

Judy asked if anyone knew where she could get an orange Scottish soft drink, and Sarah said it can be ordered but is not sold locally.

Jim Hughes asked if tickets are being reimbursed, and Robbin Goodin, David Wires, and John Moffett all said theirs have been. Dianne Holland said she talked to Cheri Eskridge, and she is in the process of making refunds. Jim Hughes said that his daughter, Anne, had made a beautiful array of cupcakes for the meeting. She had to work, so could not be here tonight. Jim said the cupcakes were delicious.

Jane Seelig commented on the plaid behind Robbin. That brought up Monty Python and the Spanish Inquisition, which was a very interesting conversation. John Moffett said he was visiting Castle Doon and ran into an old man who was there when the movie was being made.

Sarah Colglazier asked who wanted to talk about Robert Burns since we were celebrating his birthday. She told us how she prepared for tonight's meeting, reading as much as she could find about him. She did not know anything about him before. She found she had already read a lot of his poetry in school.

John shared an article he found about Burns on Wikipedia, which called him "the poet plowman". David Wires and Timmy Sorrows both said they have books about Burns. Sarah showed us a video she found on YouTube about Robert Burns, which we all enjoyed. The video played "Auld Lang Syne", and we discussed this, as Burns did not write this on. He was probably the first person to write it down, according to Jim Hughes. The song was very old and had been in common usage long before Burns wrote it down.

Sarah talked about her research and said she only found mention of one brother, though he had several siblings. She said there are a lot of Burns' relations now, around 900. He and his wife had several children, but only three lived to adulthood. He also fathered several children with other women. He supported them and their mothers, as well as his own family throughout his life.

Timmy Sorrows had a question about the poetry he wrote for his political leanings. She was an English teacher, and she said only his romantic poetry is found in literature courses. She said she wished she could have taught his political poetry as well. Some of his poetry supported the working man and the poor. Some of his poetry and songs were written anonymously to stay out of trouble, as he would have lost his government job had it been known that he wrote them. Sarah said she wondered about his work, as he wrote many poems and lyrics for music. Some of his poetry has been put to music since his death. As with all writers, he became more famous after his death.

John Moffett said that people are not usually appreciated while they live, and used an example of Jesus preaching in a church far from his home. The people did not want to listen to him and told him to leave.

Judy Stubbs talked about a book, titled, "When Scotland was Jewish". Nine clan lords were interviewed for this book, and she found it to be

very interesting.

Bruce Wilson proposed a toast, and read the poem, "A Bottle and a Friend", after which we all toasted Robert Burns.

The poem "Flow Gently Sweet Afton" was brought up, which Burns wrote in 1791. This poem was put to music by Johnathon Edward Spillman a native of Kentucky in 1837 while he was a law student at Transylvania University in Kentucky. This has happened to quite a bit of his poetry over the years.

Sarah Colglazier told us she is looking forward to dancing when we can have this program. Judy asked if we will eat the haggis during that program, and wanted to know if it has been set up yet. Bruce Wilson said the haggis program has not been set up yet. Don Corson, who is doing our dance program, said he could leave sometime after the dancing for the haggis party. Robbin Goodin said there will be a celebration of Robert Burns on Thursday, January 27. The woman who teaches dance for veterans does this during the program.

Jane Seelig is having a knee replacement next week and hopes she will be able to dance next year. Jane's right knee is very bad. She said she used to do country Scottish dancing until her knee got too bad, and she is looking forward to dancing again.

Dianne Holland said she and her daughter, Holley, used to do Scottish country dancing. They enjoyed it and usually partnered with each other. She said she was in the men's group one night, and Jeff Forbes thought she had gotten mixed up. He told her she was in the wrong group, and she told him she was being the man that night, and it was all right. We all found this amusing. Dianne said she and Holley would take turns dancing the man's part.

Sarah brought up what a good idea it was to cancel Burns' Night, as the virus has gotten so bad lately. We agreed that a large gathering like that would have been very dangerous under the circumstances.

He pointed out that we have one new popup, and the old one either needs to be thrown out or repaired, as the canopy is torn in several places.

Regional Celtic Commissioner Janie Blome is trying to find out about Glasgow but is having trouble confirming dates. The Scottish Storytelling Center will have some events online. The Chicago Scots will have their 175th anniversary and is offering free membership on their website. In June the Scottish Highland games will be held in Chicago; the dates will be in the newsletter.

Membership Commissioner Holley Holland says there are no changes since last month. She is still working on the membership lists, as some things need to be updated.

Newsletter Editor and Electronic Communications Commissioner John Moffett said he will continue in his board position until April and will put out the newsletter through March. We will need a new person to write up the newsletter in April. He reminded us to get items for the newsletter in by the end of the month.

Member at Large Commissioner Sarah Colglazier had no report. She said she will run for Member at Large again.

Alan Hay Bio

Alan Hay was born and bred on a farm on the Aberdeenshire coast, in the rural North East of Scotland, the descendant of many generations of farmers and crofters from that part of the country. Educated at the universities of Aberdeen and Stirling, he has been writing, speaking, and thinking about Scotland's history and topography for the best part of 40 years. He is Archivist of Clan Hay, a Fellow of both the Royal Society of Arts and of the Society of Antiquaries, and is Chairman of The Royal Celtic Society, an Edinburgh-based organization dedicated to preserving and promoting the languages, literature, music, and culture of Scotland, founded more than 200 years ago.

Then in March, we are hoping to be back in person at CCUM for Mindy McIntosh. She is presenting on Outlander Botany. She has written many books and publications on botany. I can't wait to hear her talk. A really fun thing about this night will be a book giveaway. Thank you Dianne Holland for this

fun idea, and many thanks to Mindy for providing the book! Come on in and maybe you will be the lucky winner. Mindy will also have books at the meeting for purchase. I am ready to keep my herb garden going and add some more Outlander herbs. We are still working on our April Haggis Night. Stay tuned for details.


