It has been a tremendous year and we can look forward to the Leslie Gathering next year in New Hampshire, the smaller commemoration of the battle of Flodden in Scotland in 2013 and the next year of 'Homecoming' in 2014, the 700th Anniversary of the Battle of Bannockburn.

Ah, I feel warmer already.

THE FREENS O REID HARLAW AND ST. ANDREW'S DAY PARADE, INVERURIE, NOVEMBER 27, 2011

The St. Andrew's Day Parade was held on Sunday the 27th November, 2011, the closest weekend to the 30th November. It was the 4th Parade to be held in Inverurie and has involved local groups as part of the Remembrance of St. Andrew, Scotland's Patron Saint. The Parade was led by a composite Pipe Band made up of members of the Inverurie, Kemnay and Kintore Pipe Bands.

This year's event was to recognise the 600th Anniversary of the Battle of Harlaw and The Freens o Reid Harlaw, an embryonic group which is just in the process of being formed, was asked to provide a contingent of Clan members to march at the head of the Parade along with a couple of reenactment groups who were to be dressed in the battle attire of the early 15th century.

David Leslie from Leslie, as acting Chairperson and Albert Thomson, as acting Secretary, of the Freens decided that this was a golden opportunity to

bring the new society to the attention of the public and potentially attract new members. We managed to round up 14 people who had already expressed a wish to join the Freens and considering the short notice we felt this was a sufficient number to join the Parade. Sunday the 27th turned out to be very cold with a biting north wind blowing. The Parade assembled with the Pipe Band in front, followed by the re-enactment groups, then the Freens followed by about 250 people from the various local groups.

All 14 of the Freens were dressed in their various tartans and carried flags, either the Scottish Saltire or flags of their own Clan.

Led by the Pipe Band we processed down the main street in Inverurie, round the war memorial in the square and stopped in front of the Town Hall, where the Pipe Band formed a circle and entertained the considerable number of spectators with pipe music. In all about 300 people marched in the Parade.

Along with the Parade there were stalls from various groups located in the square, various other vendors and live music played during the rest of the afternoon. Later, when it started to become dark, about 4pm, there was a fireworks display which was a fitting finale to the day.

The afternoon was a great success and the Freens made many useful contacts for the future along with a number of potential new members.

THE LESLIES FROM ACTON, ONTARIO VISIT SCOTLAND

This past May, my wife Marguerite and I boarded a plane in Toronto and set off on a wonderful trip to Scotland, Northern England and Northern Wales. We arrived in Glasgow on the morning of May 18 and after picking up our rental car, we headed out for our first destination, a B&B at Ballachulish in Glencoe. That was the beginning of a very enjoyable holiday and driving tour, around countless round-a-bouts and along many miles of single track roads.

Prior to leaving and while researching the B&B's that we would stay at, we discovered Warthill and decided

that it would be a special treat to stay at a Scottish castle, especially one owned by Leslies. Our first contact was with Candy Leslie via e-mail and we arranged to stay for three nights.

I have a fairly good knowledge of my family history dating back to 1832 when my great great grandfather, John Leslie arrived at Glen Williams, Ontario, and I had some knowledge of family history in Scotland from various writings of my kin, descendants of John. However, we were to learn a great deal more before our trip was over.

Our first face to face meeting with the Leslies of Warthill was when we were zeroing in on our destination. We came upon Sebastian, out on the property, working hard to clear fallen trees blown down by a fierce windstorm that had just passed through. "Welcome kinsmen!" were his first words as he extended his hand in a warm and gracious handshake. In some way, it felt like we were returning home after a long absence. Sebastian sent us on our way to their home, following not far behind in his vehicle. After passing fields of grazing cattle and many ancient trees lining the driveway, we arrived at the grand old home.

Both Candy and Sebastian made us feel very welcome in their home. After being shown to our room, we went to the library where a fire had been set for us in the hearth. Sebastian, who is a very busy man, sat with us for a while. After pouring Scotch whisky, served to each of us in a goblet made from a cattle horn, he talked about Leslie family history, showing us some of the large amount that he has in his library. We were given a tour of the majestic

old great hall, walls filled with portraits of past generations. We were shown one of the treasures of the Leslie family, a very beautiful and artistically drawn family tree, showing the lineage of the various branches and starting with Bartholomew in 1066.

During our stay, Candy and Sebastian told us of various sites we should visit, the Battle of Harlaw monument, the Chapel of the Garioch, the ruins of the castle of Balquhain.

We managed to find them all. I even took advantage of the Scottish rule of the "right to roam", and crossed a farmer's field to stand on the ancient and massive remains of Balquhain.

During our visit, we learned more of the Clan Leslie Society International, the various newsletters of the society and the upcoming

SATURDAY MAY 05, 2012 LESLIEVILLE TORONTO- LESLIE GATHERING AND HISTORICAL OUTING

The Maple Cottage is in the heart of Leslieville in Toronto. It is a small house owned by the City of Toronto with tables and chairs, a small kitchen and a beautiful garden that is maintained by the Leslieville Community. Within easy walking of the Maple Cottage are the Leslie Post Office/General Store; Leslie Grove Park, Queen Street East Presbyterian Church (founded by Robert and George Leslie and others), the site of the Leslie Nurseries, some of the remaining street trees planted by George Leslie, Caroline Avenue (after Caroline Davis, George Leslie's first wife), the site of the Orange Hall, the Duke of York Tavern, Leslie Street, and Maple Leaf Forever Park and back to Maple Cottage and the Maple Leaf Forever Tree.

Joanne Doucette has lived in Leslieville for many years and has researched George Leslie and his family very thoroughly, written a book on his history of "Pigs, Flowers and Bricks: a history of Leslieville to 1920", and is an active member of the community. A copy of this book has been donated by her to the Clan Leslie Library at the University of Guelph. Joanne has brought to light the fact that George Leslie was a Scots who strongly influenced the progress of the Town of York and the later City of Toronto, the largest city in Canada. Joanne's enthusiasm for George Leslie's history and for preserving everything Leslie in Leslieville is contagious. Read her letter to me below, I have never heard any Leslie praise Leslies as much as this. She should be made an honorary Leslie.

Letter to William Leslie, December 8, 2011.

You know, William, I am so proud to have been associated with George Leslie. The more a researcher digs and turns over stones, the more bad things are usually found. But the more I turn over the stones in George Leslie's life, the more gold I found. He really is someone to be proud of. He probably wasn't an easy man, as he had a reputation for doing things his way, but he was a kind jovial soul too and above all honourable. The older I get the more I respect that word "honourable". It is a word like "truthful" and "decent" that is rarely used in the media now. Yet the more I learn, the more I know that it was people like George and his brother Robert and the values they lived by that made this a country worth living in. Before 9-11, these sentiments might have seemed Pollyannaish, but we have sent young men and women off to Afghanistan to die for those very values. It gives me great delight personally to educate people about the Leslies and people like them. George Leslie's father fought at Waterloo. His Leslie brother joined the US Cavalry to fight against slavery in the Civil War. He was badly wounded and spent much of the rest of his life in a veterans' home. A grandson of George Leslie led the Mountie contingent in France in World War One. He became Commissioner of the RCMP. A great grandson was a fighter pilot shot down and killed over France. Well, I guess I don't have to sell you on the bravery and decency of these Leslies and others too. You know more than I.


