

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

There were some connectivity issues at this point for Mr. Wilson, and Damien Burns read the Preamble and the Oath of Office to the new commissioners. All the commissioners took the oath; Robbin Goodin Educational Programs, Pat Schweitzer for Member at Large, Anne Lewis for Hospitality, Damien Burns for Electronic Communications, John Moffett for Newsletter Editor, and Marla Jo Cameron for Membership.

Vice-President's Report – Jim Hughes

Jim Hughes gave the Heritage Fund update. The Heritage Committee approved funding for three pipers for a total of \$500. (2 @ \$200. and 1 @ \$100.) This money has not yet been distributed until we hear from Carolyn Cook as to when she recommences her classes. Another \$500. was awarded to a pupil of Marleen Bailie to attend the Ohio Scottish Arts School but as this event was cancelled, she declined the offer as she did not wish to participate in the on-line program; her application for next year will be reviewed sympathetically.

Cheri gave the Treasurer's Report to Secretary Linda Wilson.

No report.

Membership Report – Annie Rivers / Marla Jo Cameron

Annie said she will email the report to Mr. Wilson. There have been few changes since April.

Hospitality Report - Melissa Ingram / Anne Lewis

Linda Wilson asked Melissa how much money is in the kitty. She said there is \$248 at this time. This is separate from the budget, and is the money donated at meetings.

Electronic Communications Report - Damien Burns

Damien said that there were no problems with on-line voting for our new commissioners, though if there are more than one person running for a

position, he will have to set it up differently in the future.

There continues to be problems with the "full board of Lou" email addresses. Damien strongly recommended that we not use it when sending mail to the full board, but attach the addresses individually until he has corrected the problem.

Regional Celtic Commissioner - Robbin Goodin

Robbin said she would not run for this position again, but would stand in the position until general member meetings are held again. At that time, a new Regional Celtic Commissioner will need to be found.

Educational Programs Commissioner - Robbin Goodin

Robbin pointed out that we have canceled meetings for April, May, and June. All programs we miss this year because of the virus will be moved to 2021.

Since we cannot have general membership meetings right now, and may not be able to for several months, Robbin asked if we could tape our program each month and make it available to members by a link. Damien pointed out that the presenters would need to sign a consent form to be recorded. Anne asked if we could use Facebook Live for the programs, but Damien said it is too public. This idea was shelved for now.

Clan McFritz Report - Pat Schweitzer

No report at this time, as all events have been canceled.

Members At Large Report – Jane Seelig / Pat Schweitzer and Dianne Holland

Both absent, no report. Pat was sworn in as Jane's replacement.

Dried Cherry Scones

Directions

Cover with boiling water; let stand for 5 minutes; drain:

Stir together:

Cut in 'til mixture resembles coarse crumbs:

Add and toss to coat:

Combine and add to flour mixture:

Knead gently 10-12 strokes until nearly smooth. Pat into a 7-inch circle. Cut into 12 wedges. Place wedges 1 inch apart on parchment-lined (or ungreased) baking sheet. Bake @ 400 deg. 10-12 minutes or until light brown. Remove from baking sheet; cool on wire rack for 10 minutes. Drizzle Orange Glaze over warm scones. Serve warm.



The Importance of Obituaries and Death Notices



Obituaries and death notices play a vital role in the research process. Obituaries are public notices of a person's death that usually appear in the local newspaper. These are considered public records.

Death notices are brief announcements that appear in the local newspaper. Death notices contain the name of the decedent, name of the funeral home handling the final arrangements, information about the funeral and memorial plans, and where donations can be made in memory of the decedent if applicable. Death notices are usually located in the same section of the newspaper as obituaries.


Every obituary tells a story. Obituaries can provide significant insights into the lives of our

ancestors. They often contain biographical sketches of their lives. This information can point towards other primary record sources, corroborate facts in evidence, verify names, dates, and locations, and help locate surviving family members, neighbors, and business associates. Obituaries normally identify the name and location of the funeral home that handled final arrangements, where the funeral or memorial service was held, and the location of the cemetery if applicable. If the decedent was cremated, this is usually stated in the obituary.

Biographical information may shed light on relevant details about age, birth, marriage, death, names of parents, siblings, spouses including maiden names in some cases, names of children and grandchildren, places of residence of living relatives, and brief details about deceased relatives. Obituaries may also contain specific dates and locations about education and military service, public offices held, awards, organizational membership and religious affiliation. If the deceased was an immigrant, researchers may find information about the country and locality of origin, and details concerning when and where they arrived at upon entry to America or Canada.

From a research perspective, the most important piece of information is the name of the funeral home that handled final arrangements. Funeral homes maintain informational packets on decedents which often contain significant additional information that does not appear in obituaries or other record sources such as death or marriage certificates.

ERIE CANAL ELEVATIONS FROM THE HUDSON RIVER TO LAKE ERIE

INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED LEVEL

Erie Canal and Westward Migration

The Erie Canal had a significant impact on New York and America in the 19th century. The canal route, which begins in Albany, New York served as a major migration route due to its flow westward from the Hudson River to Lake Erie. This route connected the Great Lakes with the Atlantic Ocean. Construction began in 1817 and was completed in 1825. The project was an enormous undertaking. Work on the canal was carried on by gangs made up, in many cases, of European immigrants. Many of the skilled designers and engineers were also recruited from Europe.

The Erie Canal was the first transportation route between the eastern seaboard and western interior of the United States that was faster than carts pulled by draft animal and cut transport costs by about 95%. The canal resulted in a massive population increase in western New York State and opened regions further west to increased settlement. Completion of the canal played a major role in the rise of New York City as the chief port of the U.S. The increased flow of commerce and settlers resulted in constant expansion efforts covering the years 1834-1862.

The Erie Canal contributed to the wealth and importance of New York City and New York State. Its impact went much further, increasing

trade throughout the nation by opening eastern and overseas markets to Midwestern farm products and by enabling migration to the West. New ethnic Irish communities formed in some towns along its route after completion, as Irish immigrants were a large portion of the labor force involved in its construction.

Because so many immigrants traveled on the canal, many genealogists would like to find copies of canal passenger lists. Unfortunately, apart from the years 1827-1829, canal boat operators were not required to record or report passenger names to the government, which in this case was the State of New York. Those 1827-1829 passenger lists survive today in the New York State Archives.

The Erie Canal proved to be the key that unlocked an enormous series of social and economic changes in the young nation. The Canal spurred the first great westward movement of American settlers, gave access to the rich land and resources west of the Appalachians, and made New York the preeminent commercial city in the United States. At the beginning of the nineteenth century, the Allegheny Mountains were the Western Frontier. The Northwest Territories that would later become Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio were rich in timber, minerals, and fertile land for farming.
