Election Nominations Announcement

Election time for CLSI is approaching and nominations are encouraged for two very important positions. CLSI must elect a Vice Chieftain and a Secretary/Registrar.

According to the bylaws, the Vice Chieftain will perform the duties of the Chieftain in his/her absence, disability, or decease, and shall perform other duties as directed by the Chieftain or Council. The Vice Chieftain shall be elected for a term of two years, and no Vice Chieftain may serve more than two consecutive terms.

The Bylaws state that the Secretary shall keep records of Society proceedings, maintain correspondence files of the Society, receive and process applications for membership and notify applicants of their enrollment, and maintain current membership records. The Secretary/Registrar shall be elected for the term of two years.

The Vice Chieftain and Secretary Registrar shall be a voting member of CLSI for at least two years, and can be a non-lineal member of CLSI.

The election shall take place by email or mail in October and those elected will take office January 1, 2015.

On the 20th of July 2014, a small group of Leslies including Clan Chief Alexander and his fiancée Miranda joined the Freens o Reid Harlaw and congregation of Chapel of Garioch Church, for the 603rd Anniversary of the Battle of Harlaw, 24th July, 1411, to remember those who gave their lives that day and to dedicate the new Clan Leslie Font to honour the memory of the Rt. Hon. Ian Leslie, 21st Earl of Rothes, Hereditary Chief of Clan Leslie and Alexander Leslie Klieforth LLD, founding members of Clan Leslie Society.

The font was presented to Rev. Brian Dobby minister for Chapel of Garioch Church, the Clan Leslie Chapel for the North East of Scotland, by Hon. Alexander Leslie, Clan Chief on behalf of Clan Leslie Society Interenational. Following the service, Leslies and members of Freens o Reid Harlaw joined with the congregation for fellowship and refreshments and anniversary/dedication cake.

Chaplain's Corner Samantha Gray, Chaplain, CLSI



As I write this, several friends are going through serious "challenges" — a modern euphemism for right ugly circumstances — with kids, health, finances and marriages. Recently one of them said "It's bad enough to have to cope with a personal crisis without the rest of the world going crazy around me too!" She was noting the reflected present chaos in her family

with that on the world scene. Having been specifically trained to work with people in crisis, as well as the ability to mediate crises situations, I recognize her reaction as extremely common just now, and for good reason.

Considering only the USA for a moment, at the far outer edges of national financial recovery and with so much other change and stress within our own country, we must also deal with how we are affected on the greater stage of he entire globe. Scotland is struggling with the vastly important question of independence, life-changing in so many ways for all Scots, and so has special stressors which her people must deal with as well. The Middle East wars, African mass kidnappings of children, the loose cannon of North Korea and its bombastic threats, the horrific abuse and murder of women in India and Papua New Guinea are all trigger points waiting to explode and we hear about this every evening on the 6 o'clock news. The latest insult to humanity – the destruction of a civilian aircraft and loss of so many innocent lives by warring dissidents in the Ukraine - adds to the global sense of unrest and lack of a safety net on this small planet. Years ago just after 9/11, I was asked by a local women's magazine to write an article on stress management, which I did. They wanted to give their readers something spiritually and emotionally helpful in a time of great anxiety and upheaval. For this issue of Grip Fast, I thought a repeat on that subject might be appropriate and useful. Crisis is, according Merriam Webster, "A difficult or dangerous situation that needs serious attention". The dictionary goes on to say it is also a point of decisive change which may be anticipated as having a high probability of a negative outcome. Sounds like the 6 o'clock news alright. The thing about crisis is this: by definition it is also short lived in its most acute and perilous stage – 6 to 10 weeks, approximately - and resolves in a relatively rapid manner, although those experiencing it may perceive it as an eternity. So what so we do in a world gone mad to survive and maintain our equilibrium,

sustain love, faith, honour, affection and good will and most especially hope? First we must admit our feelings to ourselves. We, in Western society, have been taught to be stoic, to suppress "negative" feelings such as fear, hurt, disappointment, and anger as ugly and unacceptable. It's essential to know that in terms of psychological energy, feelings are all equal, "good" or "bad'. It's the spin we put on them, how we act on them and manage them that counts. So we have to recognize our feelings and own them. If we do not, we run the risk of acting at their mercy, which seldom has beneficial results for anyone. Second, we can employ gratefulness. Many thanks to cousin Meg Leslie who introduced me to an exercise of gratefulness on Facebook! Even if you use no 'social media' try this: find three things to be grateful for daily, and share these with friends, encouraging them to do the same. Stuff we take for granted suddenly become gifts, and we see more clearly how rich we are in blessings of all sizes. Third, we must care properly for ourselves. Physical stress such as lack of sleep, fatigue, missed meals, even a bit of dehydration takes a toll. Taking care of self and healthy activity promote well-being. Remember the wonderful words of the prose-poem Desiderata: "You are a child of the Universe, no less than the trees and the stars, and you have a right to be here." No one can cope well when a range of physical stressors are in play. Forth, turn off the TV. Do NOT watch the 10 o'clock news. No one sleeps peacefully after witnessing mayhem, murder, disaster and other ugly behaviors. Multiple research studies demonstrate that people who watch less TV news have more positive and hopeful outlooks on life. Shut down the eejit box. It's good for your health. In that time saved with the TV off, pray, meditate, contemplate, write a "real" loving, newsy note to someone you care about (when did any of us last get one that wasn't emailed?), go out in the garden and pull weeds, bake cookies, take a long soothing shower, read something uplifting or humorous, take an extra walk with the dog and make a point of noticing the goodness and beauty around you. Smile and say hello to strangers you pass. You may be the only one who speaks cordially to them all day. I remember the weeks immediately after 9/11 when people in and around the "Greater New York Area" actually made eye contact and nodded or said 'good day' to one another. Sometimes it takes a crisis to remind us we are all human and sailing along on the only boat we all have, Planet Earth. Slow down expectations of yourself and even of others. Wonder Woman and Super Man are fun, but I don't have an invisible plane to whisk me around in my busy schedule, and I'm betting you don't either. We all have our own form of Kryptonite: when crisis and strains demand a particular amount of our energy, it's best to know our limits and learn to say "no"

gracefully but firmly. Do something kind for someone else. Feed a stray, buy another treat for the little kid who has spilled his, give an extra donation to charity or in the collection plate at your house of worship, take an elderly neighbor a meal... You know what to do. Be with people of good will and cheerful disposition who are happy to see one another and raise one another's spirits. The Gathering at Grandfather Mountain is an excellent example, but a casual dinner with friends, fishing with pals, an informal family get-together or coffee hour after church also serve to lighten the heart. These are all simple, universal, transcultural and well-known remedies and coping strategies that we have been taught but often don't remember to practice when they are most needed. And if anyone calls you a Pollyanna for espousing a hopeful and caring outlook, is critical and cynical about your efforts, remember the words of Baha'u'llah, prophet of the peaceful Bahia faith: "When thou art disdained and rejected by the wicked doers be not cast down; and at the power and stiff-neckedness of the presumptuous be neither vexed nor sick at heart; for such is the way of heedless souls, from time out of mind." Every kindness matters in a world that is gravely injured, hemorrhaging and crying out for want of compassion and decency. There's an old story about a little boy walking along the beach, and tossing stranded starfish back into the water so they will not die. A man notices the child and says to him "Why are you bothering to do that? There are so many of them you can't make any difference."
