

SSL Virtual Membership Meeting Minutes
April 27, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:25 pm due to connection difficulties. Damien Burns, our Electronic Communications Commissioner, once again got our technical problems solved. Education and Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our

speaker, Stephen Hay, whose program covered many Scottish castles once owned by members of Clan Hay. Robbin and Mr. Hay were fortunate to have met during Robbin's trip to Scotland. Mr. Hay was her guide, and he was happy to put on a program about castles for us. He loves Scottish history and sharing it with others. He has recently written a book about Scottish castles; more information about his book is available in the newsletter.

Mr. Hay began his presentation by talking about castles that have belonged to the Hay Clan at different times. He explained that castles changed hands for a variety of reasons, but commonly this happened by marriage, inheritance, and violent overthrow.

He started with Abbot's Tower in New Abbey. It was built by monks. Clan Hay took it over in about 1620. This was a Tower House.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

Balbithan Castle in Inverurie, north of Aberdeen started as a tower house, and later many windows and other amenities were added.

Balcombe Castle in the Kingdom of Fife in Crail. This castle has been greatly changed over the years, with added wings and towers.

Clan Hays lived in Balhousie Castle in Perth until the early 1700s. The Black Watch uses it as a museum and headquarters now.

Belton Castle has been demolished, but once Hays lived there. It was given to the army for target practice.

Blackhall Castle in Banchory was demolished during

WWII, and the stones were used to repair other structures.

Craignethan Castle at Lanark was part of the greatest concentration of castles along the border with England. There was much fertile land there, and the castle was needed to defend the border

Carribber Castle at Linlithgow was abandoned in 1760 and fell into ruin.

Castle of Park at Glenluce was a tower house in the southern part of Scotland. The Hays were put along the border to help police them. Seventy-six castles were under the control of Clan Hay at various times. The Landmark Trust completely refurbished this castle, which was in ruins at one time.

Motte of Errol is a fortification of wood and earth. Many castles started as mottes and were renovated over time into stone and wood structures.

Couthland Castle in Dalkeith was quite sizable but fell to Henry VIII in the 1600s.

Carfae Peel at Oxton had many defensive stone houses.

Pitfour Castle near Perth.

Ury House in Aberdeen near Stonehaven was taken from the Hays, who demolished it and built a new castle there.

Venlaw Castle (Smithfield Castle) near Peebles, which was a heavily fortified town.

Tullibole Castle at the Crook of Devon was home to the Hays from 1300 but went to other clans later.

A plot to assassinate Lord Donnelly, second husband of Mary Queen of Scots, was hatched at Wittinghame Castle in East Linton.

Pinkie House is now a well-known school.

Kilspindie Castle at Aberlady is a ruin now but was once part of a busy port city, which the castle defended. The Oliver Cromwell destroyed the castle.

Monkton House in Portobello stands on an earlier site.

Muchalls Castle at Stonehaven was sold to Clan Bennett in the 1600s.

Castle of Esselmont in Ellon, north of Aberdeen is now a ruin.

Crammalt Towers in Upper Tweeddale was an early castle, later inundated when the valley was flooded for a reservoir. It had strong towers but was a ruin when it was flooded.

Neidpath Castle in Peebles was a famous castle that passed by marriage to Clan Hays in 1312. This castle held out against Oliver Cromwell longer than any other Scottish castle.

Duns Castle in Duns was built in 1320 to protect the border with England and is still owned by a Hay.

Mounie Castle was built in 1641 in Oldmeldrum. It is now privately owned.

Tinnis Castle at Biggar is on the site of an ironworks. It is a very substantial castle.

Delgaty Castle near Inverness was saved from decay by the Hay Clan and is still in good condition. Mr. Hay included a newspaper article about Captain Jock Hay, which can be seen in the video.

Clan Hay lost Nunraw Castle in 1779, now privately owned.

The town of Peebles has twelve castles nearby, built to control and defend the border with England.

In the question-and-answer session, Mr. Hay said

he was only half done with his presentation due to time constraints, and we asked him to come back and finish it for us. He thought that was a good idea, and will talk to Robbin about it. He spoke about his efforts to document these castles before they are gone. He has included a great deal of information about the castles and clans who lived there in his book. He included pictures of the castles, tartans, coats of arms, historical information, and even directions to the castles.

Mr. Wilson and Robbin both thanked Mr. Hay for his presentation. He has a slide show of all the pictures in his book, and Damien said he could help him put it into a PowerPoint presentation. His book is being released in about 3-4 weeks through Amazon. It is called <u>The Directory of Scotland's Castles</u>, by Stephen Hay.

Mr. Hay answered a question about the spelling of Hay, which he said varies, but all are correct. Hay, Haye, Hays, Hayes are variations of the spelling.

A guest, Jean Coker, asked him if he could do a presentation for her group. He suggested she contact him through stephen.hay123@btinternet.com. Jean lives in Florida and was invited by a member to our meeting.

Mr. Wilson started the business meeting at 7:47 pm. He thanked our outgoing Vice President Jim Hughes for his many years of excellent service to the Scottish Society.

Jim then gave the Oath of Office to our elected officers, President Bruce Wilson, Vice President Dianne Holland, Treasurer Cherie Eskridge, and Secretary Linda Wilson. He also gave the Oath of Office to our new commissioners, Regional Celtic Commissioner Janie Blome, and Member at Large Commissioner Sarah Colglazier. Laura Doll and Archie Cunningham will be sworn in at another time, as they could not attend the meeting.

Mr. Wilson asked for a motion to approve the

March Minutes. A motion was made, seconded, and approved by the members present.

Vice President Dianne Holland thanked Jim for his help in getting ready for her office and asked if he will help her if she needs assistance, as she does not think she can fill his shoes. He thanked her, and said he will, and gladly. He said he has already turned over the key for the post office box to her. Dianne reported that there are no further requests for funds besides the two that were already made.

Treasurer Cheri Eskridge reported on the funds available in the General funds and Heritage funds.



BIO FOR STEPHEN HAY APRIL 2021 PRESENTER

Stephen Hay grew up near Glasgow when his parents left the military choosing to set up home in the industrial central belt of Scotland over their Highland roots. After leaving school Stephen joined the British army and spent 6 years as a Paratrooper.

After leaving the military he moved into hotel management but always had an interest in Scottish and Clan Hay history with an ever-growing collection of books on the subject. After two decades in hotel management, the need for a change was apparent. The tourism industry would allow Stephen to combine his two great passions, Scotland and history. After 8 years with an Edinburgh tour operator, Stephen made the leap of faith into self-employment in 2016 when he set up Targe Tours. He took the name from his hobby of Targe making which has since become a fully-fledged business in its own right. Stephen is one of only 3 professional Targe makers in Scotland and thus set up Scottishshields.com.

Stephen lives with his wife of 19 years, Dawn in Prestonpans, the site of the famous Battle of Prestonpans in 1745. He has spent the last 3 years working on a book, The Directory of Scotland's Castles. He has visited over 1000 Scottish Castles and listed each castle complete with photographs,




