General Membership Meeting Minutes February 25, 2020

President Wilson was unable to attend due to illness, and Vice-President Hughes opened the meeting at 7:00 PM with 37 attendees. Mr. Hughes then asked for approval of the January 2020 General Membership Meeting minutes. There being no discussion, a vote to approve the minutes was called for; John Scott made the motion, and Annie Rivers seconded. Mr. Hughes called for the vote, which passed. He then read off the list of February member birthdays, and we sang "Happy Birthday" to Marla Jo Cameron, as she was the only one present.

Mr. Hughes asked new members who were present and introduced Jennifer and Shawn McCleod and their 3month old daughter Abby, Sarah Colglazier and her mother Timmy Sorrow, and Jim McGuire. Guests included Jerry Coleman and his son Benjamin, Terry Pyles, and Kelly Quade. Mr. Hughes asked our guests if they wanted to become members, and all but Kelly stated they did. A vote was held by the membership, in which all were accepted.

Mr. Hughes gave the Heritage Committee report. There has been only one request for funds, and he reminded us that the cutoff is March 31st, so anyone who may need funds needs to get their request to him very soon.

Treasurer Cheri Eskridge provided the totals for both the General Fund and the Heritage Fund. She also gave totals for Burns' Night, and the Auction, which brought in only \$42 less than last year, even though there were higher expenses this year. She has already signed a contract with Woodhaven for next year's Burns' Night. A motion was made to accept the report and seconded. The membership voted to accept the Treasurer's report.

Our At Large Member, Dianne Holland, said there was no report. Jane Seelig was not present.

Membership Commissioner Annie Rivers updated our membership totals; there are 72 family memberships (up from 68), 31 life members, and 49 individual memberships, for a total of 151 members (not counting the members we voted on at this meeting).

Electronic Commissioner Damien Burns was not present and there was no report.

Regional Celtic Commissioner Robbin Goodin was unable to attend due to illness, but Pat Schweitzer gave her report and reminded us of upcoming events.

There is a KY Dames Genealogical Meeting at the New Albany library on March 21st from 10 AM to 2 PM, in the Straasweg Auditorium in the library's basement (which may be entered at the ground floor in the back). We

The Frazier Museum has asked us to participate in their Celebration on National Tartan Day, Saturday, April 4th. Last year we had a lot of fun doing this and attracted some new members. Several people have signed up to participate, but more are always welcome. Mr. Wilson and Jack Bowling have said they will put on a demonstration/program about Scottish life, Janice Beatty and Linda Wilson will 'man' a Children's Table with activities and coloring sheets, we hope to have someone talk about sheep, spinning, and weaving and Pat Schweitzer will do a program on the Kentucky tartan with her able assistant, Angus.

Indiana University South East (IUSE) is holding its International Festival on Monday, April 6th, from 5 to 7:30 PM, and has invited us to participate again. This was a lot of fun last year and is another good opportunity to promote the Scottish Society to younger people.

There was no information about either the Ladies' Night Out or the Men's Night Out. Please contact John Moffett if you have any pictures, as he needs these for the newsletter and Damien Burns needs to put them on the website.

Melissa Ingram, our Hospitality Commissioner, was unable to attend, and there was no report.

The lovely Baronass Pat Schweitzer stated that Clan McFritz attended The Celtic Pig for the Irish whiskey tasting on February 20th. Several members showed up, and a good time was had by all.

Our Newsletter Editor, John Moffett, was unable to attend. Anything that needs to go into the newsletter needs to get to him right away, as he has pressing matters to attend to and needs to get the newsletter out by March 1st.

Mr. Hughes adjourned the business meeting, and we broke for refreshments; Melissa Ingram was unable to attend, but thanks to several members, who provided us with popcorn, banana nut muffins, as well as a fruit, cheese, meat, and cracker tray. Linda Wilson set out the refreshment counter and made coffee, and Pat Schweitzer cleared everything away. Several volunteers put our supplies back in the closet.

Mr. Hughes introduced our speaker, Jack Bowling, who started by talking about the Bowling family. His research shows they came from England, Scotland, and Normandy, France. An ancestor was given several large tracts of land, some in Scotland and some in England. Jack explained that this was a common practice at the time, as it kept the lords from raising large numbers of men for an army. This kept the king a little safer from lords who might want to oppose him. At one point, his family fell out of favor with the king, and lost their manor houses. After 14 years, an influential person who later became king himself interposed on their behalf, and their property was reinstated.

Jack's family name has two spellings; Bolling is the Protestant spelling, and Bowling is the Catholic spelling. Much of the information Jack has found on his family was found in the Domesday Book, which includes tax records which were written in code. His family eventually immigrated to the United States through Maryland, which was a Catholic colony.

Heraldry originally came from France. The different aspects of heraldry, such as colors used, geometric designs, symbols, animals and so forth were a code which gave information about the wearer. Jack explained what some of them meant, though he ran short of time and could not go into much detail. We enjoyed his presentation very much, and hope he can put on another program with more information in the future.

Mr. Hughes called for the meeting to be adjourned at 8:52 рм.

Ingredients

1 C butter

¾ C sifted powdered sugar

2 C all purpose flour

1 C chopped pecans

1 tsp vanilla

¼ tsp baking powder

1 C turbinado sugar

1 large egg

42 pecan halves

Directions

- Beat butter, until creamy. Gradually add powdered sugar, stir in chopped pecans.
- Whisk together flour, baking powder and add to butter mixture until blended. Shape Into 2 logs. Wrap in plastic wrap, refrigerate 4 hours to overnight.
- Preheat oven 350 degrees. Line baking sheets with parchment paper. Place turbinado sugar in shallow dish, unwrap logs, brush logs with egg wash. Roll in sugar. Cut into 1/3-inch-thick slices, place 1 inch apart. Top with pecan half, press lightly.
- Bake 10-12 minutes, till edges are golden. Let cool 5 minutes on baking sheets. Transfer to wire cooling racks.

Beginner Level Genealogy Research Challenges

Overcoming research challenges comes with the territory as part of the research process. Whether the issue involves contradictory information, dead ends, or family stonewalling, these challenges or "brick walls" are inevitable. The good news is that a wide variety of strategies can be used to overcome the challenges. The strategies listed below have been cited by many experts over the years as options with a proven track record for success.

1. Internet: Today, researchers have many online research options available which can speed up the research process to some degree. There are three areas of caution that researchers should take into account: a. At best only 10-15% of all records are readily available online.

b. There are many items that are under copyright restrictions, meaning the researcher must deal with the agency that created the original record or hope that it may be available using one of the subscription databases.

c. Ask any professional and they will be the first to tell you that information online is not always accurate.

2. Be Methodical and Develop a Research Plan:

Long-term success in research involves having a plan and developing research goals and objectives. Even if it delays your research, taking the time to develop a plan and keeping track of your research and correspondence will pay dividends. There is a wide variety of print and online tutorials that will assist in the process of developing a plan. Skipping steps, taking short cuts, etc. seldom produces positive results.

3. Genealogical Records:

Check all potential records that may apply to the individual or family of interest. One of the best ways to begin this process is to compile a timeline of the events that impacted the subject of your search. For those interested, I've compiled a listing of the most relevant genealogical records by category which can be useful in this situation. Feel free to contact me at the email listed at the end of the article.

4. Original Records:

Even if researchers heed the warnings about limiting searches to online sources, failure to include examining the original record, will increase the chance that valuable information will be missed. Even the best compiled abstracts only contain what the abstractor thought was important. To be sure you have everything, you must compare the original document and the abstract. Examining both in light of the historical context usually provides a much more complete picture.

5. Thinking Outside the Box:

Challenges are inevitable in research. When researchers reach a dead end or brick wall, many professionals recommend taking a break for a short time and coming back to the problem. Thinking outside the box involves re-examining the historical context of the challenge. One popular option involves checking to see if other record types, previously ignored, might contain clues. Some examples are listed below. For a more detailed listing of potential record types, feel free to contact me at the email address listed at the beginning of the article.

a. Court Records: Look beyond probate records; if an ancestor is mentioned in conjunction with a civil or criminal case, look for the proceedings and who the informant was.

b. Land Records: Don't just limit yourself to the basic record. Take the time to analyze and evaluate the legal description, stipulations, and the witnesses.

c. Newspapers: Don't jump to the conclusion that there is no way your ancestors would be mentioned in them somewhere as part of a significant local event, court case, etc.

d. Occupational Records: They might shed light on other information besides the job bring performed. e. Organizational Records: Religious affiliation may be mentioned, along with occupation, affiliation, and membership in social groups.

f. Vital Records: Pay close attention to the informant. How likely was it that the information provided was accurate? What was the informant's relationship to the ancestor?

Information For Our New Members

Heritage Fund

The Heritage Fund Committee is accepting applications for the dispersal of scholarship funds. Finding Ancestral Places of Origin

Locating the place of origin for immigrant ancestors can be one of the most frustrating searches encountered by genealogists and historians. While this challenge applies more for immigrants to the United States or Canada, American-born ancestors may present this same issue regarding the birthplace. This can be particularly frustrating if living parents, grandparents, or other family members refuse to discuss any events, facts, or individuals related to the past.

The following list of United States record types have a proven track record for successful research. These records apply to foreign and United States places of origin or birth. - 2. Baptismal/Christenings and Other Church Records
- 3. Bible Records
- 4. Census Records (Federal and States)

5. Civil Birth, Death, and Marriage Records/ Applications (Don't Forget French-Canadian Catholic Church Marriages when applicable)

- 6. Civil/Criminal Court Records
- 7. Delayed Birth Certificates
- 8. Diaries and Journals
- 9. Military Enlistment and Service Records
- 10. Naturalization Records and Court Proceedings
- **11.** Newspaper Obituaries and/or Stories
- (Anniversaries, Personal Profiles, and Weddings)
- 12. Ship Passenger Arrival and Departure Records

If the subject of your search has a unique or unusual surname in a given locality, a general search in these and similar records may yield valuable clues. In other cases, you may need to search for neighbors and/or acquaintances to uncover the information.
