

SSL Membership Virtual Meeting November 274 2020

Mr. Wilson thanked all for attending our virtual meeting, which started at 7:15PM with 17 members present. Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our presenter, Peggy French, Pastor at Okolona Presbyterian Church, and a Scottish Society member.

Her program was titled "FROM JOHN KNOX TO JONATHAN WITHERSPOON: THE PROGRESSION OF PRESBYTERIANISM".

John Knox and John Calvin were both early figures in the religious Reformation, attempting to reform Catholics to Protestants. As we know, this produced a great deal of violent upheaval, sometimes with the support of the British Crown, but more often without. John Knox could not get along with any of the female rulers of the time and was frequently imprisoned. In his later years, when he had returned to Scotland, he established the "kirks", or Protestant churches, and wrote much of their liturgy. He was asked to write a "confession" for the church, which he did. The new Confession led to the ousting of the Queen of Scotland (Mary of Guise). Her daughter, Mary, fled to England, where she was a problem for her cousin, Queen Elizabeth. She was eventually executed there, but not before bearing a son, James, who became King of Scotland, and eventually, the King of England. King James is responsible for the King James' version of the Bible which we still use today.

Due to the war between Scotland and England, many of the losing Scots were sent to the New World. Most Scots were literate, as education was valued. In the Americas, John Witherspoon felt that all should be able to read the Bible, and he pressed for education for all so they could read.

In America, Scotsmen were instrumental in the formation of our government, which is a representative federation. Most of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were Scots, and their beliefs in education and representative government formed all the basis for our current government.

Peggy followed up with a short but true tale of how important one person can be. After the first winter, only 52 Pilgrims were still alive. One of these survivors had fallen off the boat on the way to the New World but was rescued. He was a direct descendent of the Bush family (two of our presidents). There would have been no Bush family if he had not survived.

We all applauded, as we enjoyed her program very much.

Business Meeting

Mr. Wilson asked for visitors, but there were none. He started our monthly virtual meeting by thanking all who had been able to come. He then asked for any old

Membership Commissioner Marla Jo Cameron reported that we have 72 family members, 33 Life members, and 37 individual members, giving us a total of 142 members. We have several new members, which are reflected on the newest member roster. John Moffett thanked Marla Jo for her well-organized records.

Hospitality Commissioner Anne Lewis was absent, and there was no report.

Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin reported that nothing is going on at this time. She provided us with a schedule of programs for next year, which may still change. This should be available in the December newsletter.

Member At Large Dianne Holland was not at the meeting, but Pat Schweitzer was able to attend. She is still working on DropBox but says that most of the changes have already been made. She has posted daily on The Scottish Society of Louisville Facebook page, and suggests that we all check it out. No McFritz report.

John Dickson Head of the Nominating Committee from the Membership Committee. He says he has not yet sought out members to hold officer and committee positions but will begin soon. He has started to review Cheri's records for the audit.

John Moffett, our Newsletter Editor, asked how we liked the October newsletter. The new cover page was beautiful, and everyone agreed that it was a good newsletter.

Electronic Commissioner Damien Burns explained that he has worked on the website and has taken off the button allowing people to buy Burns' Night tickets and replaced it with a donation button.

Our new Regional Celtic Commissioner is Janie Blome, who had no report since all events are canceled due to the pandemic. We let her know how happy we are that she has accepted this position.

As there was no more news to report, Mr. Wilson adjourned the meeting at 8:17PM.

"From John Knox to Jonathan Witherspoon: The Progression of Presbyterianism"

How the Presbyterian Church of Scotland brought many ideas into the formation of the New Colony and the building of the United States of America. Peggy got right to her presentation telling us about the Scottish Protestant Reformation and the move from Papacy to a more Calvinist National Church of Scotland. Politics and religion resulted in lots of corruption to out right buying entrance into heaven by paying or giving gifts to the Papacy. He strongly opposed connections to the Catholic Church which resulted in his founding of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland.

Two centuries later Johnathan Witherspoon a Scottish-American Presbyterian Minister was the president of the college we now recognize as Princeton University. He was very involved in politics of the new colony and signed Articles of Confederation and supported the ratification of the Constitution. He is truly a founding father of the United States.

Peggy provided a very interesting and historical program. Thanks, Peggy for your hard work and a great presentation!

Sticky Toffee Pudding with Carmel Sauce

Ingredients				
Pudding	Sauce			
½ cup butter	1 cup butter			
2 cups powdered sugar, sifted	2 ¾ cups light brown sugar			
2 eggs	1 pint, whipping cream			
3 cups of flour				
8 oz. dates, chopped				
1 tsp. baking soda				
2 cups boiling water				

Directions				
Pudding	Sauce	Assembly		
Preheat Oven 350°F. Cream the butter and powdered sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Gradually beat in the flour. In a separate bowl, sprinkle the baking soda over the chopped dates. Pour the boiling water over the dates and soda. When the water is absorbed, combine the dates and the creamed mixture. Spread batter in a 13x9x2 pan and bake for 40 minutes.	Melt butter over low heat. Stir in brown sugar until completely combined. Add cream and stir until fully incorporated. Cook over medium low heat until just boiling.	Poke holes in the cake and pour 1/2 of the sauce over the cake, allowing sauce to soak in. Brown cake under broiler until bubbly. Keep remaining sauce hot and spoon on to warm pieces of cake before serving.

BEGINNER LEVEL

How to Prepare for an Online Search

Whenever I am contacted by patrons who are beginning the research process, the first question posed usually involves when we can meet to perform an in-person online research. Because of COVID-19, in- person searches are more complicated because of social distancing guidelines. However, we still offer the service. This article is designed to prepare patrons for a successful session.

The main point I emphasize is preparation. Our ability to assist the patron is based on the amount of information they can provide. Even if a patron hires a professional, this fact will be part of the conversation. My goal is to put researchers in the best possible position for success. Here are my suggested steps to begin the research process.

Step One: Using a Pedigree or Ancestral Chart, record in pencil all of the information you already know about your family.

- These details include names, date/year of birth, place of birth, date/year of marriage and place where ceremony took place, date/year and place of death. This chart tracks you, your parents, your grandparents (both sides), etc. across multiple generations.
- If you don't know dates, there is nothing wrong with estimating them. In the beginning, if all you know is

- complete information on yourself and your parents but little if anything going further back, don't worry.
- 3. The next form you should fill out is called a Family Group Sheet. Fill out one sheet for each family. This is the form where you will record one family -- parents and the children of that marriage. As on the previous Pedigree/Ancestral Chart, fill in the names, dates, and places. If a divorce takes place, and one or both parents remarry and have children, this will involve creating a new Family Group Sheet for the new families.

Step Two: The next step is to decide what information you want to learn about your family.

- Circle any missing or incomplete information on your Pedigree/Ancestral Chart or Family Group Work Sheet or both. Start with your parents or grandparents and work your way back in time.
- Part of the decision will depend on your ultimate research objective. I've worked with some patrons who are only interested in the gist or highlights of various people in their family. The purpose of this study guide is more for those who wish to go as far back as possible.
- 3. If you fall into the latter category, feel free to contact me. I have a separate set of recommendations that would apply in that situation.

Step Three: Take the time to read a how-to-book on beginning genealogy research.

- 1. Study guides like this one will tell you what the steps are to proceed, but they will not be able to tell you the "why". In order to be successful in genealogy, you must know the historical context of the time period and purpose of the records.
- 2. Even if it delays the formal beginning of your research and making an appointment to meet with a research staff member, this step will pay long-term dividends and make the process easier.

Step Four: Investigate what research has already been done.

- 1. Talk to family members, relatives, or family friends and record any useful information or stories.
- You may discover that they not only have details of interest but also original documents, photographs, family Bibles, military papers, journals, diaries, etc., that may be useful for your research.

3. These would often be classified as home sources. One of my free study guides available upon request goes into greater detail on this topic. Ask permission to make copies of these documents.

Step Five: Begin recording this information, and especially where you found the facts.

- 1. This is called citing your sources.
- As you progress through the research process, this will become the key to your long-term success.

Once you have begun the process of putting this information together, it will make it easier for the research staff member to get an overview of what you have gathered and help them discuss and formulate a research strategy. This will help make the online search more productive for both you and the staff member. It will also serve as a guide that you can use to proceed. I have multiple study guides on this topic that I can send electronically upon request. Feel free to contact me with questions or comments.

INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED LEVEL

Using Family Trees for Genealogical Research

As online research options have proliferated in recent years, the number of genealogists posting their family trees on databases such as Ancestry, Family Search, My Heritage, Find My Past, etc. has skyrocketed.

When you upload your information, the search engines on the site will start searching for matching records for you to look at. Then you can look at the records and correct your family tree. This seems like a wonderful tool and the fun news is that you don't have to be a paid subscriber to upload your tree; however, you do have to subscribe if you want to look at the records it finds for you. Even if the information you imputed isn't correct, these sites offer the capacity for other users to comment on the tree and give you correct information if they have it. This capability enhances the ability to share information in a timely manner.

The one caveat that most professionals advise users to remember is that these trees are meant to be used by others only as stepping stones to assist them in their search for their ancestors. Many people, especially beginners, fail to view the information contained in online family trees any differently than they do the data found in a record source. When they are presented with individuals from a tree that appears to match their needs, they classify the information as accurate existing research and incorporate it into their research. This would be fine if every researcher took the time to carefully review the facts, make sure those facts had solid supporting evidence, and then added those facts to their tree along with attached record sources. But that is not how it usually happens.

Users should take the time to examine every source record and then determine for ourselves if it is valid and makes sense based on existing knowledge. Online trees come and go and change all of the time, and the records attached to them may disappear. You always want to be able to go back to your research and know exactly where you found every single piece of information. Family Trees without documentation should never be classified as proven research.

Another much safer and more reliable option that has come into widespread use is purchasing genealogical software programs. These programs have been around for years and include many features and friendly user interfaces. The common features they offer make it easy to navigate in your family tree, add citations for various sources and create reports and charts you can print or share as PDF files. Most of these programs are inexpensive and don't require any ongoing fees, except for optional upgrades. And your files reside on your hard drive, where you have complete control over them.

Most genealogy software programs offer online features. They might automatically search genealogy websites such as Ancestry or Family Search and give you hints to records or family trees that may match your ancestors. With a single click, they can automatically fill in search forms on genealogy websites. Hints usually cover only certain databases and you'll still want to experiment with different search criteria, but these features can save you a lot of time. Many programs offer the capacity to create reports for your viewing and analysis.


