Alan Hay July Presenter

Alan Hay was born on a farm on the Aberdeenshire coast, in the rural North East of Scotland. He is the descendant of many generations of farmers and crofters from that part of the country. He was educated at the universities of Aberdeen and Stirling. He has been writing, speaking, and thinking about Scotland's history and topography for the best part of 40 years. He is Archivist of Clan Hay, and a Fellow of both the Royal Society of Arts and of the Society of Antiquaries. He is Chairman of The Royal Celtic Society, an Edinburgh-based organization that is dedicated to preserving and promoting the languages, literature, music, and culture of Scotland. It was founded more than 200 years ago.

Alan's particular interest is in social history: what people's lives were actually like. That's a big subject for a 45 minutes talk, so here he will look mainly at life in the rural communities of Lowland Scotland, a background from which so many of our ancestors stemmed. What was their context and the nature of the local social structure? What were their work, their recreations, and their customs? He will look at their religious belief (together with the ancient folklore - superstition, if you will - that went hand in glove with it), their education, and the everyday matters of the houses they lived in, the food they ate, and where it came from. And ultimately, what caused them to go to the USA.

BEGINNER LEVEL

American Seamen Impressment Records

For researchers tracing missing seamen ancestors in the New England area during the 1789-1815 era, one relatively hidden and somewhat obscure resource may be useful. The National Archives house a collection of records called the American Seamen Impressment Records. From the end of the Revolutionary War to the War of 1812, the British Royal Navy forcibly boarded American merchant ships to seize English-speaking seamen and press them into service on British vessels. To a lesser extent, the French and Spanish navies also impressed American sailors. To stop this practice, the United States Congress passed acts in 1796 and 1799 to issue identification papers and keep detailed records on seaman who served at ports in the region. Ship captains on all American ships and merchant marine vessels were required to file reports to U.S customs officials immediately upon return to port when impressment activities occurred that involved their ships and crew. Reports were sent to the Secretary

of State, who then submitted an annual statement on impressments to Congress.

Impressment dramatically affected the lives of ordinary New Englanders, perhaps more than any event since the American Revolution. From 1796 to 1815, the United States government attempted to counter impressments by enacting measures to identify and repatriate seamen detained by the British, and to provide protective documentation for sailors traveling abroad. The data collected through these efforts contain important personal information about these seamen and their experiences. Federal records of the Department of State and the U.S. Federal records of the Department of State and the U.S. Customs Service relating to impressed American seamen are thus a useful source for family history.

Impressment constituted a longstanding maritime tradition in Great Britain. Britain viewed impressments as a legitimate recruiting tool for the Royal Navy during periods of war or national crisis. When deemed necessary, naval authorities organized impressments rendezvous in British ports under the guise of the "impress service." Officially targeting Royal Navy deserters and British citizens skilled in seafaring trades, the "press gangs" as they were called, combed the surrounding countryside for recruits, receiving travel expenses and a fee for each conscript. In the aftermath of the American Revolution, American ships became prime targets as the practice was expanded to boarding foreign ships at sea. The British regarded this practice as a legitimate maritime right.

Today, many of these records are also available on through Ancestry, Family Search, Find My Past, My Heritage. They tend to be part of collections labeled New England Seamen's Historical Identification Cards. Feel free to contact me with any questions.

Intermediate and Advanced Article**Family Reunions and Genealogical Research**

Family reunions can be beneficial for genealogists and historians. Some families hold annual reunions on the same date and at the same location. Those who follow this pattern often choose a location that has some symbolic connection to the family or an important event that impacted the family. Others vary their dates and locations to attract the widest possible number of participants. While many reunions are held during the summer months, these events can occur at any time during the year.

Reunions can have a variety of themes. From a historical perspective, a typical reunion invitation list may include grandparents and great-grandparents, as well as parents, siblings, and cousins. Many family reunions are sponsored by family organizations or associations. The primary goal under these circumstances is to encourage discussion and pride in the history and achievements of family members, both past and present. Members of the older generations share their memories and stories. These memories and stories often answer many questions concerning deceased family members and the events that impacted their lives. Successful reunions of this nature not only encourage interaction among all age groups, but educating the younger generation about family history.

Pre-reunion planning for activities is of utmost importance. The most successful reunions, from a historical and/or genealogical perspective, are those that allow family members to spend as much time as possible with each other while they are together. In the 21st century, it is a rare occasion when all members of a family gather in

the same venue for any length of time. The event planner should design activities that necessitate having family members do things together, but give participants opportunities to talk quietly among themselves, rather than over planning the activities.

There are numerous books and Internet sites devoted to family reunions. They cover every aspect of the planning process and most include a listing of activities that are specifically designed to ensure maximum levels of personal interaction. Both book and Internet sources will provide greater detail for each of the options, and usually feature illustrations, instructions, and other information.


