

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

**SSL Virtual Membership Meeting Minutes –
February 23, 2021**

The meeting was called to order at 7:15 pm. Our original speaker, Mel Hankla, was unable to record his presentation due to the ice storm, as he lost all power for several days. Education and Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our speakers, Jeff Forbes and John Dickson, who were kind enough to do their excellent program "How to Be a Highlander in Kentucky, Scotch VS Bourbon" a month early. After Robbin's introduction, Jeff said he has a new appreciation of filmmakers after putting their program together. He thanked Damien for updating his PowerPoint software so it would be compatible with the new version that Damien uses.

Jeff and John took turns pointing out the differences between scotch and bourbon at each stage of the process; the preparation of the grains being used, mashing, fermenting, distilling, aging in barrels, and bottling. They explained the specialized vocabulary that has grown up around this process, such as grist, wort, wash, foreshots, and feints. Please watch the presentation, which can be seen by using the link on the Society website. There is a great deal of interesting information involved with their presentation, and I found I could not keep up with them. All of our virtual programs are best seen and heard, and not read about.

There was an interesting question and answer session after the program, in which Jeff mentioned a documentary called "Scotch: Golden Dreams", directed by Andrew Peat. He thinks it can be found on Hulu or Prime for those who would like to see it. He says it is outstanding. He said to look at these stores for the scotch highlighted in the film; Total Wine in Westport Village, and Westport Wine and Whiskey.

Hadrian's Wall



Looking to the east. Newcastle is about 35 miles east and about 25 miles from Carlisle to the west. This is a photo of Hadrian's Wall very near Milecastle #39. The water you see in the background is Crag Lough Lake. We parked our car at Steel Rigg Car Park about a half of a mile from Twice Brewed Inn off B6318. We are about 20 miles south of the Scottish Border. There are amazing views in every direction and hard to believe this was built in 122 AD and is about 73 miles long. Hadrian's Wall was a defensive fortification built to keep the Caledonians and Picts out of Roman Britain and it never was the border between Scotland and England although many think it.

BEGINNER LEVEL

Taking Clues and Converting Them to Usable Sources

Clues are an important component of genealogical research. From a genealogy perspective, clues encompass any piece of evidence that may serve as a guide to the solution of a family mystery or confirm the accuracy of information. Clues often help identify additional potential sources for further research. Once confirmed, the information can be added to the body of research being compiled on an individual or family. When examining clues, here are five points to remember:

1. *Clues are crucial for successful research.*
2. *Clues must be analyzed for accuracy.*
3. *Clues have potential for good and bad.*
 - a. *The good news is that in most cases, even if further research shows some inaccuracies, the information was close enough to be useful for research purposes.*
 - b. *Researchers must be cautious because some clues may have been planted by family members or others to deceive future generations from finding the truth about an individual, family, or event.*
 - c. *As people age it is inevitable that dates and facts may be confused.*

Clues may be discovered in a wide variety of sources. The most common examples include the following:

1. *Diaries, journals, and photograph albums*
2. *Documents such as census, court, and land records*
3. *Family tradition and heirlooms*
4. *Indexes, citations, and footnotes located inside published genealogy reference books (print and online)*
5. *Online research websites like Ancestry and Family Search*
6. *Published genealogies (print, online, including those with informational forms such as family group sheets, pedigree charts, etc.)*

Once you discover clues, the next step is to follow-up and investigate the facts for accuracy. Here are some recommended techniques to follow:

1. *Try to obtain original copies of sources mentioned in footnotes and citations.*
2. *Locate the indexed entries and read the surrounding text for accuracy and context.*
3. *Take the time to study any documents in their entirety to determine the context.*
4. *Be sure to have an older genealogy and legal terminology handbook with you to determine the proper historical meaning and context of terminology.*
5. *If the names of other genealogists are mentioned as having been involved in researching the family, individual, or event, try to contact them to compare findings and experiences.*
6. *Consult with other genealogists in your local society. They might be searching in the same area or have encountered the come of the same roadblocks or challenges.*

Valentine's Day Historical Tribute

Our ancestors had many unique ways to celebrate Valentine's Day, many of which centered on Saint Valentine or Valentinus of Italy. Historical accounts date the original early celebrations back to the early third century.

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Valentine's Day has always had a special meaning. For many of our ancestors, the messages delivered to the special people in their lives were often far more personal and intimate than in modern times. The cards were more intricate and the artwork far superior than is the case today. Love letters, notes, and even fancy gifts have passed between suitors and parents as early as the 1600s. In the United States, the practice became more popular after the Civil War, when thousands of soldiers-turned-beaus were looking for belles.

The custom of sending Valentine's Day cards in the form of love poems have been written since the Middle Ages. In the 18th century printed valentine cards, with poetry and sometimes decorations, were produced. Valentine cards became hugely popular in the 19th century when lower postage rates made it affordable to send cards in the mail. Instead of the contemporary language found in many cards and letters today, romantic poetry was the rule in the cards usually supplemented by a message along the same lines.

Our ancestors had many unique traditions. One example involves how young females celebrated Valentine's Day by pinning bay leaves to their pillows. The ritual included dreaming of one's sweetheart in hopes of being married within the year. Another Valentine's Day tradition entailed writing lovers' names on bits of paper, rolling them in clay and then placing them under water. Whichever name rose to the surface first would be the Valentine. Love knots are another historical tradition. They were particularly popular in Victorian times. Love knots take many forms, but were often valentines written on paper or ribbon and tied in elaborate knots.

Today, many genealogists celebrate Valentine's Day by researching the family's valentine traditions. How our ancestors celebrated the day of romance has changed many times over the centuries, and the ways it was celebrated were often regional. Old diaries and love letters can provide many hours of interesting reading and wonderful insights into the personalities of parents, grandparents, and relatives when they were young. Photograph albums are another potential source to locate pictures of our parents, grandparents, and other cherished ancestors and close friends. Because of COVID-19, many social events celebrated as part of Valentine's Day may need to be

cancelled. However, there are many other ways we can keep in touch.

Some genealogists use the opportunity to create a Valentine mosaic of the family. While working with old family photos on the genealogy Valentine's Day cards, make additional copies of them to create a nice mosaic of your ancestors. You can even include photos of ancient ancestors who no one in your family today actually knew in person. Include fun borders around each photo with a little bit of information about the ancestors on them, and arrange them on a cardstock backing, attaching them with archival safe glue. Many people create this mosaic in a heart-shaped form and frame it. In the best case scenario, locating a heart-shaped picture frame adds an even more spectacular dimension to the finished piece. You can put it on the wall of your home or give it as a gift to a special relative who will love it. Here are some links that may be useful in planning activities or looking for ideas.

Help Us Stay Financially Sound

Please be mindful that we are an organization of 147 members promoting Scottish Heritage and History. We have meetings each month, broken into two sessions: first a speaker or presentation and then a brief business meeting. The presentations and speakers are from across the USA and are educational and of interest. Our goal is to enrich our lives with all things Scottish.

March, April, and May meetings were canceled because of the Pandemic COVID-19, the closing of our meeting place, and numerous restrictions. On May 12, 2020, we had our first Virtual Board Meeting. We have moved to Virtual Meetings starting in June with Mark Johnson's program of his new book, "Sherlock Holmes and the Werewolves of Edinburgh". Since then, we have been doing Virtual Meetings with presentations and a short business meeting. So, our organization continues to operate within the health restrictions providing interesting and exciting educational programs.

Also, of importance, it is time for dues renewal. As you

may know because of health concerns two fundraising events, the November Dinner & Auction and Burns Night Gala January 2021 were canceled. The Dinner & Auction proceeds are used to support the Heritage Fund. The Burns Night Gala is used to support the general operating fund. The Heritage Fund paid out \$1,050 for virtual lessons.
