

SSL Membership Minutes 10/26/2021

Robbin introduced our presenter of spooky stories, Megan Burnett, who works at Bellarmine University. She is an actress and storyteller and chose two stories that focus on how an inquisitive imagination can lead to danger.

The first is called **The Witch of Fife**.

Mr. Wilson then explained that the Alex Rose Award

has been changed to the President's Award, with the same requirement of service over an extended period to the Scottish Society during the previous year. All nominations need to be given or sent to the president. We want to thank Robbin Goodin, who brought the updated nomination forms, as well as a background of the award for those who are not familiar with this part of our history. The form for the President's Award will also be available on the Scottish Society website. The deadline for nominations is October 31st, and the award will be presented at the annual dinner and auction in November. (The deadline for nominations has been changed to November 15th since this meeting.)

Mr. Wilson reminded us that Burns' Night volunteers are needed to decorate the hall at Woodhaven Country Club. Gary Schweitzer said it takes teams of two to put up the shields and can take 4 to 6 hours depending on how many teams we have.

Vice President Dianne Holland gave the Heritage Fund report, informing us that the fund gave three grants this year, equaling \$600. Dianne and the committee hope that we will have more people asking for grants for things like piping or drum lessons, dancing, Scottish language lessons, seminars on heraldry, and other Celtic-related events and skills.

Treasurer Cheri Eskridge gave the updated figures for the General fund and the Heritage fund..

Secretary Linda Wilson had nothing new to report.

Membership Commissioner Marla Jo Cameron gave her report; 30 individual memberships, 72 family memberships, 32 life members, and 7 honorary members, equaling 141 altogether.

Electronic Commissioner Damien Burns, Regional Celtic Janie Blome, and Newsletter Editor John Moffett were unable to attend and sent no reports.

Education and Programs Commissioner Robbin Goodin said that our contact at Strathmoor Church said they do not need our peanut butter, as their pantry is very small. However, Robbin said that Highland Ministries will take it all. They contribute to several different food pantries and are happy about the donation.

Robbin said the calendar for next year needs four more

presenters, and she has several possibilities. She also told us that our band for Burns' Night will be Guilderoy Byrne, which was warmly received.

Marla Jo pointed out that we only need one or two people to bring bread, and Hospitality Commissioner Anne Lewis told her she has already set it up so only a couple of people have been asked to do this. Anne had nothing further to report.

Gary Schweitzer brought up the raffle of the donated basket sword and baldric, and quite a few people bought tickets. The money will go to the Heritage Fund and will be awarded at Burns' Night.

Member At Large Commissioners Pat Schweitzer and Sarah Colglazier had no report.

Marla Jo shared the happy news with us; she will be a grandmother again about April 4^{th} , 2022.

Sarah asked if this is the last time we will meet at Christ Church, and Mr. Wilson told her that is right. We will meet at Strathmoor Church starting in November.

Mr. Wilson reminded us that elections are coming up at the March 2022 membership meeting, with installation in April. Sarah said she is planning on running for the At Large position again.

Mr. Wilson asked how Connie Fry is doing after her fall, and Angie Bowling told us she is still in the rehab center. Jack Bowling answered a question about how she got hurt and told us that Connie walked into her bathroom and fell on the tile. She fell on her knees and broke her right femur just above her artificial knee. She has a rod and some screws in her leg and will need quite a bit of physical therapy. She also has several knots on her head. Jack and Angie said that Connie would appreciate calls, prayers, and cards.

Mr. Wilson adjourned the meeting at 8:55 PM.

Heritage Fund

The Heritage Fund Committee is accepting applications for the dispersal of scholarship funds. The Fund helps support the efforts of SSL members to pursue studies of the many different aspects of Celtic culture, which may include music (piping, drumming, fiddling, etc.), art (dancing, weaving, etc.), language (Gaelic, etc.) and athletics (Highland games).

This Fund can also support a person's interest in an educational program or project that furthers the understanding of Scottish culture and history.

Scottish Society members in good standing can apply for funds or can sponsor non-members for scholarships.

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
