#### Scottish Coats of Arms by Linda Wilson


Last month I went over the general outline of Scottish Coats of Arms, and the meanings of various designs and colors used in making them. The Forbes Clan Coat of Arms was the first example I used.

This month, a member suggested I do the Clan Spalding. "The clan takes its name from the town of Spalding, in Lincolnshire, and can be traced back to as early as 1294, when John de Spaldyn, 'Magister' witnessed a grant of lands in Aberdeen. The Spaldings came to prominence in 1318 at the siege of Berwick by Robert the Bruce. The story goes that Petere de Spalding, a Burgess of Berwick, hated the English governor, and aided the besiegers in taking the town. He was rewarded by Bruce in May 1319 with the lands of Ballourthye, and Pitmachie in August. The principal family were the Spaldings of Ashintully.

"Scottish Clan & Family Encyclopedia", Collins, HarperCollins Publishers 1994

The coat of arms shows the clan name in the compartment under the shield, and has a gold shield with blue cross symbolizing an upright sword, with blue and gold feathery lines forming a chevron at the top of the shield, symbolizing faithful service and protection. Because the blue cross covers the shield in both directions, it may symbolize the wearer as a Christian having served in the crusades. The gold color of the shield stands for generosity and blue for loyalty and strength.

The round picture on the tartan has the clan name in a compartment at the top of the circle, a castle within the circle, and the motto within the belt means "service is noble". The castle inside the belt shows the gateway open with the portcullis half raised. I could not find a meaning for this, but I feel it suggests a welcoming but cautious attitude towards others.

#### SSL Member Meeting Minutes by Secretary Linda Wilson

President Holland introduced our presenter, Janet Abell.

Ms. Abell gave us an account of her recent tour of Scotland with her husband.

They started in Edinburgh, and went to the Palace of Holyrood, the King's official home in Edinburgh. She had many pictures of the palace and its architecture and furnishings. She mentioned the Royal Mile, which is lined with shops and starts at the palace.

They visited Culross Palace in Crainsmuir, where some of the series *Outlander* was filmed. They were able to visit Inverness, Sterling Castle, and Drummond Castle (the formal gardens there were filmed to simulate the *Outlander* scenes in Versaille, France). They visited Invernesse Castle, and the Culloden battlefield with its many cairns and stones displaying the clan names of the Scots who fought there.

They also visited Loch Ness, the largest fresh water lake in Scotland, and the Isle of Donen and the Isle of Skye. The Glengoyne Distillery was a memorable part of their tour, along with the Jacobite Train, Glenfynnen, Glasgow Cathedral, the Kelpie statues (shape-changing sea creatures that look similar to horses), and a statue of the national animal of Scotland, a unicorn.

The pictures of their tour were great, and we enjoyed Ms. Abell's presentation very much.

President Holland had us break for snacks and socializing, after which the business meeting was brought to order. Remember to bring some small snack, or donate a few dollars to the snack fund. There were 29 members in attendance, a nice turn-out for Ms. Abell's presentation.

I want to thank Pat Schweitzer for sending me an article from the June 21, 2023 edition of The Jobe Newspaper Network about the sale of the Glasgow office.


## Bannockburn Celebration by Jack Bowling

## Member Contributions

Bruce and Linda Wilson went to an event on June 24, 2023 sponsored by The Silver Hills Historical Society, of which they are members. The Society sponsors similar events once a year. This one included a tour of the Woodbine Home, now owned by SSL members Richard and Lorna Bolton, and a catered reception and concert after the tour.

The Woodbine Home was built in Silver Hills in 1920. Anders Rasmussen and his wife Elizabeth had the 4,700 square foot home built in the Craftsman style with six bedrooms, three full baths and a large basement, plenty of room for a family of four. Rasmussen willed the property and house to the city of New Albany for a park, but the city turned it down.

Mr. Rasmussen had a large Estey pipe organ installed when the house was built. The pipe organ survives today after being moved from the living room into the hall. It has been restored several times, including the installation of additional rows of pipes (called ranks).

An Estey Organ Concert took place after the tour of the house, with both vocals and instruments, including the organ. The music was from the early 1800's to 1971. We really enjoyed the concert, and socializing with neighbors and members of the Society.




