SSL Virtual Membership Meeting Minutes May 25, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:10 pm despite some connection difficulties. Damien Burns, our Electronic Communications Commissioner, got our technical problems solved.

Education and Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our speaker, Pamela Rotheroe-Hay, who spoke about <u>HIGHLAND DRESS</u>. Robbin read her biographical information, which will be published elsewhere in the newsletter. She has recently written a book about proper Scottish dress; more information about her book is available in the newsletter.

Mrs. Rotheroe-Hay began her presentation by telling us a funny story about a man wearing his kilt backward, with the pleats in front, at a large Celtic event. He was convinced he was wearing his kilt properly—BUT HE WAS NOT!

In her presentation of <u>HIGHLAND DRESS</u>, she showed us pictures of men and women in kilts with the accessories usually used. She added a note of levity featuring "eyecandy" for both men and women. It caught the attention of her audience. In discussing kilts, she pointed out how different dyes can make kilts look quite different.

HATS AND BONNETS

She also showed us Balmoral and Glengarry hats, and feather bonnets covered entirely in ostrich feathers, which are worn only by members of pipe bands. She pointed out their hose and spats as well, which make for a very snappy parade uniform. White stockings are worn only by members of pipe bands.

The number of feathers in a bonnet denotes the status of the wearer. Eagle feathers are used, and the wearers do not take them out of the country, as such feathers are illegal to own in some countries. Feathers are worn only by nobility.

SASHES

Ladies' sashes are worn on the right shoulder by a lady chief, the Queen, wives of captains of industry, and the wives of military officers and members of the Royal Scottish Country Dancing Society. If a woman marries outside of her clan, she may wear the sash of her clan pinned at the hip. Elaborate fringing is sometimes used to finish the ends of a sash. This is usually done on silk or very fine woolen sashes, as coarser wool will fray too easily. Pam showed us how to fold the sash and make the base for the pin used on the sash. Check the video on the SSL website to see how this is done. Men can wear sashes, too. The fringing is usually 3 inches long and needs to be knotted at the ends to keep them neat. Sashes are fastened by a large pin. Sashes are usually

made from a square yard of material.

KILTS

When making a kilt, first pin the pleats in place, then turn the kilt over and very carefully cut out excess material to keep it from being too bulky. A strip of the canvas is sewn into the top of the kilt to reinforce the material and hold the pleats in place, which makes it much easier to work with. Military pleating is used for military kilts and pipe bands. Kilts for ladies can be any length but are pleated the same as a man's, and both men and women wrap their kilts from left to right. The length of men's kilts is measured by having the man kneel on the floor, and measure from the navel to the floor.

Pam showed us several pictures of men wearing kilts improperly.

ACCESSORIES

Badges and kilt pins are fastened through the top layer of fabric to keep the kilt from blowing up in the wind.

Socks were worn with a black knife, or "sgian dubh, worn in the sleeve at one time, but now worn in the top of the right sock. Flash, or tabs, are garters used to keep the socks up. They may match the kilt or be a solid color.

SHOES

Ghillie shoes are worn by dancers and other performers. They were originally worn by workmen who worked around marshes, as the water could drain out through the holes in the shoes. Buckles on shoes are worn by both men and women.

SPORRAN

Sporrans are used as a purse, and men keep money and small items in them. Pockets were worn on the outside of clothing as a separate item, tied to a belt. Sporrans are worn on the front of the kilt and attached to the belt around the kilt. Most sporrans are fairly small, except for those worn by pipers, which are as long as the kilt, and very elaborate.

Q&A SESSION

In the question-and-answer session, she explained that tartan ties are for daywear. Ascots or ruffles are worn for evening wear. She explained how to put on a kilt, and said the ladies wore them as well. Now lady's kilts are usually skirts with pleats. Plaids can be used for any type of dress, even a wedding dress. She emphasized

that you need to get a good kiltmaker. She also said to be careful with accessories when changing from day to evening wear. Hats, shoes, sporrans, ties, and sashes can change. For a wedding during the day, wear a tweed jacket, and match solid-colored socks or a color from the kilt. A sporran with a cantle (fastener), of smooth black or brown leather (not hairy), or with an animal face.

Mr. Wilson and Robbin both thanked Pam for her very informative presentation.

BUSINESS MEETING

Mr. Wilson started the business meeting at 7:30 PM with a vote for Todd Early. He was voted in, and we much appreciate every new member.

Archie Cunningham was not present, but Mr. Wilson swore Laura Doll into office as a member of the Heritage Committee.

Mr. Wilson asked for a motion to approve the April minutes. A motion was made, seconded, and approved by the members present.

Mr. Wilson checked with the churches to find out when we might begin having in-person meetings. Strathmoor Presbyterian will not be open until September, but when it does, we can use the Friendship Room instead of the gym. Better lighting and it will seat at least 40. Also, we can still use the kitchen. Christ Church may allow meetings in June using keypad entry. We do not know what room we can use, and the kitchenettes are not available for non-members.

Vice President Dianne Holland reported that there was no mail in our mailbox when she checked. Cheri Eskridge said that Marla Jo picked up the mail, and the insurance bill has come in. Cheri will get the bill so she can pay it as soon as she can.

Treasurer Cheri Eskridge said they have not changed the signatories at the bank yet. Cheri, Dianne, and Jim need to meet at the bank and take care of that. They need a copy of the minutes and a statement from the secretary as to who was elected to replace Jim as a signatory. Jim and Cherie will get together to get the check signed for the insurance.


