There will be space to display your family photos and mementos. We'll have lots of chairs so the adult can sit and visit while the younger relatives play games.


Our generous anonymous relative will again pay for the rental of the Barn and for the buffet

In response to a questionnaire, Wilma Utley responded:

My full name is Wilma Rosamond Craig Utley.

I was born on Wednesday, March 11, 1921, 3:00 a.m., in Alamo, Tenn. I'm told I came into the world crying.

Childhood memories: I had an older sister [Juanita] and brother [Wayne], later a younger sister [Illda].

Christmas memories: We always had strawberry Jello for Christmas, which was really a treat. One year I got a pair of skates from Santa Claus.

School memories: In 1st grade, we stayed in school all day, had recess in the morning, lunch for an hour, and recess in afternoon. We took our lunch to school, there was no cafeteria.

Vacations: When I was growing up, my family didn't take a vacation. After I married and had children we went to Cherokee, N.C. and visited an Indian village. Our children were amazed at the difference in their skin color and ours.

My first paying job: In high school, I tutored the Kisber children after school for \$5 a week. They are Patsy, Jonas, Jr. and Stuart.

My longest employment: I was a Bookkeeper for Davis Store for 15 years. I worked for Malone & Hyde for 10 years as secretary to Manager, Jackson Division. I retired from Malone & Hyde in August 1987.

My formal education: Graduated from Jackson [TN] High School, 1939. Attended West Tennessee Business College 1940-41.

In response to a questionnaire, Allen Stanley wrote:

My full name is **Luther Allen Stanley.**

I was born on August 22, 1919 at Nutbush, Haywood County, TN. I was delivered by Dr. Walker "at home" on the family farm. I was the first born son, with three older sisters. Later my parents had three other boys.

The first memory I have of my youth is of my maternal grandfather **Medlin**. He was a handsome man who, as a gentleman farmer, dressed up everyday in a suit and tie. He gave me my first pocket knife.... "Buckhorn handle, razor blade, best old metal ever made."

What I remember most about our family celebrating Christmas was getting fruit, nuts and candy from Santa. Then we would have a big family dinner. My fondest memory is of the Fourth of July when we all gathered on the farm to have a sing-along. Mom would play the pump organ and Dad would play the fiddle while we all sang.

One Thanksgiving, my teacher in Holly Grove Elementary School, Mrs. Grace Powell, asked us to tell her what we were most thankful for. I said that I was thankful to live in America where I was free to go to school and church. Mrs. Powell started talking about how blessed we were to live in America, and taught a whole lesson on our freedoms. When she finished, I asked, "Wow, did I say all that?"

As a child we did not take vacations; however, after I married I took my family on a vacation out west. We saw the Black Hills, the Badlands, Yellowstone, and Mt. Rushmore. I was awestruck standing in front of the Presidents on Mt. Rushmore. I never thought a country boy from Nutbush would ever have such an opportunity to see this great country.

My first paying job was at age 17 in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) at Jackson, TN. I made \$50 a month as a field leader and project assistant. We built spillways, bridges, roads and parks. We even built the picnic areas at Chickasaw [State Park].

I was in the military from 1942 through 1946. I served in the Army and in the Coast Artillery. I was assigned to Harbor Defense in Sandy Hook, NJ and Staten Island, NY.

My longest employment as an adult was with the White Motor Company in Memphis, TN, where I was Service Manager for 35 years. After I retired from White, I worked another 20 years for Putt Putt Golf and Games as manager of recreation. I helped design and build the golf course. I also maintained the go-carts and other equipment.

I retired the last time in 2002, to spend more time with my future bride, **Eloise (Utley) Fortner**. We were married on January 5, 2003 and she has kept me busy ever since!

I first met **Eloise** 25 years ago when she and her husband, **Robert Fortner**, were in the same camping club as me and my wife, **Helen**. The four of us were good friends and went to the 1982 World's Fair in Knoxville together with our other Good Sam Camping friends. We continued our friendship for many years eating out together, square dancing, ballroom dancing, and traveling. We both lost our lifelong mates in 2001. Gloria Utley in the News

When **Gloria Utley** decided to redo the kitchen of her Bossier City home a few months ago, she wasn't quite sure of the look she was going for. She did know, however, she wanted a change.

"Our cabinets were stained, caramel wood when we moved in," she said. "I was just getting really tired of that look."

So **Utley** and her husband, **Bob**, turned to professionals for guidance. "The designer and the painter helped me decide on getting a glaze on the cabinets," Gloria said. "And I'm so pleased with it."

Cabinet glazes, a type of wood finish applied by hand, have reigned nationally as a popular style of kitchen cabinetry for the past five or 10 years or so and have found a niche in the local market recently as well, said Charlotte Crawley, owner of Kitchens and Baths by Crawley. "Plain, painted white cabinets or an oak finish with a stain -- that used to be the thing. But glazes have been popular locally the last two or three years. Just about all our cabinets in the showroom have those on them now," she said.

Crawley said that while glazes are available in a wide variety, they typically make cabinets look more aged. "It looks like you poured your coffee on your cabinet and didn't wipe it off, and let it go in the cracks," she said. "It makes the detail on the cabinet work show up and stand out on the cabinets. It kind of helps you relax about your cabinets, too, because they don't have to look so pristine."

Utley admits the thought of putting a glaze on her newly painted cabinets didn't thrill her. "I was a little afraid at first, but I'm so pleased with it now," she said. While glazes

can be used with painted or stained wood, Crawley said they are most often used on painted surfaces, with pewter, coffee and caramel being the most popular shades. "You usually put glazes over painted surfaces, usually it will be a soft white paint, and they will use a coffee color or mocha, or another darker color as a glaze," she said.

Utley stayed true to the trend with her selection, choosing an umber glaze to coat her golden-tone painted cabinets.

Crawley said that while glazing enhances the appearance of most cabinets, it won't work on all of them. "You have to have a cabinet that has edges with panels or raised edges so the glaze can accumulate," she said.

Some cabinet manufacturers only sell their painted cabinets with glazes on them to cover imperfections. "It looks better on all cabinets, but it has a bigger effect on painted ones because it covers any areas that may not be perfect," Crawley said.

Over the last couple of years, the majority of Crawley's customers have purchased glazed cabinets, she said. The trend hasn't spread as quickly to customers at Lowe's Home Improvement Warehouse on Alkay Drive, though. Josh Bowers, cabinet sales specialist, said probably only about 25 percent of his customers purchase a glaze when they buy cabinets. "The most popular shade is probably the oatmeal glaze, and then the frost glaze is second," said Bowers.

But homeowners craving a specialized look such as a glaze should expect to pay more. Bowers and Crawley both estimated glazing will tack on any-where

from 10 percent to 20 percent when determining cabinet prices. "The price depends on a variety of factors -- the company, style, wood grain and color," Bowers said. "The dark glazes on the light background are most expensive; the pewter glazes aren't as bad, but they're all done by hand. That's why it costs more."

Glazes aren't restricted to just newly constructed cabinets. Older or pre-existing cabinets can be updated anytime by topping off the paint job or finish with glaze, but could cost even more, depending on the prep work involved.

"If you want to get your cabinets

glazed, you should call a house painter -- a fairly specialized one, though, not just someone who glops it on," recommends Bowers. Utley said she never has doubted for a second her decision to spend the extra cash on the glazing. "It was definitely worth the extra money," she said. "We also redid the cabinets in the dining area the same way. Everyone notices the cabinets immediately when they walk in."

Utley said her husband is even happy with their decor choices. "He is really proud of (the cabinets). We both are. The kitchen is our favorite area of the house now," she said. "It's so pretty, I could just stand in the kitchen all day and look."




