FREENS O REID HARLAW, HARLAW BATTLEFIELD TOUR 9TH JULY 2012

The first Harlaw battlefield tour was held on Monday 9th July and the weather forecast for the day was cold, windy with intermittent showers. Although the forecast for once turned out to be accurate, the day itself was a most enjoyable social occasion.



Led by Andy Douglas seven 'freens' visited a number of locations associated with the battle ending with an invitation to Auld Logie for tea and cakes making this the type of social occasion I envisaged when I came up with the idea of the group..

Having Andy as our guide was a real bonus. His knowledge about the battle simply whetted our appetite as he is the key speaker at our first annual dinner on 21st July. Andy is a member of the Aberdeen Wargames Club and has been a student of military history since the age

The Bass, The Earl of Mar's Army Mustered here Before the Battle of Harlaw of twelve with a passion for Classical Greek wars, the Campaigns of Alexander the Great and the history of Scotland. Andy was involved in two years of research into Harlaw and the development of a model of the battlefield using 750 figurines painted by 11 club members

The visit started off at the Bass and Little Bass in the area known as the Stanners on the road leading to Keithhall. Led by Andy we climbed to the top of the Bass braving wind and rain where he described these natural geological features that were the mounds for the medieval castle possibly belonging to Walter Leslie, Constable of Inverurie.

Many authors agree that it was the most likely mustering point for Mar's army. From the Bass, near Inverurie, we headed to Kinkell Kirk. The renaissance church built in 1538 replaced an earlier medieval church, said to have belonged firstly to the Knights Templar, then the Knights Hospitaller. It is also the location of the engraved burial slab identifying Sir Gilbert de Greenlaw, believed to have been a relation of Gilbert de

Greenlaw, Bishop of Aberdeen 1390-1421.

The grave slab is unusual as it is engraved on two sides, having been reused for a Forbes in 1592. The burial slab now stands upright within the walls of the Kirk and is well worth visiting. The 'freens' have already made initial approaches to try and have the slab better protected and preserved.

Thereafter, we headed for Harlaw stopping off at Johnnie Kelly's Lass which is situated near to Balhalgardy Cottages. These are the remnants of a standing stone circle. A 1771 survey showed this was a 6 stone circle while by 1964 a similar survey found a single stone with at least 22 cup-marks.

Onwards the group followed Andy to the site of the Village of Harlaw just behind Harlaw House. Andy described the village itself, the location of twelve skeletons found in the 19th century and finally the Liggars Stane, one of two standing stones from an 1840 survey. Their original position was due north of Harlaw House and said to mark the spot where the Highland females, killed in the battle, were buried.

By now, we were all ready for a break and headed to Auld Logie and the home of Leopard Magazine where Lindy Cheyne and Ian Hamilton had prepared a wonderful spread – teas, coffees and fabulous home baking.

We spent an enjoyable couple of hours covering multiple subjects from baking through to local history and of course Harlaw. What a great time we had and Lindy and Ian were great hosts and we cannot thank them enough for their kind invitation.

By now the day was wearing on and we headed for our final stop at the Harlaw Monument itself allowing Andy to describe the positions of the cairns of Irvine of Drum, Red Hector and Provost Davidson. We were also given an indication of the topography of the site at the time of Harlaw, in particular the location of a loch that was finally drained in the 1830's and the effect that would have had on the strategy of the two armies.

All in all, we were on the go from 10am until 4pm when we all went our separate ways. Everyone agreed that this was a great day out and a great way to understand the battle and places associated with the event. It was also a great social occasion.

We cannot thank Andy enough for his efforts and our knowledge certainly has been enhanced. This was what the 'freens' are all about and more 'days out' are planned.

DR. JOHN CAIRNEY, ACTOR, ARTIST, AND WRITER, BORN IN GLASGOW, FEBRUARY 16, 1930

This year is the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic. My first recollection of the story of the Titanic was viewing the 1958 B&W movie *A Night to Remember* on TV. A now legendary Scot, John Cairney played Mr. Murphy in the movie. In an interview for the Daily Record, he recounts that he got paid £20 a day and was repeatedly dunked into freezing cold water, but filming Titanic movie *A Night to Remember* is still one of the highlights of his career. In the movie Cairney played Irish immigrant Patrick Murphy, a part similar to the character Jack played by Leonardo DiCaprio in James Cameron's 1997 version of the Titanic story. In an interview located at <http://www.johncairney.com>, Cairney describes his experiences filming the movie. When he auditioned for the film, no one ever asked if he could swim; anyway if asked he would have said yes with some conviction stating that is the way actors respond to questions of this sort. You too have probably seen him in two other films: *Cleopatra* 1963, *Jason and the Argonauts* 1963.

Cairney, who is probably best known for his lengthy career performing Robert Burns' works, began his association with Burns in 1965 with Tom Wright's solo play "There Was A Man" at the Traverse Theatre, Edinburgh, and at the Arts Theatre, London.

Dr Cairney gained a Masters of Literature from Glasgow University for a "History of Solo Theatre" in 1988 and, in 1994, a PhD from Victoria University in Wellington for his study of Stevenson and Theatre. Having spent the last seventeen years in New Zealand, Dr. Cairney and his wife Alannah have now returned to live again in Scotland.

As a writer, Cairney has published two autobiographies and a novel, "Worlds Apart" as well as "A Scottish Football Hall of Fame" and "Heroes Are Forever" for Mainstream Publishing (Edinburgh) and "A Year Out In New Zealand" for Tandem Press, NZ. He wrote three Burns books for Luath Press in Edinburgh, as well as biographies of R. L. Stevenson and C.R. Mackintosh and a book of essays on Glasgow entitled "Glasgow by the way, but". His second novel, "Flashback Forward", was followed by his book on acting, "Greasepaint Monkey" in 2010.

KING MALCOLM HONOURED BARTHOLOMEW FOR HIS SERVICE.

Bartholomew was appointed Governor of the Castle of Edinburgh.

He was knighted and given large grants of land in Fife, Angus, the Mearns and Aberdeenshire.

The circumstances of these grants are recorded in the following legend:

Commencing his journey on horseback at Dunfermline, and proceeding northward, Bartholomew was promised by the King in hereditary right, all the land for a mile around any point where he should find it necessary to alight for the purpose of baiting or feeding his horse. First, he alighted at Fechil, now called Leslie, in Fife; next at Innerlessad, in Angus; the third time at Feskie, or Eskie, in the Mearns; the fourth time at Cushnie, in Mar. His horse at last failed him at the place called Leslie in the Garioch. On his return to court, the King asked him where he had left his horse, and he replied, as some say –

***“At the lesse ley beside the mair,”
My horse it tyrd and stopped there.”***

The King, finding, it is said, that the place suited well with his surname, answered in the same metrical style –

***“Lord Lesley shalt thou be,
And thy heirs after thee.”***

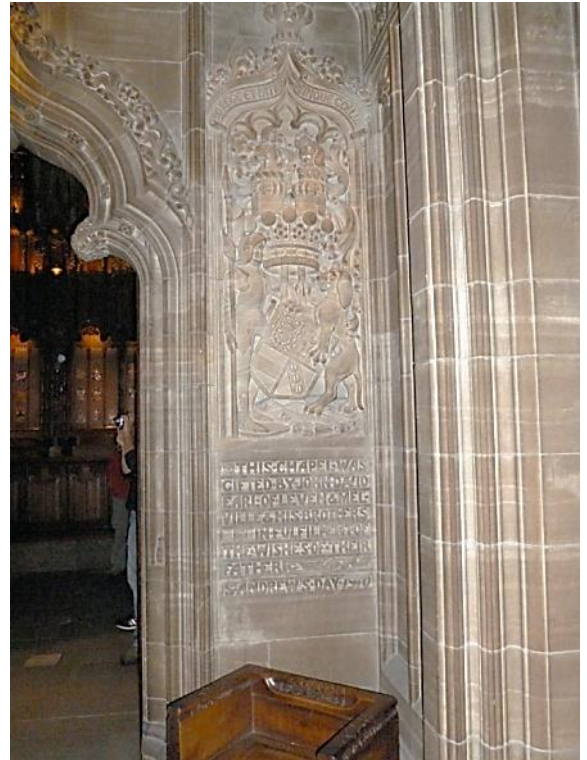
The parish of Leslie, in the district of the Garioch and county of Aberdeen, was thus the earliest possession of the family of Leslie in Scotland.

DAVID AND BETH VISIT LESLIE HISTORICAL SITES IN SCOTLAND THE ENTRANCE TO THE THISTLE CHAPEL, ST. GILES CATHEDRAL, EDINBURGH.

Note the arms of the Melvilles, with the Leslie arms quartered. The Thistle Chapel is the chapel of The Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, Scotland's highest order of chivalry. There are only 16 Knights of the Thistle. This tiny but exquisite chapel has only 19 seats or "stalls," sixteen for the Knights, two for the Sovereign and his or her Consort, and one for the Lord Lyon King of Arms. Above each knight's stall is his helm, decorated with mantling and topped by his crest. The knights who are deceased have an enamelled plate affixed to the

back of the stall and display the occupant's name, arms and date of admission to the Order.

In addition to the arms of Sir Harald Knight of the Thistle with a Leslie connection. This would be Sir John Stirling-Maxwell, 10th Baronet of Pollok. Sir John was the eldest son of Sir William Stirling-Maxwell, 9th Baronet of Pollok, and Lady Anna Maria Leslie-Melville, second daughter of David Leslie-Melville. 8th Earl of Leven and Elizabeth Anne Campbell. He was educated at Eton College and at Trinity College and was appointed a Knight of the Thistle in 1929.

THE AULD KIRK, ST. MONANS

My curiosity was raised about a year ago when Tim Leslie discovered, from a website, a Leslie plaque on the wall of the Old Kirk at St. Monans. The plaque was dated 1792, and bore the motto "Grip Fast" and with the twisted white and blue "wreath" of the Leslies.

The village of St. Monans, also sometimes spelled St. Monance, is a small fishing village on the edge of the sea. It is located on the north shore of the Firth of Forth, in Fife, next to highway A917, and almost directly west of the Isle of May. Further up the coast, to the northeast, are the villages of Abercrombie and Anstruther. The name of St. Monance or St. Monans, seems to have come from an Irish missionary, Monanus or Monans or Monan, whose shrine was situated at the mouth of the Inverie Burn. He probably came to East Fife about 832 in the company of Adrian, and he is said to have been the first to preach the gospel in the Isle of May. It is recorded that he was slain by Danish invaders about 875. This material is taken from the information sign outside of the church.

Today the St. Monans church (the Auld Kirk) appears formidable from the outside, almost a fort. But on the inside it is welcoming. All of the walls and the ceiling are painted white, and all of the windows are clear glass. The church is so close to the sea that I would expect the spay from waves crashing on the cliff below to

land on the church. In the graveyard, there is a grave stone for at least one Leslie, a John Leslie and his wife Agnes Easson. It is regrettable that there are no dates on this stone.

St. Monans Church, in close proximity to the shrine of the saint, was founded by Alan Durward about 1265-67. It is to King David II of Scotland, who reigned from 1329 to 1371, that we owe the building as it now is. The King seems to have conceived the church as a thank-offering to God, but there are two different stories about the particular occasion of his thankfulness. The first story tells how David was wounded by two arrows at the Battle of Neville's Cross in 1346 and how one of the arrows was extracted from the wound only after he had made a pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Monan, when the arrow leapt from the wound. The second story tells how the king sailed across the Forth to visit Ardrross Castle, and how the queen, Margaret of Logie, and he were in great peril when a storm arose. The king vowed that he would build a church to St. Monan if they reached the land safely.

The church was built as a monastic chapel in 1370, and sometime before 1477 the building was granted to the Dominican Friars. In 1544 the church was burned by English invaders but the damage must have been made good, for in 1646 it became the Parish Church. General Sir David Leslie of Newark (Baron of Newark) was an elder of the Kirk and a member of the Presbytery.

Now the other piece of the puzzle starts with General David Leslie, Baron of Newark. General Leslie was created Baron Newark in the County of Fife in 1660 by King Charles II. The ruins of Newark Castle are about a third of a mile southwest of the St. Monans Church. Like the church, it was on a cliff very close to the ocean. Newark seems to have been abandoned as a formal place of residence about 1750, although part of the building was occupied by servants from Newark farm until the early 1800s. Sir David Leslie died in 1682, and was succeeded by his son who was also named David. David, the second Lord, died in 1694, leaving five daughters. Jane, the eldest daughter, succeeded as baroness of Newark, and married Sir Alexander* Anstruther, baronet of that ilk, an ancient family in the county of Fife, and by him had three sons and six daughters. Jane died in 1740, and the estate and honor devolved to her eldest son William, who took the name and arms of Leslie and succeeded as Lord Newark. He died unmarried in 1773.

Alexander Leslie was the third son of Jane (some accounts give her name as Jean) and Sir Alexander* (or Philip**) Anstruther who assumed the title of Lord Newark. He was not the heir-male of the first Lord, and his claim to be Lord Newark was not established before he died on 10 March 1791. His eldest son, John Leslie, who inherited the claim, was styled Lord Newark. He assumed the title of Lord Newark on his father's death, but the House of Lords held that the charter of 1672 by which his father had claimed the peerage was a forgery. John died in 1818 and no further claim was made to the peerage.

Now, back to the plaque on the wall of the St. Monans church, bearing the words "Grip Fast" and *mare vivimus* which is the motto of the village of St. Monans. The motto means "we live by the sea," the plaque is also dated 1792, which indicates that it was probably given to the church by Lieutenant Colonel John Leslie, the eldest son of Alexander Leslie and his wife Elizabeth Price.

NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY- SCULPTURE OF MARY QUEEN OF SCOTS AND JOHN LESLIE



On the east wall of the National Portrait Gallery is a sculpture of Mary, Queen of Scots, Bishop John Leslie and William Maitland of Lethington.

This sculpture is the work of William Birnie Rhind, and was erected between 1899 and 1906. The sculpture was donated by a group of Edinburgh ladies calling themselves the "Queen Mary Statue Committee."

Bishop John Leslie (also known as the Bishop of Ross) was a close and trusted advisor to Queen Mary. Alexander Leslie Klieforth, on page 109 of his book *Grip Fast: The Leslies in History*, describes Bishop John Leslie: "While endowed with superior intellect, an abundance of energy and utter loyalty to his Queen, he lacked both patience and finesse, qualities essential to a successful diplomat."

Sir William Maitland of Lethington was a Scottish politician and reformer. He was known as "Secretary Lethington" to Mary. He was involved in the conspiracy to murder David Rizzio, the private secretary to Queen Mary.
