possible someone will be able to help.

Additional examples of benefits include the following:

- 1. Communities are categorized by geographical area and reach all over the world.
- 2. Communities focused on technology are essential for keeping up with the latest tech gadgets, apps, software, scanners for digitizing family photos, etc.
- 3. Blogs cover a wide variety of research topics and opportunities for sharing ideas and resources. Many are hosted by professionals in the field of genealogical research.
- 4. State and County community groups may offer information on local or regional repositories, memory project sites that focus on history, oral histories including video and audio clips, old photographs, and pioneers for specific areas of interest or research.
- 5. Groups for DNA analysis can assist you with your DNA test results and how to proceed.
- 6. Specialized groups exist for all ethnic groups. Examples include Jewish, African-American, Native American, etc.
- 7. Specialized groups also exist for specialized situations. A prime example would be for adoption and adoptees. This is where people would go to access help in seeking information on their biological family and parents.
- 8. Many Facebook users have discovered or reconnected with lost family members, unknown cousins, and developed many new friends.

As with all internet interactions, you're most likely to have success when a code of conduct is followed. Since Facebook genealogy groups are usually made up of hundreds or thousands of different people, it just makes sense that order and appropriateness are kept by the administrators and are expected of users. It is important to read and abide by the rules and regulations of each site. This is especially true with regards to posing queries.

Benefits of Having a Genealogy Research Plan

Having a research plan is critical for any long-term success in genealogy. The research process helps people understand and appreciate their ancestors' achievements despite many challenges. Developing a research plan involves setting goals and objectives.

Creating an effective research plan increases the likelihood you will be able to solve that long-standing brick wall in your family tree. A genealogy research plan is much more than a to-do list. The major objective in developing a genealogy research plan is to identify what you want to know and formulate questions that will address your research goals. Many professional genealogists create a genealogy research plan for each research question. The plan can be as simple as a few steps or multiple pages.

The elements of an effective genealogy research plan usually include the following points:

1. SETTING OBJECTIVES: WHAT DO YOU WANT TO KNOW?

What specific details do you want to learn about your ancestors? A marriage date? Spouse's name? Where they lived at a particular time? When they died? Determining a research objective helps keep your research focused and your plan on track.

2. LISTING ALL KNOWN FACTS: WHAT DO I ALREADY KNOW?

What have you already learned about your ancestors? This should include names, relationships, dates, and places that are supported by original records. The best techniques to obtain this documentation include:

- a. Search home sources for documents, photos, diaries, and family tree charts.
- b. Interview family members and relatives. It is best, to begin with the oldest members first. If they pass away beforehand, the stories pass with them. While someone else in the family may know this information, it will seldom be as accurate and detailed.
- c. Search repositories in the area where the ancestors lived.

3. <u>DEVELOP A WORKING HYPOTHESIS: WHAT DO I THINK</u> THE ANSWER IS?

What are the possible or probable conclusions that you hope to prove or possibly disprove through your genealogy research? Let's say you want to know when your ancestor died. You might start, for example, with the hypothesis that they died in the town or county where they owned land. County histories can be a very useful resource, enabling you to learn about the history of an area and your ancestor's role in it. County histories often are available on Interlibrary Loan, and sometimes online.

4. IDENTIFY RECORD SOURCES: WHICH RECORDS MIGHT HOLD THE ANSWER AND WHERE ARE THEY LOCATED?

Some prime examples include:

- a. Census records
- b. Marriage records and certificates
- c. Wills and probate records
- d. Land records such as deeds, mortgages, etc.
- e. Tax records

Create a list of possible sources, and identify the repositories, including libraries, archives, societies or published Internet collections where these records can be researched.

5. RESEARCH STRATEGY

The final step of your genealogy research plan is to determine the best means of accomplishing your research goals, considering the available records and your research needs. Decide which record type is most likely to contain the answer you need. Then determine the best strategy for obtaining that record; does the best technique include, for example, a visit to the area where the ancestors lived, or can you obtain the record by searching microfilm online? Do you need to hire a professional researcher or will a phone call to the courthouse where your ancestor lived, help you determine the location of the record you need? The local library, as well as genealogical societies and historical societies, can be very useful resources in helping you move forward with your research plan.




